

Use the different sections of this letter to begin conversations with your child about what he or she is learning.

Big Idea: What does *respect* mean to you?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: Little Havana

Summary: In this realistic story, a girl named Marisa is reluctant to visit her Cuban relatives in Miami, Florida. She is soon drawn in, however, by the sights, sounds, and smells of Little Havana.

Essential Questions: What can learning about your heritage teach you about yourself? How can you have fun by trying new things?

DISCUSS with your child ways that he or she can learn more about family traditions.
