




I can say the wind was beneficial to our BRUSH study as we used the brooms to sweep the sand back outside that blew into the classroom.



As we move into April, it is about that time to start looking for the wild celery and onions that grow out in the pastures. Just remember that when you venture out to be aware of all the critters that may be waking up, especially those that slither on the ground. It is, however, one my favorite pastime activities. So enjoy and get outdoors.

We also will be getting ready for Easter through our traditional ways here in Laguna. I will be getting with families with what clans the children are. That way we can explain to the classroom how we go about the Easter tradition. So if you are a big roadrunner, just know that Mr. Levantonio will be waiting for his Easter goodies.

Finally, our theme for the month of April will be Gardening. It is also that time of year to consider what types of plants and foods to grow. We will be planting in the small garden outside of our classroom. We just have not decided what to grow at this time. It may be traditional foods or it could be plants and flowers. Whatever we decide, you, as families, are more than welcome to share your gardening expertise with the classroom. Just make contact with Ms. Yvonne or me on when we can schedule a time and day. Remember, anytime you volunteer your time to our classroom and to the school, it provides In-Kind to our program. So please, let us know when you would like to volunteer some of your time.

On that note, please remember to read books to your children. Reading is a critical developmental skill that your child needs to develop at an early age. Do not be afraid to make the story as dramatic as you can. Believe me, the children love that type of reading. Read the newspaper, magazine articles, cookbook recipes, and anything else to your child as much as you can. When you finish reading to your child, log all of it in their reading log. Again, it all goes back to In-Kind which our program really needs.





Conscious Discipline: We will talk about the Power of Intention in class. The children and teachers will focus on problem-solving to create a positive and supportive learning environment.

**Cultural lifeways:** The children will learn to identify their Laguna clan, big and little (Kawaika hanu), and how Easter pudding is made by helping measure, pour, and mix the ingredients.

Creative Curriculum: For April, the theme is seeds and will run for the whole month. Seeds are fascinating! They can be found in many places and come in many different shapes and sizes. Seeds make many major appearances in our everyday lives: we eat them, plant them, remove the fruits, grind them, harvest them, and use them to create art and music. Children will have opportunities to share their knowledge, examine seeds in new ways, and experiment with them.

Nutrition Activity: The children will make kiwi and raspberry flowers using the following ingredients: peeled kiwi, and 4 raspberries. The children will place the raspberries on top of the kiwi to make a flower. Have your child show you how to make the rainbow at home for a healthy snack.

Student achievements/milestones: The children have been working on spelling their first and last names. 25% of the children can spell their first and last names without looking, 47% can spell their first name, and 28% need some help of the letters in their name.

## Reminder to parents:

PLEASE send your child in a light jacket and a hat if they don't have a hood. The weather is constantly changing and we want them to be warm. PLEASE send a hat and a water bottle for the days that the sun is shining.

·If your child is sick or showing symptoms,
PLEASE keep them home, if they are out for
more than three days get them seen by a
doctor and bring an excuse upon returning to
school. PLEASE be mindful of other children and
teachers in the classroom!

·Continue to check your child's bag/folder DAILY as notes are sent home and send the folders back as well.

## Parent tips:

- Read to your child for at least 10-15 minutes. Don't forget to write it on their Reading Log!
- Reading to your child helps them recognize letters and words to help them read.

These are memorable moments in your children's lives. In March, we learned about grocery stores. The children had fun learning about different sections in a store, different jobs in a store, and how to purchase items. Our classroom store was a success, and it was fun to play store. Our field trip to Sprouts brought our study of grocery stores to life.

Children can now tell the difference between a barcode and a QR code. They can help plan a grocery list and understand that you need money to purchase something.

Our theme is seeds. Children will learn about planting and the process it takes to grow plants such as flowers, fruits, or vegetables. The children will learn how to take care of a plant and understand why plants are important. They will investigate the process and collect data on the growth of different plants. Towards the end of the month, children will visit Laguna Elementary School for a transition visit. This will allow them to visit the kindergarten classrooms and interact with the teachers and students. Can you believe it? We are three months away from our preschool transition. Side note: Continue to work with children at home on writing their first and last name. Practice writing numbers and doing simple addition problems at home.

EARLY TALK - Shapes a Child's Life.

DID YOU KNOW-In the first few years of life...
\*Exposure to early language, in particular interactive talk, is one of the strongest predictors of brain development?

\*The number of back-and-forth conversations (conversation turns) children experience, relates with brain activity/structure.



## Use these tips to increase words & turns when talking, reading, or singing with your child.

- 1. Talk about what you're doing and thinking.
- 2. Comment on what they are doing or looking at.
- 3. Name things that they are interested in.
- 4. Get down to their level: face to face.
- 5. Touch, hug, hold.
- 6. Tune in and respond to what they look at, do, or say.
- 7. Wait for their response, give them time to reply.
- 8. Imitate them, and add more words.
- 9. Make faces, use gestures.
- 10. Take turns-don't do all the talking.
- 11. Repeat and add to what they say and do.
- 12. Follow their lead, do what interests them.
- 13. Encourage them, be positive.
- 14. Be silly!

If you struggle at times with helping your children begin to learn how to be helpers around the house, pick-up after themselves, or how to share instructions verbally or visually with your child so that they understand them, then this article is for you! Practice of M.A.P can help build trust, independence, and instill a sense of accomplishment in your child that will help them blossom as little helpers around the house, as well as all their future project based skills at DEC and beyond.

CD for Parents: Teaching Children How to Follow Directions Posted on July 30, 2017 by Fran Rubio-Katz

Teaching children how to follow directions can be a frustrating endeavor. One reason is that we rarely break directions into a simple step-by-step process. Often, we rattle off directions to our children and expect them to immediately get with the program.

In education, teachers are taught how to scaffold lessons to ensure student success. Scaffolding is a process where teachers break down information into digestible chunks. They model how to think about information, or they demonstrate how to solve a problem. Then, teachers support students through the process. Teachers are available to reteach parts of the lesson as needed, positive correction is provided and questions are encouraged. As students demonstrate mastery, the teacher pulls back accordingly and the students become independent problem-solvers of similar problems.

The Conscious Discipline® acronym M.A.P. is designed to help parents scaffold information in order to teach their children how to follow directions with success!

### Here's how it works:



### M stands for MODEL

Modeling means you demonstrate WHAT TO DO and HOW TO DO it. A helpful Scaffolding Technique to support modeling is called "Think Aloud." You literally think OUT LOUD, modeling how to think about, handle or problem-solve a process or situation.

Say you happen to have a captive audience in your messy kitchen. Take that as an opportunity to Think Aloud! You may say, "Hmm... I have dirty dishes on the table and dirty dishes in the sink. How can I handle this? Where can I begin? I know! First, I'm going to rinse the dirty dishes that are in the sink and put them in the dishwasher. Next, I'm going to clear the table. Then, I'm going to rinse those dirty dishes and finish by putting them into the dishwasher."

### A stands for ADD PICTURES

As Stephen Covey often said, "Begin with the end in mind." Show your children a picture of what their rooms look like when YOU consider it clean. A helpful Scaffolding Technique to support Adding Pictures is to always show your children the outcome or product before they do it.

You could say, "When your room matches this picture, then you will know you are done." Pictures of the concrete process, or a Graphic Organizer, are an additional resource for younger children or children with extra or different needs. List the steps and add a visual cue per step. Use clip art or pictures. Post the visual aid at your child's eye level to ensure it is "readable" to your child so they don't feel embarrassed or controlled. Older children who need additional support often prefer a checklist. There are a number of apps designed for this purpose, or you can make a good ole' fashioned checklist and teach your child to check off as each task as it is done!

### P stands for PRACTICE

Let's get this out of the way: Practice does NOT make perfect, but consistent practice sure does make progress! Guide your child through each step of the modeled process with a picture posted nearby of the finished product or a "readable" step by step guide. Make it "readable" by adding pictures and posting it at your child's eye-level.

For younger children use transition and sequencing words like, "FIRST, you put your dirty clothes in the hamper. What does your picture schedule say is NEXT?" Or, "You put your stuffed animals on your bed. What did you do BEFORE that?" Referring to the picture schedule when you ask these questions teaches your child that the picture schedule is a helpful resource.

For older children, ask specific, guiding and open-ended questions and PAUSE! Open-ended questions cannot be answered with a yes or no and steer clear of asking, "Why?" Pausing allows the child to reflect, think and problem-solve, all of which exercise Executive Functioning Skills! Helpful open-ended questions may sound like, "It looks like you are in the middle of sorting through those Pokémon cards. What do you think is the best way to store your cards?" Or, "I notice you have a couple of extra volleyball practices this week. What is your plan for having a clean uniform for each practice?"

### Remember to Differentiate

Every good teacher knows we must differentiate instruction to provide the most effective learning experiences possible. Our children may learn at varied paces, require more or less support and require information be taught in different ways. Differentiating our instruction as parents means we deliver our lessons, even on how to clean up a room, in a way that will reach our children. It may take a few shots, especially if we have a pattern resistant child... the ones we say march to their own beat!

No matter who your child is, it is your job to try and be consistent, structured and encouraging. Mistakes will happen. Use each one as an opportunity to learn. Most of all, have FUN because some day your children will be living in their own clean homes and you may find yourself longing for a little mess.
