National Honor Society/G Team Field Trip

In October students from the National Honor Society (M. Royalty, advisor) and the Green Team (C. Demone, advisor) visited the Huntington Beach Wetland Conservancy (HBWC) and participated in a wetland clean-up. (Fig. 1) During the visit students learned about the importance of the wetlands ecological system. Wetlands or Coastal Salt Marshes are one of the most productive habitats in the world and serve as home and nurseries for hundreds of species of aquatic and terrestrial plants and animals. Wetlands also provide flood protect, shoreline erosion control, and improves the quality of ground water. Over the years the coastal wetlands of California have virtually disappeared due to urban sprawl. The HBWC was established in 1985 to acquire and restore the coastal wetlands around the Orange County coastal zones.

Inclusion Summit


