The 2020-21 school year is off and running! We are so thankful to have students on campus for learning, and we have even been able to move our fall sports seasons forward. While this pandemic season has been laborious, there are lessons to glean too.

As a school, we are going deep into 1 Peter this year. Our chapel time for the entire first semester is dedicated to going through the entire book, verse by verse, to see what the Lord is teaching through Peter's trials. In addition to this rich and cohesive teaching, we have created space for students to step up into greater discipleship and spiritual leadership through a new schedule. We now have a time for them to meet in their Encouragement Groups twice per week. Each E-Group is comprised of five or six students from grades 7-12, and they meet for prayer, encouragement, and discussion. One of the first tasks of the E-Group student leaders is to help their fellow students unpack this year's theme verse, 1 Peter 4:8, which says, "Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins." We have challenged our students to memorize this passage and place this truth in their hearts.





Schools relies on

the support of generous donors in order to operate. This year is no exception. However, after 25 years in this office, I can tell you that God does whatever He chooses. Ask me again in June, and I will tell you what actually happened. Renovation Work Begins Inside the Administration Building!

Throughout the summer, progress on restoring the Administration Building has been in full swing!

A symbol of education since 1885, the Administration Building evokes fond

memories from former Nebraska Christian students hailing from all over Nebraska, the U.S., and the world. This building is truly a cherished piece of Nebraska history and architectural design from that era. Since the outset of the project, generous gifts have allowed us to accomplish substantive and crucial work.



The Administration Building stands at the center of our beautiful campus looking better than ever thanks to the following renovations and improvements made this summer: tuck-pointing, cleaning and repairing the exterior brick, installing new gutters, and painting white exterior surfaces. Just in the last two weeks, louvers were added to the bell tower, and a Nebraska Christian sign went up on the building!

The \$475,000 previously raised for the Ad Building Preservation Project provided what we needed to seal and fortify

the exterior and do some minor work in the building. We have now fully shifted our efforts to the interior of the building, and we are undertaking extensive interior renovations and restoration. Our new goal is to raise an additional \$1 million for the Ad Building Preservation Project, which will allow us to make our space fully functional. And the work has already begun! This summer, two rooms on the main floor were gutted and renovated to create new office space. They are being finished up now and will soon be in use!

With these additions completed, we are now ready to take the next step in phase 2A. This phase centers on creating a new kitchen and dining hall. Within the gym itself, new lighting, air conditioning, paint,



The west hallway has received a new floor, and both the west and east hallways have acquired fresh paint, lighting, and ceiling tiles.


These upgrades and enhancements truly create a clean, modern, usable environment that will benefit and bless our students, faculty, and guests. I




