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HONESTY

is being truthful in

what you say and do

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Special Education-Title1/LAP- Social Emotional Learning (SEL): Mrs. Duren

This month we have turned our attention to the character trait of <u>Honesty</u>, as defined as living truthfully in your words, actions or thoughts. On the surface this character trait seems simple enough. However our students have come to realize that honesty is more complicated and harder than one might think it would be. Here are some examples of honesty that they have come up with:

- 1. Honesty is important at school and at home; with friends, teachers and family members.
- 2. Honesty is about both small "white lies" as well as "giant whoppers", even if large lies seem worse than small ones. All lies affect trust.
- 3. Honesty is telling the truth, even if it could cause you to get in trouble.
- 4. Honesty is admitting when you are wrong, even if you don't want to.
- 5. Honesty is being fair, even when it could take extra time, and effort.
- Honesty is not stealing or cheating, even when it seems justified, or when others are lying.
- 7. Honesty is speaking up when something isn't right, even when it is upsetting or scary.
- Honesty is representing yourself, your emotion, and your thoughts openly and accurately, even when doing so causes discomfort.
- 9. Honesty is doing right even when no one else is looking / would know if you didn't.
- 10. Honesty is correcting a mistake, even if that mistake benefitted you.

Your students have come to the conclusion that honesty is not nearly as easy as it initially sounds like it would be. Also, they have recognized that honesty seems to be connected with a lot of other character traits we have already learned about, especially Courage, Respect, Responsibility and Kindness. This year in SEL we have intentionally placed more emphasis on how to weave kindness into all aspects of our lives, showing its connection to each character trait we cover in SEL class. While celebrating Dr Seuss earlier this month we had the opportunity in each classroom to read stories and do activities related to Horton and his experiences with being kind as well as being honest, especially regarding his emotions.
