Student Services Report - February 2023

Jouston County School District offers vision and hearing screenings to all 1st, 3rd, and 8th grade students annually. Vision and hearing screenings are an important service provided by the school health techs and nurses to catch any potential barriers affecting a student's classroom performance. These screenings act as a preventive measure to detect issues in early stages that could otherwise go unnoticed for years and possibly lead to more serious vision and hearing concerns. One example is Amblyopia, also known as lazy eye. This condition, if left untreated, can lead to monocular blindness. Early detection and treatment focuses on corrrecting the underlying causes of the condition and could be as simple as using an eye patch to train the eye. Over 6000 students were screened this year, that's 24,000 eyes and ears! Thank you to the nurses and health techs for their commitment and hard work.



**≺**eorgia law requires scoliosis screenings for children in public during early adolescence. schools Houston County Schools will screen all 6th and 8th grade students for scoliosis. Scoliosis is a curvature of the spine greater than 10 degrees. Asymmetrical shoulder elevation, shoulder blade protrusion, waist fold, and/or arm hang distance can be signs of a significant spine curve leading to scoliosis. Students who show signs of scoliosis are referred to the Health Department for follow up. Screenings offer an essential tool in early detection and prevention. Over 4000 students will be screened this school year between February 13th-17th by our school nurses. These state required screenings are always a success because of the team work from the school health techs and staff at the middle schools. Thank you for your support!
