


Ahh, spring!

the air before and after rain, and the day-to-day budget at Nebraska Christian gets very tight. Being new to Nebraska Christian, I have been asking lots of questions and looking through lots of information to try and understand the history and how God has used this school — and it is amazing. One of the things that caught my eye almost immediately is that over the past several generations there have been times that the school hasn't had the money to pay its staff on time. Many of you know that this was the case as recently as last year.

Historically this has happened at different times of the year, but in recent years, it has been an April/ May occurrence. This happens at this time of the year because the tuition money that came in at the start of 1st and 2nd semester and the gift income to that point has been spent. I think it surprises almost everyone that this shortfall has been a normal occurrence, especially when the Benefit Auction

Rittas Receive 2011 Hall of Faith Award



At the Harvest Festival on November 4, school board member Lester Unruh presented the 2011 Hall of Faith Award to Robert ('69) & Susan Ritta. Following is the text of his speech.

"The couple we honor tonight has more than 50 years of combined service at Nebraska Christian. He attended Nebraska Christian for high school, graduating in 1969. She began working in the office in 1973. They married in the spring of 1976 and in the fall together moved to Dallas where he continued his education at Dallas Theological Seminary.

"In 1986, the young family, which now included two children, returned to NC as Boys' Dorm Parents. They served in that capacity for six years, during which time their youngest two children were born. He spent many years teaching junior high and sophomore Bible, where he was well known for his "service assignments" which required students to spend 30 minutes each week helping someone without pay. Eventually, he eased over to the maintenance side of things, and he is now the head of maintenance and food service. He spends countless hours keeping the campus looking beautiful and running smoothly.

"She returned to the office in 1995, replacing retiring receptionist Judy Taylor. When the Marquette campus opened in the fall of 1999,

And Abraham called the name

of that place Jehovahjireh: as it is said to this day, In the mount of the LORD it shall be seen.

Genesis 22:14 (KJV)

So Abraham called that place The LORD Will Provide. And to this day it is said, 'On the mountain of the LORD it will be provided.'

Genesis 22:14 (NIV)

In Genesis 22, we are introduced to Jehovahjireh, a name that reminds us we have a God who sees and sees to our need, or, alternatively, a God we can see because He sees to our need. The passage is rich with insight into our God and our relationship to Him.

We often legitimately use this name in the context of physical or financial needs, and God does meet us in those contexts. The ministry of Nebraska Christian Schools is evidence of that truth. The focus of this passage is not on physical or financial needs, but on a more foundational and profound need we all have.

God has demanded a sacrifice. For three days Abraham has traveled, knowing that if God does not intervene, his son will die and with him the promises of God concerning his son. Two questions face Abraham: Does God see how this jeopardizes the promises He has made? Will He see to it that the promises are fulfilled?

The answer to both questions is yes. The writer of Hebrews tells us,

"By faith Abraham, when he was tried, offered up Isaac...Accounting that God was able to raise him up, even from the dead." Hebrews 11:17-19 (KJV). The evidence for this is also found in the Genesis 22 passage.

In verse 5, Abraham tells the young men that "I and the lad will go yonder and worship, and come again to you." Isaac notices the need in verse 7, saying, "Behold the fire and the wood: but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham responds in verse 8 with, "God will provide himself a lamb for a burnt offering."

Indeed hundreds of years later, in those same mountains, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world was crucified because God saw and saw to our greatest need. The question for us is do we see this God who has seen to our need? In the mount of the LORD it has been seen! On the mountain of the LORD it has been provided!

This passage pretty much dwarfs any concerns I might have about whether God is aware of the fact that being \$100,000 behind in budgeted gift income after the first half of the year is a threat to the mission of Nebraska Christian Schools. It even addresses my concerns over whether He has a plan for meeting this need. If you come to me like Isaac and point out the need, I can't tell you how or when, but I can tell you, the Lord will provide. He is all we really need. He is the God who sees and sees to our need.

Having watched God in the past, I can tell you that it is likely His provision for Nebraska Christian Schools will come from the generosity He has instilled in the hearts

"They're great kids. This energy and what we're building here, it's kind of amazing," commented international conductor Eric Dale Knapp during a recent interview with a local TV station regarding the 7th Annual Festival of Lessons and Carols. And that's what happens when you bring 200 junior and senior high school students from five different schools and some home school students to the Nebraska Christian campus for one very full day of rehearsal. Add to that a 50-voice children's choir, a 27-piece orchestra, an organist from New Jersey and an international conductor from New York City, and the result is an aweinspiring performance that many would say is their most meaningful worship experience of the Christmas season.

This year the sold-out crowd also enjoyed performances by opera and concert singer Megan

Knapp of New York City and Kala Balch, a Hastings native whose career has taken her from the TV screen to major motion pictures as a professional session singer and performer. Other featured soloists and small group singers included Josh and Allene Cumpston, Kaity Flynn ('06), Susan Ritta, Lester Unruh, Jeanette Benson, the NC quartet (Katherine Welk, Zoe Flynn, Joey Sun, and Derek Rose), and the Grand Island Evangelical Free Church quartet (Jeanette Benson, TiLynn Scott, Steven Scott, and Eric Benson).

"It's just amazing to be able to perform with this caliber of instruments and performers," said Mike Flynn, NC's Music Director. "Having Maestro Knapp and the professional musicians and singers work with the students gives them exposure they wouldn't get elsewhere."

The Festival is hosted by the NC Development Office and made possible in part by grants from the Merrick Foundation, the Nebraska Arts Council and Nebraska Cultural Endowment, and the Nebraska Christian Schools Foundation.

has been such a fun and successful evening for fundraising. The Dinner and Auction do help tremendously, but the money that comes in is helping to bridge the gap from March to the end of the school year.

The teachers and staff are basically loaning the school money (their paychecks) for a month or two until tuition payments for the next year come in, or, as happened last year, a short-term loan is given to the school to pay teachers. The loan was quickly paid with new tuition money coming in, but the problem is perpetuated because it means that this year we started behind because we used tuition money for this year to pay salaries for last year. Although this has been common, I think it is something that we need to strive to reverse.

I sent many of you a letter around Thanksgiving asking people that share a connection with Nebraska Christian or to our mission to help with consistent giving and praying. Some of you responded – thank you – but we still have a long way to go. I am not sure how to state the need

that we have. I am trying to not wait until paychecks are late before bringing this to your attention. I hate to ask (I know that is hard to believe based on recent mailings), but I have felt convicted that I need to let people know our need. It is a need that, as mentioned before, could be significantly reduced if everyone would join us in this effort by giving \$10 a month.

God has been faithful during rich and lean times to Nebraska Christian. He is Jehovah-Jireh (The Lord will provide) and we trust Him. We are praying that He will stir the hearts of our Alums and friends to join with us financially. If you haven't been a consistent financial supporter in the past, I ask that you pray about this as a possibility for you and your family. 
