## Literacy Volunteers Of Cumberland and Salem Awarded For Outstanding Achievement



Led by Laura Pistoia, Gateway's Director of Literacy Services, Literacy Volunteers of Salem and Cumberland Counties was presented with the Alice M. Leppert Award for Outstanding Affiliate Achievement from Literacy New Jersey. The literacy program was honored for its innovative response to not only the Covid-19 pandemic, but also the inherent language barrier that exists within the communities served. Literacy Volunteers of Salem and Cumberland faced many challenges in recent years, but when the only Spanish-speaking member of the program transitioned out of her full-time position, things became more complicated. Without another bilingual employee to fill the position, Pistoia and the rest of the team needed to develop a solution quickly.

While a Spanish-speaking high school student volunteered to assist with making and receiving calls for the program, his school schedule posed some limitations; and many of the Spanish-speaking tutors were not available to participate in person due to Covid-19 concerns or other health-related conditions. One of the online teachers, however, brought a simple yet



effective tool to the team's attention. The Remind app, which allows administrators to send text messages from a phone or computer directly to a recipient's cellphone, became a vital part in bridging the gap between English-speaking staff and Spanish-speaking adult learners. Translating and sending messages in Spanish was far easier than attempting to use Google

Translate over the phone. While more complex intake cases are still referred to the student volunteer, many adult learners have found the remind app to be extremely helpful. <u>About our literacy program</u>: Realizing that illiteracy is a barrier to self-sufficiency, Gateway's Literacy Volunteers of Salem/Cumberland offers one-on-one tutoring for adults who need help with reading, writing, and speaking English. The Literacy Services Department also offers financial literacy classes. Tutoring is free and confidential. Tutoring sessions occur at a public place such as the local library. Day or evening tutoring is available.

#### EXELON-FUNDED \$36 MILLION RACIAL EQUITY CAPITAL FUND, ADMINISTERED BY ROCKCREEK, ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FROM MINORITY-OWNED BUSINESSES IN SERVICE AREAS

RockCreek-managed fund, in partnership with minority banks and community-based lending institutions, will provide needed capital to help minority-owned businesses grow, create jobs, and expand in underserved and under-resourced communities served by Exelon.

**Chicago, III. (May 4, 2022)** – Exelon announced today that <u>RockCreek</u>, one of the world's largest diverse-owned global investment firms, has opened applications for the \$36 million Exelon-funded Racial Equity Capital Fund to support minority-owned businesses in Exelon's service areas in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, Illinois, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Exelon, which serves more than 10 million customers through its six electric and gas utilities, announced last fall that it had partnered with the Exelon Foundation to create the Racial Equity Capital Fund. The fund will help minority businesses obtain capital to fuel growth and spur job opportunities in communities that have historically been underserved, under-resourced, and overlooked by investors and traditional funding sources. The fund will provide loans and equity investments for numerous minority businesses throughout Exelon's service areas over the next three years, with estimated loan amounts between \$100,000 and \$300,000, and equity investments of nearly \$1 million.

"With this fund, we are empowering small, minority-owned businesses to grow their capacity, increase revenue and hire more employees," said **Calvin Butler**, chief operating officer and senior executive vice president of Exelon. "We have identified financial partners who understand the unique challenges these businesses face, but who also share our vision and are eager to reinvigorate the communities we both serve."

RockCreek has forged partnerships with minority-owned lending institutions and communitybased banks to increase the investment capacity of the Racial Equity Capital Fund. The fund will invest in minority-owned businesses who have historically lacked access to capital to sustain operations, grow revenues, create jobs, and increase wellbeing throughout underserved and under-resourced communities.

"Capital is the fuel that allows businesses to grow, create jobs, and strengthen communities, and for too long, minority-owned businesses – and entire communities – have been neglected by financial markets," said **Afsaneh Beschloss**, Founder and CEO of RockCreek. "The Racial

Equity Capital Fund will bring this critical fuel directly to minority-owned businesses and will continue serving their communities in the years ahead."

Initial partners in this effort include Providence Bank & Trust; United Bank of Philadelphia; and City First Bank, National Association of Washington, DC. RockCreek continues to seek out and engage with other potential partners throughout Exelon's service areas.

The partnerships are the next step in the launch of the \$36 million initiative, which is funded by Exelon and managed by RockCreek. RockCreek will select businesses for financing and manage the fund to serve as a continuing resource to help grow businesses, create jobs, and strengthen the communities Exelon serves.

#### The Next Chapter of Partnership with Minority Businesses

Exelon has launched a Racial Equity Capital Fund, in partnership with the Exelon Foundation, that will expand access to capital for minority businesses so they can create more jobs, grow their companies and reinvest in their neighborhoods and communities. The fund builds on Exelon's longstanding history of supporting the underserved and under-resourced communities and further delivers on our commitment to drive economic equity and opportunity for our customers and communities.

## The Racial Equity Capital Fund will strengthen communities and help minority businesses grow by:

- Providing affordable capital to businesses in communities that have traditionally been challenged in accessing and securing funding (e.g., minority-owned businesses and businesses in underserved and under-resourced communities, etc.).
- Increasing minority business capacity and subsequent employment opportunities for diverse local communities.
- Utilizing the expertise of the fund manager, <u>RockCreek</u>, a diverseowned firm with > 75% diverse ownership and management team diversity — to make investment decisions.
- With RockCreek, growing the capability of the capital fund through partnerships with minority community banks, other key local financial organizations and community organizations to source originations and provide additional investment and lending opportunities outside of the company-provided funding.

#### **Racial Equity Capital Fund Details**

- The fund will provide \$36 million in equity investments to support minority-owned businesses in the communities it serves.
- The <u>initiative</u> is part of Exelon's ongoing, extensive efforts to promote equity and economic opportunity in the diverse communities served by our six utilities, which include Atlantic City Electric, BGE, ComEd, Delmarva Power, PECO and Pepco.

- Spent \$2.9 billion with diversity-certified suppliers in 2021, growing our total spend with diversity suppliers more than 56 percent from 2016–2021.
- Spent more than \$14 million in 2021 on workforce development, supporting more than 65 workforce development programs across its six utilities, including Infrastructure Academies that create pathways into utility careers through training programs offered in partnership with other entities. Over 300 program participants were hired internally and externally to date.
- Established a Racial Equity Task Force designed to eliminate barriers and create opportunities for Exelon employees, vendors, customers and communities.
