

### Planning for a Changeable Future

On September 13, a representative constituent group of NMPS administrators, teachers, Board of Education members, and community members met to begin a year long process of Strategic Coherence Planning. As the



process unfolds, the group will be refining New Milford's Vision of the Graduate, defining the characteristics of an impactful learning environment, reflecting on current and past district performances, and planning for the improvement of systems that need to be aligned to ensure each student is prepared for his/her future.



In collaboration with EdAdvance consultant Jonathan Costa, the group will develop focused strategies that will be implemented to address the challenges of educating New Milford students for a changeable future. The end result will be a planning document that explicitly lays out the steps for forward progress. Mr. Costa says, "Ultimately, we want to focus on the highest leverage learning

goals, instructional practices, and improvement strategies that have demonstrated over time to have the largest influence on student learning and preparation for their lives, learning and work in a digital age."

As part of this ongoing improvement planning, the Strategic Coherence Planning group is seeking input from the broader New Milford educational community to inform decisions on their work. As such, community members are invited to share their thoughts regarding the specific skills, dispositions, and experiences students will need as they navigate the future using the *Thoughtexchange* platform at this link: https://tejoin.com/scroll/760180713

The feedback will be an important part of the overall Strategic Coherence Planning project and provide valuable insights leading to the final outcome.



## **Supporting Students and Families: School-Based Health Centers**


"It takes a village to raise a child" is an African proverb illustrating that as a community, we must come together to

support our children. This proverb couldn't ring more true today. Before the pandemic, the need for behavioral and health services for New Milford's students was evident. And now, as we begin to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been an accelerating trend in mental health challenges among school-aged children.

New Milford Public Schools is excited to collaborate with Connecticut Institute For Communities, Inc., a non-profit organization dedicated to fostering opportunities to serve our communities through the school-based health center (SBHC) model. Assistant Superintendent Holly Hollander says, "This partnership will allow us to meet the diverse needs of students through on-site behavioral and primary services. Our goal is to provide services that families may not otherwise have access to. The Centers will be located within the walls of our school buildings and will meet critical needs for students who the COVID-19 health crisis has impacted."

Working as a collaborative team, school educators and administrators will partner with the SBHC personnel to design the systems and protocols needed to maximize this opportunity. The Centers will not replace the services offered currently by district staff, but will become a welcome addition to families who have difficulty getting to outside providers. Scheduling and attending appointments during the day can be difficult for some parents. When the Centers are fully up and running, appointments may occur at school during the child's day with parents' consent.

Using the allocations awarded to the district from the American Rescue Plan for Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) funds, the district is able to provide the systems and space needed to support this important and needed initiative. More information will be shared with parents in the upcoming month, communicating details, as we plan the launch of the first two sites in our schools.

# Notes from the School Nurses


It is our goal is to keep our students and staff as safe and healthy as possible during this continued pandemic. Our best protection from getting sick and spreading the COVID-19 virus continues to be masking, social distancing, frequent handwashing and getting vaccinated if you are eligible for the vaccine. Please continue to screen your children daily for illness prior to sending them to school.

Keep your child home if they are not feeling well and/or have been in close contact with a person who has COVID-19. Consult your child's health care provider if they are having COVID-19 symptoms.

In general, sometimes it can be hard to decide whether to keep a child home from school. If children are vomiting or have a fever, diarrhea, rash or other skin eruption, sore throat with fever/rash, earache, conjunctivitis, or other acute illness (e.g., severe cold symptoms, persistent cough, etc.) it would be best to keep them home. Children should be symptom-free for 24 hours or cleared by their doctor before returning to school.

Thank you for your help and support in reinforcing healthy behaviors in our students.


