Dear Parents/Guardians and Community Members, In the 2016-17 school year, Clatskanie Middle High School (CMHS) did not receive a rating for the Overall State Rating system. This is due to the expiration for the ESEA act and the transition to the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The results of the Smarter Balanced Assessment showed CMHS students are not achieving well in math. The district has recognized the low performance in math state test scores over the years and have implemented a new math curriculum for the 2016-2017 school year along with aligning the math courses.

SCHOOL READINESS

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

For the 2017-2018 school year CMHS is utilizing the Measure 98 funds to continue the CCRC and implement an alternative education program for students.

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

CMHS students are able to enrich their academics through advanced course work, dual-credit, college courses, advanced placement courses through online learning, and independent studies. Students are recognized for their hard work and effort through student recognition programs, honor roll, and scholarships. For the class of 2017, 31 students earned a total of 515 college credits and \$201,971 in scholarships.

CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION

CMHS is able to offer a variety of career and technical courses. There are three program of studies in the high school: Natural Resources, Manufacturing Technology, and Health Services. In addition, all middle school students are introduced to career and technical courses through a course called "Middle School Cruise". All middle school students take a quarter of: health, computer applications, industrial arts, and foreign language.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

CMHS has enhanced their extracurricular activities. Currently students may participate in a wide range of athletics. Students also have several activities to choose from: Forestry, Speech and Debate, Drama, Band, Choir, National Honor Society, Key Club, Student Council, Yearbook, and HOSA.

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
