# <u>POLITICAL HISTORY, PRINCIPALS OF AMERICAN DEMOCRACY, AND SYSTEM OF AMERICAN</u> GOVERNMENT

- The colonists fought the British because they were **angry about taxation without representation**, the British army stayed in their houses, and they didn't have self-government.
  - As a result, the Declaration of Independence was adopted on July 4, 1776, and officially announced our separation from Great Britain. This is why we celebrate Independence Day on July 4.
    - Other national holidays besides July 4 include Memorial Day, Presidents' Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Labor Day and Columbus Day.
- The original 13 states were New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia.
- Declaration of Independence
  - o Rights in the Declaration of Independence are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.
  - o **Thomas Jefferson** is considered the author of the Declaration of Independence.
- Constitutional Convention
  - The Constitutional Convention was held in 1787, and it is when the US Constitution was written by the Founding Fathers.
  - Benjamin Franklin, author of <u>Poor Richard's Almanac</u>, is known for being the <u>oldest member of</u> the Constitutional Convention and an influential U.S. diplomat.
  - The Federalist Papers were authored by **Alexander Hamilton**, **John Jay**, **and James Madison to try to convince the states to ratify the Constitution**.
- George Washington was the first president and is considered the "Father of our Country."
- The two major political parties in the United States are the **Democratic and Republican** parties.
- The 13 stripes on the American flag represent the **13 original colonies**.
- The 50 stars on the American flag **represent the 50 states**.
- The national anthem of the United States is "The Star-Spangled Banner."
- "I pledge allegiance to the Unites States of America..."
- Constitution
  - The supreme law of the land in the US is the Constitution, which sets up the government, defines the legal system, and protects basic rights of Americans.
  - o The first three words of the Constitution are "We the People."
  - o America's government consists of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches.
  - o Checks and balances keep each branch of government from becoming too powerful.
  - o Under the Constitution, some powers belong to the federal government. Those powers include the power to declare war, print money, create an army, and to make treaties.
  - O Under the Constitution, some powers belong to the states. Those powers include the power to provide schooling and education, protection, safety and giving driver's licenses.
- The United States has **a capitalist economic system**-an economy run by the free market (individuals), not the government
- Congress (legislative)-make laws
  - The two parts of the US Congress are the **Senate and House of Representatives**, and they **write federal laws**.
    - The House of Representatives is the largest part of Congress with 435 voting members.
      - Each state's population determines the number of House members for each state.
      - House members (U.S Representative) serve **two-year terms**.
      - Your U.S. Representative for your Congressional District 6 is **Gary Palmer**.
    - The Senate, the smaller house of Congress, has **100 voting members**.
      - Two U.S. Senators represent everyone in the state.

- Senators serve six-year terms.
- Your two U.S. Senators from Alabama are **Katie Britt** and **Tommy Tuberville**.
- President (executive)-enforces laws
  - o The President oversees the **executive branch**.
  - o Presidents serve terms of **four years.**
  - o Your current U.S. President is **Donald Trump** (Republican).
  - The president appoints all federal judges, signs bills into law, can veto bills, and is the Commander in Chief of the military.
  - The President's Cabinet advises the President. Cabinet positions include Secretary of Agriculture, Vice President, Secretary of Education, Secretary of Commerce, Attorney General, and Secretary of Energy.
  - o If the President can no longer serve, the **vice president** becomes president. If both the president and the vice president can no longer serve, the Speaker of the House becomes president.
  - o Your current U.S. Vice President is **J. D. Vance** (Republican).
  - Your current Speaker of the House of Representatives in the U.S. House is Mike Johnson (Republican).
- Courts (judicial)-interprets laws
  - The judicial branch is our **federal court system** and the highest court in the US is the **Supreme** Court.
  - o The judicial branch decides if a law violates the Constitution.
  - The Supreme Court has **nine Justices**.
  - o The current Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court is **John Roberts**.
- Amendments
  - The Constitution has **27 amendments**.
  - The men who designed the Constitution knew it wasn't perfect, so they created a way to change or add to it through amendments.
  - We call the first 10 amendments to the Constitution the Bill of Rights and they protect individual liberties.
    - The First Amendment protects religion, speech, press, petition, and assembly.
    - **Freedom of religion** is the right to practice or not practice a religion.
  - o The Second Amendment gives citizens the right to bear arms.
  - There are four specific amendments that expanded voting rights for most Americans: A citizen's voting rights cannot be taken away based on their race (15<sup>th</sup>), gender (19<sup>th</sup>), financial status (24<sup>th</sup>), or age (over 18) (26<sup>th</sup>).

#### **AMERICAN HISTORY**

- Before the arrival of the Europeans, the **Native Americans** lived in America.
- Navajo, Creek, Cherokee, Iroquois, Inuit, Mohegan, Apache and Pueblo are Indian tribes native to the United States.
- Colonists came to America to enjoy religions freedom and economic opportunity.
- **People from Africa** were taken to America and sold as slaves.
- The US bought Louisiana from France in 1803.
- Wars fought by the US during the 1800s were
  - o War of 1812
  - o Mexican American War
  - o Civil War
    - Fought between North and South
    - Fought primarily over the issue of slavery

- Abraham Lincoln was the president who kept the country together with the victory of the North
- Emancipation Proclamation freed enslaved people in Confederate territory
- o Spanish-American War
- Susan B. Anthony fought for women's rights.
- Wars fought by the US during the 1900s were
  - World War I.
    - Woodrow Wilson was president during World War I.
  - World War II
    - Franklin Roosevelt was president during the Great Depression and World War II.
    - The US fought Japan, Germany, and Italy in World War II.
    - President Dwight Eisenhower first became known as a general during WWII.
  - o Korean War
  - o Vietnam War
- The driving cause for the U.S. during the Cold War was containing communism.
- The Civil Rights Movement fought to end racial discrimination in the U.S.
  - Martin Luther King, Jr. fought for civil rights for African Americans during the Civil Rights Movement.
- On Sept. 11, 2001, terrorists attacked the United States at the World Trade Center.

# **RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

- People living in America agree to abide by the "rule of law," which means that **everyone-including leaders** in the government-must follow the law.
- One responsibility that is only for US citizens is **serving on a jury**.
- One right that is only for US citizens is **voting in a federal election**.
- Promises you make when you become a US citizen is that you will **defend the Constitution of the United States**, give up loyalty to other countries and serve in the military if needed.
- Citizens have to be **18 years old** to vote for president. We **vote for president** every four years in the month of **November**.
- Ways that Americans can participate in their democracy are by voting, giving elected officials your opinions on issues, and joining a political party or community group.
- All men must register for the Selective Service at age 18.
- The last day to send in your federal income tax forms is April 15.
- The current Governor of Alabama is **Kay Ivey**.

- Some states that border Mexico are New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, and California.
- 13 states border Canada. Some of those states are **Montana**, **Washington**, **Alaska**, and **Minnesota**.
- The capital of the U.S. is **Washington D.C**.

- The Pacific Ocean is on the West Coast of the U.S. and the Atlantic Ocean is on the East Coast.
