## **High School Terminology**

- Carnegie Unit (Credit) 1 Unit is 150 hours of seat time instruction.
- Academic Course a course in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, or Modern Language. Also used to determine HOPE eligibility, Honor Roll, and Class Rank.
- **Required Course** an academic or elective course that is mandatory for graduation.
- Elective a *non academic course* that fulfills Carnegie units for graduation.

## **Promotion and Retention**

In order to be promoted to the next grade level, students must earn credit as indicated below: 5 credits - 10th Grade Sophomore 11 credits - 11th Grade Junior 17 credits - 12th Grade Senior 23 credits - Graduation

## Retention

If students do not earn the number of credits needed to move to the next grade level, they will be RETAINED in their current grade.

## **Eligibility for Athletics**

Students entering the 9th grade are grandfathered in under GHSA for eligibility; however, students must pass 3 out of 4 courses during <u>each</u> Semester to remain eligible .

## Grades

- Grades ROLL during a semester.
- Progress Reports go home every 4 1/2 weeks.
- Only Semester Grades are permanent.
- Once grades are complete, the grades are stored on the students transcript; this takes place at the end of each semester.

## **Honors Program**

- All students receive the *same* diploma type; General.
- We offer *Honors* English, Math, Science, and Social Studies.
- Rigorous program of study designed for the most academically capable students, taught at a faster pace, greater demands, more homework, and out of class reading assignments.
- 5 points are added to the final grade each semester of each class. GSFC removes the five points in factoring eligibility for the HOPE Scholarship.

## **Dual Enrollment**

- College classes count for BOTH high school and college credit.
- NO cost to the student that's 30 FREE Hours of College Credit.
- 11th and 12th Grade students who are ready for college-level work and the responsibility.
- We offer several DE classes on VHS campus.

## **HOPE Scholarship**

- The Georgia Student Finance Commission administers the HOPE program.
- Students cumulative grade point average in academic core classes determines HOPE eligibility. No classes taken in middle school for high school credit count towards HOPE GPA.
- This fall your student's grades will start counting toward determining HOPE eligibility for college.
- A 3.0 average in academic core classes and 4 courses of RIGOR determine HOPE eligibility
- Zell Miller- 3.7 and 1200 SAT/26 ACT 100% Tuition

## Attendance

- Attendance is taken every block.
- Parent & Medical Notes are turned in to Mrs. Howard at the front office.

-Parent Notes MUST be turned in <u>within 5 days</u> of the absence or the absence will be unexcused. (maximum of 5 parent notes will be excused)

-Unexcused absences *may* result in students not being able to make up their work.

- Attendance impacts final exam exemptions, the ability to attend Prom, and eligibility to receive Honor Cards.
- If a student is <u>late</u> to school, they <u>must sign</u> in at the front office.
- Students must be present for 60 minutes in a block to be considered present.
- Students are NOT permitted to sign out for lunch.

#### **Dress Code**



- All tops must be solid including no writing and no pictures
- Clothing brand logos must be smaller than 2 inches
- All tops must be Vidalia City dress code colors: maroon, gold, black, white, or gray
- Tops and bottoms must be contrasting colors
- Undershirts must be maroon, gold, black, white or gray with no wording or pictures
- Shirts must be collared, polo-style, button up, or crew neck shirt with short or long sleeves
- Crew Neck shirts must be around the base of the neck.

#### **Dress Code**



- The base shirt (shirt that touches the skin first) MUST be around the base of the neck
- Shirts that button up the front must have attached collar (see above)
- Only the top two buttons can be unbuttoned and must be within three inches from the top of the placket.
- Shirt length must reach past the waistband, but within the student's arm length.
- No hoodies are allowed
- Vidalia City Schools' spirit wear is allowed as long as it is dress code color, dress code shirt style (collared, polo, button up, or crewneck), and is not homemade. Spirit wear hoodies are not allowed.

#### **Dress Code**



- All bottoms (pants, shorts, skirts, capris) must be appropriate size and solid dress code color: Denim, Black, Gray, or Khaki
- All shorts, pants, and skirts must be denim (includes black or white) or khaki/chino style button up. No athletic pants or shorts are allowed, with the exception of JD Dickerson Primary students. Due to developmental needs of these students, athletic pants and shorts will be allowed.
- All bottoms must be without frays or holes
- All bottoms must be without words or pictures
- All bottoms must, at minimum, touch the top of the knee when standing and pants at appropriate waistline
- Tights must be solid (no fishnet) black, gray, or khaki and can only be worn under approved bottoms.
