Description of Target Group

French 4 A is the first semester of the fourth year in French designed as an elective for students at all grade levels who have completed French 3B or demonstrated proficiency at that level.

Purpose

French 4A is designed to give the student continued and advanced training in foreign language. It is designed to permit students to appreciate and respect other people and cultures; gain communication skills in French; and become familiar with the culture of the French-speaking people. Credit earned will meet the foreign language requirement for college entrance.
