### Southeast Gateway Revitalization Plan Presses On Through The Pandemic

The Southeast Gateway Revitalization project has been a consistent effort under Gateway for more than a decade. With the presence of the COVID-19 pandemic and the related social and financial challenges, implementation of many aspects of the revitalization program have been postponed, and the larger projects have proven difficult to get off the ground. However, with a global focus on rebuilding and returning to a "new normal," the SEG program is getting back on-track as well.

Gateway first met with residents of the Southeast Bridgeton neighborhood in 2005 to discuss their needs and vision for revitalizing the neighborhood. Together, the Southeast Gateway Neighborhood Revitalization Plan was developed.

With a thorough plan for implementation in place, it is the community that truly brings this project to fruition. Collaborating with residents, agencies, and local government supports a more resilient, sustainable, and connected community that can better adapt to hardships. Esaul Martin and Josue Ruiz-Ramirez, SEG Coordinators, have been building relationships with churches in the area, as well as with the local police. Surveys and meetings are prioritized to outline the most pressing concerns of local residents. Artwork will be incorporated into the neighborhood with involvement from local adults and children, which aims to inspire community connectedness and discourage vandalism and crime. This leads to a safer community for present and future generations alike.

For a project with so many components, Ruiz-Ramirez discusses his perspective on the importance of community support. He recalls the support and feedback of Cuffy Seabrook and other members and partners, which have been vital in moving the project forward. While challenging at times to coordinate the efforts of all people involved, "it truly shows the resilience of not only Southeast Gateway but the city as a whole. If people throughout the city could come together the way we do in Southeast Gateway, there is no telling what we can accomplish," Ruiz-Ramirez said.

The Southeast Gateway (SEG) Revitalization Plan is the main document used to outline all goals in this project and consists of a matrix with three overarching goals: Safety, Economic Development, and Creativity and Sustainability. The plan conducts milestones as part of the Wells Fargo Regional Foundation Implementation Grant. Along with Gateway, partners include the Cumberland Empowerment Zone, United Advocacy Group, and the City of Bridgeton, as well as various other agencies and members of the community. The document includes completion dates from now through 2024 and ongoing. Martin and Ruiz-Ramirez outlined the multidimensional efforts going into realizing the goals in this matrix.

First, to improve safety, goals include increasing the presence of police officers in the neighborhood and improving infrastructure such as street lighting, bus shelters, and traffic safety. A neighborhood watch plan is being developed, as well as bringing awareness to the resources within the community such as the police department and public tip line.

As for economic development, there are plans to bring back job training events to the Southeast Gateway neighborhood, provide a job database, and build transportation resources for people travelling for work. Improving access to homeownership is also a major goal, and will include building single-family homes and affordable housing while preserving the historical characteristics of Bridgeton. Recently, a Food Specialization Center has been opened in partnership with the Cumberland Empowerment Zone. The center offers a space for food-related small businesses to start or grow their business while also providing food to the SEG neighborhood (where food insecurity has been identified) and concentrating financial interactions within the neighborhood.

For the future, there is a proposal to create a mixed-use Plaza in the neighborhood to provide necessary day-to-day products and services to residents. This location would provide temporary development jobs as well as permanent jobs once opened. It is to include a laundromat, food services, and an urgent care center in proximity to residential areas for accessibility. Phase I includes developing large commercial buildings, while Phase II will focus on residential development. The Plaza was proposed to be developed on South East and Pamphylia avenues with plans for extensive remediation and preparation for development.

The matrix concludes with Sustainability and Creativity. A notable project in this component of the plan intends to remediate the "Tin Can" site to create a community recreation space. Youth Empowerment Zones, expansion of educational opportunities, and minority entrepreneurial centers are outlined in the revitalization plan. Holding Unity Day events is another way to bring together many stakeholders in the community; in Summer 2021, an event was held to bring together the community with food, games, and partner organizations. Semi-annual neighborhood clean-ups were started less than two years ago with a huge number of volunteers and agencies from all over Cumberland County.

The interaction between all partner efforts to achieve the multi-dimensional matrix will collectively build a more sustainable Southeast Gateway Neighborhood.
