Project Destined

Project Destined is a non-profit program which administers a real estate based education focused on empowering underserved communities through training in financial literacy, total health and leadership development. Project Destined scholars gain exposure to all aspects of the real estate investment life cycle while gaining exposure to real industry professionals, analyzing real opportunities and helping to invest real capital into real estate within their own communities. Several students were part of the summer cohort including Danielle A., Blue Tie '20, Pascalyn C., Green Tie '21, Ayanna S., Green Tie '21, and Meah W., Blue Tie'20.



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Caddie Academy

The WGA Caddie Academy provides summer caddie opportunities to under-resourced high school students who ultimately hope to pursue an Evans Scholarship. Each summer, students come from across the United States to caddie at clubs in the Chicago area while living together under the guidance of current Evans Scholars.

Through Caddie Academy, students have the chance to earn money, meet role models, and learn invaluable life lessons on the golf course. After successfully completing three summers, they become eligible to apply for the Evans Scholarship, a full tuition and housing college scholarship. In addition to caddying, participatns take part in special activities including attending a professional baseball game, educational field trips, career talks, and standardized test training. Samantha G., Yadira H., and Vivian M., all Gold Ties '21, participated in this program.





Internship at Payden & Rygel

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Two students spent their summer interning at the investment management firm Payden & Rygel. Kennedy B., Gold Tie'22 and Demilynn V., Green Tie'21 had the opportunity to learn about the various departments at the firm, and even spent time in the trading room at the Downtown LA office.

Urban Health Fellowship

Undergraduate and high school students are eligible for the Summer Urban Health Fellowship through Harbor UCLA Medical Center at Banning High School. The program gives students the opportunity to work in teams while learning about health care disparities and issues facing underserved and marginalized communities. Chia O., Gold Tie'22 shared this of her six-week experience: "Attending this program was the best decision I could have possibly made. All who attend share one common interest, medicine. We all want to contribute to society and we are all eager to learn about the deeper roots from which our help is needed. The theme for the program this year was immigration, so a lot of the activities and curriculum were based on this topic." Chia added she learned so much and was so impressed by all who are devoted to the program.

Ceconomics for Leaders For several years, thanks to the generosity of Elyse Kaiser, daughter of Joanne Marie (Blue Tie,'48) and Marcel George, students have attended the Economics for Leaders Summer Program. This summer, three Green Ties,'21, and one Blue Tie, '20 spent time on college campuses (Yale, Brown, Emory, & Washington University) with like-minded high school students learning how to integrate economics into the process of decision making. All four enjoyed this learning experience, as well as living on college campuses with other high school students. CREATE & Sports Medicine Program Gold Tie '22, Crystal A. had a busy summer attending two summer camp programs. CREATE is part of the ACE Program, which is currently in place at SMA. This summer experience allowed Crystal an opportunity to learn more about Architecture, Construction and Engineering with hands on, project based learning. The Sports Medicine Program, a long time favorite for our students, provided Crystal training for the care and first aid treatment of sports related injuries and CPR. These types of summer learning experiences compliment the students' school year curriculum.

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Supporting SMA Ways to Give

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Matching Gifts

Many companies may double or even triple gifts made to non-profit organizations. If your employer has a matching gifts program, you can maximize the value of your contribution by following the company's process for identifying St. Mary's Academy as your recipient.





Monetary Donations

Gifts or pledges of cash or checks may be made directly to the school at any time. Gifts can be made online as one-time or recurring gifts, or mailed directly to the school.

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Stocks/Securities or Real Property

By transferring appreciated stock to St. Mary's Academy prior to selling it, the capital gains on the amount of appreciation is avoided and the donor receives a tax deduction for the full market value.



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Planned Giving

A bequest is usually the simplest kind of planned gift. It is a provision in a donor's will which names a charity (in this case, St. Mary's Academy of Los Angeles) as a beneficiary of a portion of the donor's estate. The estate then receives a charitable deduction for the total amount designated to the school. As circumstances change, the bequest can be altered by the donor.



Endowment

An endowment is a permanent fund that is restricted and of which the principal is preserved. Contributions to St. Mary's Endowment Fund are invested and a determined percent of the portfolio is used for purposes restricted by the endowment fund. Thus, the endowment becomes a gift that lives forever and helps the school maintain affordability by providing revenue to subsidize the operating budget.

REST IN PEACE DEAR CSJS

Sr. Adrienne Clare Pereira CSJ, former St. Mary's Academy Principal (1976-1978, and fall of 2013), Development Department staff member, Board member, mentor, and most recently volunteer for the students' Christian Service Program, passed peacefully this summer after battling a lengthy illness. A native of Honolulu, Hawaii, at the age of 10, she and her family were evacuated to Northern California, due to the 1941 bombing of Pearl Harbor. Sister Adrienne attended and gradutaed from San Francisco's Star of the Sea Academy in 1949 and was a Sister of St. Joseph of Carondelet since March, 1950. A Sister of many talents, she shared them in a variety of ministries, particularly here at SMA. Though low-key in style, her presense was impactful and Sr. Adrienne was always willing to try a new role. She was strong and confident, but never boastful or bragging. Her manner of giving was always gracious and full. She is dearly missed by the SMA faculty, staff, and especially the students. A void was felt as our school year began. Sr. Adrienne Clare is remembered in our good thoughts and prayers and we pray for the repose of her soul.



Sr. Patricia (Pat) McCarthy CSJ Green Tie '53, passed away after an acute illness late last year. Educated by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelt, she entered the CSJ community in 1953 and made her final profession in 1961. During her many years in ministry, Sr. Pat freely shared her artistic gifts and many talents with students of all ages; elementary grades through the retired CSJs. A teacher and counselor at her Alma Mater from 1986 to 2005, Sr. Pat is fondly remembered by many SMA Belles. She taught several subjects, but she excelled in art and often said about art, and life in general, "don't be afraid to color outside of the lines." Sr. Pat's last "teaching assignment" at SMA was leading the first "Belles & Brushes" alumnae activity, held in the summer of 2017. She led the alums in a lively canvas painting project, using all four tie colors for the hot air ballons featured. We greatly miss Sr. Pat's fun and creative spirit, and pray for her soul's eternal peace.

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Sr. Thomas Bernard MacConnell CSJ passed in June at the age of 93. Principal of St. Mary's Acadmey from 1962-1965, Sister was the last "full school year" principal of the Slauson Crenshaw campus. Sr. Thomas was born and educated in the Bay Area. It was during her college years she was called to religious life. Beginning as a Postulant at St. Mary's Academy in 1947, she made her final vows in 1953. Due to Sister's giftedness and willingness to serve wherever her talents were needed, her ministry life was full and varied. Teaching elementary through college aged students, serving as General Councilor, working in the Congregational Archives, and being named as local Superior to the Sisters who worked at Daniel Freeman Memorial Hospital were a few of her assignments. However, her most memorable ministry assignment was that of setting up and opening the Spirituality Center for the LA Archdiocese. Sr. Thomas Bernard served faithfully in many ways during her ministry and now we pray for her erternal reward.





Sr. Ernestine Muñana CSJ, St. Mary's Academy alumna, class of 1936, and member of one of only two Yellow Tie classes, recently passed away at the age of 103. Sister was one of the oldest members of the Los Angeles Province. At the age of 5, she and her family left Mexico and moved to Oxnard, CA. Prior to entering the Community, Sister attended Woodbury Business College and then worked as a secretary for several years. Once in the Community, her primary ministry was teaching business courses, and Spanish. Sr. Ernestine had a love of travelling and was fortunate to accompany high school and college students on trips to Europe. In recent years when asked how she felt about her life, she responded she had "great gratitutde for a life of service that has prepared countless students for the world and life as it comes." Her friends and the dear CSJs at Carondelet Center will miss her beautiful spirit and the conversations she shared while walking the halls of the Center. We pray for her well deserved and eternal peace. May her soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, particularly our dear Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet and St. Mary's Academy alumnae, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.
