

140 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE

SUPERINTENDENT SCOTT HAGERMAN UPDATE

Our district will celebrate its 140th anniversary in 2026. As we reflect on our rich history, we are proud of our student's academic and personal achievements and grateful for the unwavering support of our community.

Our mission is to provide a world-class education that empowers all students to reach their full potential. Our vision is to equip graduates for mastery founded upon excellence and integrity.

How Are We Doing?

We are pleased to share that Tanque Verde Unified School District is one of only 1% of districts nationwide where students are learning at higher levels now than before the pandemic started, according to the Education Recovery Scorecard, a research project from Harvard and Stanford. In their most recent report (March 2025), the Education Recovery Scorecard concluded that "Relative to 2019, students in your district are 0.80-grade equivalents ahead in math and 0.07-grade equivalents ahead in reading."

The data indicates our students started the 2024-2025 school year with 13 days of learning ahead in English Language Arts (ELA,) and 144 days ahead in math from where they started in 2019.

This is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our students, teachers, and staff. We are proud of our progress, but we know there is still more work to be done.

Goals for 2030

The Governing Board has set ambitious goals for 2030, which will guide and lead our students to a passing rate above 80% on


state achievement assessments. All students can demonstrate mastery at high proficiency levels, and we are committed to providing the resources and support necessary to make that happen.

HISTORY OF THE TANQUE VERDE SCHOOLS

The Tanque Verde Unified School District (TVUSD) has a rich history dating back to the late 19th century. Established in 1886, the district was founded to serve the educational needs of a rural ranching community.

In 1900, the "Report of the Superintendent of Public Instruction" recorded Tanque Verde with one teacher for 44 students and an annual budget of \$857. Over the decades, as the region developed and the population grew, the district expanded to meet the evolving needs of the community. By 1986, TVUSD proudly celebrated 100 years of public education, marking a century of commitment to student learning and achievement. Today, TVUSD is thriving with 2,200 students, 180 teachers, and an annual budget of \$18 million. What began as a one-room schoolhouse has now grown to four school sites educating students from preschool through 12th grade.

Emily Gray Junior High for grades 7-9 opens on the property at Melpomene Way and the school at Tanque Verde Road becomes Tanque Verde Elementary

VOLUNTEERS MAKE AN IMPACT

Tanque Verde Unified School District (TVUSD) schools flourish not only because of dedicated educators and students but also because of the passionate volunteers who generously give their time and energy.

Volunteers in TVUSD contribute in numerous ways, including assisting teachers, serving as members of the Parent Teacher Groups (PTG), organizing school programs, campus beautification projects, and supporting extracurricular activities. Their commitment helps create a tight-knit

school community and supportive educational environment.

Susan Fry, a parent and former Governing Board member, finds volunteering to be a way to foster community engagement. "When I stepped off the Governing Board, I wanted to find ways to rebuild the sense of community after COVID. Add a desire to serve students, teachers, and staff who needed help, and Weekend Eats was born. It's been a gratifying experience to see the community

step up with food, monetary, and packing support".

Susan Fry visits each campus weekly, delivering bags of food for students and staff as part of the Weekend Eats program.

"Nothing makes me happier than spending time in the TVUSD schools and seeing masterful teachers captivate their students, hearing giggles on the playground, and listening to the raucous noise in the cafeteria," says Fry. "Children bring a curiosity and love of learning that is inspiring to be around."

Many TVUSD volunteers get involved because they have a child or grandchild at a school. Rick Meyers dedicates his time to the Garden at ACES. "My grandson attended ACES about five years ago," said Meyers. "They started a Garden Club, and my grandson was interested, so we joined! Even after my grandson moved schools, I decided to stay and help out because it seemed the extra help was needed."

Known as the Press Box Crew, John Maciulla, Glenn Loflin, and Jacob Scott meet weekly during the football season to run the clock and scoreboard and handle the announcing in the press box.

"My son started playing football for TVHS as a freshman. I'm a huge football fan, but I recognized that the current announcer didn't provide enough

information for those who weren't as big of a fan to follow the game," explained Glenn.

"I love giving back to the community and district I live in," said John Maciulla. "Being a high school football fan, I love watching the boys compete, play as a team, and learn to rely on their teammates to achieve the goal."

The district recognizes volunteers' countless hours and dedication and deeply values their contributions. "We couldn't do what we do without them," said Superintendent Dr. Scott Hagerman, "Their kindness, dedication, and generosity set an incredible example for our students.'

Reflecting on his experience, Rick Meyers said, "I would encourage anyone to volunteer at any of the schools in TVUSD. There is a sense of belonging to a community that helps us all to show we care about our children and make a small difference in making our schools the best they can be. I feel it is a privilege to be a part of the energy a school provides."

"Find a place you're passionate about. There is a place for everyone", encouraged Glen Loflin. "Get involved. As a small district, we don't have the budgets of the larger school districts, so volunteering allows the district to use its resources in other more important areas," explained John Macculia.

"Just do it!", says Fry, "There are many ways to be involved in the schools and the district as a whole. Whether you donate money, spend time as a classroom volunteer, or offer expertise, now more than ever, schools can use resources. Knowing that you are making a difference for your kids, your

grandkids, or your neighborhood's kids is gratifying. And what you get back will be far more than what you give!"


