Back To Work The Go








There Lakeland 7-32 October 1, 1948

Lakeland's Dreadnaught eleven turned back the eager Walesmen 32 to 7 in their first tilt of the '48 season. The Highlanders started the season with only seven varsity men from last year and an almost completely green line. Lakeland scored in every period while Lake Wales made their only one in the second quarter. Wayne Clark snagged a short pass from Buford Long and outran the entire Dreadnaught backfield to cross the goal line standing up. Clarence Jones booted the extra point. This was the first touchdown ever to be scored on the Lakeland team by a Lake Wales eleven.

Four of the Lake Wales touchdowns were made on the ground and two in the air. Buford Long made four of the "zone busters". Roy Craig and Buddy Farris each scored once after receiving passes from Wayne Clark. Sebring chalked up their lone TD with a drive from the 50 yard line where they had taken over on downs. The Lake Wales line showed much improvement after Wingfield was changed from fullback to guard. Massey and Lee, seniors, also "held that line".


ON THE JOB

The forward wall did an excellent job of stopping two touchdown drives almost on the goal line. Jones made the first marker for Lake Wales on a 45 yard sweep. Long thrilled the 3500 fans in the second half, breaking the Kathleen half time lead of 7 to 6 with three touchdown runs of 25, 50, and 60 yards. Kathleen slightly outpunched the Highlanders in first downs and passing. They had 10 FD to our 7 and completed 7 out of 12 pass attempts.

The Highlanders fought a hard game but gave up all title hopes as they lost to the Hornets 12 to 6. About 6000 watched the Haines City team rack up 21 first downs to Lake Wales' one. The team was gallant in goal line stands stopping a number of possible scores within the 15 yard line. The only Lake Wales touchdown was made by Buford Long, running 35 yards around left end. Haines City scored first after a march clear up the field in the first quarter. They scored once more in the third followed by a Lake Wales rally which ended in a TD. This victory clinched the Championship for the Hornets for the fourth straight year.






There Bartow 53-13 December 3, 1948
