Quarter Four Field Trips Designed to Provide Authentic Experiences

GHS Art and Ceramics Students Visit HopeCAT

Greenville High School art and ceramics students recently stepped outside the traditional classroom to explore new artistic horizons during an exciting field trip to HopeCAT in Sharon. Accompanied by art teacher Megan Gruver, 36 talented students participated in specialized, hands-on workshops that allowed them to experience unique materials and professional procedures not available in our school studios.

The day was packed with creative exploration, offering each student the opportunity to dive into three distinct artistic processes. First, students glazed a premade ceramic piece and got to witness a live raku firing. This was a particularly thrilling highlight for our young artists, as the dramatic, fast-firing raku process offers a stark contrast to the standard electric kilns used back at GHS.

In addition to working with clay, the students explored the world of studio printmaking by creating original art pieces using various specialized printmaking materials. To round out the day's activities, the group took on a collaborative textile project. Each student screen printed a custom design, originally created by one of our very own Art Club students, directly onto a t-shirt, which they then personalized and decorated using vibrant paint markers.

This immersive trip provided our students with invaluable exposure to advanced artistic techniques and real-world studio environments. multiple complex anatomical and biological concepts come to life in a real-world, high-stakes environment.

Jr. High Science Club Explores Conservation



The Greenville Junior High Science Club recently took their passion for the environment out into the field for an exciting hands-on conservation project. Led by science teacher Mark Russell,

a dedicated group of 7th and 8th-grade students partnered with the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR).



Working alongside state environmental experts, the students helped build and deploy specialized fish habitat structures, commonly known as fish cribs, at nearby Pymatuning Lake. These wooden structures provide

crucial shelter and breeding grounds for local fish species, directly contributing to the health and sustainability of the lake's aquatic ecosystem.

The project gave our junior high students a wonderful opportunity to apply their classroom knowledge to real-world ecological conservation while giving back to our local environment. Hosted at Thiel College in partnership with Pennsylvania State Senator Michele Brooks' office, the event provided a unique, immersive look into the inner workings of the legislative process.

Accompanied by government teacher Matt Crawford, our students had the invaluable opportunity to collaborate directly with Senator Brooks, as well as several other current and retired government officials. This direct mentorship allowed the students to gain real-world insights into what it takes to draft policies, build consensus, and lead in public service.

Stationed at a school near the border of Uganda and Kenya, the volunteer's students are currently working hard to master written and spoken English. Recognizing a perfect learning opportunity, both educators realized that exchanging handwritten letters with American peers would be a fantastic, real-world way for the African students to practice their skills while fostering a deep cultural exchange.

The letter exchange quickly turned into an eye-opening geography lesson for our 7th graders. Through the correspondence, the students discovered fascinating differences, and surprising similarities, in their daily lives. While the Greenville students described the beauty of experiencing four distinct seasons, the Ugandan and Kenyan students explained that their climate consists of just two: a wet season and a dry season. The African students also shared their passion for "netball," a popular sport in the region that prompted the GHS students to watch videos online to learn the rules of the game.

The cultural exchange also sparked great curiosity. After seeing a photograph of their

new pen pals, the Greenville students wondered why all the students in the classroom had closely cropped hair. Their Peace Corps contact responded by sending a video of the Ugandan students themselves, who proudly explained that keeping their hair short is a practical choice, it is much more affordable to take care of and keeps them looking neat for school. By turning a standard classroom into a global conversation, Ms. Wilson gave our 7th graders a priceless window into another culture.

The girls' throwing program also flexed its muscles, with Aubrey Babcock taking 7th place and Ella Tokar finishing right behind her in 8th place in the shot put.
