

Meditation on the Scripture Readings for Sunday, July 20, 2025

The Better Part: Welcoming God Into Our Hearts and Homes



Today's Sunday's readings offer us a profound meditation on hospitality—not just toward others, but toward God Himself. In the first reading (Genesis 18:1-20), Abraham welcomes three mysterious visitors under the oak of Mamre. Though he does not yet know their divine identity, he offers them rest, food, and shelter. His generous hospitality becomes the stage upon which God reveals His promise: that Sarah would bear a son. Abraham's openness of heart becomes the door through which God's blessing enters.

Psalm 15 echoes this spirit of righteousness and integrity: "Who shall dwell on your holy mountain?" The one who speaks truth, acts justly, and honors God's ways. These are not just outward actions but signs of a soul that is hospitable to the Lord—someone who makes a home for God within.

In the Gospel (Luke 10:38–42), we are brought into the home of Martha and Mary. Martha, ever active and anxious, busies herself with many things—noble tasks, but ones that distract from the Presence in her midst. Mary, by contrast, chooses "the better part" by sitting at Jesus' feet and listening. Jesus' gentle correction reminds us that our service is most fruitful when it flows from a heart first centered on Him. Like Abraham, Mary welcomes God not just into her house, but into her attention and affection.

St. Paul, writing in Colossians (1:24–28), speaks of the mystery hidden for ages: "Christ in you, the hope of glory." This is the ultimate form of hospitality—not simply welcoming God into our homes or our churches, but into the very core of our lives. When Christ dwells in us, we become, as Paul says, "mature in Christ," capable of enduring suffering and proclaiming Him with joy.

As we reflect on these Scriptures, may we learn to welcome the Lord with Abraham's generosity, Mary's attentiveness, and Paul's devotion. Whether in prayer, action, or rest, may our hearts become living sanctuaries for His presence.
