



What are AP Classes?

ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM® (AP®)
COURSES ARE COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSES OFFERED IN
HIGH SCHOOL.

AP courses reflect what is taught in top introductory college courses.

At the end of the course, students take AP Exams that measure how well students have mastered college-level course work.

Students who do well on AP Exams can earn credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college.






Why AP Classes?

AP courses demand more of students than regular honors courses.



AP courses are fastpaced and cover more material than an average high school class.



AP teachers teach students to think critically, analyze and synthesize facts and data, weigh competing perspectives, and write clearly and persuasively.

Help to fine tune critical thinking, time management, and study skills.




Helps you stand out on a college application.

The AP grade scale ranges from 1 to 5:

Grade Meaning:

- 5 Extremely well qualified
- 4 Well qualified
- 3 Qualified
- 2 Possibly qualified
- 1 No recommendation



Cost of AP Exams



Free for Houston County students

Cost May 2025

Parents Pay \$98 per exam. Students may take multiple exams.

Fee Reductions

Free or reduced lunch students get 1 free exam and then pay \$53 per exam.



Things to Consider Before you Commit



Deciding on which and how many AP courses a student should take is a team effort that includes students, parents, and teachers.



AP classes are yearlong commitments.




Data such as class grades and PSAT scores can be a great indicator of potential success but are not the only factors to consider.




Motivation, time management, and determination are factors that while hard to measure, can drastically affect success in AP classes as well as college.

Each student is unique


Consider your future – college major and career

- If it is required for your career and major consider taking the AP course to have a year-long solid foundation

- If a course is strictly a pre-requisite credit, you may want to take DE to complete the course quicker
- If you are planning to complete a degree at the partnering college consider taking DE to jumpstart your degree program requiring no transfer of credits




AP Registration Process







 Students/parents review, complete, and sign the registration form and return it to the basket in the counselors' office on or before February 2nd.





 Students will be notified of classes that will not make due to lack of interest and advised of recommendations from the AP Committee if there is an academic concern.
