

Social Emotional Learning (SEL)

What are we grateful for?

This week, our students were given the opportunity to think about Gratitude in another light, besides being "thankful". In each class we took the opportunity to read the story "The Giving Tree" by Shel Silverstein, and discuss more about how it feels when one either shows,

or is shown gratitude, as well as how it feels when one does not show or receive it. We also discussed how easy it can be to forget to appreciate and show our gratitude for others, and perhaps even take others for granted. Our students identified with this story, empathized with the characters, and applied it to their own worlds. We discussed the importance of taking a moment to express our gratitude, even if we're busy, when it seems unnecessary, or tough.

Here are some quotes from your students this week regarding the topic of Gratitude: "I am grateful for my family because they are there for me no matter what." "I am grateful for my teacher because she loves me." "I am grateful for having my basic needs met." I am grateful for good memories of people who aren't here anymore." "I can show gratitude by just noticing other people, and what people do for me." "I can show gratitude by being respectful and kind to others, even to those I don't like." "I can show gratitude by spending time with and giving to others." "I can show gratitude by remembering what I have, and what is really important".

As we begin our holiday break, consider taking a moment to talk with your students about what each of you are truly appreciative of, brainstorm ways to show that gratitude toward others, and set a plan to follow through on an act of gratitude. Afterwards, discuss how the experience felt. It could be as simple as sending a card to a neighbor, calling or visiting a relative you don't get the chance to see often, or remembering to offer to help others and to say please and thank you, without reminders when others are helping you.

May this holiday break bring you continued opportunities to notice all the things you are grateful for, and many opportunities to express that gratitude - putting good back into the world, one moment at a time.
