


We are back at the school!

Greetings Parents and Families,

We hope this letter finds you all doing well and in good health.

Here at DEC, your child's health is of the utmost importance. We serve the youngest, most vulnerable learners in our community and surrounding areas. Because their immune systems are less developed, they are more susceptible to illnesses than an adult.

Although your child is monitored at the program for any signs and symptoms of illness, we ask that you also monitor at home. If your child is not feeling well, please keep them home where they are comfortable and can get the rest they need. We take extra precautionary measures to ensure the health and safety of all children here at DEC.

If your child is having symptoms of illness while at the program, this is the procedure that will be followed:

- **<u>1</u>** Health Aide is called to the classroom with a concern. Health aide will complete assessment and make a determination as to whether or not the symptoms fit within the exclusion criteria outlined in our policy. This is a case by case basis.
- **<u>2.</u>** If the symptoms **<u>DO NOT</u>** fit within the exclusion criteria, the child may stay at the program. A family contact note will be sent home to notify parents/guardians and to recommend further monitoring of symptoms at home.
- 3. If the symptoms <u>DO</u> fit within the exclusion criteria, the health aide will take the child to the child-care room and wait with them until they are picked up. Health aide will make a report and a parent/guardian will be called to pick up the child. Child is to be picked up within 30 minutes of notification. <u>Please go to the front office to sign child out.</u>
- 4. When the child is picked up, health aide will give the parent/guardian the report and discuss further action. If a child is sent home with symptoms of a <u>contagious/communicable</u> illness, a doctor's note clearing the child <u>WILL</u> be required for the child to return to program to ensure the health and safety of all DEC children and the illness is not spread.

Be reminded:

- 1. Washing hands with soap and water is the number one way to prevent infection/illness.
- 2. Keep contact numbers up-to-date and voicemails cleared, in case there is a concern regarding your child while they are at the program we are able to reach you.
- 3. When coming to pick up the child from program, whether it be parents or others on the child's contact list, please be sure the child has a car seat.

Tips for Creating Routines for Learning

Daily routines offer the chance to build self-confidence, curiosity, social-skills, self-control, and communication skills, to name a few.

Routines help babies, toddlers and preschoolers learn self-control. Consistent routines, and activities that happen at the same time and in the same way each day, provide comfort and a sense of safety to young children. Routines help your child/children predict what will happen next. Routines also support and develop children's social skills.

Examples of simple routines that are learning opportunities:

<u>Playtime & mealtimes</u> are two routines that are social times for both children and parents. Through talking, taking turns, sharing toys, and learning to wait, young children learn important social skills, which will help them later in life.

PLEASE NOTE: Routines provide the two key ingredients for learning - **Relationships** and **Repetition**. If your child is having fun with you, your child is learning too! Enjoy these moments with your child/children.

Information

The Laguna Division of Early Childhood program provides a rich and engaging setting for all early learners, infants up to preschoolers including any child who may be experiencing a developmental delay such as in the areas of large or small muscle development, and in communication or social/emotional development. Sometimes, parents/families may have a concern when their child's development seems delayed or slower than expected.
