Alumni Spotlight: Mary Ann (Ertelt) Stack, Class of 1945

I was also educated at St. Catherine's (1st grade through 12th grade) and graduated in 1945. My memories from St. Catherine's are many and precious.

I am a product of

For some reason the first memory that pops up is Monsignor Baker and Sister Patrick monitoring the noon playground. They would walk up and down the playground

visiting. Monsignor was a rotund, very dignified looking man. He taught a class at the college. Sister Patrick was a petite nun, she taught English and speech classes at St. Catherine.

I will start at the beginning. In 1st grade I had Sister Rose. There

was a raised sand box in the 1st grade room that had little dolls in a playground, one was dressed like a nun. I thought it was Sister Rose. For 2nd grade, I had Sister Rita, a dear sweet person but rather nondescript. In 3rd and 4th grade, I had Sister Albertine, who later taught music. She had a library in her room, you could bring the books home to read. It instilled in me the love for reading. In 5th and 6th grade, I had Sister Gertrude. (In another life she could have been an actress.) If the class would get their work all done on certain days, she would tell us stories. I don't know where she got her material, but she held her class in rapt attention. In 7th and 8th, I had Sister Charles, she treated me like a person, with respect. One of my favorites, she did have a temper, so no one wanted to rile her up!

I was in grade school during the depression, and high school during the war. I'm sure that had some effect on me. The chapel was in daily use with Mass, the church wasn't even heated during the week until they finished off the basement and had activities down there.

There were 40 in our class, the largest class to graduate thus far. They had to close the high school because the classes were too large and they couldn't accommodate them.

I am grateful for the sacrifices my parents made to give us that education. My mother didn't drive, so my father would come in from the field during his busy time to pack us up and bring us in after milking 10 or 12 cows by hand, until one of us was old enough to drive. Children, count your blessings!

I had 6 children, 15 grandchildren, 22 great-grandchildren and counting. I live in an assisted living facility.

Friday, November 4th is going to be a night worth celebrating! The 50th annual St. Catherine School Fall Auction will be held at the Valley City Eagles Club.

The theme for this year's auction is "How Sweet It Is!". This fundraiser has been successful in past years. This "sweetness" has been cooked up by the generosity of the community and surrounding area businesses, parents, families, and the great support of the members of the parish of St. Catherine of Alexandria over the last 50 years.
