
# Page 2 -- 2024-2025 Semester 1 Highlights



#### DIAL SCREENING: APRIL 22ND AND 23RD

As part of federal special education law (IDEA– Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) we offer screenings to children ages 30 months through 5 years old.

The goal is to provide equitable access to education by offering individualized support and accommodations to help students succeed academically and socially. Special education services may include:

1. Individualized Education Programs (IEPs): These are personalized learning plans that outline specific educational goals, support strategies, and necessary accommodations for students with disabilities.

2. Inclusive Education: Special education aims to integrate students with disabilities into general education classrooms whenever possible, promoting interaction with peers and creating a diverse learning environment.

3. Variety of Services: This can include speech therapy, occupational therapy, counseling, or specialized teaching methods to address a wide range of needs, from learning disabilities to physical or sensory impairments.

Students qualify for special education by meeting criteria for one of 14 disabilities, the disability having an impact on education, and requiring specialized instruction.

Special education plays a vital role by fostering inclusion and creating opportunities for all individuals to participate in society. It promotes understanding, acceptance, and respect for diversity, leading to a more inclusive and equitable environment for everyone. # Competency-Based Education

SAU 7 transitioned to a competencybased system of education this year. We initiated this transition with parent presentations held at each school in September. If you were unable to attend and would like more information, you can watch a recording online. Simply visit sau7.org, click on "Departments," and then navigate to the "Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment" page. The link, titled "Competency-Based Education 24-25: Parent Presentation," is located at the top of the page. Additionally, if you scroll down on that page, you will find links to various other resources.

As with any new initiative, there has been a learning curve and some challenges to overcome. Nevertheless, our teachers have done an outstanding job implementing competencies, utilizing rubrics, and adopting new mindsets to enhance student learning in meaningful ways. This transition began in 2020, when we partnered with V&S School Solutions to ensure our approach aligns with state educational standards.

In mid-January, we hosted an exciting event: several college and university admissions officers joined us via Zoom to address a question that has been on many parents' minds since our shift to competency-based education: "Will a competency-based system negatively impact my child's chances of college acceptance?" The responses from approximately a dozen admissions officers were reassuring-they indicated that a competency-based system does not negatively affect college admissions. # grants

We have had several grant-funded activities this year, including a Laura Bush Foundation Library grant in Stewartstown, an Artist in Residence grant in Pittsburg, and Wellness grants for each school. The Wellness grants have brought in motivational speaker Ed Gerety, the TIGER program (always a student favorite!), and videographer Dave Kartunen. Other federal grants have allowed us to continue our professional development efforts with consultants from V&S School Solutions and Tom Ledue as well as fund our School Resource Officers. Later in the year, these funds will support our continued learning efforts surrounding Competency Based Education.

## Teacher Licensure

I am currently working with just over a dozen teachers, throughout SAU 7, on licensing procedures. Some individuals only need to complete an assessment to obtain certification, while others are in the process of finishing their courses and corresponding assessments. The NH Department of Education Bureau of Credentialing has experienced several changes over the past year, creating challenges in staying informed. However, I prioritize ensuring that our teacher candidates receive the necessary information to support their success.

## Teacher Mentor Program

This year SAU 7 welcomed 11 new teachers between Colebrook, Pittsburg, and Stewartstown schools. We currently have 10 mentors working with our new teachers on a weekly basis to help ensure a smooth & welcomed transition!


# **Wellness Walk**

Chris Paquette - IT Director

There has been a lot to adjust to this year with my job in particular. I started working within the SAU 7 years ago as an assistant to Clint Brooks as an employee of Pittsburg School. After a year there, my position was moved to be SAU wide. Within those 7 years, I have gone through quite a few changes in the SAU. Multiple superintendents, tech directors, and a business administrator. With these changes came the biggest so far. The opportunity to work as an Interim IT Director.



It has certainly been a learning experience even if I have had to act as a pseudo IT Director at times due to there being gaps in that position as the new directors had not been hired yet. It has certainly humbled me in a few areas, but I feel proud to have been given the chance to prove myself and to the SAU that I am ready to help educate our students through the use of tech we have at our disposal. For this report, I will list a few of the highlights Matt Jordan and Myself have been working on to keep things running smoothly with tech at the SAU.

We spent quite a bit of time working on cleaning up incredibly old backup files that are no longer necessary on our system as well as creating a new schedule for that system that should fill with bloat as much as it did before.

We also performed several updates on all of our servers we run here to be sure we stay in compliance with security updates.

The inventory on our ticketing software has also been updated significantly and is reconfigured to sync with our Google platform again. This will make managing the devices a little bit easier while handling tickets.

Matt and I have been working with a few vendors for a potential new website provider to give our site a more modern look, as well as help our content creators have an easier time updating the sites so we don't have stale content sitting around.

We have done a massive amount of work in Alma with our switch to competency based learning which brought a set of challenges that we didn't anticipate. I did have a little experience in Alma, but not nearly as much as my predecessor, Shane. After his departure in late June / early July, a majority of my Summer was spent so I could try to keep things running as smoothly as possible as I still learn the intricacies of the software.

Matt and I set up 62 chromebooks in Colebrook and 24 Chromebooks in Pittsburg during the Winter break. Things went over well with this transition of moving the students from their old devices to the new ones.

New Access points are being configured now by a third party company that Shane had worked with last year that will give us more reliable connection to the internet, as well as bringing us to the current wifi standard. Our current access points are around 7 years old, so this is a very nice change to have coming shortly.

This doesn't nearly cover everything we have done, but this is already a long read so I will spare you the trouble. Thank you all for reading this and I hope you have a great rest of the year!
