Four Clay County Middle School eighth-graders made big commitments Wednesday, October 23, 2024. If they stick to it then there's a big payoff waiting once they finish high school.


Students Kimora Daniels, Malia Deloach, Kariya Jones and Kameron Sol are Clay County's REACH scholars for 2024-2025.

REACH (realizing educational achievement can happen) is Georgia's needs-based mentorship and college scholarship program aimed at helping students who could be the first in their families to attend college and need money toward an in-state postsecondary education. If the students maintain a 2.5 GPA, good attendance and behavior they will receive a scholarship upon graduating from high school.

Reading At Home...Can Make A Huge Difference!

Choose Books That Are At An Appropriate Reading Level For Your Child

- Use the five finger rule. Open the book to any page and ask your child to read. Put up a finger every time your child does not know a word. If you have put up more than five fingers before the end of the page this book is too hard for your child.
 - Choose books that match your child's likes and interests.

- Play a board game
- Visit your local library

The Teacher's Corner:

Straw Polls was an opening activity for Mrs. Mathis 1st grade class to engage students in ways to collect, organize, and represent data. The posing question was, "What is your favorite flavor of ice cream?" Students had to choose from three flavors, vanilla, chocolate and strawberry. They voted by placing their straw in the designated cup and tally marks to record the number of votes for each flavor of ice cream. Students used the collected data to ask and answer questions, as well as practice addition and subtraction strategies.



Mr. S Johnson's 8th Grade GA's Studies class learns the important role that Georgia played in the American Revolution.

Mr. S Johnson's Social Studies class is learning about conflicts and changes along with compromises that led to our country's independence, with a focus on the role that Georgia played in these changes. To solidify the learning of this standard, the class created anchor charts/graphic organizers that were displayed on the wall in the classroom for reference.

The Articles of Confederation, which was America's first attempt at creating a national government after gaining its independence from England. This document provided America with a very weak central government from 1776-1789 when it was replaced by the Constitution that we have today.
