<u>Demographics:Data Sources-2021-2022 TAPR Report</u>

Groveton Elementary consisted of the following demographic subgroups: White 75%, African American 4.8%, Hispanic 16.6%, Two or more races 3%, American Indian .3%, Asian .3%, Economically Disadvantaged 66.6%, English Language Learners 3%, Special Education 16.6%, and At Risk 11.1%. There are 332 students enrolled from PK-5. Attendance rate was 96.1%. Mobility rate was 20.3%. The average class size was 16 students. The total number of campus staff was 24 Teachers, 1 Professional Support, 1 Campus Administration, and 12 Educational Aides. Average number of years' experience for teachers is 13.2 and 9.6 years with Groveton ISD on average. Student to teacher ratio is 13.6.

The staff at Groveton Elementary work hard to create a positive environment that encourages students to maintain respectful and caring relationships throughout the school community. Students, families, and educators work together to develop, live, and contribute to a shared school vision. High expectations are set to foster a positive setting for learning, academic achievement, and student growth.

- ✓ Build a spirit of cooperation and collaboration among staff and administration
- ✓ Reward classes that spell Perfect Attendance each six weeks (100% attendance earns a letter for the day)

<u>Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment: Data sources: Report cards, Dibels, Benchmarks, STAR Reading</u> <u>& Math, T-Tess, CLI</u>

Curriculum resources for 2022-2023 included <u>Science Fusion</u> for grades K-5, <u>My World Social Studies</u> for grades K-5, and <u>Write Source</u> or teacher made materials for K-5 in Language Arts. <u>Fountas and Pinnell</u> for Reading in addition to a supplemental program <u>Heggerty</u> for phonemic awareness in grades K-2, with PK using <u>Frog Street</u>. Math resources include <u>Go Math</u> and <u>Number Talks</u> for grades K-5. Both Handwriting and Language Arts curriculum K-5 is <u>Zaner Bloser</u>. Renaissance Learning components STAR Math, STAR Reading, STAR Early Literacy, Accelerated Reader, as well as Dibels/MClass, CLI, <u>Istation</u> to progress monitor students each six weeks to identify strengths and weaknesses. An additional measure of our curriculum included STAAR benchmarks, and TEKS based assessments. Other support systems include Starfall, Study Island, Epic, Lexia, and Progress Learning. Teachers are required to document and submit instructional planning each week. Walkthroughs are performed by the campus principal to verify instructional plans are being followed and to offer feedback when needed.

Summary of Needs:

- ✓ Teachers complete a YAG (Year at a Glance) at the beginning of the year to ensure all TEKS are taught by the end of the school year
- ✓ Teachers complete a Pacing calendar each six weeks that align with the YAG
- ✓ Implement a new writing program, My Access, in the lab to improve student's constructed responses on STAAR
- ✓ Implement Reading Eggs and Amplify Texas Elementary Literacy Program in grades K -2 to help with phonemic awareness and phonics to support early reading
- ✓ Implement Reagan Tunstall's <u>Hand2Mind</u> math curriculum in grades K-5 that focuses on small group instruction
- ✓ Utilize Study Island in grades 3-5 to familiarize students with new online tools used on state assessment, STAAR

Family and Community Involvement: Data Sources-

Groveton Elementary plans a variety of parent involvement activities throughout the school year. The school year began with Meet the Teacher the week prior to the start of school. After the parents meet their child's teacher, they are encouraged to attend the Annual Title 1 Parent Involvement Meeting to inform parents of their rights and give them ways to become involved in the education of their child. In September, grandparents are invited to come and eat lunch with their grandkids and in November a Thanksgiving meal is offered for others to participate in. November also includes a food drive that allows the donations to be given back to the families in the community. Book fairs are scheduled for both the fall and spring semester allowing parents to visit the school and participate in the event. Teachers use Class DoJo or newsletters to keep parents informed of student's behavior and academic progress in the classroom. Parent Portal is provided to all parents to keep them abreast of their child's grades online and social media is used to inform them of upcoming events.

School Organization:Date Sources

Groveton Elementary is a PK-5 campus. It consists of 1 Principal, 1 Dean of Discipline, 1 Counselor, 1 Registrar, 1 Secretary, 1 Nurse, 1 Sped Coordinator, 1 ESL/Dyslexia Teacher, 20 Homeroom teachers, 3 Sped teachers, 1 PE teacher, 1 Librarian and 1 Library aide, 12 Paraprofessionals, and 2 RTI teachers. There are 3 teachers in each grade level except for Pre-K where there are only 2. The campus offers PE, computer, and library to all students. Beta club is an organization that is instated in the 5th grade for qualifying students. GT testing and a pullout program is implemented for all students that meet qualifications. University of Interscholastic League (UIL) is offered for students in 2-5 to participate against other school districts.

Technology:Data Sources-

Groveton ISD is committed to technology integration in the classrooms to provide students with the support they need to thrive academically. It helps teachers to integrate new tools that engage their students in unique and innovative ways. Grades PK-2 had approximately 4 computers to use in their classroom for stations and testing. The upper grades 3-5 had carts of laptops that were shared between 3 classes. The school has a computer lab that was accessed by all grades K-2.
