PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners of St. Therese,

I want to begin by thanking Almighty God for the gift of St. Therese Parish and *all* of you! It is truly a gift to serve you good people! And I pray that all of God's blessings be bestowed on you, your families and loved ones!

In the spirit of this beautiful Christian holiday of Thanksgiving that is approaching, I'd like to share with you some excerpts from **President Abraham Lincoln's famous Thanksgiving Proclamation on October 3, 1863**. In it, he alludes to the Civil War that our country suffered through in those days. But his message is still very resonant for us today who are living in a "cultural and moral civil war."



"The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature that they cannot fail to penetrate and even soften the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God.

"No human counsel hath devised, nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

"It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully

acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people. I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a Day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens.

"And I recommend to them that, while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and union."

So let us, with this great President of the past, observe this day especially as a day of Thanksgiving to our loving God, begging Our Lord to heal the wounds and divisions of our nation and make us once again, "one nation under God!" (Please join us at our 10:00 a.m. Mass on Thanksgiving!)

National Eucharistic Revival

Do This in Remembrance of Me | Part 17: Second Reading

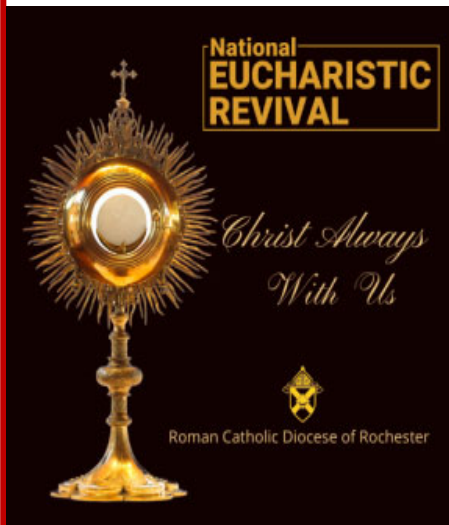
On Sundays and Solemnities, after the Responsorial Psalm, we always hear the proclamation of the Second Reading, which is taken from the New Testament books (other than the Gospels) and is generally continuous from one week to the next. While St. Paul is the most prolific of the New Testament writers, we also have readings from St. John, St. Peter, St. James, and others. Although the sentences in these readings are sometimes long and a little awkward (because they were originally written in Greek, not English), they are packed with great wisdom and directives for Christian living.

These writings are beneficial to us because St. Paul and the other writers were all helping early Christians understand how to live in an anti-Christian world (recall that Christianity was illegal in the Roman Empire during the first centuries of the Church). The writers provided answers to difficult

questions, gave explanations for why we do certain things and not others, and exhorted the people to holiness and fidelity even in the midst of daily struggles and persecutions.

Look through the readings for any Sunday, and what do you see? "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ" (1 Cor 11:1); "Seek what is above" (Col 3:1); "that you may not grow weary and lose heart" (Heb 12:3); "Be doers of the word and not hearers only" (Jas 1:19); "Children, let us love...in deed and in truth" (1 Jn 3:18); "He will wipe every tear from their eyes" (Rev 21:4). Does it feel like we could keep going and going? We really could! At every Sunday Mass and on Solemnities, the Second Reading is packed with wisdom from the saints to help us become saints, too!

HOW CAN WE HELP THE SOULS IN PURGATORY?

PRAYER FOR THE HOLY SOULS IN PURGATORY

for sinners everywhere,

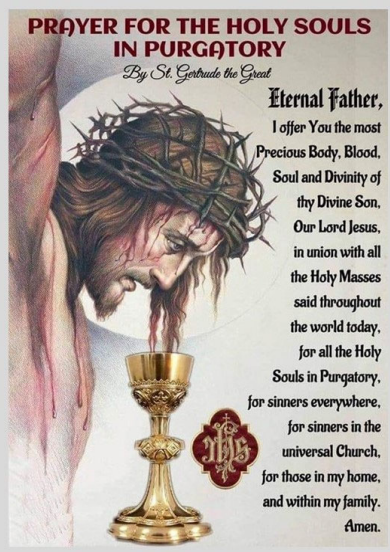
for sinners in the

We can help the souls in Purgatory by having Masses offered for them and by praying for them, but we can also offer up the good works we do for them. For instance, offer up the fruits of your work with the poor or any good deed that you do like taking an elderly person to the doctor or the store. Any charitable work can be offered up and sacrificed for the souls in Purgatory. Some churches used to have Purgatorial Societies wherein each of their members would commit to praying a certain number of prayers for the dead on a regular basis and would also ask others to pray for the dead with them. I think that we should consider bringing this practice back—and not only in November. It's interesting that we now have groups that focus on the grieving but not groups that focus on those who have died.

A very important aspect of Purgatory has to do with justice. Every sin we commit impacts others. This is clear in the case of public sins or sins like murder, but it's even the case with "private" sins. Every sin we commit has a negative impact on others. Because of this, we have to make amends for things we've done. If one were to throw a brick through a window and soon after apologize, he could be forgiven but something would still have to be done about the

window. It's only right that he do something to make up for the damage he caused. Same thing with our sins.

People today don't go to cemeteries as often as they did in the past. That used to be a routine thing on certain days, like Memorial Day or the birthday of a deceased loved one. There's a lot of merit in walking through a cemetery. For one, it helps us put our own problems in perspective by being reminded that these people had all the troubles I have and more—and now they're gone. Likewise, we realize they had experienced honor and praise and all the things that make us feel good. And yet, at the end, this is what will come to me, to all of us. At every funeral, I say to people, "You are going to die, and you've got to get ready for that."

We've all heard the phrase, "Offer it up for the poor souls." You know, someone stubs his toe, and we say, "offer it up." The worst thing in the world isn't suffering; the worst thing is "wasted suffering, meaningless suffering," to quote Archbishop Fulton Sheen. We live in a world that sees no meaning whatsoever in suffering; that it's a horrible thing to be avoided at all costs—to the point of people taking their own lives through physician-assisted suicide. Or, killing a child in the womb to avoid any suffering on the mother's part.

I often remind people to offer their prayers for the souls in Purgatory. Older people may feel they're not productive any longer. I say, even those having to lay flat on their backs because of illness have the chance to make these moments their most powerful and important, IF they offer them up for the holy souls or for another holy cause. If you have trouble concentrating, make it an act of faith and pray, "Lord, I give it all to you for the salvation of souls." It's powerful, very powerful.

The Roman Catholic teaching on Purgatory was officially proclaimed as dogma in 1438. Until that year, belief in the doctrine was not required but, since then, it is. Some people rejected the dogma of Purgatory, but I think what was being rejected was perhaps not as accurate an understanding of Purgatory as what we should have had. Some of the older notions of Purgatory were truly frightening. We were told it was no different from Hell, except that it was temporary. However, it is actually a place of healing—NOT a place of punishment—because it is a place of consecrated suffering. We ought not be afraid of Purgatory; instead we should look forward to it as it will lead to our perfection so that we can have eternal happiness in Heaven.

Here are five ways to help the souls in Purgatory in November:

- Go to a cemetery and pray for those who are buried there.
- Write down the names of your loved ones who have died to help you to remember to pray for them every day.
- Offer prayers for those souls who have no one else to pray for them.
- Tell God that you want to offer all the joys and pains that come your way this month for the souls in Purgatory. Of course, this would mean you can't complain about those pains when they come!
- Go visit the poor on behalf of the souls in Purgatory. Souls in Purgatory need to make amends for all those ways in which they hurt others and closed themselves off to charity. Visiting the poor on their behalf—chatting with a homeless person on the street, serving in a soup kitchen or shelter, etc.—can be a very meaningful way to help make amends for others' sins. As 1 Peter 4:8 says, "Keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins."



"Let Me Introduce You..." By Fr. Stephen F. Watson OCD



Viva Cristo Rey! A couple of weeks ago, I was called to the Martinez home on El Molino Street. The family needed a priest to pray for Juan Martinez who had just died. His two daughters were there comforting their mother, Carlota. The husband of one of the daughters was also there. In fact, it was he who came looking for a priest and brought me to the house. A couple of days later, the daughters and their mother came to me to make funeral arrangements. As I came to know a little bit about them, I asked if it was okay for me to share something about their family. They were happy to do so. This is the story of **Juan and Carlota Martinez**.

Juan Martinez married Carlota Garcia in January of 1968. Juan's brother, a priest named Fr. Andres Martinez, was a good friend of Carlota's parents. When he learned that Carlota and her mother, who lived in El Grullo in the Mexican state of Jalisco, planned a vacation in L.A., he had his brother Juan meet them to act as their "guardian angel." Juan, originally from the small Mexican state of Colima which borders Jalisco, was working in Los Angeles as a machinist. (In those days, it was easy for Mexican citizens to come and go to Los Angeles.) Would you believe that after *only two weeks* Juan proposed to Carlota. That was amazing, especially considering that Juan was famous for his motto, "*Todo con calma*," meaning, "*Do everything calmly*." I think Fr. Andres must have been acting as the matchmaker. Carlota, who had a promising career in banking, hesitated, of course. However, Carlota's mother advised her daughter to marry Juan and—within six months—she did just that!

Their first home was in Solano Canyon, an historic community that bordered the Chavez Ravine neighborhoods. The young couple then moved to Alhambra, first living on Arroyo Terrace, and then, since 1978, on El Molino Street, just down from St. Therese Church. Juan and Carlota were blessed with two girls—born five-and-a-half years apart—Patricia and Claudia. The girls were each baptized by their uncle, Fr. Andres, at the famous La Placita Church, Our Lady, Queen of Angels. (Fr. Andres was on loan to the Diocese of San Bernardino for several years.) When they were old enough to begin school, the girls were enrolled at St. Therese Parish School and completed all their elementary education there.

Juan and Carlota had a small clothing business with twelve employees. It was a lot of work with little remuneration. They eventually sold it, and Juan became a groundskeeper for the City of L.A., while Carlota became a beautician in San Gabriel, with several parishioners as her clients. Meanwhile, Patricia and Claudia were involved with the St. Therese Young Adult group. Patricia was also a youth leader for the St. Therese Youth group, along with Bernadette Walsh (now Gonzalez), under the guidance of Maria Jongeling, the coordinator for both groups. When Maria retired, Patricia worked with the newly-ordained Fr. Donald Kinney for a short while. The girls also sang in Ralph Mohutsky's St. Therese Youth Choir. Claudia met her husband, Stephen Ralston, after a Sunday Mass, when he went up and introduced himself. Stephen had previously volunteered in the friars' rectory. His best friend was Matthew Nally, whose parents we featured in an earlier column. In 1992, Stephen and Claudia were married in St. Therese Church by Fr. Paul Koenig, OCD. Today, they live in Upland and have a son, James, and a daughter, Angela, both of whom were baptized at St. Therese. Claudia has worked for the Alhambra School District for the past thirty years and is presently teaching pre-K students.

Patricia says that for many years she was "married to my dissertation." She finally received a doctorate in Business from UC Irvine. Today, she is a professor at Loyola Marymount in the College of Business. She is now married to David Sanchez, an attorney, and they live in Pasadena and attend Holy Family Parish. They have a fifteen-year-old daughter, Analisa, who goes to Flintridge.

Juan loved working in his garden. In fact, he was tending his garden on the morning of the day he died. Later that day, he felt tired and was sitting in his chair. He said his legs felt cold and he asked Carlota to bring him the blanket with the Virgin of Guadalupe on it. As a young bachelor, Juan was active in the Legion of Mary as a devoted son of Mary. We can be confident that Mary did not forget her son in his hour of passing from this life. May he rest in peace. We pray now for Carlota that she will be sustained in the sure and certain hope of being reunited with her husband. I say it again: *Viva Cristo Rey!* Juan's funeral will be celebrated at Noon this Friday, November 29, here at St. Therese.

The Martinez Family is part of the rich 100-year history of St. Therese Parish.
Let us all walk with St. Therese as we journey together in faith during our Centennial year.

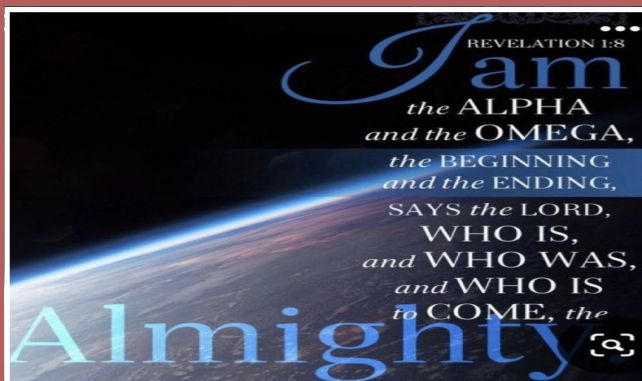
