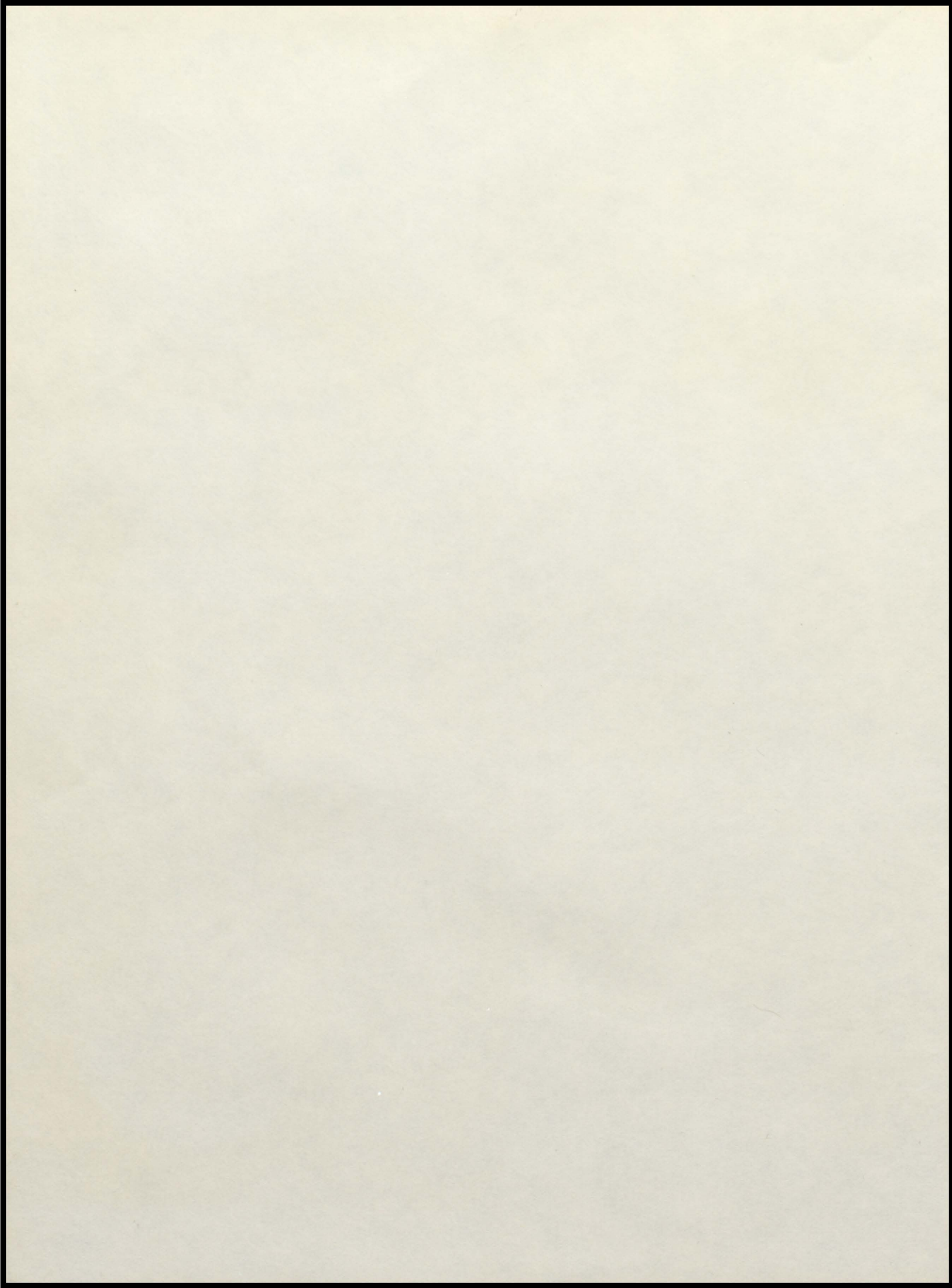

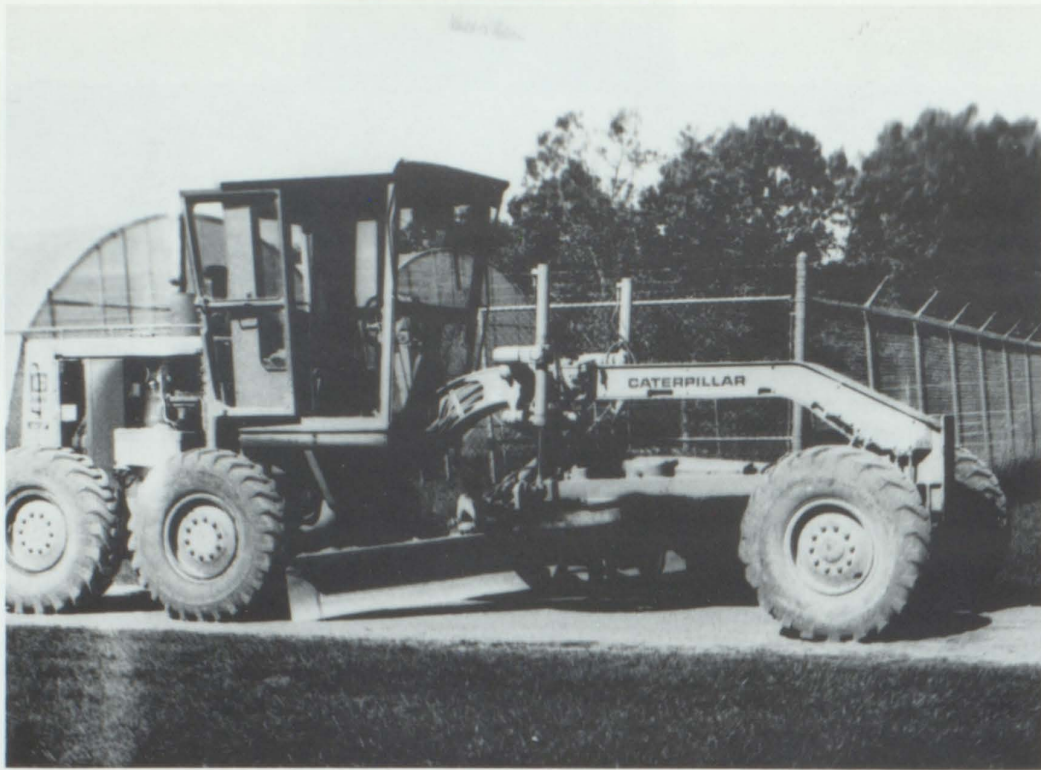

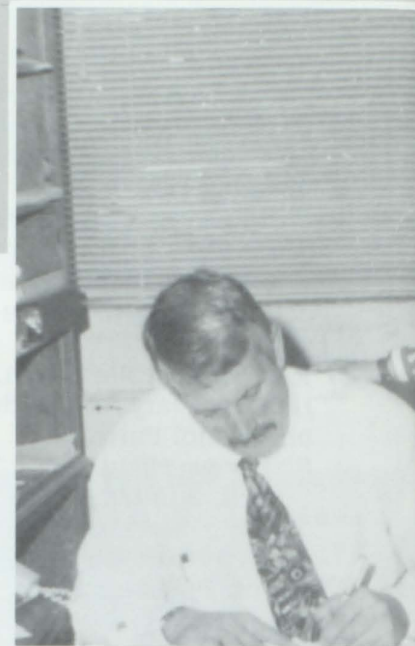

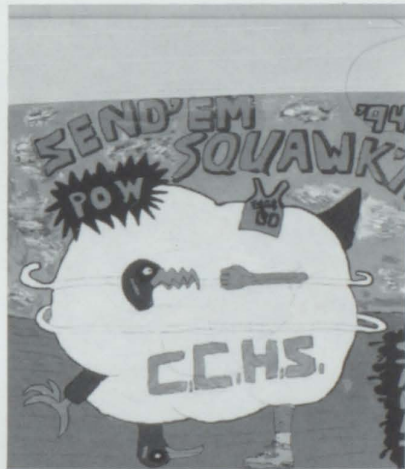

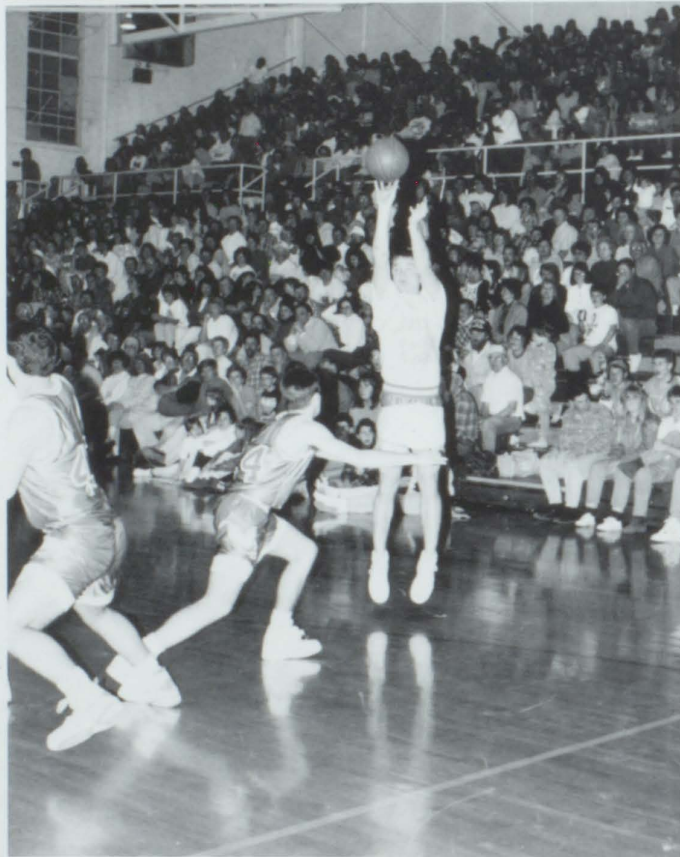

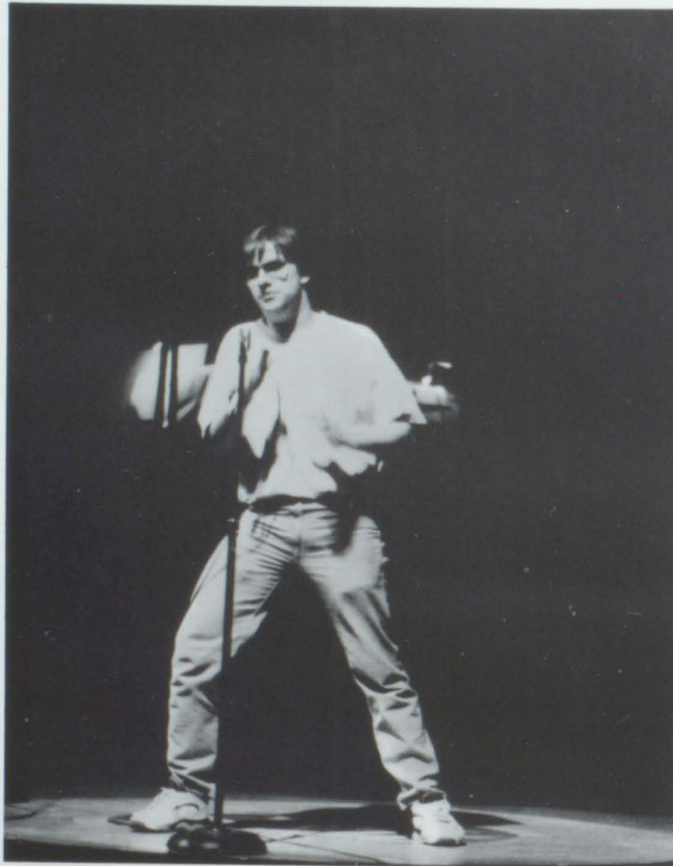

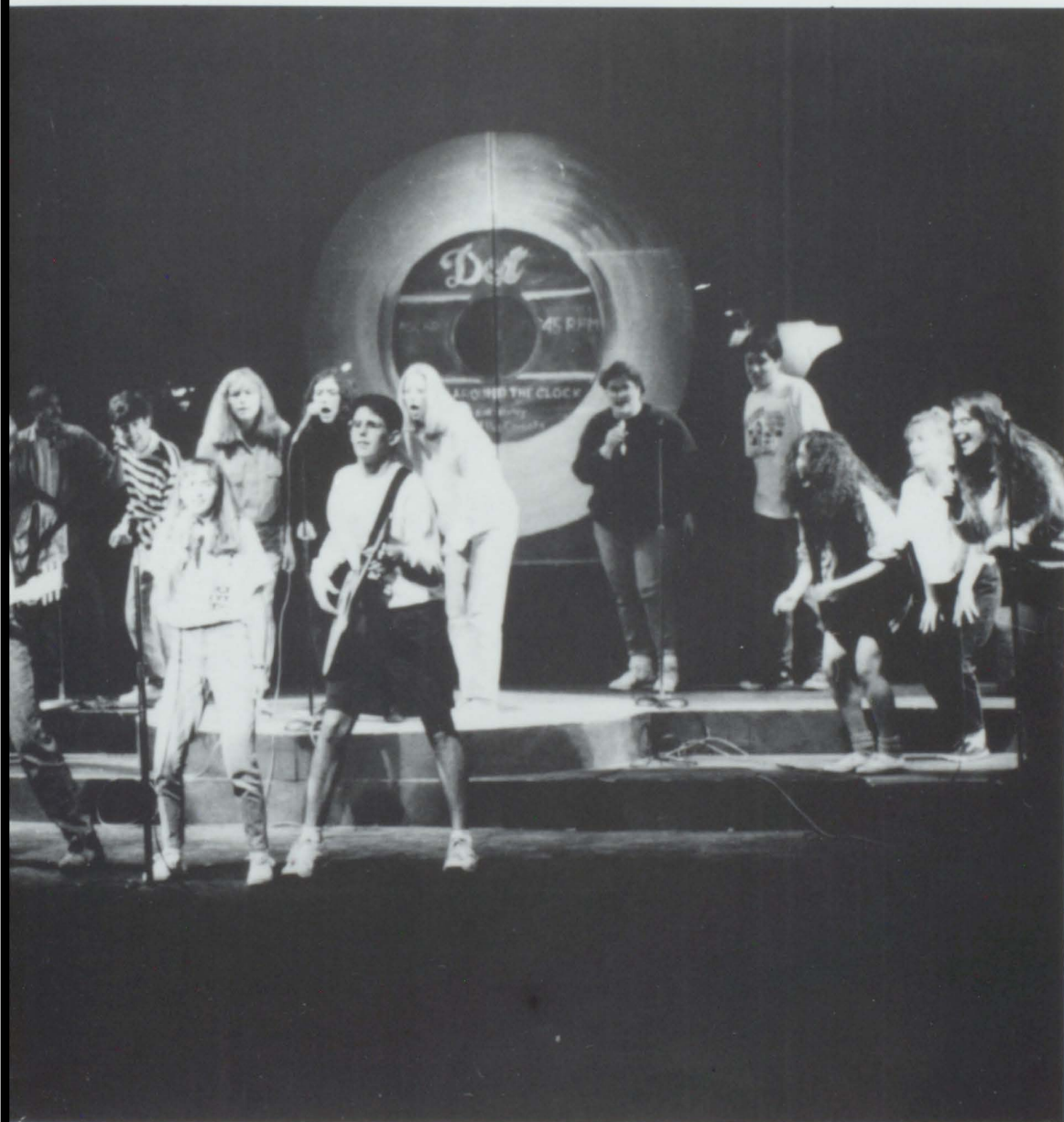
A Brand New Beat

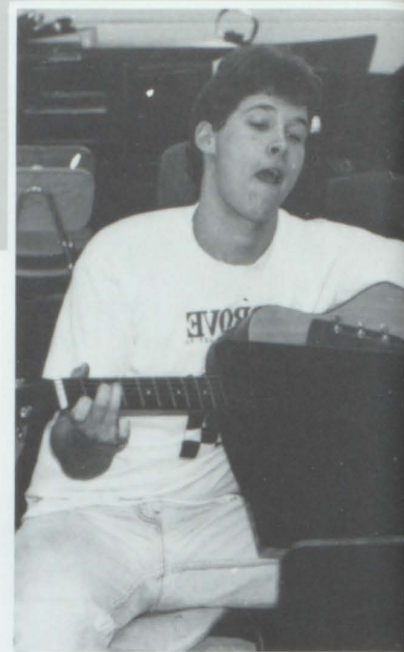

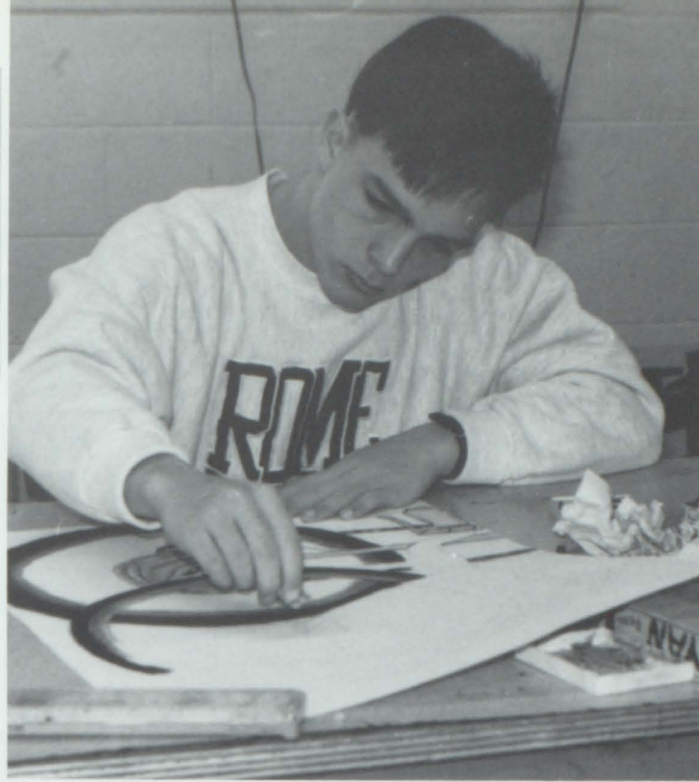

Talents Revealed

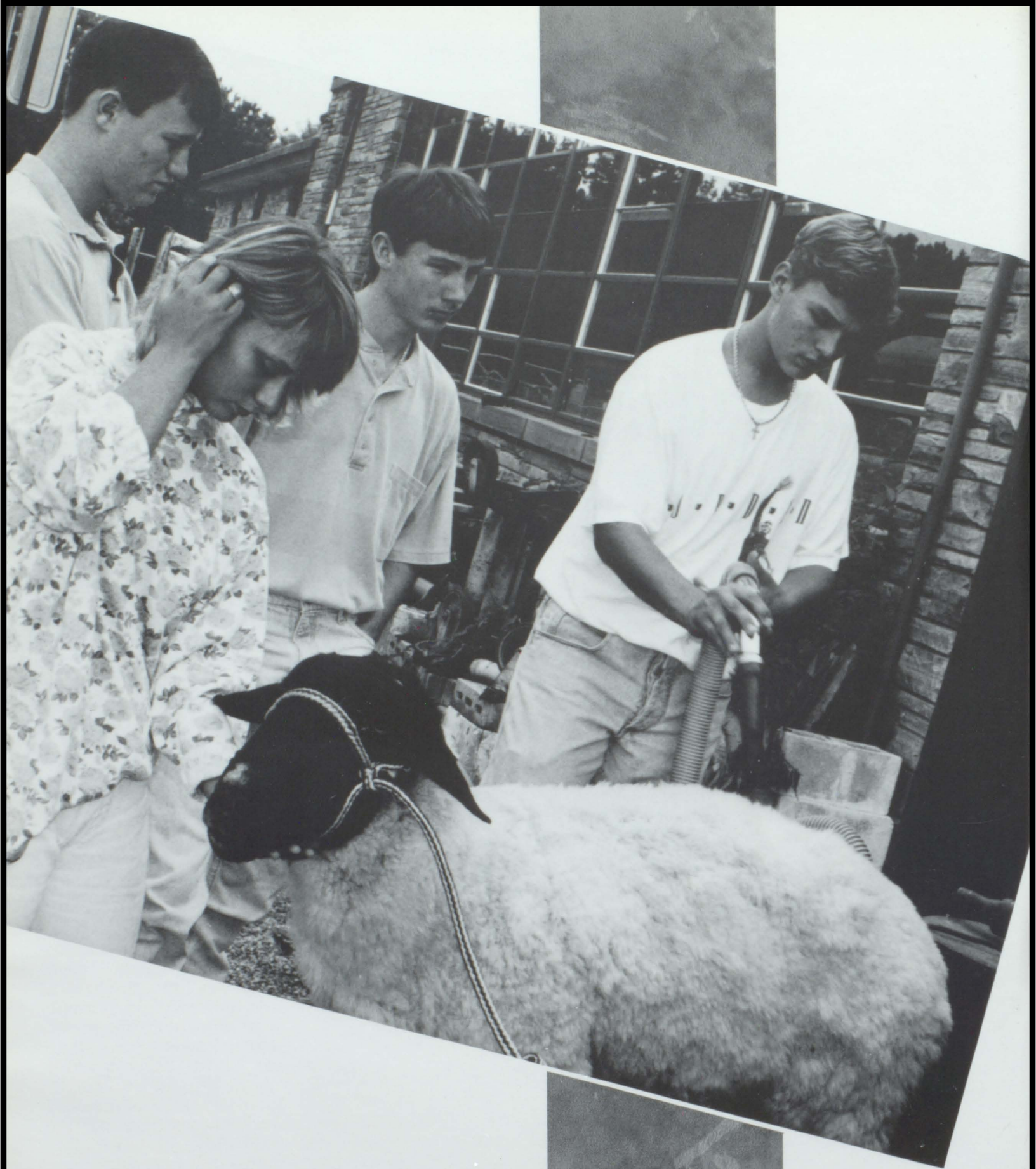

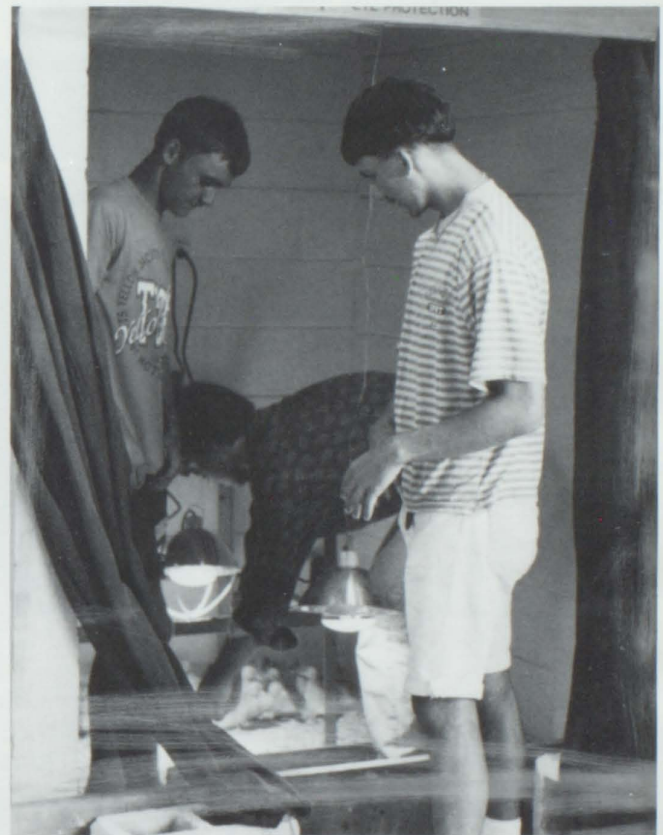

Woody.

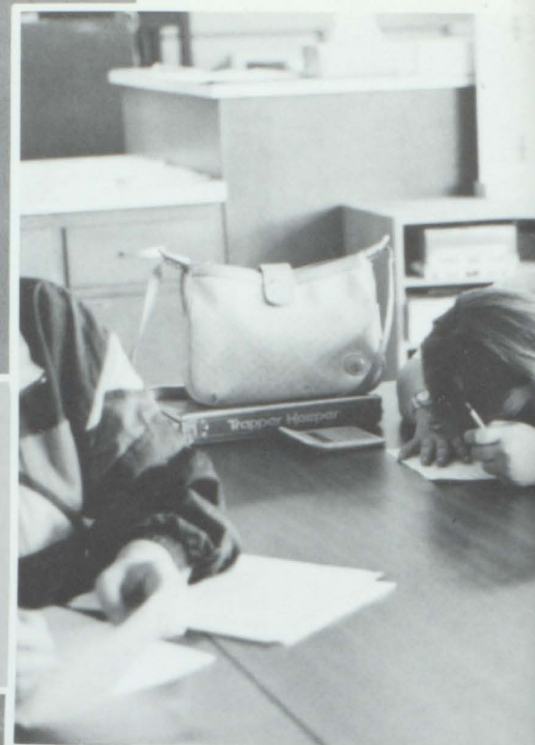

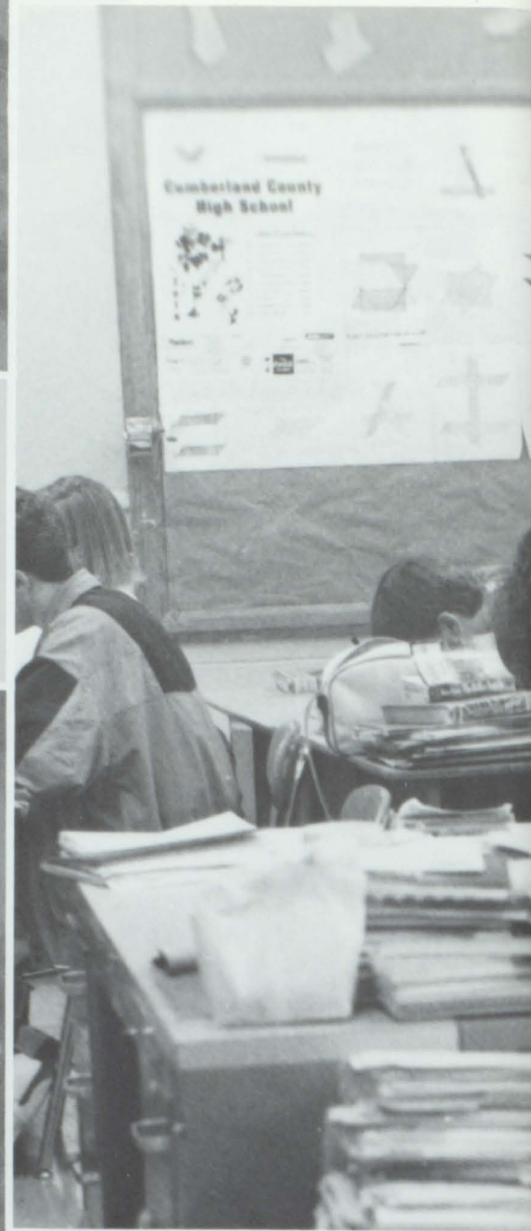

Students had to consider elective courses carefully when planning for the social studies requirement. Recently, several colleges changed their entrance requirements to include either world history or world geography.

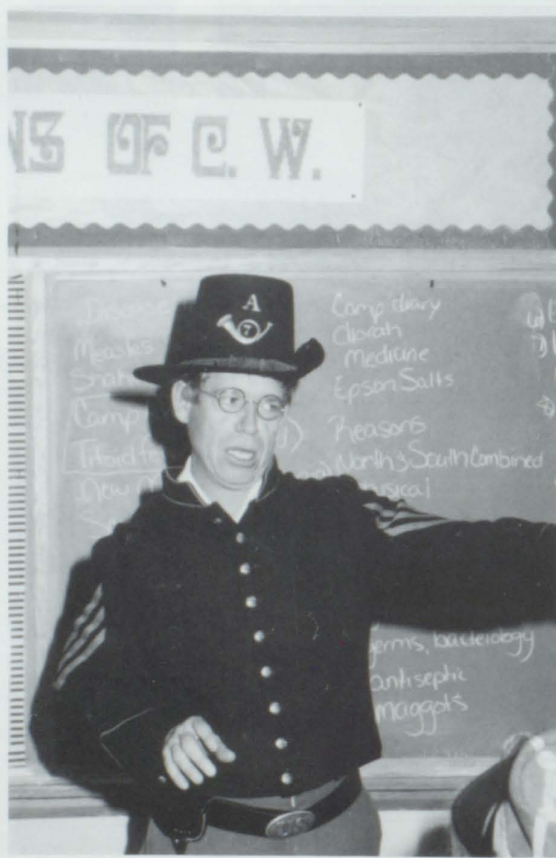

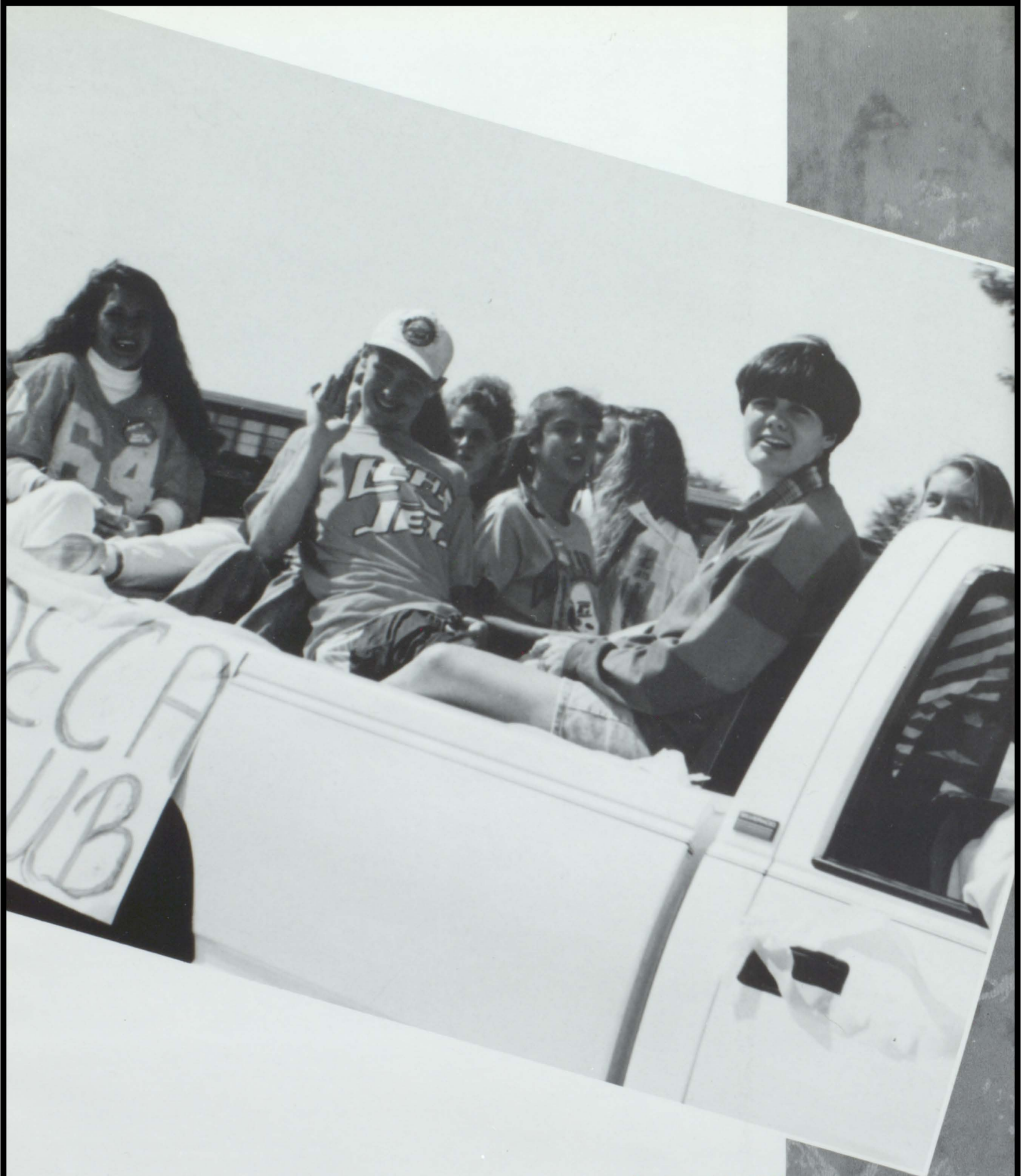

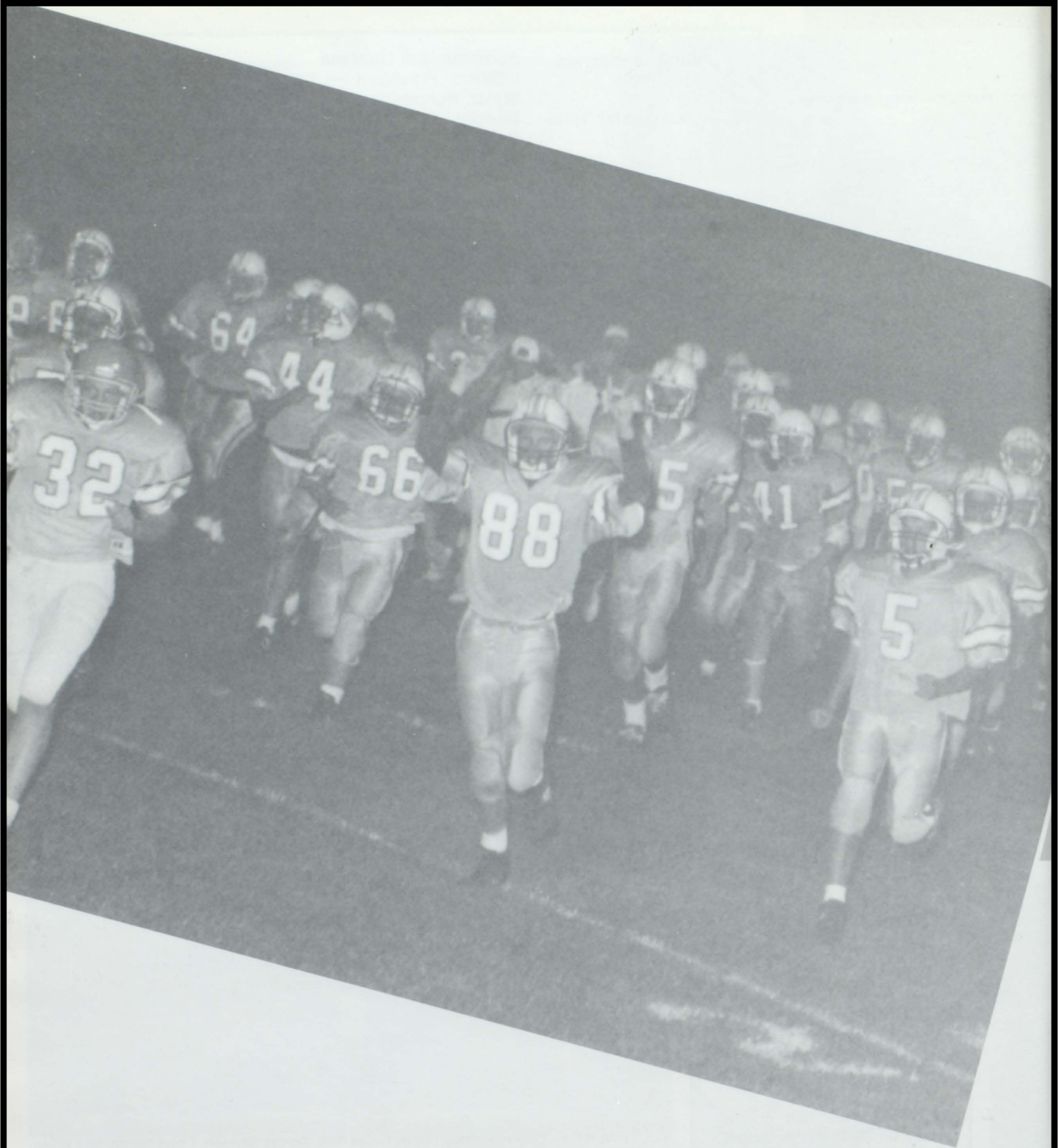

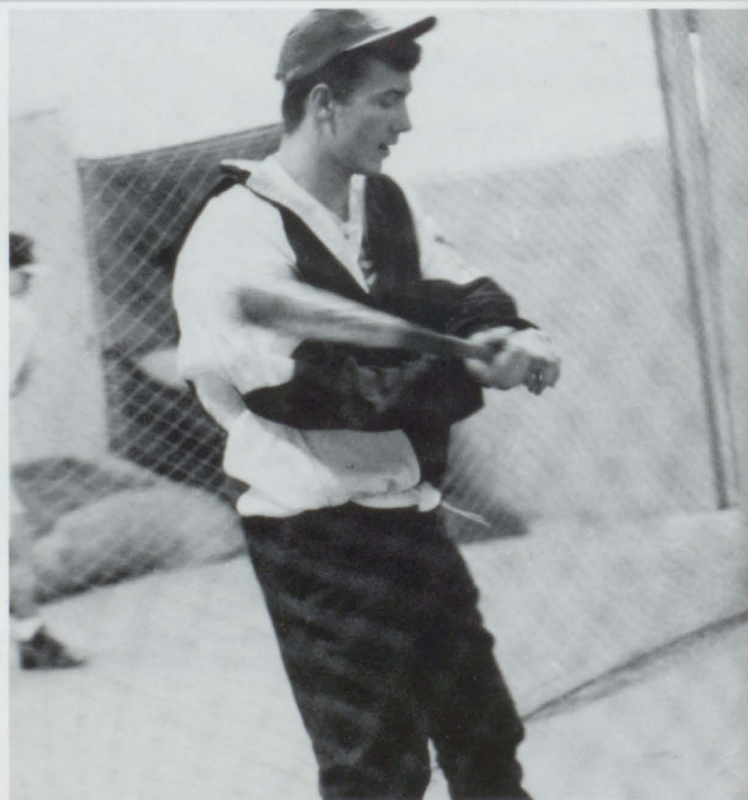

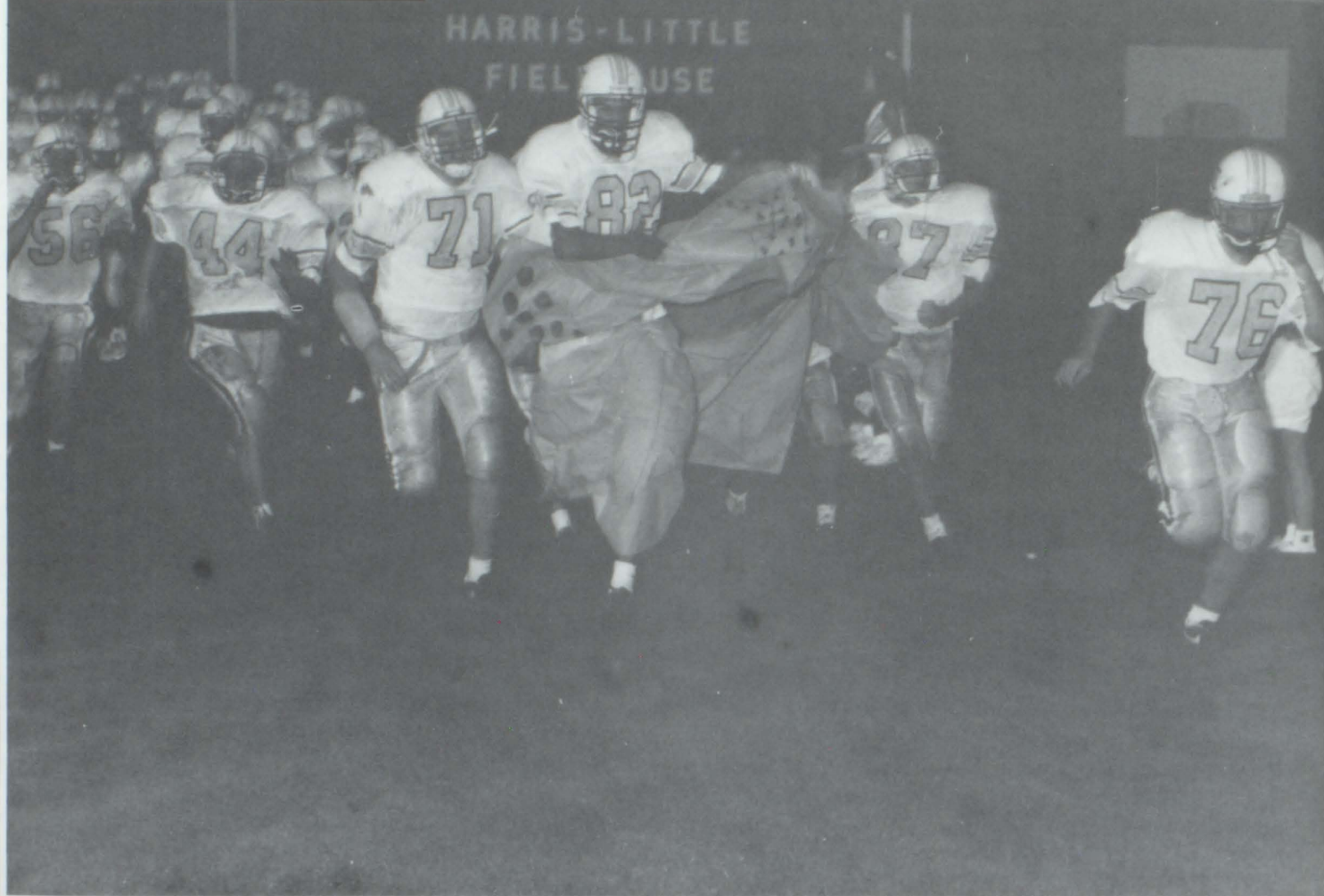

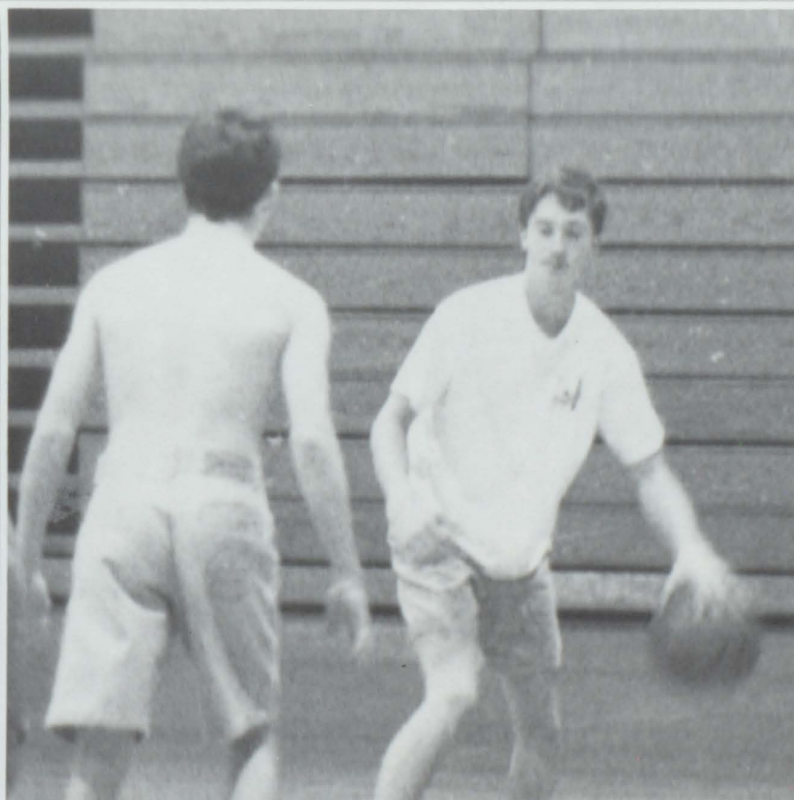

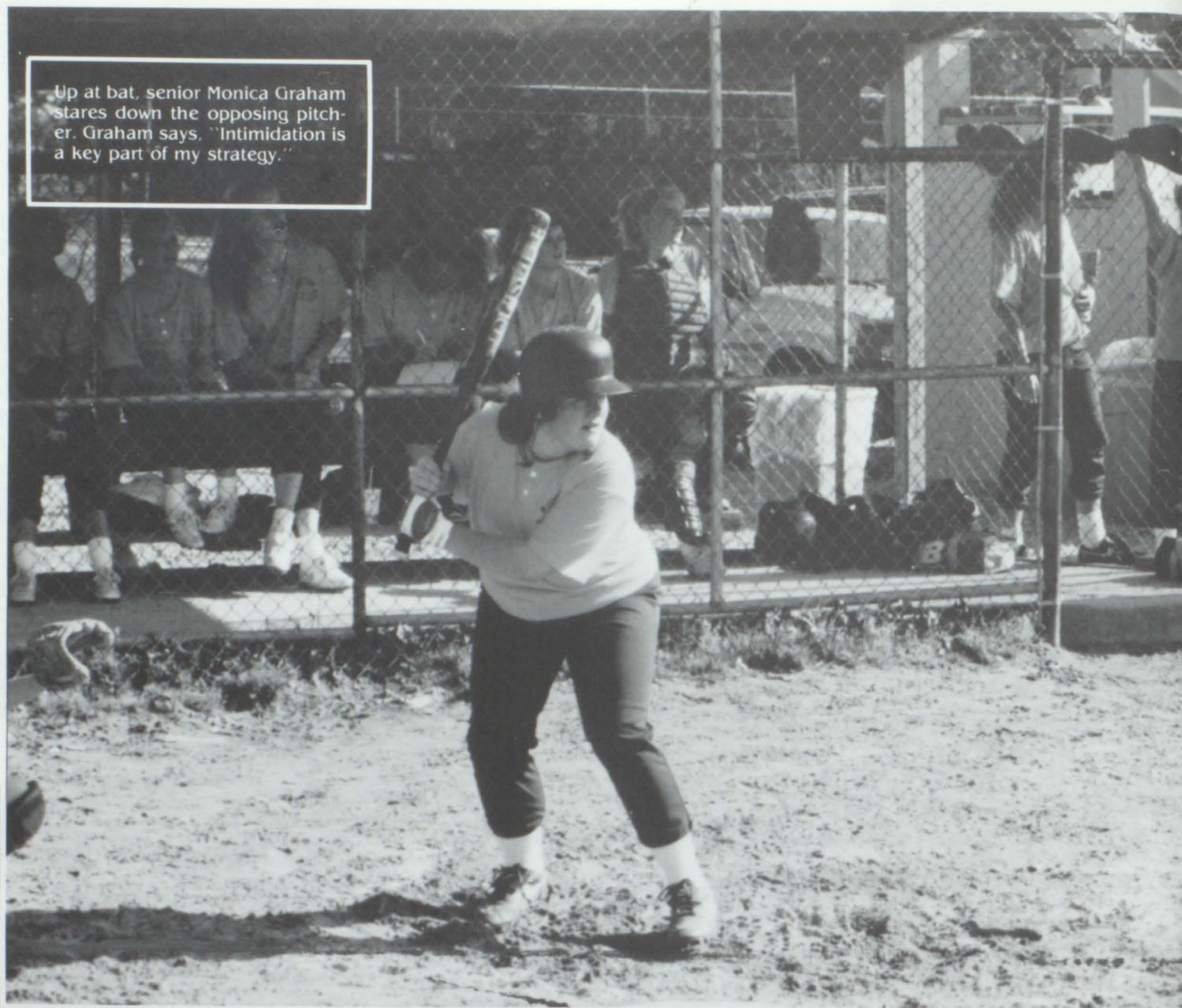

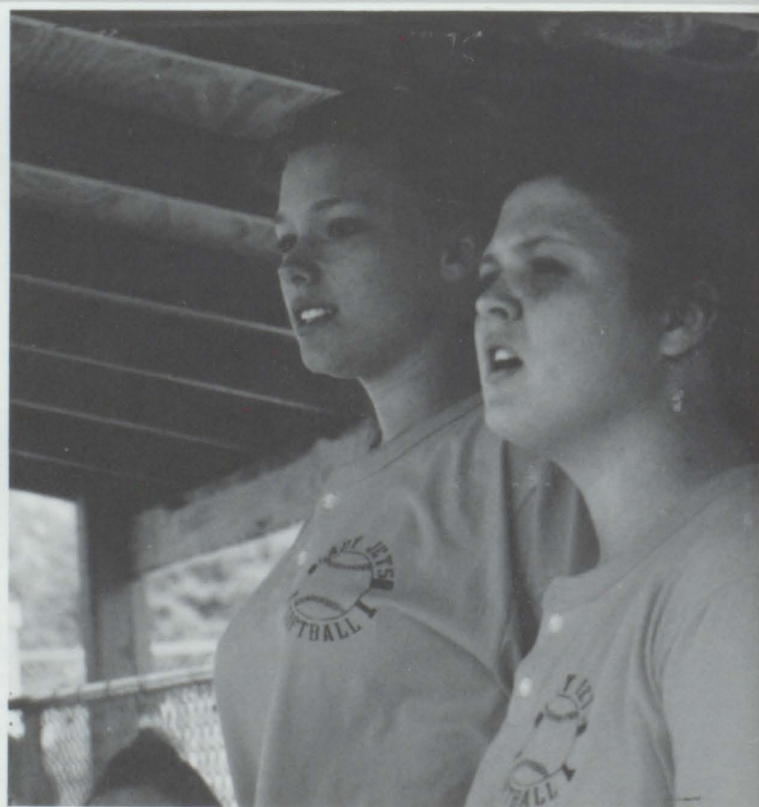

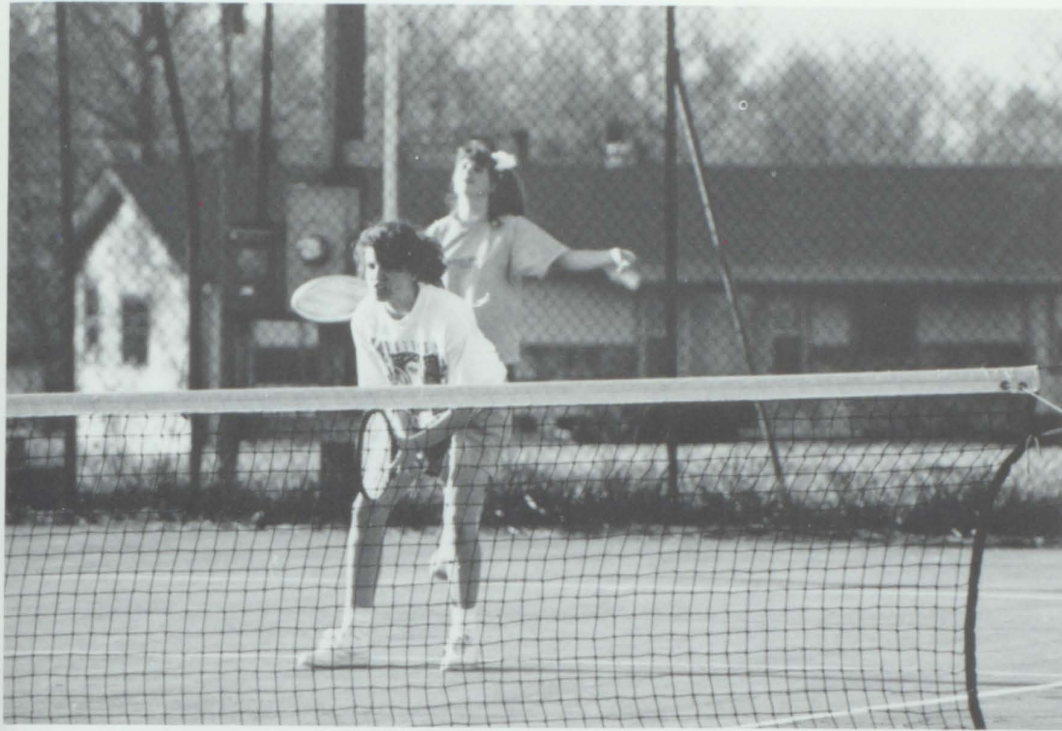

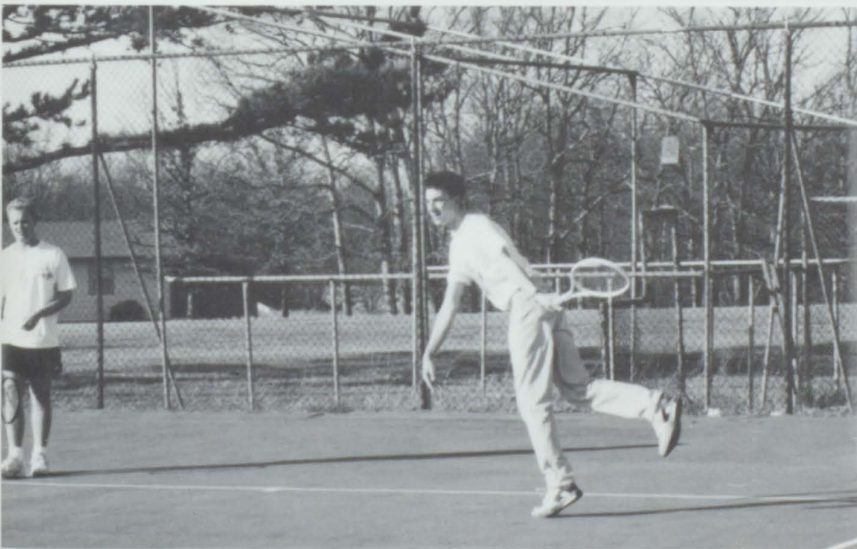

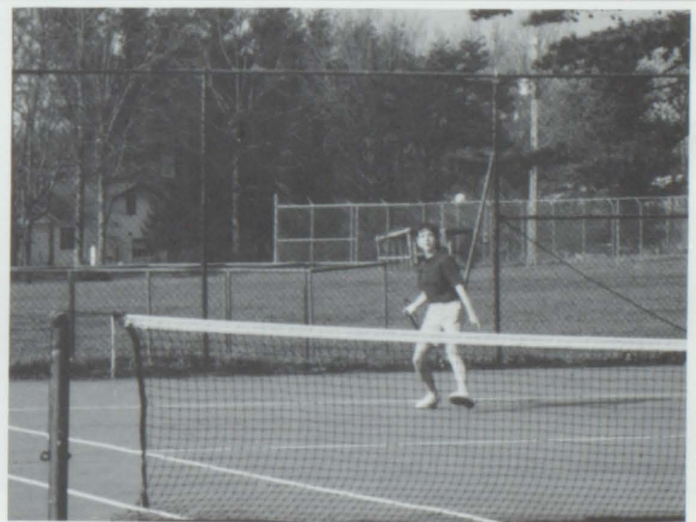

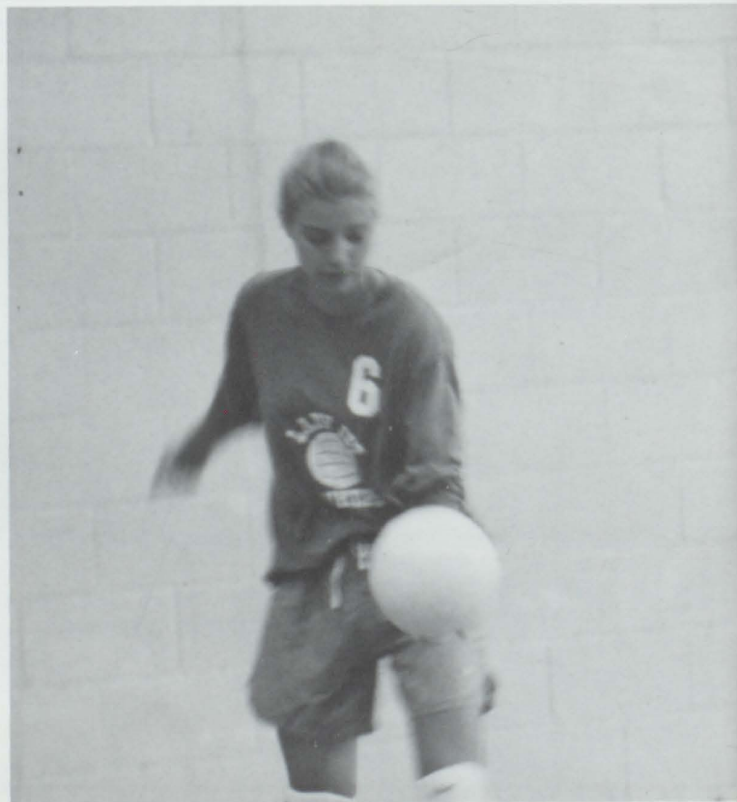

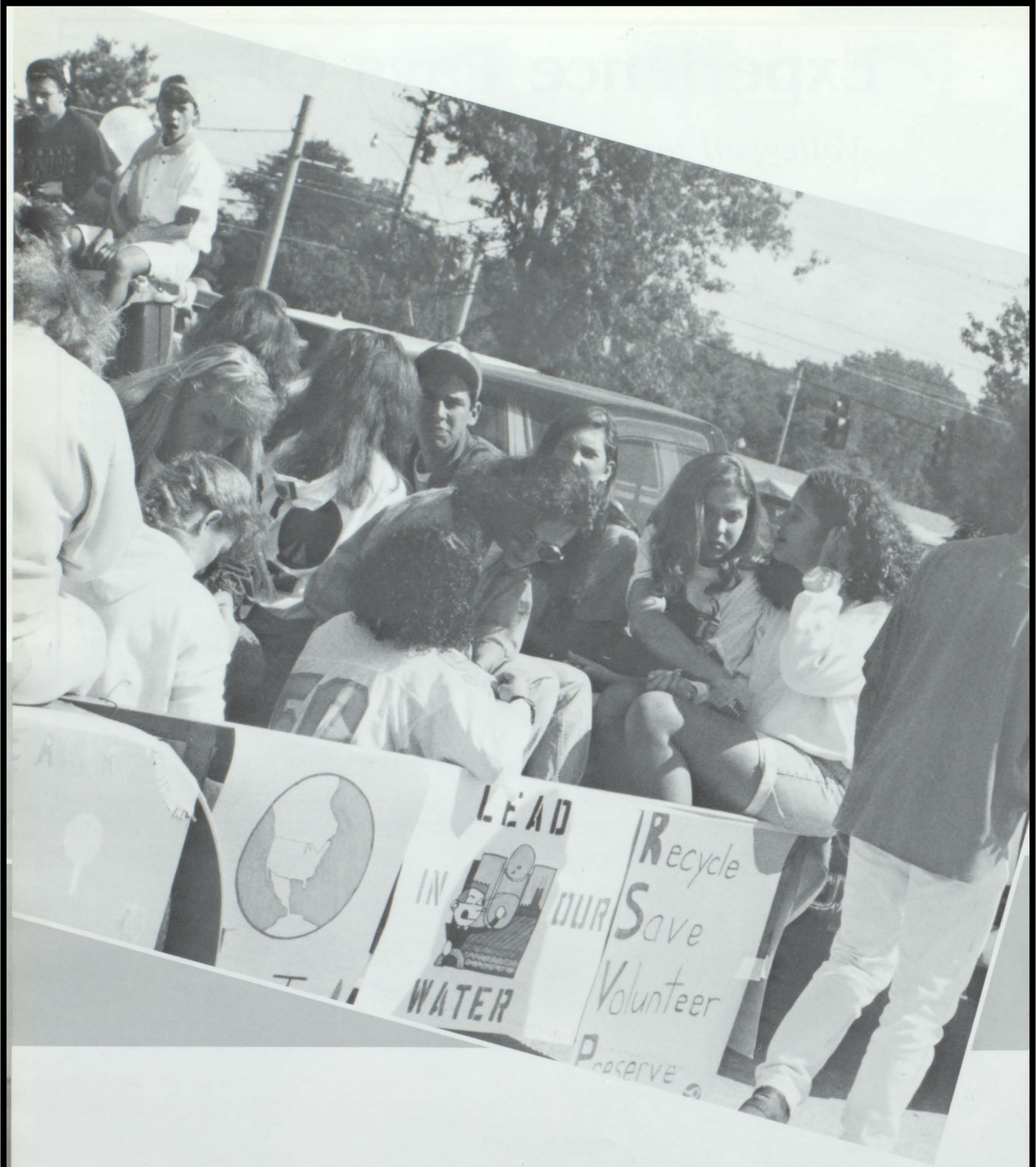

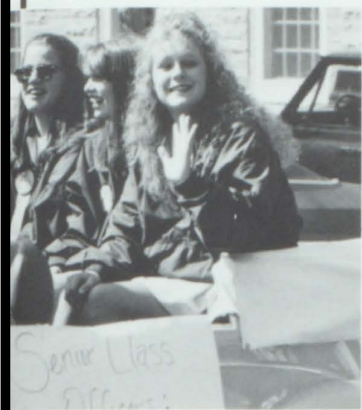
A Cut Above the Rest

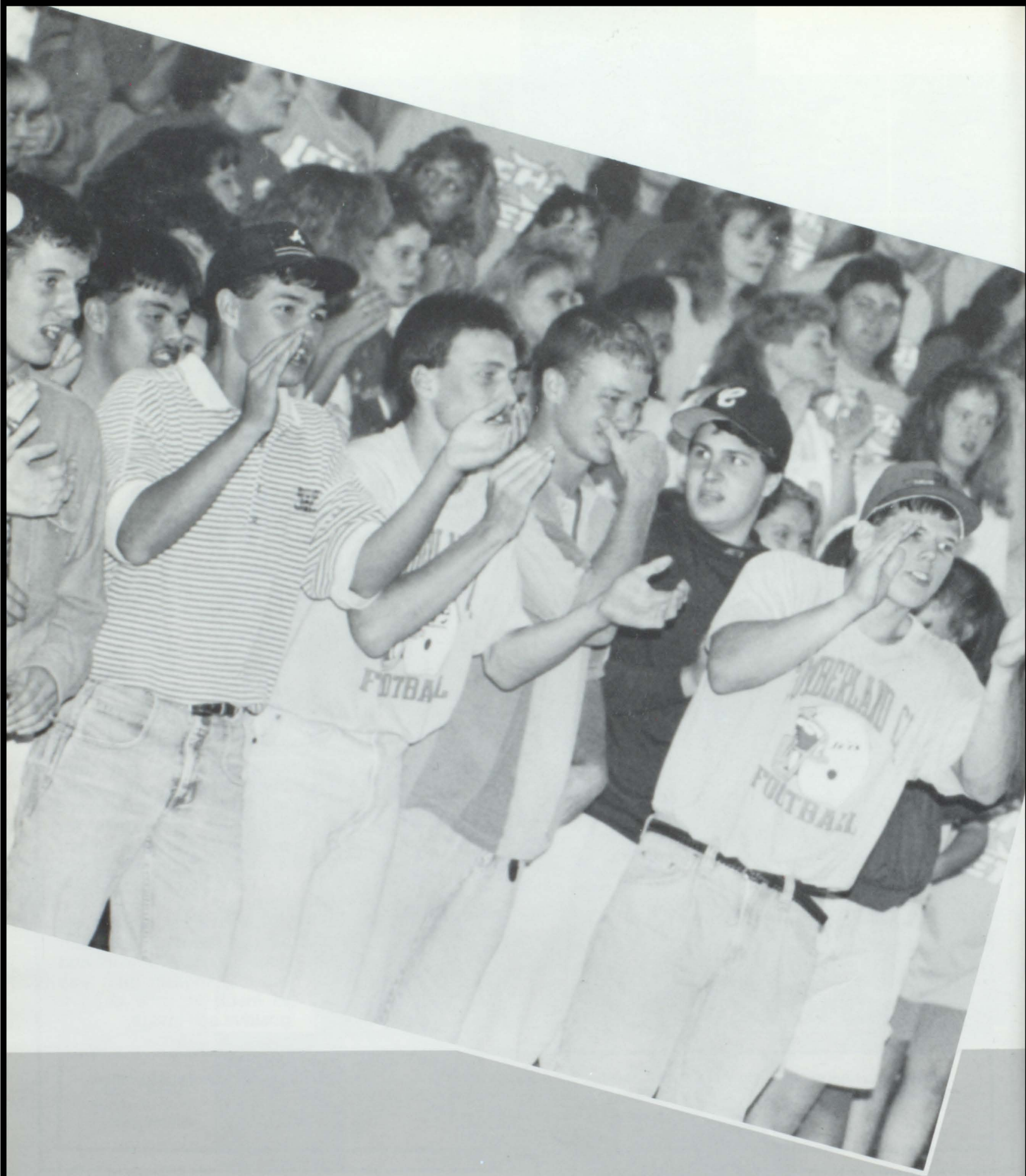
Model School Moves



By school board instruction, the Model School was moved to share the campus. The Model School was created to lower the high drop-out rate from Martin Jr. High. 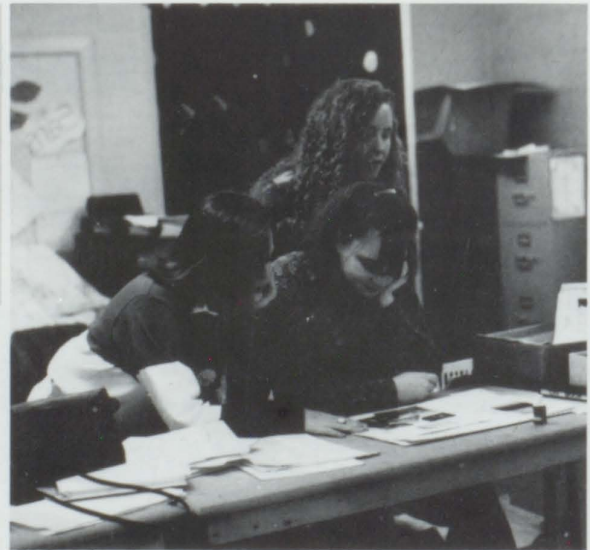

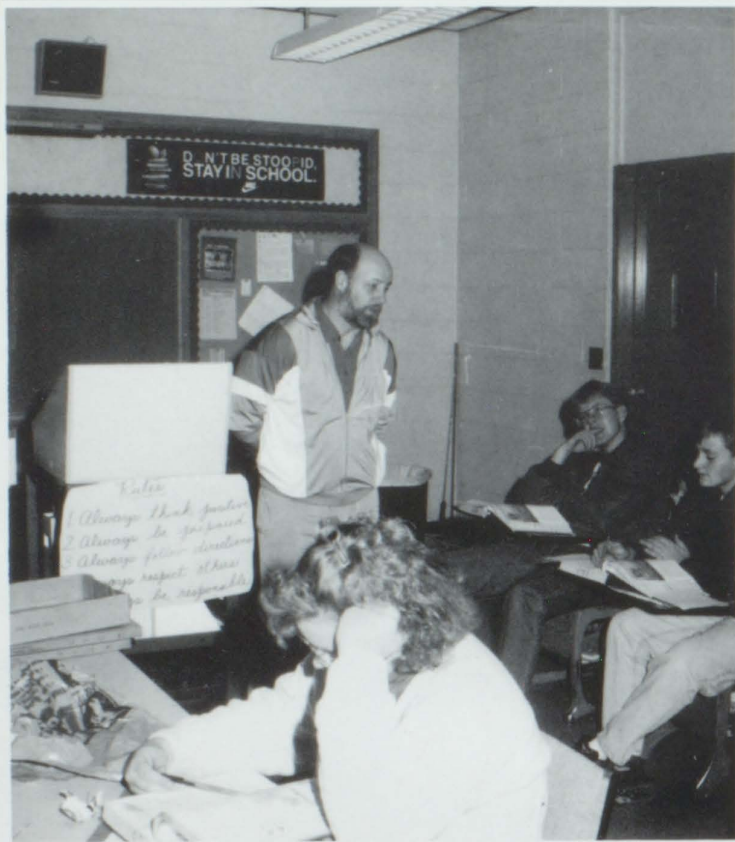

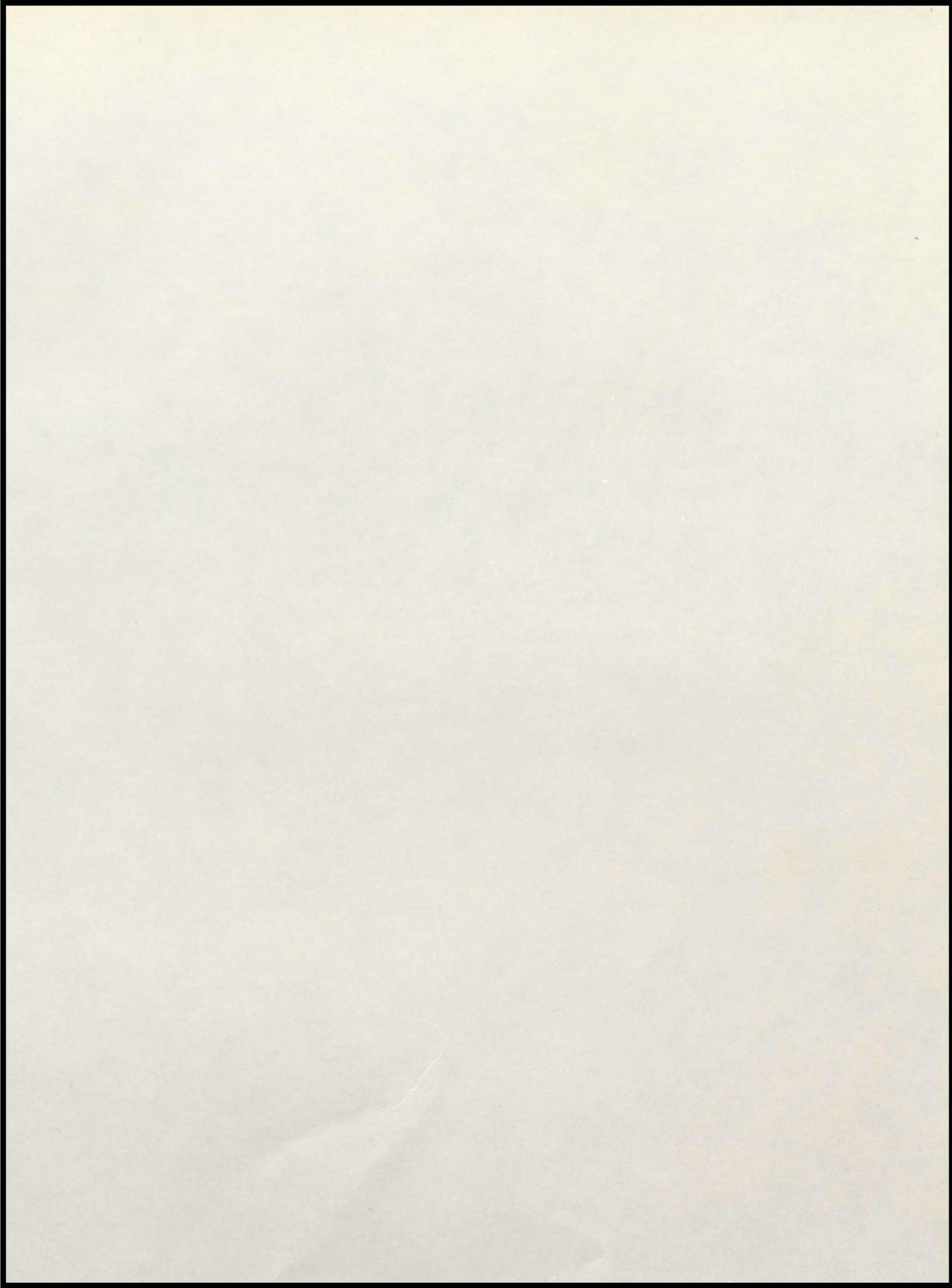
