Hello from the Technology Department! As spring approaches we are gearing up for our end of year push and getting ready for our Summer projects. As stated in the last newsletter we were hoping for news on getting our Rural Technology Grant. We were notified by the Georgia Department of Education that we did get the grant and this is really exciting news for Stewart County. As outlined before, this grant will allow us to purchase seven new 75 inch interactive panels for upgrading the High School Hall. We will also be able to purchase fifty teacher laptops to upgrade our aging fleet and 25 desktop computers to replace the oldest ones, currently in the elementary lab. We will now be able to use our older 75 inch panels from the High School around the school in different areas such as the gyms, meeting rooms, media center and anywhere we might need the added displays for teaching or presenting for guests. Also in the works is an upgrade to our existing internet circuit provided by the Department of Education called Peachnet. Our current internet circuit is 300 Megabits per second. With the update coming, it will top out at 1200 Megabits per second. This update should allow the district to be able to meet the demands of the high bandwidth requirements from our online resources for years to come.

As the school year comes to an end, our bus drivers and bus monitors will continue to provide the services and care that each scholar is privileged to have.


