This event preceded yet another amazing Giving Tuesday, where so many of our past and present families came together to offer their financial support for our school and match the pledges offered by both our Board of Trustees and the Jessie Ball DuPont Fund to help our Annual Fund continue to grow and provide for our students in so many wonderful ways!

An Eventful Year

Beth Fore Stadium

For many of our alumnae, a ride through campus brings back memories of Hall of Fame Coach Beth Fore. Memories of championships won both on the diamond and on the court. Memories of laughter shared on bus trips, on campus, and before and after games. Memories of afternoons filled with sacrifice and sweat in Gilmer Gym, wind sprints late in the evening with nothing more than the headlights of cars illuminating their paths, and a developed drive amongst our young ladies to succeed in the classroom, on the field and court, and, in life.

For over 45 years, Mrs. Beth Fore was a beloved teacher, as well as a softball and basketball coach at Prince Edward Academy/Fuqua School. During her coaching career, she saw softball on the Al Smith Field transition from the slow-pitch sport she loved to fast-pitch softball. As with anything Mrs.

Fore touched, she sought perfection. While she did not bring home a state title in her first year of fast pitch, she did win the conference championship. The following year, she brought home the state title. In total, Mrs. Fore led her softball teams to 16 conference championships and 6 state titles with an overall record of 535-114, to include four undefeated seasons with the back-to-back undefeated years of 1994 (25-0) and 1995 (26-0).

Inside Gilmer Gym, Mrs. Fore led the girls' basketball teams to 5 conference championships with an overall record of 335-241. Additionally, she coached numerous athletes who then went on to play at the collegiate level in both softball and basketball.

On Thursday, April 28, the softball stadium officially became the Beth Fore Softball Stadium in honor of our beloved teacher and coach. A granite marker was placed in front of the press box that features a plaque in Mrs. Fore's memory, generously donated by former players and Luck Stone. Additionally, an anonymous donor graciously provided an incredible scoreboard signifying the naming of the Beth Fore Softball Stadium.

Many former players, numerous alumni, friends, and family were on hand at the dedication ceremony. Her players stated, "Coach Fore taught us hard work, discipline, accountability, sportsmanship, respect, and humility. She required us to be good students first, good athletes second, and to fear the wind sprint."

“Upcycled” Art Projects Add Character to Campus

Upper school students in Mrs. Audrey Sullivan’s art class and middle school students in the STEAM Wheel completed recycled art projects, using only reused materials to produce each piece. Faculty, staff, families, and students were asked to donate recycled items that were no longer wanted or needed, such as bottle caps, wire, utensils, buttons, bubble wrap, hardware

pieces, and many other interesting household finds. Students then brainstormed structural art-form ideas and developed a plan for executing their creations. Callie Major '23 created a brilliant jellyfish using a recycled colander, beads, and wire. Hunter Stimpson '25 used bubble wrap, utensils, and pipe to create a magnificent crab.

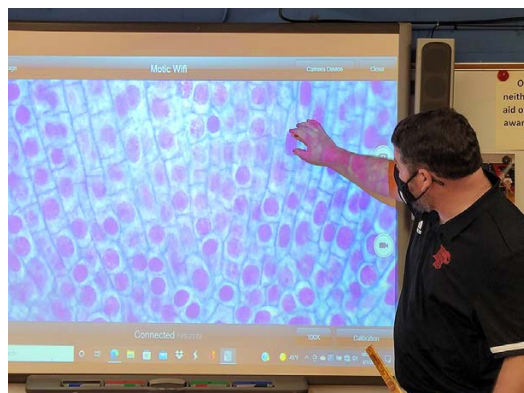
Our middle school STEAM Wheel students completed a special project for one of the lower school playgrounds. Seventh and eighth grade students used recycled bottle caps to make beautiful flowers that were hung along the playground fence line to brighten up the space. Audrey Sullivan, art teacher and project leader, inspired her students to use their creativity to make the playground a space our younger Falcons could enjoy.



Additionally, upper school students created a replica of High Bridge using recycled bottle caps. The High Bridge is a historic landmark, formerly a railroad bridge, which crosses the Appomattox River. The remains of the bridge, now known as the High Bridge Trail State Park, is frequented by many visitors each year. Trey Stimpson '22 was the lead artist on the mural and about half of the class worked on the project for several months. The mural hangs on the wall in the corridor leading to the art room.

Students thoroughly enjoyed exploring their imaginative wheelhouse by creating these upcycled masterpieces.

New Science Technology Added at Upper School



The upper school science department received funding to purchase a microscope with the ability to project and manipulate images. Fuqua science students now can look at the microscopic world without the need to share microscopes. “Microscopy is a difficult technique to learn,” commented John Boswell, upper school science teacher. “By watching the instructor manipulate the scope, students gain a better understanding of the techniques involved.” Our science teachers are very appreciative of this generous gift, which will enhance our science program.

PK Students Learn with New Smartboards

Across the country, many elementary, middle and high school classrooms, including those at Fuqua, have Smartboards in their classrooms. Smartboards are a valuable tool in education that allow students to interact with lessons, which can make learning more engaging and effective. This can be especially true for pre-kindergarteners who love learning “by doing.” Thanks to a generous donor, both our PK3 and PK4 classrooms were gifted a Smartboard for instruction. Our PK classrooms use the boards to manipulate shapes, improve their fine motor coordination by tracing objects, view videos and images that connect with a lesson, and play interactive educational games as a group helping foster essential learning skills with a hands-on



approach. Thank you to this anonymous donor for allowing even our littlest Falcons to soar with this newest technology!

Brenton M. Estorffe '08 Memorial Scholarship Established

The Brenton M. Estorffe '08 Memorial Scholarship was established this year by a group of alumni, who were impacted greatly by the relationships they formed with fellow alumnus Brenton Estorffe. According to the guidelines established, the scholarship recipient will receive a \$1000 annual tuition grant, renewable through graduation. The scholarship is open to new students in grades 9, 10, 11, along with current rising 9th graders. Recipients will be selected by a committee comprised of the Head of School, Upper School Head, Director of Admissions, and Business Manager. Rudee Atkinson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Atkinson, was the first recipient of the Brenton M. Estorffe '08 Memorial Scholarship.

Students who wish to be considered must submit an application and must be mission appropriate, agree to follow the school code of conduct, and have accepted enrollment at Fuqua School. Applicants for the scholarship should demonstrate the following qualities which were characteristics of Brenton Estorffe during his lifetime:

- Personable and outgoing
- Loyal team player
- Self-motivated
- Engaged in extracurricular activities

Brenton Estorffe's time at Fuqua as a foreign exchange student from Australia was nothing short of remarkable. He never met a stranger and made a positive impact on everyone he met. Those who had the pleasure of knowing him remember that his quick wit, infectious smile, and easy laughter could light up a room. During his time as a student, this charming young man stole the hearts of the Fuqua School community.

Brenton was also a formidable foe on Fuqua's basketball team and went on to play both basketball and football at the collegiate level. Later in his life, he showed the same commitment and dedication to his family and friends. When tragedy struck in 2018, Brenton lost his life, even though his heroic actions saved his family.

This scholarship is intended to continue Brenton's life work by encouraging his values: be a friend to those you meet; love deeply those you hold dear; and when given the opportunity, step up to the challenge. Brenton exemplified this code and served as a model for others. Work hard, play hard, and take care of your family.

The Class of 2022 has been on a journey together and are now nearing a monumental milestone. Some enjoyed this journey together since Pre-Kindergarten. Others joined the class along the way in lower school, middle school, and upper school. Together, they enjoyed and endured



the peaks, the valleys, the twists, and turns of this journey through their formative years as a family, and together, they will always represent Fuqua School as the Class of 2022,” commented Head of School Chance Reynolds in his remarks to the Class of 2022.

Fuqua School’s Class of 2022 has five summa cum laude (GPA 4.0+) graduates, six magna cum laude (GPA 3.6–3.99) and four cum laude (GPA 3.2–3.59). Our 20 graduates were collectively offered over \$2.96 million in scholarships to various colleges and universities; they will use \$1.1 million in academic scholarships or an average of \$55,000 in financial assistance for each senior. Additionally, two members of the Class of 2022 signed to play sports at the next level. Lauren Jamerson plays softball at Sweet Briar College and Andrew McDowell plays baseball at Averett University.



“Congratulations, seniors, on the passing of this milestone. You earned your spot on the stage, and you have every reason to be proud,” Reynolds added. “Your dedication to your studies and your school is to be commended. Your commitment to not only setting goals, but achieving those goals is to be applauded. Your drive and determination to succeed is to be celebrated, and with diploma in hand, you are ready to step into the future of your dreams!”

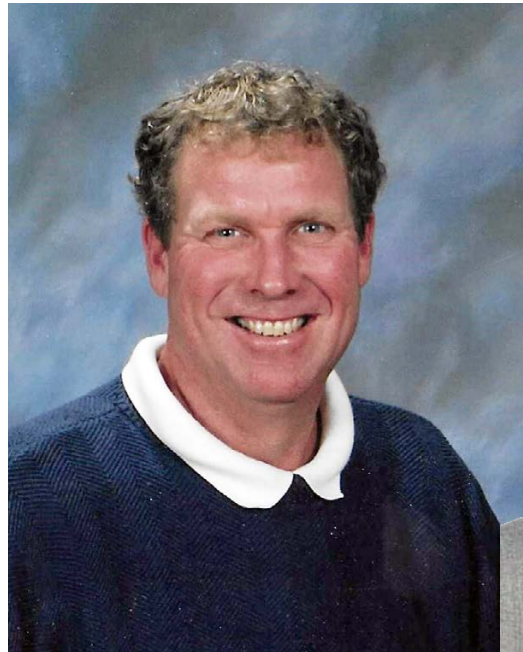
Robert Morris “Bobby” Jones was born in Farmville, Virginia to Charlie L. Jones, Jr. and Virginia Morris Jones, who was a teacher at Prince Edward Academy. Bobby grew up on Poor House Dairy Farm in Rice and was a 1977 graduate of Prince Edward Academy. He loved living on the farm and chose farming as his career. He graduated from Virginia Tech with a degree in Dairy Science and returned to take over the farm in 1981.

Bobby was an active member of the Prince Edward County community, serving on the Prince Edward Board of Supervisors since 2000 and the Planning Commission since 1988. He was a member of Sharon Baptist Church as well as a member of the Prince Edward Ruritan Club for 37 years. He served on numerous dairy and cooperative boards, as well as boards for Farm Credit and the Farmers’ Cooperative.

Bobby was always eager to lend a helping hand and gave generously to meet the needs of others, such as providing the meat for the annual Ruritan Stew, pushing his neighbors’ driveways after a snowstorm, or bringing a paper bag full of candy for the children at every family gathering. Bobby was known for his contagious smile, generosity, and compassionate heart. He devoted his life to farming, family, and friends.

His brother, William “Billy” Jones, 1972 alumni of Prince Edward Academy, recalls the quality education and guidance they received from PEA. “Education has changed. We believe that Fuqua School has kept the same standards as when we were there. The social development, guidance, leadership skills, and initiatives are irreplaceable.”

Bobby’s legacy will live on through the generous donation he made to Fuqua School through planned giving. For that, we are forever grateful.

Legends of the Fall

The PEA/Fuqua School Athletic Hall of Fame inducted three Legends of the Fall on Saturday, March 5. Coaches Lewis “Skeeter” Fore and Walter “Bozo” Addleman were inducted, and Coach Robert “Bob” Hazelwood was inducted posthumously as former players, family, and numerous friends were on hand.

In his opening comments of the evening, Chance Reynolds, Head of School commented, “During their tenure, these three men became the examples our athletes followed, the voices they heard, and the smiles seen when our alumni look back upon these years. It seems only fitting that all three would become the newest members of the PEA/Fuqua School Athletics Hall of Fame.”

Keith Dickson ’72, Professor Emeritus, National Defense University, retired Colonel, U.S. Army Special Forces posed the question, “Why was the football experience here so long ago so unique and so memorable?” Without a doubt he attributes his experience to these Legends of the Fall. In answering that question, he stated, “These are remarkable men. Nothing fancy, nothing complicated about them. They were straightforward and matter of fact, with each man possessing, in his own way, the secret to molding individuals and building them into a team that operated as an extension of their will.”

Later in the evening he added, “What a remarkable triumvirate and what imperishable gifts they gave me. When I graduated and left Farmville to go on what has been an altogether remarkable journey, their collective influence, just as



remarkable, stayed with me. I am grateful to have the opportunity to thank them now and assure them that their unique skills have gone far beyond the football field to encompass a multitude of significant personal and professional achievements.”

“It is very difficult to talk about one coach without talking about the other two. They were A TRIO,” stated Kenneth Batts ’76, and fellow Hall of Famer, in his introduction speech for Coach

Addleman. “They challenged us, both mentally and physically, lasting together for close to 40 years.”

Year after year, a tradition of excellence was established by Coaches Fore, Hazelwood and Addleman. Under the leadership of these coaches, the PEA football teams enjoyed unprecedented success from 1968–1992, with an overall winning percentage of .725, 8 conference championships, and an overall record of 148 wins, 56 losses, and 2 ties.

Additionally, Head of School Chance Reynolds announced that he had been approached by an alumnus who shared that his wish was for our school to honor Coaches Walter “Bozo” Addleman and Robert “Bob” Hazelwood in a similar manner as what we have done in the past for Coach Lewis “Skeeter” Fore. When asked what he had in mind, he replied, “For some of us, these three gentlemen were the only coaches we ever knew. They taught us how to win. They taught us how to persevere. They taught us what it takes to accomplish a goal. As a result, I want the Falcons of today and tomorrow to always remember how much these three gentlemen have meant to our school.”

Words could never truly express the loss we feel or the depth of gratitude we owe to Coach Fore for the many years that he spent coaching, teaching, and mentoring the many students who walked our hallways here on the hill or set foot on the football and baseball fields.

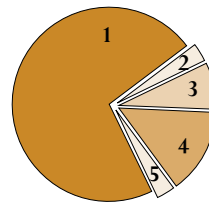

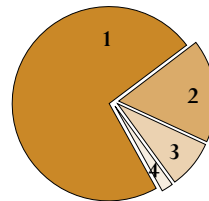
