Farewell to Lori Sisquoc

Ms. Lori Sisquoc will retire at the end of this academic year. She has worked at Sherman for over 42 years (Fig. 1).

Lori is a Fort Sill Apache (Oklahoma) and a descendent of the Mountain Cahuilla Tribe of California. Lori's great grandfather, Anthony Largo, and his brothers attended Sherman in the 1890s and early 1900s when our school was located in Perris, California. Lori's mother and grandmother were employed at Sherman. Lori started working in the Sherman dormitories on Oct. 4, 1982 and continued this work for 15 years. In 1995 she began teaching the Native Traditional classes as Sherman. Later she taught Museum Studies and became Director of the Clarke Cultural Center and Curator of the Sherman Museum.

Each year through the Clarke Center and the Sherman Museum Lori spearheads the numerous student Native campus activities. She is a walking encyclopedia on Sherman history. When in doubt about Sherman's history, ask Lori, she will

After retiring Lori would like to volunteer at the Sherman Museum from time to time and complete some of her unfinished projects. She would also like to continue teaching Native Culture and history in southern California and beyond. She is

From The Editor

School songs promote a sense of student belonging and school identity. Unbeknownst to recent Sherman students and graduates we have a school song. Our song was originally called "The Purple and Gold Song" (after our school colors) and was first sung in 1906. Noted alumni and WW2 veteran Frank Clarke (The Clarke Heritage Center on campus is named after him) stated that during WW2 on the battle lines Sherman students and alumni would sing our school song. Singing the song would remind these soldiers of happier times and that they were in the thoughts and prayers of fellow students, family, and friends back home.

Over the years our school song was almost forgotten. Sherman Alumni President and WW2 veteran Robert Levi (our school auditorium is named after him) returned to Sherman to teach the song to a new generation of Sherman students. In 2001 with the help of Sherman music teacher Bobby Dixon, Mr. Levi recorded our school song.

Unfortunately, today the original recording of our school song is difficult to obtain and no musical notation can be found. However, the song lyrics are known; an old framed lyric document hangs in the Sherman Museum.

News From The Back Forty -Pathways












FIG. 2: Top Left & Right: Students from the Pathways Construction Internship Program installing a solar system. 2nd from Top Left: The Lady Braves Culinary Team at the Pro Start Competition. 2nd from Top Right: The Lady Braves food plates, Celestial Ceviche, Stuffed Rabbit Saddle, and Fry Bread. Third from Top Left: Sherman Future Farmers of America members and Advisor Desiree Trapp (center sitting) at the County Fair. Bottom Left: Action in the sheep show ring. Bottom Two Above: "Heard Museum Art Show Winners Noah Crisostomo and Arabelle Castro-Stretches.

Seven students in Galene Townsend's graphic design class competed in the 2025 Heard Museum Youth Art Student Show in Computer Generated Art. Four of the students placed and won cash awards. The winners included: Noah Crisostomo and Arabelle Castro-Stretches, First place, Division 1 (Fig. 2); Leslaus Cruz, Second Place, Division II; and Diana Black Wolf, third place. We congratulate all participants for their achievements.

Brian Hayden and forty of his construction students visited engineers at the famous Universal Studies in Hollywood, California to learn how rides at the theme park are designed and constructed. After the meeting students thoroughly enjoyed the park attractions.

Pathways students in the Construction Internship Program assembled a complete solar system for a local Riverside residence (Fig. 2). In teacher Brian Hayden's own words, "These amazing young men climbed onto the roof and began placing the 'standoffs' (bracking system that holds the solar panels in place) then assembled the circuit breaker panel, cut off switch, and ran the conduit for the power". The interns were: L. Manakaja, T. Martinez, K. Miller, A. Pena, R. Pewewardy, and D. Yazzie.

The California Pro-Start Culinary Arts tournament is the state's premier competition for high school students where teams and individuals (solo) compete for medallions and recognition. In late February, Sherman competed in its third straight Pro-Start culinary competition in Los Angeles, California. This year our Lady Braves team of P. Montague, B. Lewis, T. Powsey, and N. Jackson placed 14th out of 36 teams (Fig. 2). Noteworthy, Senior Tate'ota Semans earned 6th place high individual with his hotdog topping and Marlie Ute and Delani Abeita earned 6th and 8th place, respectively, in the loaded Iowa Potato Competition. The Sherman culinary competitors were: Naomi Jackson, Brandee Lewis, Tate'ota Semans, Marlie Ute, Delani Abeita, Trae Powsley, and Paisley Montague.

Our FFA students represented Sherman well at the Riverside County Fair and National Date Festival in Indio, California (Fig. 2). Several student projects made the cut for Champion Drive for Market Goat and Market Lamb and all student projects sold at the auction. April Caddo took 1st place in the cotton and cream fashion class and April Caddo, Danielle Antonio, and Regina Akino took 6th to 8th places in the costume contest.

In the afternoon of March 28 the CTE Pathways Team and Instructor David Heard hosted the Law Enforcement Career Expo at Sherman. Students visited booths, exhibits, and table displays and talked to law enforcement personnel to learn about career job opportunities at various agencies.

Charlott Dominguez hosted a "Write It, Do It" competition (aka "WIDI"). The WIDI is a technical writing event that is part of the Science Olympiad. In this competition, teams of students work together to describe and build models and earn points based on their accuracy. The highest point winners earned a reward trip to a book store and an off-campus dinner. In March, the library held a Pictionary Contest. Pictionary is a drawing game where teams of people take turns drawing and guessing which word is to be drawn. Winning teams received prize bags filled with school supplies and snacks.

Diverse Native activities continued at the Clarke Cultural Center and the Sherman Museum. The activities included: Daughters of Tradition meetings rotated between the Clarke Center and the San Manuel Indian Health Clinic with Ms. Natalie Funmaker; weekly Pow Wow and culture sharing nights at Bennett Hall; museum study classes; Smudging Ceremony, a potluck honoring elders; open arts and craft projects, and Cahuilla language sessions.


