

Mrs. Jane Adams was born in Macon, Georgia. She graduated from A.L. Miller Senior High School. She received a Bachelor of Science in Education in 1980 from Fort Valley State University. She later received a Master in Mathematics Education from Georgia Southwestern State University.

She began her teaching career at Northside High School in 1980 where she taught math. She also served as a Georgia In-Tech Trainer for the District from 2004–2005. Mrs. Adams retired from the Houston County School District in 2008 after teaching for 28 years. During her tenure at Northside, she

took on many leadership roles. She served on the Project Success Team, identifying student strengths and weaknesses to best meet educational needs of at-risk students. She also served as an advisor to numerous clubs and managed a peer tutoring program. Mrs. Adams also received the Walmart Teacher of the Year and Radio Shack Tandy Scholarship for Academic Excellence.

Mrs. Adams and her husband, Grady, have been married for 52 years and live in Byron. Mr. and Mrs. Adams have one son and two grandchildren.

She began her teaching career at Danville Elementary in Twiggs County. In 1983, she transferred to Houston County

to become a first grade and compensatory education teacher at Miller Elementary. She also taught at Kings Chapel Elementary, Matt Arthur Elementary, and Shirley Hills Elementary. Mrs. Belflower retired from the Houston County School District in June 2014 after 31 years in the classroom. Teacher Hall of Fame Criteria

The purpose of the Houston County Teacher Hall of Fame is to honor extraordinary classroom teachers who taught in Houston County, Georgia and made a significant difference in the lives of their students. This recognition program began in 2007 to honor the District's most outstanding teachers.

Nominees must have maintained exemplary standards of behavior and ethics, exhibited leadership, been enthusiastic about teaching and learning, demonstrated competency in their subject matter, worked well with colleagues and administrators, and consistently sought to encourage, inspire, and motivate students toward greater accomplishment. While many teachers serve a long and distinguished career, accomplishments must be worthy of Districtwide recognition. Longevity without meaningful impact does not constitute appropriate credentials for Houston County Teacher Hall of Fame consideration.

Nomination requirements:

- At least 20 years of classroom experience in the Houston County School District
- Must be retired from the field of education
- Must have held a valid teaching certificate in Georgia
- Must have earned a bachelor's degree or higher
- After the nomination has been verified for the eligibility requirements above, the nominee will be contacted by the District to submit an application that must include:
 - Education, teaching experience, and special recognition
 - Nominee's personal, professional statements
 - Letters of support or recommendation

Dr. Mark Scott, Superintendent of Schools, appoints the Selection Committee, which reviews all nominations. Nominees not chosen the first year may be considered for up to three years. The application is modeled after the National Teachers Hall of Fame located in Emporia, Kansas, to make it easier to also nominate a teacher at the national level.
