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## **WELCOME**

Welcome to Air Force JROTC, unit GA-062 at Northside High School. Cadets are encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity to develop their character and to practice leadership skills. AFJROTC is like most activities; cadets get out of it as much as they put into it. By keeping a good attitude and putting forth a strong effort, cadets will develop personal traits and skills that will help them succeed in life no matter what path they pursue. Upon successful completion of the AFJROTC program and graduation from high school, graduates will be eligible for several benefits. If graduates enlist in any branch of the Armed Forces, they will be eligible for one or more additional rank increases upon successful completion of basic training. Cadets are also eligible to compete for JROTC nominations to the service academies. Lastly, they will receive a training completion certificate and a record of all their activities within AFJROTC.

This document contains information, policies, and guidelines for how AFJROTC is operated and how cadets are expected to conduct themselves. Cadets in AFJROTC are expected to meet the highest GA-062 standards of behavior, attitude, and courtesy. Belonging to the Corps is an honor and privilege, and a cadet may be removed if they do not meet these standards. Discipline problems such as dishonesty, excessive tardiness, unexcused absences, failure to follow directions from those in authority, or school suspensions are a serious matter and may also result in the student's removal from the program.

## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

AFJROTC is a 3 or 4-year program offered to high school students, grades 9-12. The curriculum includes Aerospace Science (AS), Leadership Education (LE) and Wellness. All Northside High School students receive Physical Education credit towards graduation for successful completion (*3 years*) of the AFJROTC program.

## **MISSION**

The Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps' (AFJROTC) primary mission is to develop citizens of character dedicated to serving our nation and communities.

### AIR FORCE CORE VALUES

Our core values are the foundation upon which an Air Force Junior ROTC Program is built. Core values are a fundamental set of guidelines that can serve a cadet throughout their life. They are:

- **Integrity First:** Integrity is devotion to honesty, truthfulness, doing one's duty, and doing what is right. This means that your word can always be counted upon and that you can be trusted to accomplish your job.
- **Service Before Self:** Service is the giving of self to provide for the welfare of others. Others needs are placed above your own personal desires.
- **Excellence in All We Do:** Excellence means doing the very best you can in each job you perform regardless of how large, small, difficult, or easy it is to accomplish. Excellence incorporates a sustained passion for continuous improvement and innovation.

### CADET HONOR CODE

*"On my honor, I will not lie, cheat, or steal nor tolerate those who do. I will maintain my integrity and act appropriately at all times. I will follow all cadet regulations and abide by the directions of those officers over me."*

- **Respect:** Cadets will respect other cadets and other students and faculty of Northside High School. Cadets will treat everyone with respect, both inside and outside of school. A cadet's behavior on the internet and social media must also be respectful and not bring discredit to AFJROTC. Cadets can be disciplined through AFJROTC and the school for disrespectful or inappropriate postings on social media.

### AFJROTC HISTORY

The First JROTC program was established in Cheyenne Wyoming by Army Lieutenant Edgar R. Steevers. Established as a merger of high school education with non-compulsory military training. Lt Steevers believed military training could help create better citizens. In 1916. the National Defense Act of 1916 occurs, and the US Army formally adopts JROTC. There are currently over (887) JROTC units worldwide and more than 120,000 cadets are enrolled in the program.

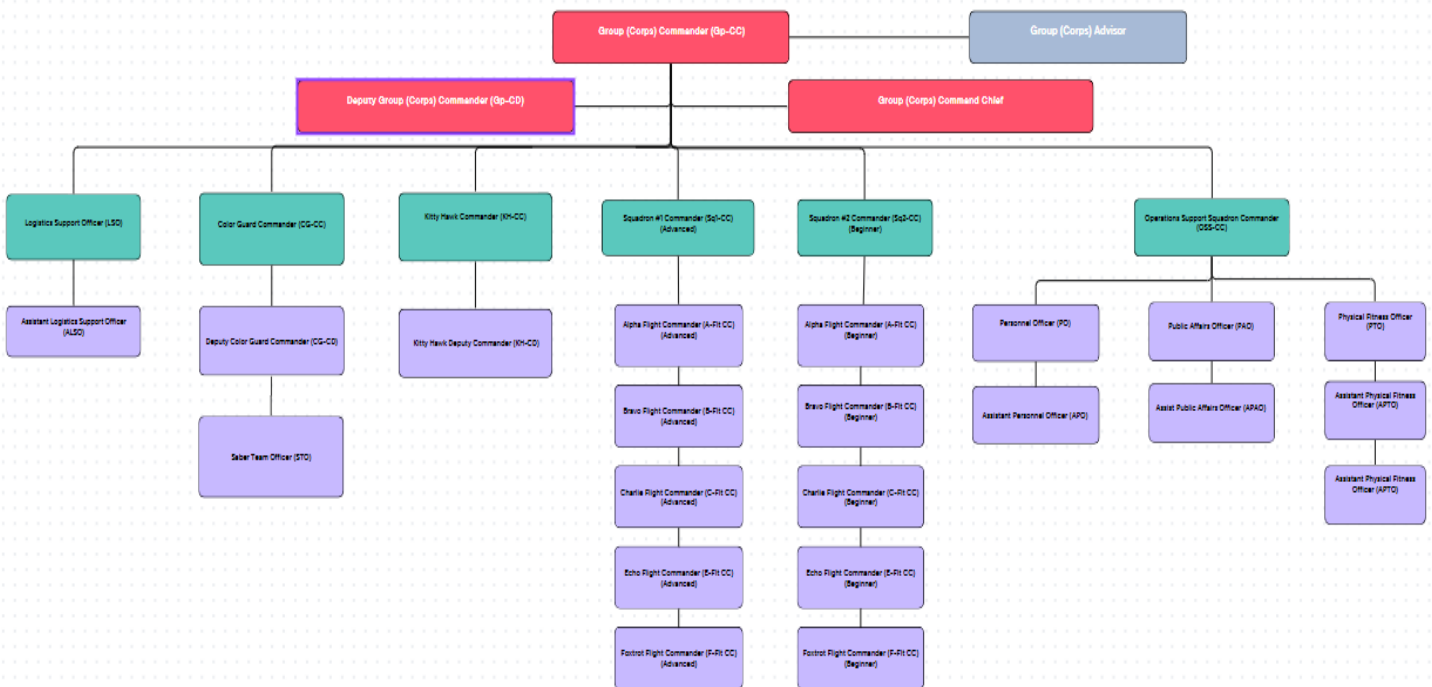
## INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR/DISENROLLMENT

Inappropriate behavior, in or out of uniform, is prohibited while participating in AFJROTC activities. This behavior includes, but is not limited to the following:

- **Vulgar Conduct and Language:** JROTC cadets and Instructors will avoid the use of profanity. Cadets may receive a reprimand if they conduct themselves poorly. This could affect their chance of advancement within the Corps and their ability to retain their current position.
- **Hazing:** Any form of hazing, whether verbal or physical, will not be tolerated within any AFJROTC unit or activity. Requiring cadets, individually or as a group, to perform any physical action as a reprimand, punishment, or failure to perform will also not be tolerated. Examples of prohibited activity include (but are not limited to): pushups, running laps, pushing, shoving, verbal abuse, teasing or otherwise humiliating behavior – these are all prohibited. Also, no unit may facilitate or condone any secret clubs or societies as part of the AFJROTC program.
- **Harassment:** Harassment such as improper or abusive language, and coercion of lower-class cadets for personal gain, is forbidden. Misuse of cadet authority will not be condoned nor tolerated.
- **Disenrollment:** Removal may be necessary in extreme cases and for select cadets on a case-by-case basis. This will be accomplished and documented by the SASI and other instructors and will be in full coordination with the student, counselors, and parents. Where possible it will be preceded by counseling to give the cadet a chance to correct the behavior. AFJROTCI 36-2010: *“The SASI must develop specific written disenrollment rules and processes that are coordinated with school leadership and the counseling staff annually prior to the beginning of school. As a minimum, the process must include cadet counseling, discussion with parents/guardians, discussion with counselors/school administration and the SASIs role as the final authority disenrollment procedures and cadet removal.”*
  - **The following reasons are grounds for removal (the list is not all-inclusive):**
    - Failure to maintain acceptable standards (including uniform wear, grooming, negative attitude, or academics).
    - Disciplinary issues such as suspensions or unexcused attendance problems.
    - Inaptitude or indifference to training.
    - Persistent disciplinary or behavior issues.
    - Actions deemed detrimental to good order and discipline in the Corps.
    - Any other reason deemed appropriate by the AFJROTC instructors.

### CADET CORPS ORGANIZATION

- GENERAL:** The Holm Center recommends all AFJROTC units with less than 250 cadets be organized as a cadet group. This COI establishes the GA-062 Cadet Group with an expanded group staff under the direction of the *Operations Support Squadron Commander* and two operational *Squadron Commanders* (each with two or more flights). The *Cadet Group Commander* will be the senior cadet in the chain of command regardless of rank. Previous Group Commanders will serve as *Special Assistants (Corps Advisor)* to the current *Group Commander* and will support as required.
- CADET STAFF SELECTION AND ROTATION:** The SASI, with the input of key staff members, selects the cadet Group Commander, subordinate commanders, and staff members. The Group Commander will be announced at a mass formation during the second half of the first and second semesters.
- CHAIN OF COMMAND:** The cadet corps will be organized as depicted below:



#### 4. POSITION DESCRIPTIONS:

**Group Commander:** The Group (Corps) Commander is responsible for:

- Assisting Instructors in scheduling and planning details for all major cadet activities.
- Ensuring cadet group activities are conducted in accordance with current Air Force, AFJROTC, and corps regulations, directions, policies, and procedures.
- Ensuring the well-being of the entire JROTC Cadet Corps.
- Assigning additional duties or responsibilities for major events to Group Staff personnel.
- Organizing and running weekly Group Staff Meetings.
- Plan meetings with the Flight Commanders
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Deputy Group Commander:** The Deputy Group Commander is responsible for:

- Assisting the Group Commander in scheduling and planning details for all major cadet activities.
- Assuming Group Commander roll if they are absent or unable to execute their duties
- Ensuring that all cadet group activities are conducted in accordance with current Air Force, AFJROTC, and corps regulations, directions, policies, and procedures.
- Ensuring the well-being and ensuring the safety of the entire JROTC Cadet Corps during events.
- Assisting the Group Commander in assigning additional duties or responsibilities for major events to Group Staff personnel.
- Supporting the Group Commander in organizing and running weekly Group Staff Meetings
- Assist instructors with managing and conducting Self-Inspection
- Assist the Group Commander by managing and leading wherever deemed necessary.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Command Chief:** The Command Chief is responsible for:

- Organizing and leading the Cadet of the Semester and PEP Boards.
- Enter merit/demerits from staff cadets into WINGS; modify spreadsheet as required.
- Coordinate and develop a merit/demerit spreadsheet for the new school year.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Operations Support Squadron (OSS) Commander:** The OSS Commander is responsible for:

- Operational functions of the corps, to include oversight of: Personnel Officer, Public Affairs Officer, and Physical Fitness Officer.
- Collect and maintain extra-curricular events documents in *Events Folder*.
- Ensure proper loading and closure of events (LDR, community service, etc.) in WINGS.
- Monitor the planning, execution, and completion of events.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Squadron Commanders:**

- Oversee functions and provide direction for Flight Commanders
- Ensure Flight Commanders are trained to conduct responsibilities.
- Track and monitor all forms (contracts, uniform issues, etc.) collected by Flight Commanders
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Public Affairs Officer:** The Public Affairs Officer is responsible for:

- Collect photos and other items to promote the AFJROTC program.
- Post upcoming and completed activities in the *Northside High School AFJROTC* Facebook page.
- Publish and maintain monthly event calendars.
- Maintain bulletin board with current information to create and maintain interest in the corps.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**The Kitty Hawk Honor Society:** The Kitty Hawk Honor Society is responsible for:

- Evaluate and maintain cadet listing for Kitty Hawk membership.
- Plan, schedule, and coordinate community service projects.
- Schedule and execute KH Induction Ceremony.
- Organize (2) Red Cross blood drives during school year.
- Form academic team and participate in Academic Bowl.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Logistics Support Officer:** The LSO is responsible for:

- Maintaining an inventory of all uniform items and accessories the Cadet Corps receives.
- Issuing and distributing uniform items to cadets.
- Maintaining record of every issued item on paper and in WINGS program.
- Maintain supplies and uniform items in a neat and organized manner.
- Organizing all uniforms into a system based on sizes.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Personnel Officer:** The Personnel Officer is responsible for:

- Ensuring all Flight Commanders who need access to WINGS, have access through the instructors.
- All promotions, awards, and incentive programs.
- Maintaining and keeping current records in WINGS and hard copy of promotions, ribbons, awards (such as cords, berets, etc.), activities and leadership positions.
- Maintaining an inventory of ribbons and ranks in a neat and organized manner. Coordinate with the instructor and cadet leadership when items are low or absent.
- Responsible for preparing certificates of Appreciation, Completion, Training and running the Cadet of the Month Program.
- Responsible for Awards Banquet, awards, and certificates.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Physical Training Officer:** The PTO is responsible for:

- In charge of a Fitness Team
- Focusing on competitions with other units.
- Planning the Bataan Death March
- Plan, execute, track, and enter into WINGS all PFT scores/awards.
- Providing refreshments for Corps events as designated by the Instructors.
- Ensure NPFT scores are entered within 10 school days of taking test.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.

**Flight Commander:** The In-class Flight Commander is responsible for:

- Encouraging, motivating, and taking care of their flight members, build teamwork, respect, and pride. Display enthusiasm and passion.
- Setting a high standard and example in being active in our corps by wearing the uniform and displaying positive behavior and discipline and responsibility.
- Taking attendance and handing out all papers.
- Other duties as identified in *Staff Duties Description* document.



## CURRICULUM

**Weekly Schedule:** The standard weekly schedule will be as follows (subject to change):

**Monday:** Aerospace Science/Leadership Education

**Tuesday:** Aerospace Science/Leadership Education

**Wednesday:** Uniform Inspection/Drill and Ceremonies

**Thursday:** Aerospace Science/Leadership Education

**Friday:** Wellness/Teambuilding

**Aerospace Science (AS):** acquaints students with the elements of aerospace and the aerospace environment. It introduces cadets to the principles of space flight, principles of aircraft flight, history of aviation, development of air power, contemporary aviation, human requirements of flight, the space environment, space programs, space technology, rocketry, propulsion, the aerospace industry, the science of flight, astronomy, survival, and the study of various cultures across the world.

**Leadership Education (LE):** helps students develop leadership skills and acquaints them with the practical application of life skills. The LE curriculum emphasizes discipline, responsibility, leadership, management, followership, citizenship, and career, cadet corps activities, study habits, time management, communication skills, and drill and ceremonies.

Wellness provides a standardized, facility variations minded curriculum offering substantial individual health improvements. The objective is to motivate cadets to lead healthy, active lifestyles. PT/Wellness provides leadership opportunities, builds esprit de corps, and increases cadet confidence.

**1. GRADING POLICY:** A Cadet's final grade in AFJROTC will be determined by the following subcategories:

Aerospace Science/Leadership/Uniform	45%
Physical Training	20%
Daily (Pop Quiz, Writing Assignments, etc.)	15%
Final	20%

Federal law requires that all Junior ROTC Cadets wear the military uniform an average of at least once a week to complete program requirements and participate in the Physical Training (PT) program which includes the wear of PT gear on PT days (usually Fridays). **Note: Cadets who fail to wear the uniform as required, or do not participate in PT, will NOT receive a passing grade or credit in AFJROTC.**

## CLASSROOM POLICY

1. **GENERAL:** The classroom will be conducted in a military manner with organization, discipline and respect.
  - Respect for fellow cadets, cadet leaders and instructors.
  - Be at your seat at *Parade Rest* when the late bell rings.
  - Flight commander oversees student flight (the classroom).
  - Cell phones will be turned off and put away for the entire duration of class unless specifically allowed by the instructor.
  - The following rules apply to the telephone, email, Schoology, Zoom, Google Classroom, and on-line video conferencing environments:
    - Cadets will not post or send messages, pictures or other data that is obscene, profane, or disrespectful.
    - Cadets will address everyone in a polite, courteous manner and not use obscene, profane, or disrespectful language.
    - Cadets will address all adults respectfully, with their ranks/titles as appropriate.
2. **ATTENDANCE POLICY:** Cadets who are absent from class for any reason are required to communicate with instructors to make up for all work missed. It is each cadet's responsibility to obtain assignments or handouts immediately upon return. If absent on uniform day, cadets are required to wear the uniform on their first day back. All late make-up wear must take place before the next uniform inspection day. Communicate in advance with flight commander and instructor on make-up plan. Extenuating circumstances may be considered when a cadet cannot meet the cut-off date.
3. **PREPARATION FOR CLASS:** Each cadet is required to be physically and mentally prepared for class. Cadets are required to be at the position of "Parade Rest" by their seats when the tardy bell rings. Being in the cadet/instructor's office is not an excuse for not being at your seat when the tardy bell rings. If an assignment is given by an instructor, the assignment must be completed before the beginning of that instructor's next class. Cadets must always be ready for a pop quiz on all material covered.
4. **CLASSROOM PROCEDURES:**
  - a. If a cadet needs to see an instructor during a class, they will coordinate with the classroom instructor. NO cadet is allowed into the cadet/instructor's office during class, without prior approval by both the classroom instructor and instructor to be visited. NO cadets are allowed to depart the classroom into the hall without an instructor's permission unless they are leaving the classroom with a school administrator.
  - b. No open food or drink is allowed in the classroom or cadet office. Water is the only item allowed to be consumed in the classroom. With Instructor approval, closed food or drink containers may be allowed.
  - c. When the instructor first enters the room to begin class, the class will be called to attention. *If a guest military speaker enters the classroom to speak to the class, the class will be called to attention.* When the class dismissal bell rings, the class will be called to attention as directed by the instructor (Flight Commander will dismiss if the instructor has already departed the class).
  - d. Cadets will sit up in their chairs with their feet on the floor directly in front of their desk (not in the aisle or on another desk). Cadets will not place their heads on the desks or close their eyes during class. Cadets who feel sleepy may stand up in the back of the room (permission is not needed).

- e. Cadets are expected to participate in all classroom discussions. During testing, cadets are not allowed to talk until every cadet has finished and turned in their test. Cadets must arrive at class every day with a pen or pencil.

- 5. INFORMATION BOARD:** Cadets are required to check the information board in their AFJROTC classroom every day (even if they do not have a class in that room that day, due to other school activities or class absences). Cadets are responsible for all information posted in the **Official Section** of the board and it may be part of any test or quiz from the day after it is posted.

## PROGRAM OPPORTUNITIES

### 1. SCHOLARSHIPS:

- **J-100 Scholarship:** The J-100 AFJROTC Character-in-Leadership Scholarship, or the J-100 for short, provides 100 cadets a four-year scholarship with benefits including four years 100% paid tuition, in addition to university-owned/on-campus housing fees (\$10,000 max per year), a book stipend, and the standard AFROTC cadet stipend. The scholarship can be used at any AFROTC host or crosstown university. There are no specific degree requirements, but cadets who desire to potentially enter the USSF may want to consider pursuing technical degrees. Accepting the scholarship will result in a cadet being required to enroll in AFROTC and pursue an officer commission.
  - J-100 Eligibility Criteria 5.5.1.1.1 3.0
  - Unweighted GPA 22 ACT or 1100 SAT (or No-Test Waiver)
  - >50 fitness score
  - Minimum of 2 calendar years AFJROTC experience
  - US citizen
- **Flight Academy:** The Air Force is funding 300 scholarships for AFJROTC cadets to attend private pilot training at public/private universities during the summer of 2022. Selected cadets will be identified through a competitive boarding process. The scholarship will pay for round-trip airfare, room and board, collegiate academics, and flight hours required to potentially earn a Private Pilot's Certificate (PPC) through an in-residence collegiate program that is approximately eight (8) weeks in length.
- **High School Scholarship Program (HSSP):** 3–4-year college scholarships designed to incentivize high school seniors to participate in AFROTC. Nationwide competitive selection process based on composite scoring of academic quotient (50%), personal interview (45%), and physical fitness assessment (5%). At least two boards are held each fiscal year selecting enough eligible applicants to meet AF PGL goal four years out (approximately 1,000 selected in FY 22). The HSSP scholarship application window is open from 1 July until 31 Dec.
- **In-College Scholarship Program:** (2) 3.5-year scholarships. Targeted in-college program designed to meet accession goals w/major-specific scholarships and to promote diversity w/targeted foreign language (FL), Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI), and Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) scholarships. Multiple competitive and non-competitive boards each fiscal year based on composite of cumulative GPA (30%), detachment commander's ranking (50%) and physical fitness assessment (20%).

- 2. Leadership Development Requirements:** LDR activities (formerly known as co-curricular activities) are a critical component of any successful AFJROTC unit and will be incorporated into the program. LDRs are activities which are a critical component of a successful AFJROTC unit and will be incorporated into the program. LDR activities are AFJROTC-sponsored and school-approved teams and/or committees that normally plan or participate in events conducted outside classroom hours (before school/after school). These events are planned, organized, and executed by the cadet corps while being supervised by a certified AFJROTC Instructor.

**LDR activities include but are not limited to:**

- *Orienteering Team:* A team of cadets using a map, go out in the woods to find various checkpoints. The team is required to read a map and use a compass to find the points. Whichever team is fastest and most accurate wins.
- *Raiders Team:* A team of cadets that go through various strenuous obstacle courses. The team attends competitions. To win the team must complete the course first with the fastest time.
- *Model Rocketry:* Cadets learn how to build and launch model rockets. Also learn the academics behind rockets. Typically, there will be one launch each semester (weather dependent).
- *Flickerball Team:* The team is evenly split into two smaller teams. The two teams go up against each other and have to score points by throwing the ball at the goal, it's 1 point if you hit the back board and 3 if you get it through the hole.
- *Drone and Robotics Team:* These teams study all things related to building and operating robots and flying drones.
- *Drill Team:* This competitive team will teach you how to drill at your best. Travel to competitions and perform Regulation, Exhibition, Inspection and Color Guard.
- *Color Guard:* Four person teams that present the Colors at a large variety of public events from sporting events to school and community ceremonies.
- *Saber Team:* This team forms arches with saber swords at ceremonies such as A.L.S. (Airmen Leadership School), homecoming, military ball, Miss Northside Pageants, Kitty Hawk Induction Ceremonies, etc.
- *Physical Training (PT) / Fitness Teams:* This is an event-based team that is selected for various PT competitions at other schools in the area. Promotes overall Corp fitness and a sense of unity for the Corps.
- *Community Service (CS) Activities:* The unit performs a wide variety of community service activities in support of the school, local organizations and the community-at-large.
- *Kitty Hawk Honor Society (KHHS):* Kitty Hawk Honor Society is equivalent to the National Honor Society and was created to develop an interest in college education, to help cadets participate as a club and to provide additional areas for leadership experiences and development. Eligible cadets will be provided with an application during the 1st semester.

## PROMOTION POLICY

- 1. GENERAL:** The Headquarters Air Force Junior ROTC directs permanent ranks for Air Force Junior ROTC cadets based on years in Junior ROTC. There are three types of promotions: regular promotions, position promotions, and Promotions for Exceptional Performers (PEP) promotions. Total rank in the cadet corps is limited by the maximum authorized by the cadet Unit Manning Document (UMD). To help meet those limitations the maximum temporary rank for cadets by school grade level is as follows:

Freshmen - Cadet TSgt	Junior - Cadet Captain
Sophomore - Cadet CMSgt	Senior - Cadet Colonel

Exceptions to this policy may be made by the SASI for position promotions. To be eligible for a promotion a cadet must be in good standing with Northside HS (not assigned to ISS during the promotion period up to actual effective date) and AFJROTC (no discipline problems). Also, they cannot have a demerit balance and must have at least a current passing grade of 75 or higher in AFJROTC (most promotions require a 75 or higher average in AFJROTC).

- 2. REGULAR PROMOTIONS:** Regular promotions take place twice each semester. The first cycle is during the middle of each semester and the second cycle is at the end of each semester. Cadets receive initial cadet officer rank by position promotion when selected to serve in a cadet officer position. Cadet officers are eligible for promotion only at the end of the semester promotions. A promotion close-out date (PCD) will be set by the *Group Commander* and SASI. All information used for promotions will be as of this date. NO grades or uniform inspections will be made up after this date. Regular promotions are patterned after the Air Force and include both fully qualified and best qualified.

- a. The first (3) regular promotions to c/Amn, c/A1C, and c/SrA, are on a fully qualified basis. ALL cadets who meet the minimum requirements for promotion on the promotion close out date are promoted. Flight Commanders are responsible for all fully qualified promotions in their class. All other regular promotions are on a best qualified basis. Best Qualified cadets are determined by a promotion score. The scores of all cadets competing for promotion are listed in numerical order with the highest score on top and the lowest score on the bottom. The SASI will provide the cadet group commander with a promotion quota expressed as a percentage. If the promotion quota is 50%, then the top half of the list will be promoted, and the bottom half will not be promoted. All recommended promotion lists will be submitted by the group commander to the SASI/ASI for approval.
- b. After each promotion cycle, all cadets who were not promoted will be counseled. Flight Commanders will counsel each non-promoted enlisted cadet and the deputy group commander will counsel each non-promoted cadet officer. The purpose is to make sure all non-promoted cadets understand why they were not promoted and what they can do to increase their chance of promotion during the next cycle.
- c. Promotion boards will be conducted for promotion to the following ranks: MSgt and above. The *Personnel Officer* will coordinate with the group commander to select cadet officers to be board members. All board members must be of a higher rank than the cadets meeting that board. The Personnel Officer is a non-voting member of each board. The group commander will not normally be a board member. The **Group Commander, SASI or ASI** must be present during all promotion board meetings.
- d. Cadets who are placed in ISS will not be considered for promotion during the promotion period they are in ISS. Cadets who are expelled from NHS will be demoted to their permanent rank. Upon returning to AFJROTC at NHS they will start at their permanent rank unless given a position promotion.

- 3. POSITION PROMOTIONS:** Cadets who are selected to fill cadet officer positions and are not already at the rank noted below, will receive position promotions: *Flight Commanders* will be promoted to cadet 2nd Lt; *Squadron-Level Commanders* will be promoted to cadet Captain; the *Deputy Group Commander* will be promoted to cadet Lt Col; and the *Group Commander* will be promoted to cadet Col. The *Command Chief* will be promoted to C/CMSgt. Cadets will be allowed to retain the higher rank of a position promotion **ONLY** if they successfully serve in that position. If they are removed from that position, they will return to their previous temporary rank, **or** their permanent rank as determined by the *SASI/ASI*.
- 4. PEP PROMOTIONS:** The Air Force uses a special promotion system to recognize and reward exceptional performance outside of the regular promotion system. Here at GA-062, a small number of exceptional cadets each year receive Promotions for Exceptional Performers (PEP) promotions. The Top Merit Winner is eligible for a PEP promotion, if he/she meets the criteria outlined under the Top Three Merit Earners in this COI. Cadets who are identified by the SASI or ASI as exceptional performers are also eligible for PEP promotions. Cadets are considered for PEP promotions all year, and are limited to no more than 1 per period (Jun-Dec and Jan-May).
- 5. DEMOTION:** In rare circumstances, cadets may be demoted in rank. This is typically done for disciplinary reasons and is at the discretion of the SASI. A detailed rationale will be provided to the cadet and will be accompanied by extensive counseling to ensure the demotion is corrective and not purely punitive in nature.

**MERIT/DEMERIT SYSTEM**

**1. GENERAL:** Cadet Officers and senior NCO's have the authority to recommend cadets for merits and demerits. **Only the Senior Aerospace Science Instructor and the Aerospace Science Instructors** have the authority to approve merits and demerits. Normally merits and demerits will be awarded according to the guidelines of this policy. Each cadet’s merit/demerit total returns to “0” at the end of each semester. Merits for extra-curricular organization participation are awarded at the end of the semester.

**2. MERITS:** Cadets recommending merits will use the CADET MERIT FORM (F-101). If more than one cadet is recommended for merits for the same reason, multiple cadet names may be placed on the form F-101. Cadet leaders in charge of activities (OIC or NCOIC) are responsible for providing the Command Chief with a copy of the activity attendance roster. The Command Chief will record all MERITS/DEMERITS on the Merit/Demerit spreadsheet located on the staff stick.

  - Home football game support (honor guard, parking cars)..... 5
  - Special work detail outside normal cadet duty..... 2-5

  - Performance in a Team Event..... 5
- Extra-curricular activities: (maximum of 50 merits per semester)

**3. DEMERITS:** Demerits may be given to those cadets who violate regulations, misbehave, fail to comply with school or JROTC policies, or who fail to comply with instructions given by a superior. The number of demerits given will be determined by the nature of the offense. This COI details some of the infractions that warrant demerits and the amount **normally** awarded. Demerits will nullify an equal number of merits. Cadets recommending demerits will use the CADET DEMERIT FORM (F-102). Print all information. Be specific when stating the reason for demerits. After completing the top block, the cadet receiving the demerits must review and sign the form. If the cadet feels the demerits are not justified, he/she may check the appeal block and write the reason in the space provided (make sure enough details are included for the investigating officer).

**Refusal to sign the demerit form is an admission of guilt.** CLASSROOM DEMERIT FORMS (F-103) may ONLY be used by Flight Commanders for offenses that occur during class. Appeals must be made directly to the SASI or ASI at the time of issue Place all completed form F-101’s, F-102’s and F-103’s in the appropriate Merit/Demerit box located in the Staff Office. The Command Chief will log them onto the “merits/demerits” spreadsheet on the staff stick. **All merits and demerits must be approved by the SASI or ASI before entering** the information on the MERIT / DEMERIT spreadsheet.

- **CADET EVALUATION BOARD:** The accumulation of an excessive number of demerits or multiple repetitions of the same offense may reflect an attitude problem. Therefore, cadets who accumulate excessive demerits or, are issued demerits three times for the same offense are subject to being brought before the Cadet Evaluation Board for review and counseling and may be recommended to the SASI or ASI for punitive action.

**TOP THREE MERIT EARNERS**

- Earning merits represent a positive attitude and commitment to the AFJROTC program by becoming involved in various AFJROTC activities. To promote this attitude throughout the corps, in a competitive manner, the top three net-merit earners will be formally recognized and rewarded at the completion of each semester. The Command Chief will track merits and demerits. Flight Commanders will coordinate with Command Chief before the end of each semester to ensure the accuracy of the merit/demerit tracking process. NOTE: net merits equal total merits earned minus demerits received during a given semester. The top three merit earners will be recognized and rewarded in the following manner:
  - (1) First Place Winner: A plaque, a superior performance ribbon and a gold shoulder cord which will be worn with the uniform during the following semester.
  - (2) Second Place Winner: A plaque and an achievement ribbon.
  - (3) Third Place Winner: A plaque.
  - (4) Additionally, each first-place winner below the rank of C/TSgt will receive a PEP promotion to the next higher rank. All three winners will be given preference, whenever possible, for special activities that occur during the next semester.

## RESERVE CADET

- A Reserve Cadet is a cadet who cannot enroll in AFJROTC courses within the school and is in the AFJROTC program for the sole purpose of participating in co-curricular (after school) activities. To qualify as a Reserve Cadet, a student will meet the following criteria and with SASI concurrence:

\*The student has completed the entire AFJROTC Academic Program at the school and cannot continue without duplicating curriculum courses.

- Reserve Cadets may participate in all AFJROTC activities (community service, drill team, honor guard, etc.). Time in reserve status does not count towards the Certificate of Completion. Reserve Cadets will retain their uniform for the entire academic year. Reserve cadets will wear their uniform on designated uniform days and report to the AFJROTC classroom for uniform inspection.

## NORTHSIDE AFJROTC SCHOOL LETTER

1. **GENERAL:** The Northside AFJROTC school letter will be awarded one time each year at the Spring Awards night. All AFJROTC cadets are eligible to earn the letter provided they meet the following criteria from one of the following categories. Cadets **WILL NOT** be awarded a letter if they have had ISS, OSS, Saturday School or after school detention during the school year. Cadets who are failing AFJROTC will not be awarded a letter.

- **CATEGORIES:**

- a. **TEAM MEMBERSHIP:** A cadet must belong to at least one AFJROTC team and earn at least 10 team merits during the school year.
- b. **COMMUNITY SERVICE:** A cadet must qualify for the AFJROTC Service Ribbon two semesters **or** complete at least 5 AFJROTC community service projects with AFJROTC during the school year.
- c. **QUALITY STATUS:** A cadet must meet all of the following criteria:
  - Good Conduct Ribbon
  - Attendance: no more than 6 absences in a school year.
  - Dress and Appearance Ribbon
  - A minimum of 80% final AFJROTC grade for first semester.
  - A minimum of 85% AFJROTC overall and a 95% average uniform grade.
  - No ISS, OSS, Saturday School or after school detention during the AY.

2. Once a cadet has been awarded a letter, they will be authorized to purchase a letterman jacket.
3. At the beginning of the second semester the GA-062 *GP/CD CC* and *Kitty Hawk Commander* will be responsible for working with the group staff to determine the cadets who may be eligible to receive the letter. The *GP/CD CC* and *Kitty Hawk Commander* will be responsible for determining the cadets who **WILL** receive the Northside Letter at the Spring Awards. The *GP/DP CC* and *Kitty Hawk Commander* will coordinate with the SASI to determine the final eligibility list and add the list to the Spring Awards script.

**CADET OF THE SEMESTER**

- 1. GENERAL:** The *Cadet of the Semester* program is designed to recognize outstanding cadets in the following categories: Airmen (AB-SrA). Each Flight Commander will review all eligible cadets in their class to nominate their best candidate to meet the group board. Cadets must be in good standing with AFJROTC (passing AFJROTC, no missed uniforms, a positive merit balance etc....) and in good standing with NHS (have NOT received an ISS, OSS, Saturday School or detention during the current semester, etc....). Flight Commanders should evaluate the same factors the board will consider: overall AFJROTC grade, total merits, total community service, military bearing, appearance in uniform, and performance of cadet job if applicable.
- 2. FLIGHT COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITIES:** Each flight commander should:
  - a. Maintain a list of all eligible flight members.
  - b. Consider the factors listed in paragraph 1, when nominating candidates.
  - c. Flight Commander must make their nominations during the following months: Oct and Mar
- 3. SQUADRON (1) AND SQUADRON (2) COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITIES:**
  - a. Ask Flight Commanders to nominate cadets for Cadet of the Semester
  - b. Receive nominees from each flight on first school day of the month noted in para 2.d.
  - c. Verify cadet nomination form information including:
    - i. Cadet good standing and grade from SASI
    - ii. Correct rank for category from role book or main data bank
    - iii. Correct total merits and total community service from tracking sources.
  - d. Complete letter to each cadet (AFTER nomination is verified with the SASI).
  - e. Provide nomination forms to the Command Chief.
- 4. COMMAND CHIEF MASTER SERGEANT RESPONSIBILITIES:** The CCC should:
  - a. Serve as president of the board for Airman.
  - b. Select (2) senior NCOs to serve as board members (rotate this responsibility).
  - c. Convene each board on the first Wednesday after nominations are verified.
  - d. Discuss with board members standard questions to ask each candidate.
  - e. Provide the SASI with the names of nominees and board results after board meets.
  - f. Update Cadet of the Semester Certificate with name and picture of cadet winner.
  - g. Complete a Merits Form 101 recommending (10) merits for the winner and (5) merits for each of the other nominees.
- 5. PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES:** The PA Officer should:
  - a. Place an announcement in the orders of the day to recognize the nominees.
  - b. Place an announcement in the orders of the day to recognize the winner.
  - c. Take a picture of the winner for the cadet yearbook.
  - d. Place name on Cadet of the Semester plaque hanging in classroom.
- 6. INSTRUCTOR STAFF RESPONSIBILITIES:** The SASI and ASI should:
  - a. Verify cadet nominees are in good standing with AFJROTC.
  - b. Announce the winning cadet in every ROTC class.
  - c. Approve (10) merits for each winning cadet and 5 merits for each of the other nominees.
  - d. Award the winning cadet the white shoulder cord.

**UNIFORM WEAR**

1. **GENERAL:** The uniform worn by Northside High School Junior ROTC Cadets is an official US Air Force uniform, therefore, we are required to follow the official guidance of AFI 36-2903, Air Force Dress and Appearance Regulation. Only the insignia is different to denote membership in Junior ROTC.
  - **MAINTENANCE:** All students enrolled in AFJROTC at Northside High School will be issued an Air Force JROTC uniform. This uniform is on loan from the USAF and must be worn in accordance with Air Force uniform wear policies. **There is no rental fee.** Whenever the uniform is worn, it must be clean and in good repair. Cadets are personally responsible for the proper care and cleaning of their uniform. While wearing the uniform, cadets will not engage in any activity, such as gym class, sporting events, certain types of work, etc., that could soil or ruin the uniform. Cadets are issued new or professionally cleaned uniforms. Cadets turning in uniform items for any reason must have the item professionally cleaned prior to turning them in. NOTE: All dark blue uniform items must be dry cleaned; only the light blue shirt or blouse may be washed. If dark blue items are washed they will become unserviceable, and the cadet will have to buy a replacement. Cadets who turn in unclean items will be charged a cleaning fee to cover the cost of cleaning the items. Cadets who fail to properly return ALL their uniform items will be placed on the school debt list, will not be allowed to participate in school graduation ceremonies, and will not receive an AFJROTC completion certificate.
  - **INSPECTIONS:** The normal uniform day at Northside High School is **Wednesday**. All cadets are required to wear their uniform during the entire school day on uniform day unless they have received prior exemption from the SASI/ASI. Wearing the uniform is a weekly graded assignment and therefore must be made up if missed. Cadets absent on uniform day will wear their uniform on their first day back in school. However, cadets have until the day before the next uniform inspection to make up a missed uniform wear grade. (For example, a cadet was absent on Wednesday, May 1, the cadet has until Tuesday, May 7 to make up his/her uniform grade). When making up a missed uniform grade, it is the cadet's responsibility to coordinate with their Flight Commander and/or the SASI/ASI to receive his/her grade. Failure to make up the uniform wear grade will result in the cadet earning a zero for that assignment.
    - i. On Physical Training (PT) days (normally Friday) cadets must wear issued PT uniform items, along with appropriate footwear suitable for physical training to include running.
  - **REGULAR WEAR:**
    - i. When wearing the cadet uniform, cadets must follow Air Force rules and wear the uniform hat at all times while outside of buildings. **Northside High School covered walkways will be considered outdoors.** Uniform hats must be worn when in uniform and entering or exiting a car or bus.
    - ii. The flight hat, when not worn, may be placed in bookbag, pocket, or tucked under the belt on the left front side. Ensure the belt is tight enough to prevent the hat from sliding down and being lost.
    - iii. The following shoulder cords are authorized for wear with cadet uniform (only one at a time). **A gold cord** may be worn by the top merit earner. Kitty Hawk Honor Society and Staff members in good standing (not inactive or on probation) may wear **the blue and white over/under cord**. The Cadet of the Semester may wear the **white cord**.
    - iv. The royal blue spirit tee shirt will be issued to each cadet. This shirt is only to be worn for alternate uniform inspections or specified unit activities/events. Since the tee shirt is part of a uniform, it must **always** be tucked in when worn. If belt loops are on the pants/shorts being worn with the spirit shirt, a belt must be worn as well.
    - v. Cadets will be issued a white V or U necked t-shirt. The T-shirt will be worn under the blue shirt to prevent stains from forming. Wearing the white T-shirt **is mandatory** and a part of the uniform inspection grade.

- **OUSTIDE WEAR:** Cadets will not wear their uniforms (other than to Northside High School during normal school hours) without the specific permission of the SASI/ASI. Parts of the uniform (belts, jackets, etc.) will not be worn separately from a complete uniform. Cadets may NOT wear (mix/match) the AFJROTC uniform with civilian clothing. Cadets may wear their uniform to church, weddings, or special events with prior approval from the SASI/ASI. Cadets will NOT wear the uniform or Spirit Shirts while assigned to ISS.
- **PROFESSIONALISM:** When wearing the uniform, cadets must remember that they are wearing a symbol of their country and, therefore, must wear it correctly and conduct themselves with special dignity and restraint. The way cadets wear their uniforms affects public opinion about Air Force Junior ROTC at Northside High School and the US Air Force. Cadets are expected to wear the uniform properly and present a professional military appearance at all times when in uniform. Public display of affection (PDA) is not permitted while participating in AFJROTC activities. PDA is also not permitted when wearing the uniform. Nametags and ribbons (when awarded) are a required part of the uniform.

## CADET APPEARANCE AND GROOMING GUIDELINES

**7.9. Personal Grooming Standards.** This chapter outlines personal grooming while wearing any Air Force uniform. SASI's discretion may be used to determine if an individual's personal grooming is within standards of this instruction. The personal grooming standards listed are minimum standards that represent common appearance issues and are not all-inclusive. Although Cadets have the right, within established limits, to express their individuality through their appearance, the Air Force has defined what is and what is not an acceptable, professional military image for Cadets. Except for minor variations based on gender differences, all Air Force Junior ROTC cadets must comply with the same personal grooming standards. SASIs/ASIs have the responsibility to determine compliance with this instruction and to correct the obvious violations regardless of whether the situation identified is clearly written in this instruction. SASIs do not have authority to waive grooming and appearance standards except as identified in this instruction.

**7.9.1. Hair-male and female.** Will be clean, well-groomed, present a professional appearance, allow proper wear of headgear. Will *not* contain excessive amounts of grooming aids (e.g., gel, mousse, pomade, or moisturizer), appear lopsided, touch either eyebrow (**Exception:** female bangs), or end below an imaginary line across the forehead at the top of the eyebrows that is parallel to the ground. If applied, dyes, tints, bleaches and frostings must result in natural hair colors. **Examples of natural hair colors are brown, blonde, brunette, natural red or black. All Cadets are authorized to wear natural color hair regardless of their natural born hair color, but when combined or frosted, the colors must blend together so as to not present an unnatural appearance between colors. For example, hair colors may be displayed as a "salt-and-pepper" look as this presents a naturally blended hair color and is, therefore, authorized. In contrast, ombre (blending of one color to another with dyes, tints, bleaches and frostings) or black hair with blonde highlights and/or streaks and blonde hair with black highlights and/or streaks do not present a natural appearance as they display vastly different shades of natural hair colors and are, therefore, unauthorized for wear. Prohibited hair color examples (not all inclusive) are burgundy, purple, orange, fluorescent or neon colors.** SASIs may temporarily authorize cancer patients to wear approved caps (black or tan) due to a temporary medical condition (i.e., radiation and/or chemotherapy).

**7.9.1.1. Wigs/Hairpieces/Extensions.** Are authorized and will meet the same standard required for natural hair, be of good quality, fit properly, and comply with safety, functionality and professionalism. (**Note:** Extensions are still prohibited for males). Wigs/Hairpieces/Extensions will *not* be used to cover unauthorized hair styles.

**7.9.1.2. Hair-Nets.** Worn as required for health or safety reasons. Made of natural or a synthetic material; must be conservative (plain and moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme), solid color similar to the member's hair color, also strong enough to support and control hair and contain no metal fasteners. Hair-nets are only authorized when performing related duties as determined by applicable SASI.

**7.9.2. Jewelry.** While in uniform will be plain and conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme) as determined by the SASI.

**7.9.3. Rings.** Airmen may wear a total of no more than three rings; wedding sets count as one ring when worn as a set. Rings will be worn at the base of the finger and may be worn on the thumb.

**7.9.4. Necklaces.** Will not be visible at any time. If worn, will be concealed under a collar or undershirt.

**7.9.5. Bracelets.** Ankle bracelets are not authorized. Cadets may wear one bracelet around their wrist. If worn, the bracelet will be conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme) in design, no wider than ½ inch, gold or silver in color, and will not have any inappropriate pictures or writing. Medical alert/identification bracelets are authorized. If worn, medical alert/identification bracelets will be conservative and moderate. Bracelets will not be excessive or extreme, which is defined as plain, not drawing inappropriate attention. Gemstones/tennis bracelets may only be worn with the mess dress uniform. **Bracelets espousing support for cause, philosophy, individual or group are not authorized** (Exception: Traditional metal POW/MIA/KIA bracelets, which come in colors besides silver, bronze, or gold, remain authorized). **No rubber or fabric type bracelets are allowed.**

**7.9.6. Eyeglasses/Sunglasses.** Will be worn in the manner for which they are made. Eyeglasses and sunglasses will not be worn around the neck or on top/back of head or exposed hanging on the uniform. Eyeglasses and sunglasses may have conservative ornamentation on non-prescription sunglasses or eyeglasses, frames may be black or brown material or gold or silver wire. Brand name glasses may be worn with small logos on frames or lenses. Logo may contrast with frame color or lenses (conservative colors/small logos; black, brown, matte silver/gold). Conservative wrap-around sunglasses may be worn. Conservative, clear, slightly tinted, mirrored or photosensitive lenses are authorized. Sunglasses (to include darkened photosensitive lenses) are not authorized in formation. Exception: Sunglasses are not authorized in formation, unless for medical reasons, e.g., PRK/Lasik surgery and when authorized by a SASI or commandant on the advice of a medical official.}]

**7.9.7. Tattoos or Brands.** **Whether you are in or out of uniform, tattoos or brands anywhere on the body are not allowed if they are obscene or if they advocate sexual, racial, ethnic, or religious discrimination.** Tattoos or brands that might harm good order and discipline or bring discredit upon the Air Force are also barred, whether you are in or out of uniform. The SASI may exercise discretion if a new cadet arrives with a tattoo that may not be in full compliance with the above guidance.

**7.9.8. Body Piercing.** Cadets in uniform are not allowed to attach or display objects, articles, jewelry, or ornamentation to or through the ear, nose, tongue, or any exposed body part (including anything that might be visible through the uniform). **Cadets may not cover any of these articles with make-up, band aids, or wearing clear post pins to hide body piercings.**

**7.9.9. Back Packs.** Cadets may wear a backpack on the left shoulder or both shoulders (not to interfere with rendering the proper salute).



**7.9.10.** Wear/use of an earpiece, any blue tooth technology or headphones, while in uniform, indoors or outdoors, is prohibited, unless specifically authorized for the execution of official duties. Exception: Headphones and earphones (iPods, MP3-type players, etc.) are authorized during travel on public transportation i.e., bus, train or air travel.

**7.10. Specific Female Cadet Grooming Guidelines. (See Figure 3-2, Figure 3-3, and Figure 3.4).**

**7.10.1 Hair-Female. No minimum hair length, to a maximum bulk of 4 inches from scalp** and allows proper wear of headgear. Hair will end above the bottom edge of collar and will not extend below an invisible line drawn parallel to the ground, both front to back and side to side unless pulled back and secured or worn in an authorized ponytail or equivalent or long braid(s). If hair is pulled back and secured behind the head, radius will not exceed 6 inches from the point where the hair is gathered (i.e., no more than 6 inches to the left and 6 inches to the right, 12 inches total width; and 6 inches protruding from where hair is gathered) and must allow for proper wear of headgear. One or two braids or a single ponytail or equivalent may be worn down the member's back with length not extending below a horizontal line running between the top of each sleeve inseam at the under arm through the shoulder blades. The braid(s) or ponytail or equivalent cannot be worn over the shoulder or pulled in front of the body. They shall extend down the member's back. Bangs, or side-swiped hair, may touch eyebrows but will not touch or cover eyes. When in doubt, assess correct length of hair with the cadet standing in the position of attention. Exception: While wearing the Physical Training Gear (PTG), long hair will be secured but may have loose ends and may extend below a horizontal line running between the top of each sleeve inseam at the under arm through the shoulder blades.

**7.10.1.1.** Pinned-up hair should be styled in a manner that prevents loose ends from extending upward on the head. When hair is in a bun, the bun must be a single bun; all loose ends must be tucked in and secured. When hair is in a ponytail or equivalent, it must be a single ponytail or equivalent that does not extend below a horizontal line running between the top of each sleeve inseam at the under arm through the shoulder blades.

**7.10.1.2.** Locs, braids, twists, micro-braids, French braids, Dutch braids and cornrows are authorized. Locs are defined as portions of hair that have been intentionally or unintentionally fused together to form a loc or locs. A braid or twist is two or more portions of interwoven hair. If adding additional hair, it must be a natural-looking color (similar to the individual's hair color) and conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme). Multiple locs, braids, twists or cornrows may come together down the back in one or two braids or a single ponytail. Hair must not exceed length and bulk standard and headgear must fit properly.

**7.10.1.2.1.** All locs, braids and twists, when worn will be of uniform dimension, no wider than one inch, with natural spacing between the locs, braids, and twists and must be tightly interwoven to present a neat, professional and well-groomed appearance. When worn, multiple locs, braids, or twists shall be of uniform dimension, small in diameter (approximately ¼ inches), show no more than ¼ inch of scalp between the locs, braids, or twists and must be tightly interwoven to present a neat, professional appearance.

**7.10.1.2.2.** A braid/twist must continue to the end of the hair without design and following the contour of the head and may be worn loose or in a secured style within hair standards. **Exception:** Micro-braids or twists are not required to continue to the end of the hair.

**7.10.1.3.** Unauthorized: Mohawk, mullet or etched design.

**7.10.2. Hair accessories.** Hair accessories. If worn, hair accessories (e.g., fabric scrunches, hairpins, combs, clips, headbands, elastic bands, barrettes, etc.) must match hair color. Black hair accessories are authorized regardless of hair color. Invisible hairnets are authorized; hairnets must match hair color. Hair must still comply with bulk and appearance standards. Headgear must fit properly. Headbands or fabric scrunches will not exceed two inches in width. Ornaments are *not* authorized (i.e., ribbons, beads, jeweled pins).

**7.10.3. Fingernails.** If worn by females, nail polish will be a single color that does not detract from the uniform, nor can the nail polish be extreme in color. Some examples of extreme colors include, but are not limited to, purple, gold, blue, black, bright (fire engine) red and florescent colors. Do not apply designs to nails or apply two-tone or multi-tone colors; however, white-tip French manicures are authorized. Fingernails must not exceed ¼ inch in length beyond the tip of the finger and must be clean and well groomed. Fingernails must not interfere with the performance of assigned duties. Fingernails must not hinder proper fit of prescribed safety equipment or uniform items.

**7.10.4. Skirts.** The length of your skirt may not vary beyond the top and bottom of the kneecap. Your skirt will fit smoothly, hang naturally, and must not be excessively tight. **Wearing hosiery with the skirt is optional.** Choose a sheer nylon in a neutral dark brown, black, off-black, or dark blue shade that complements the uniform and your skin tone.

**7.10.5. Earrings.** Male cadets are not authorized to wear earrings while in uniform. Female cadets may wear small (not exceeding six mm in diameter) conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme) round or square white diamond, gold, white pearl, or silver earrings as a set with any uniform combination. **If member has multiple holes, only one set of earrings are authorized to be worn in uniform and will be worn in the lower earlobes.** Earrings will match and fit tightly without extending below the earlobe unless the piece extending is the connecting band on clip earrings. When not wearing earrings, male and female cadets **are authorized to wear transparent piercing spacer(s) in lower earlobes while in uniform.** **Transparent spacers are not allowed in ear holes outside of the lower earlobes or any other piercing holes visible in uniform (nose, lip, eyebrow etc.).** Piercing holes will not be large enough to permit light to shine through.

**7.10.6. Undergarments (Mandatory).**

**7.10.6.1. Females.** Appropriate undergarments are required to be worn with all uniform combinations. Wear bra and underpants with all uniforms. Wear of the white V-neck style or athletic tank top undershirt when wearing opened collar service uniforms is authorized. Undershirt will be tucked into slacks or skirt. Undershirts will not have pockets.

**7.10.7. Cosmetics.** Female Cadets may wear cosmetics; however, if worn, they will be conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme) and in good taste. Female Cadets will not wear shades of lipstick that detract from the uniform, or that are extreme colors. **Some examples of extreme colors include but are not limited to, purple, gold, blue, black, bright (fire-engine) red, and fluorescent colors.** Male Cadets are not authorized to wear cosmetics.

**7.10.7.1.** Cosmetic tattooing. Tattooing for cosmetic purposes is authorized when directed by licensed, qualified medical personnel to correct a medical condition, illness or injury for both men and women. When not medically directed, cosmetic tattooing is permitted for women if done to apply permanent facial makeup (i.e., eyebrows, eye liner); **the cosmetic tattooing must have a natural appearance and be conservative, moderate, within reasonable limits**, not excessive or extreme, and in good taste.

## **7.12. Body Piercing/Ornamentation**

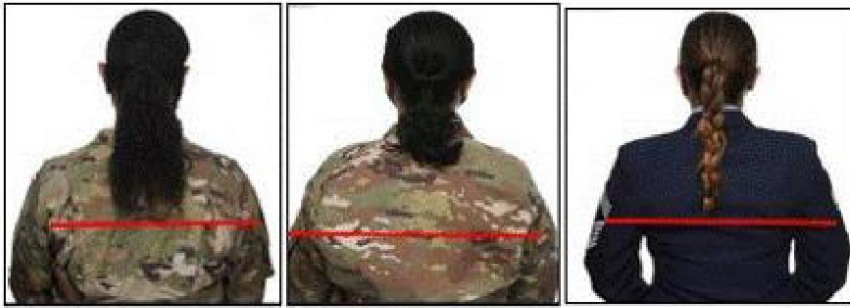
**7.12.1** In uniform with the exception of earrings for women, all members **are prohibited from** attaching, **affixing**, or displaying objects, articles, jewelry or ornamentation to or **through the ear, nose, tongue, eye brows, lips, or any exposed body part** (includes visible through the uniform).

**7.12.2 Plugs for guage holes in the ear lobes are not authorized (regardless of color, i.e., flesh colored).** There are no exceptions per AFI 36-2903.

**7.12.3** Dental ornamentation: Teeth, whether natural, capped, or veneered, will not be ornamented with designs, jewels, initials, etc. The use of yellow gold, white gold, or platinum caps (permanent or temporary) merely to add ornamentation to the teeth and not required by dental/medical necessity is prohibited.

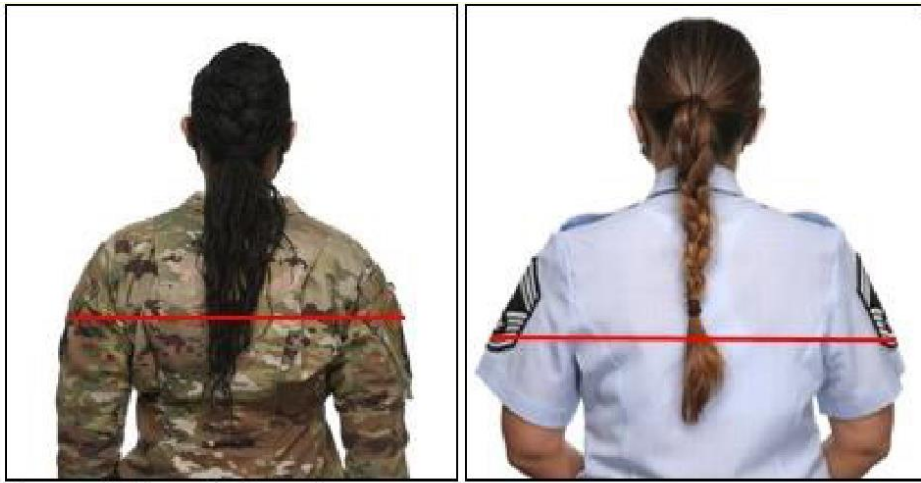

**7.13. Specific Male Cadet Grooming Guidelines. (See Figure 3.1)**

**7.14. (Change).** Hair-Male. Tapered appearance on both sides and the back of the head, both with and without headgear. A tapered appearance is one that when viewed from any angle outlines the member's hair so that it conforms to the shape of the head, curving inward to the natural termination point without eccentric directional flow, twists or spiking. A block-cut is permitted with tapered appearance. Hair will not exceed **2 ½ inches in bulk**, regardless of length and ¼ inch at natural termination point; allowing only closely cut or shaved hair on the back of the neck to touch the collar. Hair will not protrude under the front band of headgear. Cleanly shaven heads, military high-and-tight or flattop cuts are authorized. **Prohibited examples (not all-inclusive) are Mohawk, mullet, cornrows, dreadlocks or etched shapes and/or design.** Cadets may have one (cut, clipped or shaved) front to back, straight-line part, not slanted or curved, on either side of their head, above the temple. Part will not exceed 4 inches length or ¼ inch width. Men are not authorized hair extensions. See **Figure 3.1**

**7.14.1. (Change).** Mustaches. Male Cadets may have mustaches; however, they will be conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme) and will not extend downward beyond the lip line of the upper lip or extend sideways beyond a vertical line drawn upward from both corners of the mouth.

**7.14.2. (Change).** Beards are not authorized unless for medical reasons, when authorized by a medical official, or as authorized pursuant to a request for a religious accommodation. Beard wear authorized for religious reasons are governed by AFJROTCI 36-2001. **When authorized for medical reasons, members will keep all facial hair trimmed not to exceed ¼ inch in length.** Individuals granted a shaving profile may shave or trim their facial hair to present a neat, clean, professional image.

**7.15.** Sideburns. If worn, sideburns will be straight and even width (not flared), and will not extend below the bottom of the orifice of the ear opening. Sideburns will end in a clean-shaven horizontal line. See **Figure 3.1**

**7.16.** Mustaches. Male Cadets may have mustaches; however, they will be conservative (moderate, being within reasonable limits; not excessive or extreme) and will not extend downward beyond the lip line of the upper lip or extend sideways beyond a vertical line drawn upward from both corners of the mouth. See **Figure 3.1**

**7.17. Fingernails.** Male Cadets are not authorized to wear nail polish.

**7.18. Cosmetics.** Male Cadets are not authorized to wear cosmetics.

**7.19. Undergarments (Mandatory)**

**7.19.1.1.** Appropriate undergarments are required to be worn with all uniform combinations. Wear undershirt and underpants with all uniforms. Wear the white V-neck or athletic style tank top undershirt when wearing opened collar service uniforms only. Undershirt will be tucked into trousers. Undershirts will not have pockets.

## **7.20. Specific Cadet Uniform Wear Guidelines.**

### **7.20.1. Cadet Uniform Wear Guidance/Policy for School Hosted JROTC Events:**

**7.20.1.1.** School Sponsored Military Ball with Awards Ceremony: Units have two options they may choose to utilize.

Option 1: All cadets can wear the AFJROTC and SFJROTC Service Dress uniform.

Option 2: Each male and female cadet will be given the individual option to wear their AFJROTC and SFJROTC Service Dress uniform or to wear formal or semi-formal civilian attire. Any civilian attire worn must be in compliance with any/all school and district policies.

NOTE: Option 2 would allow block schedule school students to attend who are not currently in AFJROTC and SFJROTC and who may not have uniforms currently issued to them.

**7.20.1.2.** School Sponsored Dining-Ins/Dining-Outs with Awards Ceremony: All AFJROTC and SFJROTC cadets will wear their AFJROTC and SFJROTC Service Dress uniform.

**7.20.1.3.** For any other event, the SASI, in conjunction with the school Principal will decide on the appropriate attire for AFJROTC and SFJROTC cadets.

### **7.20.2. Cadet Uniform Wear Guidance for Fundraising:**

**7.20.2.1.** There are no concerns with businesses contributing money to an AFJROTC and SFJROTC booster club or other private clubs associated with AFJROTC and SFJROTC that are NOT established by the Air Force as part of the program.

**7.20.2.2.** If businesses make a monetary donation, AFJROTC and SFJROTC instructors and cadets may not advertise for the business in return – particularly in uniform. Doing so would present the “appearance” of an Air Force endorsement of the businesses making the donation. Such an appearance could be interpreted as a violation of the Joint Ethics Regulation.

**7.20.2.3.** AFJROTC and SFJROTC personnel/cadets should not solicit donations from local businesses at any time.

**7.20.2.4.** Incorporating Corporate Sponsorship/local business donations as a way to help boost funding for your AFJROTC and SFJROTC program are a great way to fund Leadership Development Requirements (LDR) for your cadets. The key is to contact your district and follow the above guidance to help keep sponsors and AFROTC and SFJROTC units within the scope of the Joint Ethics Regulation.

1. Unit patch (optional). If worn, will be placed on right pocket and centered.
2. Last Name and **AFJROTC or SFJROTC tapes**. Letters are dark blue on digital camo background (mandatory). Tapes are grounded and centered on pockets. Name tape only may be held with Velcro to enable reuse/reissue to a different cadet.
3. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) (mandatory). Will be worn on the left and right collars, centered 1-inch up from the bottom of the collar and parallel to the ground while remaining centered on the collar
4. **AFJROTC Patch (white, Lamp of Knowledge) or SFJROTC Patch (black, Lamp of Knowledge) - WHITE/BLACK patch only (mandatory)**. Will be worn on left pocket and centered.
5. **Berets, ascots, and shoulder cords will not be worn with ABUs.**
6. ABU sage green boots and Coyote Brown boots may be reissued to cadets. Spray boots with disinfectant spray before reissuing ABU boots. (Black boots will not be worn with ABUs)



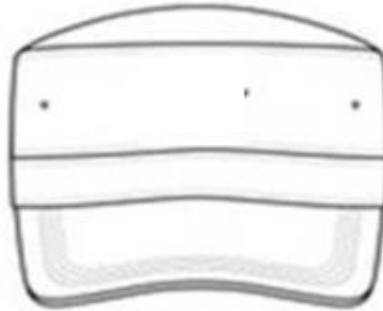

10. OCPs may be bloused; the trousers will not extend below the third eyelet from the top of the boot.

9. AFJROTC Patch (white, Lamp of Knowledge), mandatory. Center  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 inch below left shoulder seam.
10. Black Boots/corfams may be issued on an as required basis to the unit Color Guard or Drill Team. This is for restricted use and is not intended for use across unit's entire cadet corps. **Black boots/corfams may be reissued to cadets.** Spray boots/corfams with disinfectant spray before reissuing.

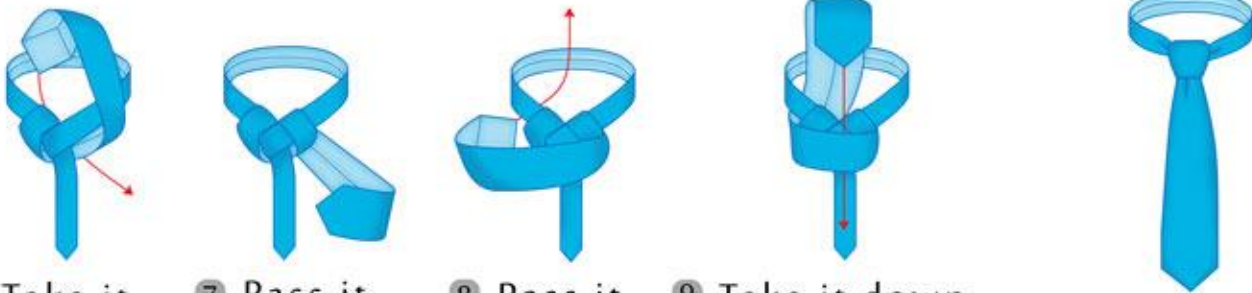

**FLIGHT OF THE EAGLE CHAPTER  
BY-LAWS TO THE GEORGIA STATE CONSTITUTION**

**KITTY HAWK HONOR SOCIETY**

Article I

**Section 1. NAME.** The Kitty Hawk Honor Society (KHHS) Unit at GA-62 will be known as the “**EAGLE CHAPTER**” FLIGHT. This chapter is organized at Northside High School, Warner Robins, Georgia, 17 Dec 1993.

**Section 2. OBJECTIVES.** The objectives of this organization are to promote high academic achievement and encourage community service involvement. At the beginning of each school year a special program will be adopted to carry out the objectives of this organization. The program includes supporting school activities, AFJROTC events, community service projects and the AFJROTC Tutorial Program. The activities for the year will be published in a calendar of events.

Article II

**Section 1. MEMBERSHIP.**

- a. INACTIVE.** Any member who fails to maintain academic standards (90% average in uniform grade, 90% in AFJROTC, and 80% GPA) or who without valid reasons fails to attend 75% of the announced meetings or has failed to participate in at least 4 hours of community service projects per semester, will be placed on inactive status. Any cadet placed on inactive status because of grades may return to active status by producing evidence of achieving the required academic standards by the next NHS Progress Report. If the academic standards are not met by the next NHS Progress Report, then the cadet will be placed on probationary status until the end of the semester. If the cadet doesn't achieve academic standards by the end of the semester, the cadet will be dismissed from the KHAS. If academic standards are met at a later time, the cadet can apply to rejoin KHAS during the next induction cycle (January or August).

- b. PROBATIONARY.** Any member who fails to uphold the standards of appropriate conduct expected of KHAS members, will be placed on probation until the beginning of the next school semester. Additionally, any member who is expelled, placed in ISS/OSS or found guilty of participating in activities harmful to the integrity of this organization will be placed on probation or removed from membership. NOTE: 1<sup>st</sup> offense of ISS constitutes probation.

Members will be

dismissed from KHAS for 2<sup>nd</sup> offense of ISS, or 1<sup>st</sup> integrity of this organization. The SASI will determine the severity of the unacceptable conduct that warrants dismissal from KHAS.

**Section 2. MEMBERSHIP PROCEDURES.** The SASI will review cadet grades and provide a list of names of those who are eligible for an invitation to join the KHAS to the membership committee. After evaluation, the membership committee will provide a list of names recommended for invitations to the SASI for final approval.

**Section 3. INDUCTION.** The Certificate of Membership will be awarded to cadets during the Induction Ceremony pledge program, at the appropriate time and place. The Induction Ceremony is normally held twice per school year (January and August).

**Section 4. DISCIPLINE.** Inactive cadets or cadets in probationary status will not be permitted to hold office or wear the Kitty Hawk insignia and cord. The cadet who is removed from office will not be returned to that office. Another cadet will be selected to fill the vacant position in a special election. Cadets who have been placed under the inactive or probationary status will be notified via letter from the Kitty Hawk commander.

**Section 5. GRADUATION.** Graduation Honor Cord: Honor cords will be presented to cadets who:

1. Are active members of GA-062 and KHAS at the time of graduation.
2. Hold a certificate of completion and were active members upon completion.

(A list of names will be provided by the SASI to school administrators in May. Refer to active membership for details.)

### Article III

Section 1. **ORGANIZATION.** Annual elections will normally be held during the Spring semester after new members are inducted. The SASI will nominate two cadets for each position for election by the membership.

Section 2. **INSIGNIA.** Active members in good standing are authorized to wear the KHAS badge and blue and white shoulder cord on their uniform. The KHAS badge and cord are provided to cadets at the Induction Ceremony. A list of names will be provided by the SASI to school administrators in May. Refer to active membership for details.

Section 3. **MOTTO.** The Motto of this chapter is: “Nothing less than excellence.”

**AFJROTC ASSEMBLY AND MILITARY BALL**

The purpose of this COI is to establish procedures for participation in the AFJROTC Assembly and Military Ball for AFJROTC at Northside High School GA-62

1. **GENERAL:** Northside High School normally joins with the other 4 high schools in Houston County to participate in a Joint Military Ball. This Ball is normally held on a Friday night near Valentine's Day at the Museum of Aviation.
2. **COURT REQUIREMENTS:** All participants in the Military Ball Court must have at least a **80** average in AFJROTC during the fall semester, be in good standing with AFJROTC (no discipline referrals) and the school (NO OSS or ISS during the current semester), currently maintaining at least a **75** average in AFJROTC, must have a positive merit balance (both the current semester and the previous semester) and must have participated in **at least three** AFJROTC community services or fund raisers during the current school year.
3. **VOTING:** The first vote will normally take place 3 weeks before the Assembly. The names of all nominated female cadets and 11th grade male cadets (who meet the requirements listed above) will be placed on the first ballot, unless they request their names be removed. Each cadet in class on the day the vote is taken will be allowed to vote for one cadet in each category. The top names in each category will become finalist. The names of the finalist will be posted on the official bulletin board. The final ballot will be during the week before the Assembly. The top two cadets in the freshmen, sophomore, and senior class will be the representatives from that class. In the junior class, the female cadet receiving the most votes will be the Queen and the cadet receiving the 2<sup>nd</sup> most votes will be on the court. The junior male with the most votes will be the King and the 2<sup>nd</sup> place junior male will be on the court. The King and Court will be announced before the assembly. The identity of the Queen will be kept secret until the Assembly.
4. **AFJROTC Assembly:** Court members may select any AFJROTC cadet **who meets the court requirements listed in paragraph 2** to escort them (however, sabre duty has priority over escort duty). The king will serve as the escort for the previous year's queen. The Saber Team will be arching sabers for the court at the assembly. The assembly and the script will be set up by the Officer in Charge (OIC).
5. **Military Ball:** Cadets who are in OSS or ISS at the time of the Military Ball will not be allowed to attend the Ball. Cadet guests may come from any Georgia High School **EXCEPT** alternative schools such as Crossroads (OSS/ISS restrictions apply to guests as well). Only the King and Queen will be introduced at the Military Ball. The AFJROTC Senior walk out will also take place during the ball.

**ANSWERING OFFICE TELEPHONE**

**1. GENERAL:** Air Force Junior ROTC at Northside High School currently has four telephone lines and one FAX line. The cadet line is located near the cadet office door. Cadets must request permission from an instructor before using the cadet line.

2. When an instructor is not available to answer the telephone, the senior ranking cadet will answer (hint: if you are the only cadet in the room, you **ARE** the senior ranking cadet). Cadets answering the telephone **must** use proper military etiquette. When answering the telephone, **always** include the following information:

Where they have reached	"Northside Air Force Junior ROTC"
Who they are talking to	"Cadet (state your last name)"
Polite offer to help	"May I help you?"

3. If the caller requests the SASI (or ASI), first attempt to find the instructor the caller requested. If the instructor requested is not available but another instructor is available, **do not** ask if the caller wants to speak to the other instructor. Instead, let the other instructor answer the phone to see if he/she can help. If the instructor is teaching the class, tell the caller and ask to take a message (only disturb the class for an emergency/urgent call).

4. If all instructors are unavailable, take a written message. All messages should include the following:

- The name of the cadet taking the message
- The date and time the message was taken
- The caller's name and telephone number
- A short message

5. Personal calls may not be made during school hours. All emergency calls made during the school day **must** be made at the school office, ( sickness, to be picked up, early release etc.) The telephone will be available after school and after field trips to call parents for rides.

6. Cell Phones: Cell phones will be Off/Silent and out of sight during class and all AFJROTC activities. Cadets must ask permission from the SASI/ASI prior to using their cell phones during an AFJROTC activity.



**AFJROTC AWARDS****Awareness Presentation Team Badge**

Awarded for participation on an Awareness Presentation Team. Go to WINGS | Logistics | Create Display Orders and order the Awareness Presentation Team Badge.

**Kitty Hawk Honor Society Badge**

Awarded to cadets who are members of Kitty Hawk Honor Society. The unit's Kitty Hawk chapter will spell out the requirements for entry into the society. Go to WINGS | Logistics | Create Display Orders and order the Kitty Air Society Badge.

**Distinguished AFJROTC Cadet Badge**

This annual award consists of a certificate and the distinguished AFJROTC Cadet Badge. The award recognizes one outstanding school year cadet (third-year cadet in a 4-year program) selected at the end of each school year. This allows the recipient to wear the award their final year in the AFJROTC Program. The recipient must be of a high moral, character, demonstrate positive personal attributes, display outstanding military potential, and maintain consistent academic and military excellence. The SASI, in coordination with the ASI and with the concurrence of the principal, selects the recipient of this award. The Holm Center Form 308, Certificate of Recognition, is located in WINGS | Published Files | Directory | Certificates folder. The certificate is used to present with the badge. The unit must purchase the purchase the badge from a vendor. The recipient will hold the following awards prior to selection:

- A) Leadership Ribbon
- B) Achievement Ribbon
- C) Superior Performance Ribbon
- D) Academic Ribbon
- E) Leadership Development Requirement
- F) Service Ribbon

**Model Rocketry Badge**

Awarded to cadets who have fulfilled Model Rocketry program requirements. Program requirements are listed in the Model Rocketry Handbook Available in WINGS | Publishes Files | Directory | JROTC | Instruction and Guides | Model Rocketry Handbook. OPR : HOLM Center | JROSL.

**Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Academic Cadet Badge:** Awarded to rising Junior and Senior cadets for academic excellence as signified by attaining a minimum 3.3 grade point average (GPA) with no grade below a 2.0 GPA on their transcript. The individuals must be recommended by SASI.

**Distinguished Unit With Merit (DUAM).**

Award consists of a ribbon awarded to cadets enrolled during the same academic in which 1) The unit receives a HQ AFJROTC evaluation with an overall rating of exceeds standards and 2) the unit is selected by HQ AFJROTC to receive the DUA. Both criteria must occur during the same academic year. The unit will receive a congratulatory letter and a certificate of recognition which will be posted in WINGS. Medal/ribbon must be purchased from a vendor using MilPer funds. For each additional ribbon earned, a silver star will be awarded.

**Distinguished Unit Award (DUA)**

Awarded to cadets enrolled during the academic year when the unit is selected by HQ AFJROTC to receive the DUA. The unit will receive a congratulatory letter and a certificate of recognition which will be posted in WINGS. For each additional ribbon earned, a silver star will be awarded.

**Outstanding Organization Award (OOA)**

Is a ribbon awarded to cadets enrolled during the academic year when a unit is selected by HQ AFJROTC to receive the OOA. The unit will receive a congratulatory letter and a certificate of recognition which will be posted in WINGS. OOA recipients do not receive streamer. The ribbon must be purchased from a vendor using MilPer funds. For each additional ribbon earned, a silver star will be awarded.

**Outstanding Flight Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded each academic term to members of the outstanding flight based on participation in community service projects, merits/demerits and JROTC GPA. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Top Performer Award.**

**The award consists of a ribbon and a certificate presented/awarded only by Headquarters, AFJROTC personnel.** This award is only presented during a visit by HQ AFJROTC personnel. The award is presented to a maximum of 2% of the current unit cadet corps population (unduplicated headcount). Once awarded, the ribbon may be worn for the duration of a cadet's tenure in AFJROTC.

**Consideration for the Top Performer Award.** All currently enrolled cadets may be considered, but specific consideration will be given to cadets not previously recognized for superior performance. The Regional Director may select (SASIs may nominate) a maximum of 2% of a unit's cadets based on a cadet's performance in the following key areas: Leadership and job performance: in primary duty and specifically in preparation for the unit's assessment. Leadership qualities: involvement and positions held in Leadership Development Requirement activities. Academic performance: nominee must be in good academic standing in all high school course work, significant self-improvement, community involvement and other accomplishments.

**Outstanding Cadet Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded annually to the outstanding first-year, second-year, third-year, and fourth-year cadet. The recipient from each class must be of high moral character, demonstrate positive personal attributes, display outstanding military potential, and attain academic and military excellence. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Leadership Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded annually for outstanding performance in a position of leadership as an AFJROTC cadet. Ensure recognition of cadets who have consistently displayed outstanding leadership ability above and beyond expected performance. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Achievement Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded for a significant achievement in AFJROTC or other school activities/ events. For non-AFJROTC team/organization, cadets must have been a team leader or placed in a competition. Individuals may not receive more than one ribbon during a 1-year period. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of a fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Superior Performance Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded to no more than the top 10% of the cadet corps annually for outstanding achievement or meritorious service rendered specifically on behalf of AFJROTC. Present the ribbon for a single or sustained performance of a superior nature. Ensure award is presented in recognition of achievements and services which are clearly outstanding and exceptional when compared to achievements of other cadets. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Academic Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded for academic excellence as signified by attaining an overall grade point average of at least "B" for one academic term, in addition to an "A" average in AFJROTC. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded, A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Cadet Leadership Course (CLC) Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded for completion of an approved leadership school program of at least 5 days duration. For each additional CLC completion an additional Bronze Star will be awarded. Silver Star will be awarded for outstanding performance of leadership ability at a CLC instead of the Bronze Star. Limit the Silver Star to 10% of the class.

**Special Teams Competition Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded to team members for placing 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup> in an Air Force or Joint Service Competition to include Drill Teams, Color Guard Teams, Marksmanship Rifle Teams, Saber Teams, Academic Bowl Teams, CyberPatriot, StellarXplorers, etc. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of a fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Joint/All-Service National Competition Award**

Is a medal/ribbon awarded to team members who competed at a Joint/All-Service national-level competition to include Drill Teams, Color Guard Teams, Marksmanship Rifle Teams, Saber Teams, Academic Bowl Teams, CyberPatriot, StellarXplorers, etc. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster. Medal/Ribbon may be obtained from the host of the competition or purchased from a vendor using MilPer funds. Medal may not (ribbon may) be worn during competitions and regular uniform wear days.

**Air Force Nationals Competition Award**

Is a medal/ribbon awarded to team members who competed at an Air Force only national-level competition to include Drill Teams, Color Guard Teams, Marksmanship Rifle Teams, Saber Teams, Academic Bowl Teams, CyberPatriot, StellarXplorers, etc. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster. Medal/Ribbon may be obtained from the host of the competition or purchased from a vendor using MilPer funds. Medal may not (ribbon may) be worn during competitions and regular uniform wear days.

**Orienteering Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded to team members for completing a unit-specific Orienteering program as part of unit curriculum. Cadets must attend and complete Orienteer Training and complete a yellow or higher course. For each additional ribbon earned a bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Leadership Development Requirement (LDR) Leadership Ribbon**

Is a ribbon awarded at the SASI's discretion for leadership in AFJROTC Leadership Development Requirement activities (such as but not limited to PT team commander, orienteering team commander, drill team commander, color guard team commander, dining-in chairperson, military ball chairperson, etc.). For each additional ribbon earned a bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Drill Team Ribbon**

Cadets must be on the drill team for an entire year/drill season to be eligible to qualify and must have competed in at least 3 drill performance events. i.e., competitions, special school events, community demonstrations (cumulative). For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Color Guard Ribbon**

Cadets must perform in at least 5 color guard performance events to receive this ribbon (cumulative). For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Saber Team Ribbon**

Cadets must perform at least 3 saber team performance events to receive this ribbon (cumulative). For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Marksmanship Team Ribbon**

Cadets must be on the marksmanship team for an entire year/season to be eligible to qualify and must have competed in at least 1 marksmanship competition event (cumulative). For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Good Conduct Ribbon**

Cadets must not have received a referral (this includes no ISS/OSS) and not missed more than 6 days of school (unexcused absences) for an entire school year to be eligible to qualify for this award. An oak leaf cluster will be added to this ribbon for each year of qualifying membership beginning with the second year.

**Service Ribbon.**

Awarded annually for distinctive performance in school, community, or AFJROTC service projects. Limit to members whose active participation in a service project contributed significantly to the goals of the organization. Cadets must participate in a minimum of 4 community service projects. NOTE: Participation in Drill Team, Color Guard, or Saber Team activities do not qualify for the Service Ribbon (See above criteria for these other ribbons) unless community service hours are also awarded. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Health and Wellness Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded annually for the participation in the unit health and wellness physical fitness – program. All cadets who participate in the unit’s wellness program and obtain a minimum grade of 70% in the PT may receive the Health and wellness Ribbon. Subsequent yearly award of the Health and Wellness Ribbon will be denoted by the addition of a Bronze Oak Leaf cluster to the ribbon for each additional year of award. Cadets who score in the Physical Fitness Test’s 75-84% will receive a Bronze Star device; 85-95% will receive a Silver Star device; and 96-100% will receive a Gold Star device. These cadets, if already wearing the ribbon with oak leaf cluster(s), will receive an wear an additional Health and Wellness Ribbon with the highest-level Star Devices) affixed. Duplicate awards of the Bronze, Silver, or Gold percentile will be denoted by the addition of another star on this ribbon. Should a cadet subsequently score in a higher percentile, only the star representing the higher percentile will be worn. In no case will a cadet mix different color stars, or star(s) and oak leaf cluster(s) on the same ribbon. (NOTE: The Physical Fitness Test percentiles are computed automatically under the PFT-Mass Assessment in WINGS.)

**Recruiting Ribbon.**

Is awarded for outstanding effort in support of unit recruiting activities. Cadets must have directly contributed to the recruitment of two new members to AFJROTC. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster

**Activities Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded for participation in Leadership Development Requirement (LDR) activities other than those that qualify for the Color Guard, Drill Team, and Special Teams Competition ribbons. These include but are not limited to orienteering teams, model rocketry clubs, academic bowl teams, and raider/sports teams. Cadets must participate in a minimum of 3 activities. An oak leaf cluster will be added to this ribbon for each year of membership beginning with the second year. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Attendance Ribbon**

Is awarded to cadets who have no more than three excused absences from AFJROTC classes during the academic term (no more than 6 unexcused absences for the entire school year). Cadets may only receive one award annually. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded.

**Dress and Appearance Ribbon.**

Is awarded to cadets who maintain a 90% or higher average on weekly uniform grades during an academic term (awarded each semester). For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Longevity Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded for the successful completion of each AFJROTC school year (semester with a 4X4 block schedule). For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.



**Bataan Death March Memorial Hike Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded to honor and remember the sacrifices of the victims and survivors of World War II's Bataan Death March, AFJROTC units may conduct an optional 14-mile course (trails, roads, course, tracks, etc.). Units may complete the full hike in a span of one to no more than 3-days. Cadet safety must be monitored at all times and advanced planning for any first aid/medical attention is paramount. Cadets who fully complete the 14-mile hike are authorized to wear the ribbon. Additionally, no fees can be charged to participate in the Memorial March. However, units are encouraged to collect donations which will be given to reputable organizations that benefit disabled veterans such as The Air Force Association's Wounded Airman Program, the Wounded Warrior Project, Special Operations Warrior Foundation, etc. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.

**Patriotic Flag Ribbon.**

Is a ribbon awarded for the participation in non-color guard events specifically designed to honor our nation's flag. Such events include flag raising ceremonies, flag retirement ceremonies, flag folding ceremonies, and historical flag demonstrations. In order to receive this award, cadets must have participated in a minimum of 5 flag events throughout their AFJROTC career. For each additional ribbon earned an additional bronze oak leaf cluster will be awarded. A single silver oak leaf cluster will be used for the award of the fifth bronze oak leaf cluster.
