

Use the different sections of this letter to begin conversations with your child about what he or she is learning.

Big Idea: What does *respect* mean to you?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: The White Spider's Gift

Summary: In this play, set in ancient Paraguay, kind and noble Piki competes with other village boys to win the hand of the chieftain's daughter. Just when Piki thinks he has lost, a white spider with amazing weaving skills offers to help him.

Essential Questions: What makes somebody a good person? How do actions speak louder than words?

DISCUSS with your child how he or she can be a good sport. Talk about how famous athletes show good sportsmanship and how these actions are forms of respect.
