Text That Includes a Fragment	Complete Sentence			
Lindsay wants to buy a watch. Saw one in the window display.	Lindsay wants to buy the watch that she saw in the window display. (combined ideas using a relative clause)			
Paolo had an interest in learning Web design. Signed up for a computer class.	Interested in learning Web design, Paulo signed up for a computer class. (combined ideas using a participial phrase)			
The troupe of lively young dancers.	The troupe of lively young dancers moved gracefully across the stage. (added a predicate)			
The troupe of lively young dancers.	The crowd applauded the troupe of lively young dancers. (added a subject; added a verb to create a predicate)

Other times, there is only a comma separating the clauses. (This second type of run-on sentence is known as a <b>comma splice</b> .)
