

# 52071.

- (a) If the governing board of a school district requests technical assistance, the county superintendent of schools shall provide technical assistance consistent with paragraphs (1) or (2) of subdivision (c). If a school district has not been identified for technical assistance pursuant to subdivision (c) or for state intervention pursuant to subdivisions (b) and (c) of Section 52072, and if the service requested creates an unreasonable or untenable cost burden for the county superintendent of schools, the county superintendent of schools may assess the school district a fee not to exceed the cost of the service.
- (b) If a county superintendent of schools does not approve a local control and accountability plan or annual update to the local control and accountability plan approved by a governing board of a school district, the county superintendent of schools shall provide technical assistance focused on revising the local control and accountability plan or annual update so that it can be approved.
- (c) For any school district for which one or more pupil subgroups identified pursuant to Section 52052 meets the criteria established pursuant to subdivision (g) of Section 52064.5, the county superintendent of schools shall provide technical assistance focused on building the school district's capacity to develop and implement actions and services responsive to pupil and community needs, including, but not limited to, any of the following:

- (1) Assisting the school district to identify its strengths and weaknesses in regard to the state priorities described in subdivision (d) of Section 52060. This shall include working collaboratively with the school district to review performance data on the state and local indicators included in the California School Dashboard authorized by subdivision (f) of Section 52064.5 and other relevant local data, and to identify effective, evidence-based programs or practices that address any areas of weakness.
- (2) Working collaboratively with the school district to secure assistance from an academic, programmatic, or fiscal expert or team of experts to identify and implement effective programs and practices that are designed to improve performance in any areas of weakness identified by the school district. The county superintendent of schools, in consultation with the school district, may solicit another service provider, which may include, but is not limited to, a school district, county office of education, or charter school, to act as a partner to the school district in need of technical assistance.
- (3) Obtaining from the school district timely documentation demonstrating that it has completed the activities described in paragraphs (1) and (2), or substantially similar activities, or has selected another service provider pursuant to subdivision (f) to work with the school district to complete the activities described in paragraphs (1) and (2), or substantially similar activities, and ongoing communication with the school district to assess the school district's progress in improving pupil outcomes.
- (4) Requesting that the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence provide advice and assistance to the school district, pursuant to subdivision (g) of Section 52074.
- (d) Upon request of a county superintendent of schools or a school district, a geographic lead agency identified pursuant to Section 52073 may provide technical assistance pursuant to subdivision (c). A geographic lead agency identified pursuant to Section 52073 may request that another geographic lead agency, an expert lead agency identified pursuant to Section 52073.1, a special education resource lead identified pursuant to Section 52073.2, or the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence provide the assistance described in this subdivision.
- (e) A school district shall accept the technical assistance provided by the county superintendent of schools pursuant to subdivisions (b) and (c). For purposes of accepting technical assistance provided by the county superintendent of schools pursuant to subdivision (c), a school district

may satisfy this requirement by providing the timely documentation to, and maintaining regular communication with, the county superintendent of schools as specified in paragraph (3) of subdivision (c).

(f) This section shall not preclude a school district from soliciting technical assistance from entities other than its county superintendent of schools at its own cost.


Intensive Intervention (Level 3 Support) 52072.

Universal Citation: CA Educ Code § 52072 (2021)

- (a) The Superintendent may, with the approval of the state board, identify school districts in need of intervention.
- (b) The Superintendent shall only intervene in a school district that meets both of the following criteria:
- (1) The school district meets the criteria established pursuant to subdivision (g) of Section 52064.5 for three or more pupil subgroups identified pursuant to Section 52052, in three out of four consecutive school years.
- (2) The California Collaborative for Educational Excellence has provided advice and assistance to the school district pursuant to Section 52071 and submits either of the following findings to the Superintendent:
- (A) That the school district has failed, or is unable, to implement the recommendations of the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence.
- (B) That the inadequate performance of the school district, based upon an evaluation rubric adopted pursuant to Section 52064.5, is either so persistent or acute as to require intervention by the Superintendent.
- (c) For school districts identified pursuant to subdivision (a), the Superintendent may, with the approval of the state board, do one or more of the following:

- (1) Make changes to a local control and accountability plan adopted by the governing board of the school district.
- (2) Develop and impose a budget revision, in conjunction with revisions to the local control and accountability plan, that the Superintendent determines would allow the school district to improve the outcomes for all pupil subgroups identified pursuant to Section 52052 in regard to state and local priorities.
- (3) Stay or rescind an action, if that action is not required by a local collective bargaining agreement, that would prevent the school district from improving outcomes for all pupil subgroups identified pursuant to Section 52052 in regard to state or local priorities.
- (4) Appoint an academic trustee to exercise the powers and authority specified in this section on his or her behalf.
- (d) The Superintendent shall notify the county superintendent of schools, the county board of education, the superintendent of the school district, and the governing board of the school district of any action by the state board to direct him or her to exercise any of the powers and authorities specified in this section.

# Proposition 28 Estimates for LEAs



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posted November 16, 2022

By a 26-point margin in last week's 2022 Midterm Election (63%-37%), voters approved <u>Proposition 28</u>, which will provide K-12 public schools (including charter schools) an annual allocation for arts and music programs beginning with the 2023-24 fiscal year.

The funding will come from the General Fund side of the State Budget and will not come out of the Proposition 98 minimum guarantee. The annual funding for this measure is equal to 1% of the Proposition 98 funding that K-12 schools received in the prior fiscal year, which for 2022-23 is about \$95.5 billion. This means there will nearly \$1 billion available for the measure for the 2023-24 fiscal year.

The funding will be allocated directly to local educational agencies (LEAs), with 70% of the share based on 2022–23 LEA enrollment while the remaining 30% will go to LEAs based on their share of low-income students, defined as students who qualify for the National School Lunch Program. LEAs will then have to distribute those funds to their school sites based on the specified 70/30 split. LEAs are required to certify that at least 80% of the funding goes to hire staff for arts and music instruction; however, LEAs with less than 500 students are exempt from this requirement. Additionally, the California Department of Education is permitted to provide a waiver from the 80% staffing requirement to school sites upon written request from the principal. LEAs are also allowed to set aside 1% of their funding for administrative purposes.

The initiative empowers principals (or the program director of a preschool) to determine how to expand a site's arts programs, including combining funds with other schools to develop joint programs and shared staff. The principal or program director must develop a plan for spending the funding they receive. Additionally, LEAs are required to annually submit a report that details the types of art programs funded, program staff (the number of full-time equivalent teachers, classified personnel, and teaching aides), the number of students served, and the number of school sites providing art education programs using the initiative's funds.

While we have provided specific programmatic details of the measure in previous *Fiscal Report* articles (see "<u>Proposition 28 and the Minimum Guarantee</u>" and "<u>K-12 Art and Music Education Funding Initiative Qualifies for November Election</u>"), we want to highlight that there is language within the proposition that requires this funding to supplement existing arts and music programs. Specifically, the language requires

LEAs to certify that the funds received from the measure are used to supplement funding for arts and music education programs and that any funds received in prior fiscal years are, in fact, used to supplement these art and music programs.

To help LEAs plan for their share of the Proposition 28 funding for the 2023-24 fiscal year, we are providing preliminary estimates of what each LEA will receive broken down by school site. Our estimates show that each LEA will receive \$113.45 per student based on the enrollment metric and \$84.15 per student based on the low-income metric. Keep in mind that these estimates were derived using the latest data available—they will fluctuate as more current information becomes available.



## 2022-23 Opportunities for Parental Involvement

Oak Valley strives to maintain effective communication with parents and also hosts several activities and events throughout the year that encourage parent involvement. The district began using the Parent Square platform in the 21-22 school year. According to Parent Square data, at the end of the first semester of 2022-2023 school year 52% of parents use the Parent Square app, while 43% receive Parent Square communication via text or email, yielding a 95% parent contact rate. A total of 48% of parents responded to messages that were sent to them. Oak Valley invites parents to all performances, assemblies, sporting events, and schoolwide activities throughout the year. Parents are encouraged to volunteer in the classroom and on field trips. The ELD coordinator worked with families on the Latino Family Literacy Project once a week from October through December, all parents were invited to attend. The Oak Valley 4-H and Ag programs invite parents to attend meetings, events, and activities throughout the year.

Parents are an integral part of the district's decision-making. Therefore, parents are encouraged to participate in School Site Council and ELAC. Parents are also asked to participate in the development of the LCAP through various outlets such as monthly coffee with the principal meetings. Parent surveys are distributed to gather parent input during events that have high parent participation rates, such as parent teacher conferences and open house. Additionally, parents were asked to provide input about what they envision for each of their children during parent teacher conference.

In addition to school led parent involvement, parents are also active in an organization called the Oak Valley Parent Club. The Parent Club meets at least monthly throughout the school year and organizes various activities for students including: trunk or treat, Breakfast with Santa, an annual family dance, and a sports themed activity day at the end of each school year. The Parent Club provides breakfast for the school's monthly PBIS awards and distributes Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets every year to students who are identified as high need within the community.

#### 2021-22 Types of Services Funded

Due to Oak Valley being a small rural school, several support personnel are provided on campus by the Tulare County Office of Education. Within the special education services we are provided a part time psychologist that oversees the most severe socio-emotional needs of our students. A part time speech pathologist and a full time Special Education Resources Specialist along with two part-time Special Education Aides are provided in order to service our students on an Individual Educational Plan (IEP). We have a full time counselor who works with students and families to address social emotional and behavioral needs. In addition, the HEART After School Program is provided to extend our learning day for students that wish to participate. We also receive specialized health programs conducted by one of the county's RN nurses. Supplemental and concentration funding also provides after school tutoring and summer school programs.

Oak Valley has various paraprofessionals that offer additional support to our students such as a part time health aide, library aide, three intervention resource classroom aides that support tier II and tier III reading intervention. The VAPA (Visual and Performing Arts) department is growing. We have a part time instrumental music instructor (0.6 FTE) that we share with a neighboring school which provides students with marching band and concert band experience, a drama program who performs one play a year, a dance program that gives students a dance outlet and performs at assemblies, along with an art teacher who provides art instruction to our elementary and middle school students. Due to agriculture being the largest industry in our area, it is vital that we support ag education. Therefore, an Ag Pathway has been created that includes a newly build outdoor garden that includes citrus, nut, and fruit trees along with vegetable planter boxes and a greenhouse. The outdoor garden also provides an area for students to collaborate and conduct scientific labs. Oak Valley's Ag Pathway articulates into the high school's Ag Pathway in which our students have the opportunity to participate in.

The District is part of County CO-OP for support with State and Federal Projects and pays the County for support on financial matters. TCOE is always providing training opportunities in various curriculum, instruction, assessment, and leadership topics.

#### **Professional Development**

Three full days and 29 early release days (Wednesday afternoons) are dedicated each year to staff and professional development focused on continuous improvement. The focus of the PD sessions has been on (1) implementing the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) in order to improve our intervention program to meet the learning needs of all of our students, (2) Writing practices and strategies, (3) ELD practices and strategies, (4) how to accelerate learning to mitigate learning loss, and (5) Social-emotional student supports. Coaching is provided throughout the year and has been focused on literacy, more specifically the Guided Reading program and writing in K-3. Services are contracted with the Tulare County Office of Education.
