butterfly houses. When spring returns, your child can place fruit or flowers inside their house and hang it outside to lure butterflies.










Upper Elementary Marsh

We finished our latest read aloud book, *The Ogress and the Orphans* by Kelly Barnhill and are moving away from the fantasy genre to some non-fiction for a bit.











Upper Elementary Forest

It was so great to see families at conferences and take undivided time to celebrate each child's progress and all the work they've done. Sixth years have been stretched and challenged in all sorts of ways with their Minnesota to the World projects, which they will be sharing the week before break. Children have been exploring simple machines, sampling mealworms, cubing, and doing lots of work with fractions and decimals! We have finished three student-selected read aloud books, ending with *Amari and the Night Brothers* by B.B. Alston. We are now reading aloud shorter non-fiction books, including *The Story of Cod* (Mark Kerlansky), *The Librarian who Measured the Earth* (Kathryn Lasky), and *Sir Cumference and the First Round Table* (Cindy Neuschwander).
