Plagiarism is stealing someone else's work and passing it off as your own. Do **NOT** make the mistake of believing this would be okay within the classroom as neither the school nor I will tolerate it. As the Student Handbook states, the following are all examples of plagiarism:

- Paraphrasing another's work without citing
- Copying word for word another's work without citing
- Using facts from another's work that are not common knowledge without citing
- Use the main ideas from someone else's work for an assignment without citing
- Copying another student's work
- Copying or attempting another's signature.
- Supplying answers or work for another student to copy or submit as their own.

Cell Phones and Smart Watches

There is a 'no cell phone policy' within the classroom. Should you bring your phone to class, the following three strike rule will apply:

- **Strike 1:** The phone will be confiscated and held until the end of the class period.
- **Strike 2:** The phone will be confiscated and brought to Mr. Krenz to be picked up at the end of the school day.
- **Strike 3:** The phone will be dropped off everyday in the morning to the main office and may be picked up at the end of the school day.

Smart Watches are allowed in the classroom until they are used as anything other than a watch, at which point they will be confiscated. If you see this, come to school tomorrow and discreetly ask me, "What is the motto?" All Smart Watches will be placed on my desk prior to any tests and quizzes.

Daily Activities (DA)

Daily Activities will be posted on the whiteboard every day prior to class. These activities include the following:

- **Monday Madness** - Sentences will be written on the board that are in need of corrections. You will be given the printed sentence and must correct them while labeling whether the correction is a Capitalization, Utilization, Punctuation, or Spelling error (abbreviation: C.U.P.S.).

- **Tuesday Terms** - 3-5 new terms will be written on the board. You will need to write the terms and definitions down in your notebook as well as a sentence using the word correctly. Every other week, we will have a quiz over these terms.
- **Reading Wednesday** - The class will silently read the first (or last) 15 minutes of class. At the end of the 1st and 3rd quarter, you will give a Reader Response presentation in regards to one book you have read or are currently reading. (**Class specific books do NOT count.**)
- **Thinking Thursday** - A thought-provoking prompt will be written on the whiteboard. You will write your response in your notebook using proper C.U.P.S. (Note: you will be given 5 minutes after the bell to write your response. Use that time wisely!)
- **Frenzy Fridays** - A riddle or puzzle will be written on the whiteboard. You will use a sticky note to write your answer. If you guess correctly, you will earn an extra credit point.

Grading

At least two grades will be added into PowerSchool every Friday. Monday Madness and Thinking Thursdays will be graded accordingly each week, while Tuesday Terms and Reading Wednesdays will be graded for participation.
