Senior Jason Seiber said, "We did 'Burma Road' twice as much, which gave us the extra advantage for a big win."

Half-time score showed the Jets ahead 20 to 0 . Senior quarterback Dwayne Davis scored with a quarterback sneak to start off the first quarter. The defense shut the Cougars down early to give the offense the edge in the first quarter. Sophomore Johnny Bass broke
through the line for another 6 points. As the end of the first half neared, junior wide receiver Matt Galyon grabbed a 26 yard pass from Davis to give the Jets the 20 to 0 lead in two quarters of play.
