
#### **BAND**










### PEP **CLUB**



The Lake Wales Highlander 1955 football season got off to a rather bad start as the powerful Auburndale Bloodhounds capitalized on breaks to win by 34-7.


Auburndale scored first on a 26 yard pass from Bill Turner to R. L. Pugh; but the Highlanders quickly tied the score when four plays netted them 71 yards and Bill Truluck scored.

Another Turner - Pugh aerial gave Auburndale a 14-7 advantage, and Wayman Meadows scored the Bloodhounds' third touchdown by galloping 28 yards with a Highlander fumble.

Before the end of the half, Jerrell Teague scored two TDs for Auburndale, one on a 21 yard run and another on a 45 yard sprint with a Highlander fumble.

Neither team scored during the second half. Lake Wales netted a total of 12 first downs and 233 yards to the Bloodhound's 258 yardage and 11 first downs.






Lake Wales scored first after a 57 yard drive, but a fumble on the 15 later in the half set up a Panther score.

In the third quarter Howard Bass went 18 yards to score, and James McMillan added another tally to set the score at 21-7.

Bass scored again in the final quarter after Jim Nordlund had intercepted a Mulberry lateral on the Panther 42.

Lake Wales dominated the game with 257 yards from scrimmage to Mulberry's 125 yards. Howard Bass booted all four extra points.



Howard Bass scored for Lake Wales in the first quarter as he climaxed a 47 yard drive with a plunge over the goal from the one.

Fort Meade's tally came early in the second quarter when Bill Gillispie carried from midfield to the Highlander's two yard line, and Bill Farris vaulted into the end zone to tie the score 6-6.

John Upchurch handed off to Howard Bass later in the same quarter for another TD to give Lake Wales a 12-6 lead.

In the second half the Miners penetrated within scoring distance twice; but each time they were held by a strong Highlander line.

Lake Wales netted 290 yards from scrimmage and 12 first downs; while Ft. Meade picked up ten first downs and 204 yards.






Successful in four goal-line stands, the Highlanders trounced the Wauchula Wildcats by 19-0 in their first SFC game.

Wauchula threatened in the first quarter by advancing the ball to the Highlander ten yard stripe, but Lake Wales took over on downs. Later in the same period the Wildcats fumbled into the end zone after driving to the two.

The Highlanders received the ball on the twenty and drove 80 yards, with James McMillan scoring from the six.

Late in the second quarter Howard Bass carried for nine yards and a second Highlander score to give Lake Wales a 12-0 lead at halftime.

In the third quarter a Wauchula drive ended on the nine, and Howard Bass streaked 91 yards on the first down to stretch Lake Wales' lead to 19-0.







Fumbles were costly as the Highlanders lost a conference grid battle with Plant City 14-7.

Plant City took advantage of a Highlander fumble as Henry Bister passed to Charles Cooper for a 44 yard touchdown play.

Later in the first quarter Howard Bass set up a score for Lake Wales when he carried for 65 yards to the 17. On the third down Bass carried for 15 yards and the tying score.

Charles McCublers vaulted into the end zone for the Planters on the first play of the final quarter. The conversion was good, and Plant City won by 14-7.

The loss to Plant City was the first Southwest Florida Conference setback for Lake Wales.




The undefeated Pasco Pirates of Dade City romped to a 26-7 win over the Highlanders in a crucial Southwest Florida Conference tilt.

Showing much power early in the game, Dade City drove 76 yards to score the first seven points. Lake Wales fumbled in the second quarter to set up a Pirate touchdown from 19 yards out.

Dade City recovered another fumble in second half and pushed forward for 32 yards and their third tally of the game.

Warren Bennett intercepted a Highlander pass on Lake Wales' 35, and Robert Sanders carried for the score.

The Highlander's lone tally came after a 78 yard drive in the final quarter. James McMillan passed to Howard Bass on the three, and Bass scored on the third down.



Howard Bass set up a Highlander score with a 36 yard run to the two. On the third down Bass drove through for the score, and Jim Cooper converted to give Lake Wales a 7-0 lead.

After a 65 yard drive by Bartow, Kenneth Allen scored from the nine-yard line, and David Garner kicked the extra point.

Lake Wales fumbled on the 48 late in the second quarter. With seconds remaining in the half G. W. Curry carried to the nine. On the next play Curry was unable to pass, and as the buzzer sounded he darted into the end zone to put the Jackets ahead by 14-7.

In the second half Bartow drove 66 yards after the kick-off, and Curry went over the goal from the two. Bartow's final score came in the fourth period when Robert Coker plunged over from the two.

The Yellow Jackets racked up 16 first downs with a net yardage of 286. Lake Wales picked up 97 yards from scrimmage and 4 first downs.





Breaking a three game losing streak, the Highlanders scored a 20-13 victory over the Winter Haven Blue Devils for their second SFC win.


Each team scored 13 points in a fast-moving third quarter, and Lake Wales added the deciding margin on a 62 yard drive in the third quarter.

Larry Richards set up Lake Wales' first score with a 28 yard end run to the three, and Howard Bass scored on the next play.


Grady Smith made two long TD runs for Winter Haven in rapid succession, one of 63 yards, and another 33 yards.

Lake Wales immediately tied the score as Howard Bass received the kick-off and raced 80 yards to pay dirt.

The deciding score came in the third quarter when Bass went 9 yards to score. 99









Climaxing the year with a bang, the Highlanders crushed their arch-rivals from Haines City with a thorough 26-0 trouncing in the Highlander Homecoming game.

Howard Bass was no small worry for the Hornets as he scored all 26 points and netted 339 yards. Lake Wales scored its biggest victory over Haines City since 1939.

In the first quarter Bass carried 58 yards for the first TD of the game, and his 46 yard run in the second added insurance points.

On the fourth play after half-time Bass raced 38 yards for a third tally climaxing a 63 yard drive.

Lake Wales fought off a Haines City threat after the Hornets had penetrated to within inches of a score.

The Highlanders then drove to their own 49, and Bass sprinted the final 51 yards and booted the conversion to give Lake Wales a 26-0 lead.

The game ended the season for Lake Wales with six wins and four setbacks. Outstanding on defense for the Highlanders were James McMillan, Sam Barranco, Donald Bryan, and Tom Jones.

Lake Wales scored in every quarter of a one-sided SFC game with the Arcadia Bulldogs to rack up a 40-7 victory.

Arcadia fumbled twice in the opening minutes of the game, and the Highlanders took advantage of the breaks as John Up-Church scored twice on runs of six yards and of one yard.

Early in the second period Lake Wales gambled on a 4 and 2 situation, and Bill Truluck charged through tackle to go 55 yards for the third Highlander score.

Howard Bass returned an Arcadia punt 60 yards, and the Highlanders took a 27-0 lead.

The Bulldogs scored their lone touchdown in the closing seconds of the first half when Ed Dorminey plunged five yards to climax a 39 yard drive.


Late in the third period Roger Cain intercepted an Arcadia pass and went 65 yards for the TD.

After grinding out 97 yards, Lake Wales scored the final seven points as Bass carried on a 12-yard scoring play.




"We've got the pep!" might well be the battle cry of the LWHS cheerleaders who stood behind the Highlander teams through "rain and shine"!








#### "B" BASKETBALL


