Dear Parishioner:

When a loved one dies, we are faced with the need to deal with the emotions of loss and a practical need to make plans and decisions concerning the funeral.

Planning the Funeral Mass is one of the most important and immediate decisions that needs to be made. It presents an opportunity to express our faith in a tangible and healing manner.

The following pages offer options and choices, which makes it possible to put a personal dimension into the Church's public prayer for one who has died.

At St. Alphonsus, we have implemented the most recent directives issued by the Catholic Bishops of Wisconsin regarding planning funerals.

Concerning the need to coordinate Mass times, we have to ask for your understanding. Generally, funeral Masses are celebrated in the morning. Funerals are not celebrated on Sundays, Holy Days, or holidays. If there is to be visitation in the church, it should be scheduled before the funeral Mass. Visitation and the Funeral Mass cannot be scheduled over a 2-day period.

We will make every practical effort to be of assistance, and we truly hope that the Funeral will be a source of comfort and deepening faith in God's mercy and eternal life. Please call the Parish Office, 1-414-421-2442, to discuss your plans.

Scheduling the Funeral Mass and Visitation

Generally, funeral Masses are celebrated in the mornings. Funerals are not celebrated on Sundays, Holy Days, or holidays. If there is to be a visitation in the church gathering space, it should be scheduled immediately before the funeral Mass. Visitation and the Funeral Mass cannot be scheduled over a 2-day period.

The Rite of Committal

Whenever possible, the priest presider at your loved one's funeral Mass will also celebrate the Rite of Committal at the cemetery (when there is one). However, the priest's schedule may not permit him to lead this ritual. If so, there are several options regarding the funeral service of committal. Prayers at the cemetery may be led by the funeral director or, if available, the cemetery Chaplain. One of the parish deacons may also be available to do the Committal service.

The Funeral Home

The funeral home provides many vital services, both noticed and unnoticed, to families who are mourning a loved one. These include assisting your guests in navigating our worship space as well as setting up and taking down of picture boards, furniture, A/V equipment and supplying the visitation accountements.

We are happy to host the visitation for your loved one. However, St. Alphonsus Parish is not a funeral home and cannot provide the same services at a visitation that a funeral home is able to provide. If you should choose to not have the presence of a funeral home at the visitation and Mass you and your family will be responsible for the set up and take down of any picture boards, AV equipment, the moving of furniture, the disposal of flowers, etc.

The Planning Meeting

The priest who will be presiding at your loved one's Funeral Mass will meet with you in the days before to help you plan and organize the Mass. This

meeting should take place at least 48 hours before the Funeral Mass in order to give the priest time to prepare a homily and organize all the details.

Bereavement Ministry

At the funeral planning meeting, you will be introduced to a member of our Bereavement Ministry. The Bereavement Ministry will assist you and your family before, during and after the Funeral Mass. They will share more details about this ministry at that meeting.

The Visitation

These gatherings are scheduled to immediately precede the Funeral Mass. Generally, they are scheduled for one to three hours before Mass and they are usually held in our Gathering Space. Our bereavement ministry will be present during the visitation in a supporting role and they will provide our family room as a place for the family to take a break if needed. Water and very simple snacks will be available in that room. Beyond the simple snacks provided by the Bereavement Ministry, no other food or drink is allowed during visitations. Likewise, no food is allowed in the Church.

Post Funeral Gathering

We recommend that you use a restaurant or catering hall for the funeral luncheon. However, should you be interested in using the Community Room, please inquire with the parish office. Families may use it for *light* refreshments provided it doesn't conflict with other scheduled parish events. Such gatherings may only occur *after* the Funeral Mass.

If you choose to hold a light reception in the Community Room, you are responsible for setting up and taking down the room, cleaning of all of the tables and the room itself afterwards and the removal of all trash bags to the dumpsters behind the church. No alcohol is allowed for funeral receptions.

Planning the Funeral Mass

The White Pall

This white cloth reminds us that the deceased "put on Christ" at Baptism. Up to six family members may assist with placing this on the casket.

The Readings

You may choose a reading from either the Old Testament or the New Testament, or one of each. You should also select a reading from one of the Gospels.

Those who read during the Funeral Mass should be comfortable doing so in this time of emotions and be able to proclaim the readings in a clear manner.

The Deacon or Priest always proclaims the Gospel.

The General Intercessions

Please select one of the complete sets of Intercessions to be read during the Funeral Mass.

The Presentation of Gifts

Family members or friends are encouraged to bring these to the altar. Up to three people may participate.

Eulogies

Eulogies or "reflections" are not a part of the Catholic Funeral Mass and, therefore, are not permitted during Mass.

A family that wishes to have a eulogy would find that this is best done at the funeral home visitation or at the social gathering following Mass. These particular times are most appropriate for sharing of memories, whereas, at the Mass, we focus on Christ and salvation.

These guidelines follow the recommendations of the Bishops of the State of

Wisconsin

A *brief* reflection (5-7 minutes) may be allowed prior to the start of Mass. Please talk to the priest regarding specifics. Anything said during a reflection must be appropriate for the context of a Catholic Church.

Music

St. Alphonsus is blessed with a dedicated group of parishioners who assist us in singing at every Funeral Mass. You may suggest hymns, which have special meaning to you as long as they are sacred and liturgically appropriate. Solo pieces are limited to a meditation after Communion. Choices are also limited to the choir's knowledge of songs and the copyright licensing of the parish. Such songs should be coordinated with the Director of Liturgy and Music, at least 48 hours prior to the funeral.

Guest musicians and/or vocalists must be active music ministers in their church.

Concelebrating Clergy

Family friends or relatives who are Catholic clergy are welcome to concelebrate or to preside, with advance notice and proper documentation. Please consult with the parish priest in advance.

OLD TESTAMENT Joshua 24:14-15

A reading from the second Book of Maccabees,

A Reading from the Book of Lamentations,

My soul is deprived of peace, I have forgotten what happiness is; I tell myself my future is lost, all that I hoped for from the Lord. The thought of my homeless poverty

is wormwood and gall;

Remembering it over and over leaves my soul downcast within me.

But I will call this to mind, as my reason to have hope:

The favors of the Lord are not exhausted, his mercies are not spent;

They are renewed each morning, so great is his faithfulness.

My portion is the Lord, says my soul; therefore will I hope in him.

Good is the Lord to one who waits for him, to the soul that seeks him; It is good to hope in silence

for the saving help of the Lord.

OLD TESTAMENT Daniel 12:1-3

A Reading from the Book of Daniel,

In those days, I, Daniel, heard this word from the Lord.

"At that time there shall arise

Michael, the great prince,

guardian of your people;

It shall be a time unsurpassed in distress

since nations began until that time.

At that time your people shall escape,

everyone who is found written in the book.

Many of those who sleep

in the dust of this earth shall awake;

Some shall live forever,

others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace.

But the wise shall shine brightly

like the splendor of the firmament,

And those who lead the many to justice

shall be like the stars forever."

NEW TESTAMENT READINGS

(can be used as 1st reading during the Easter Season)

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles,

Peter proceeded to speak to those gathered in the house of Cornelius, saying: "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him. You know the word that he sent to the Israelites as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all, what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him." We are witnesses of what he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name.

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles,

NEW TESTAMENT Romans 5:5-11

A Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

Hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. For Christ, while we were still helpless, died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. How much more then, since we are now justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath. Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life. Not only that, but we also boast of God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

NEW TESTAMENT Romans 5:17-21

A Reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

If by the transgression of the one, death came to reign through that one, how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and the gift of justification come to reign in life through the one Jesus Christ. In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so, through one righteous act acquittal and life came to all. For just as through the disobedience of one man the many were made sinners, so, through the obedience of the one the many will be made righteous. The law entered in so that transgression might increase but; where sin increased, grace overflowed all the more, so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through justification for eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

A Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized in his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life.

For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection. We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin. For a dead person has been absolved from sin. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ raised from the dead, dies no more; death has no power over him.

A Reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized in his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life.

If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ raised from the dead, dies no more; death has no power over him.

NEW TESTAMENT Romans 8:14-23

A Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you receive a Spirit of adoption, through whom we cry, "Abba, Father." The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we await for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

A Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

If God is for us, who can be against us? He did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us. Who will condemn? It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword?

No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

A Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans,

Brothers and Sisters:

None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.

For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written:

As I live says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me.

and every tongue shall give praise to God.

So then each of us shall give an account of himself to God.

A Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians,

Brothers and Sisters:

Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through man, the resurrection of the dead came also through man. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then at his coming, those who belong to Christ; then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to his God and Father. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death, for "he has subjected everything under his feet." But when it says that everything has been subjected, it is clear that it excludes the one who subjected everything to him. When everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to the one who subjected everything to him, so that God may be all and in all.

A Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians,

Brothers and Sisters:

Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through man, the resurrection of the dead came also through man. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then at his coming, those who belong to Christ.

A Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians,

Brothers and Sisters:

Behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in a blink of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For this which is corruptible must clothe itself with incorruptibility, and this which is mortal must clothe itself with immortality. And when this which is corruptible clothes itself with incorruptibility and this which is mortal clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about:

Death is swallowed up in victory.

Where, O death, is your victory?

Where, O death, is your sting?

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A Reading from the Second Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians,

Brothers and Sisters:

We know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God.

Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

A Reading from the Second Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians,

Brothers and Sisters:

We know that if our earthy dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven. We are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yet, we are courageous, and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord. Therefore, we aspire to please him, whether we are at home or away. For we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

A Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Philippians,

Brothers and Sisters:

Our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.

A Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians,

We do not want you to be unaware brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?" He replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him.
