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TK and Kindergarten

Kindergarteners are working on sounding out and writing four-letter words and learning that an 's' can also make a 'z' sound. They continue working on writing sentences focusing on starting with a capital letter, finger spaces in between words, and a period at the end. They illustrate the sentence showing they understand what they read.

TK is learning about plants and basic plant parts. They are still learning the letters in their name, M, and A. They practice writing their names while saying the letters. TK is also working on matching pictures or items with the same beginning sounds.

In math, kindergarteners are learning to subtract two numbers. They are learning how to read a subtraction number sentence and matching it to a corresponding picture. TK is working on the numbers 6, 7, and 8.

Please remember TK and Kindergarten have a snack every day before first recess. This helps them make it to lunch. Please send a healthy snack that is easy to eat and clean up. You can send a couple of weeks' supply if that is easier. I have saltines for students who do not have a snack.

Third and Fourth Grade Classroom Mrs. Mars

It's hard to believe but we are almost half way through the year! Students started their mid-year testing this week to show everything they have learned so far. They will be finishing these next week.



On Tuesday we talked about Martin Luther King Jr. and the important role he played in history. We then talked about how these lessons are still relevant to us today and how we can help to improve the lives of those around us.

First and Second Grade Explorers Mrs. Mittge

Winter weather prohibited us from finishing our Martin Luther King, Jr. studies so we began the week finishing our unit on this inspiring American role model.

We also took a step back in math to review our numeric investigations. We spent some time at the beginning of the week to review counting and modeling numbers in first grade and solving 2-digit subtraction problems in second grade. We will be wrapping these units up in the next couple of weeks.

First graders will be working with I initial blends. Second grade will look at more ways to make long e. They will focus on the vowel team ee.

Please continue to read aloud for 20 minutes with your child. I am seeing huge gains from students who are doing this reading as well as the weekly story problems and reading fluencies. I am also seeing strengths from students who are confident artists, so if you have some free time, please color, draw, do some play dough with your Evaline Explorer.

Fifth and Sixth Grade Classroom Mr. Burlingame

This week we combined the topics of temperance, civil rights, and Martin Luther King Jr. into a large lesson on the importance of making your voice heard to prevent social injustice. We looked at why the civil rights movement was needed, why the prevalent attitude towards certain racial

groups existed at the time, and how people like Martin Luther King Jr were instrumental in changing those attitudes.

This school year, your students have already had the opportunity to learn about, and use many important character traits including Respect, Responsibility, Gratitude, and Creativity. They have also had many opportunities to practice strategies and skills associated with each of these, such as during our fall field trips, our Annual Food Drive, our Feast, and our Winter Play.

As we resume classes this month, one of the questions that students raised when asked what they thought our next character trait to cover would be was "Haven't we learned enough to be okay people?" This led to a great discussion on what constituted "enough" and what was the definition of being "okay". It is true that being responsible and respectful are admirable and positive character traits as well as important leadership qualities, and that demonstrating gratitude and creativity will get you far regarding having success with many interests and goals, as well as having healthy and fun connections with other people. So isn't that enough... and if not, then what is missing?

This month your students are learning about one of those key missing traits while focusing their learning on the importance of knowing what it's like to "walk in another person's shoes." In other words, to understand and connect with other people's feelings. This is in fact our working definition of the character trait we call Empathy, which is January's focus character trait. At the heart of being a student of character is the core belief that every person should be kind and nice - and that a key aspect of being kind and nice is understanding and caring about how other people feel. Just ask any 5 year old to describe what to do to be a student of character, or to excel at any character trait we present to them, and the universal answer they instinctively give, even before any lessons are given, always includes these descriptors - being kind and nice.



As we remember Martin Luther King Jr, and all the things he did to benefit our country this month, I want to leave us all thinking about this quote, which further emphasizes the importance of having Empathy in our lives: "It takes empathy, patience, and compassion to overcome anger, hatred, and resentment." So let's take a lesson from our youngest learners, and remember the importance of being kind and nice - and to always care about others and what they are going through and feeling. Mrs. Duren
