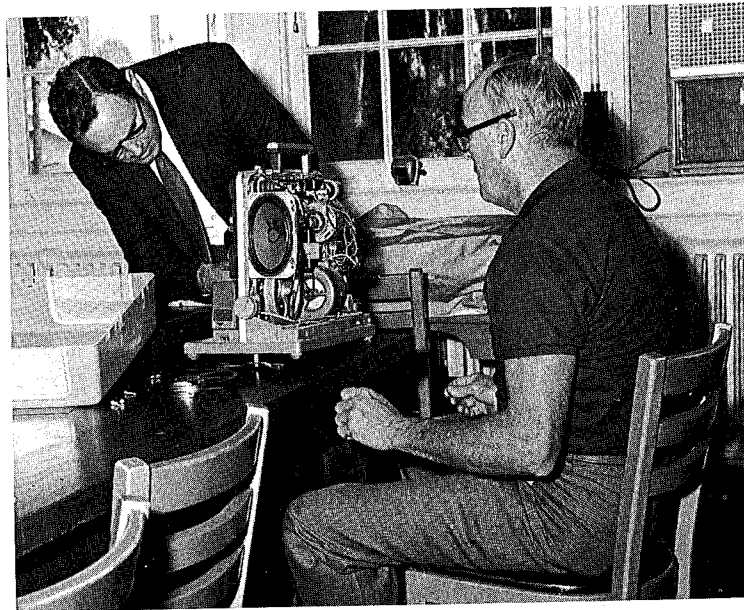




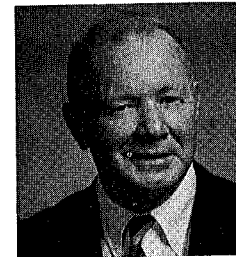
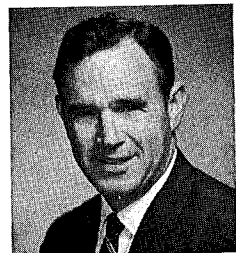
## High school gains new principal

One reason that Lake Wales High School runs so smoothly is the friendly, efficient administration of school affairs by both the area and high school offices.

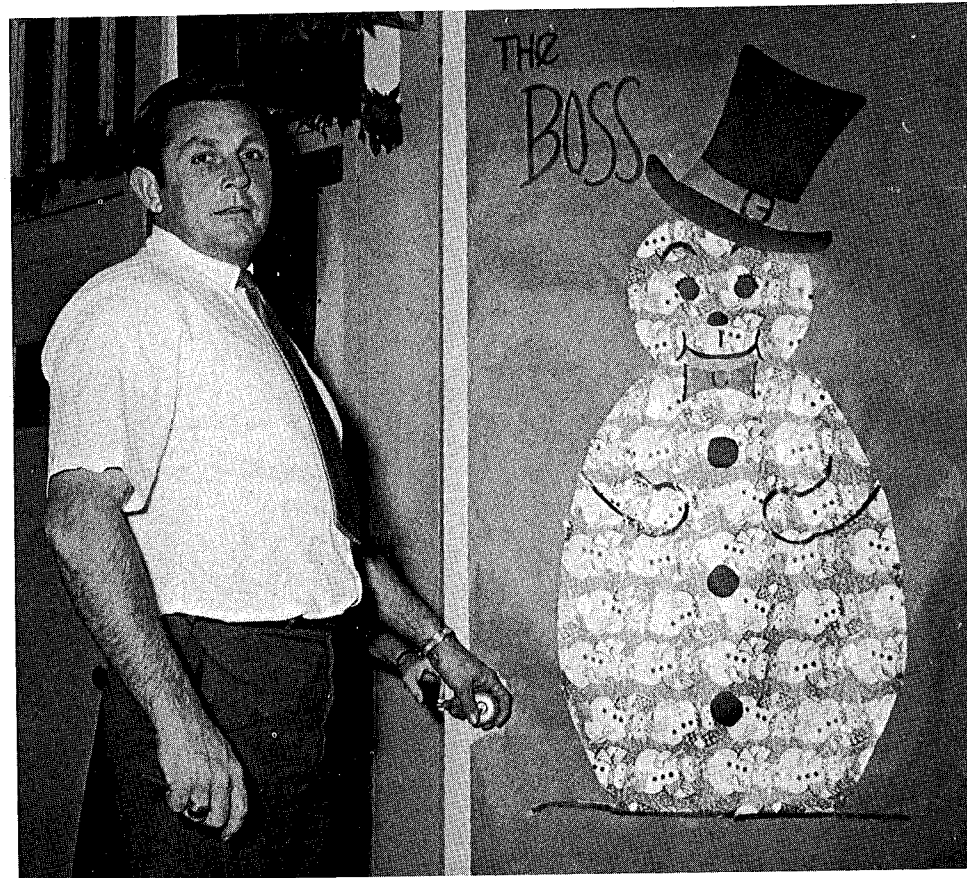

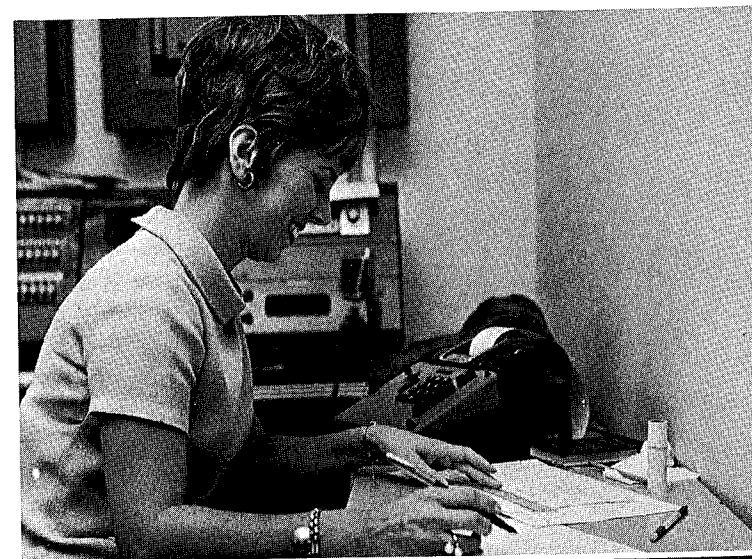


## Associate teachers assist faculty

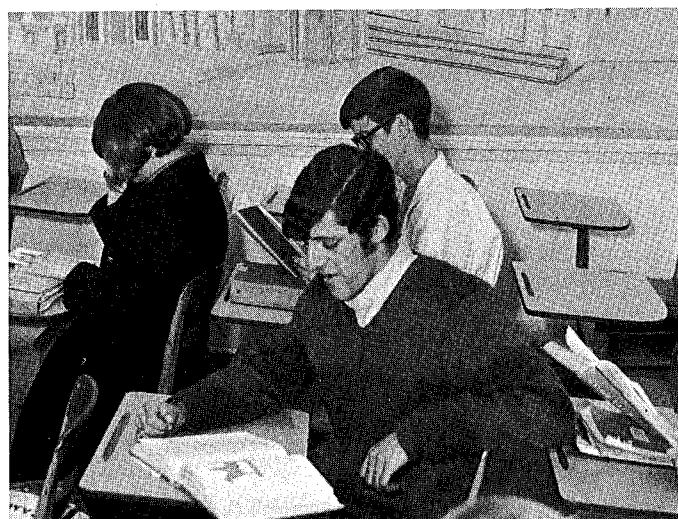
## Languages broaden communication

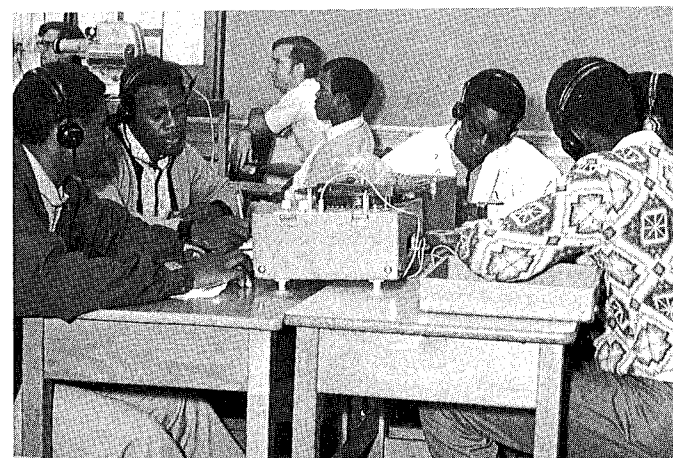

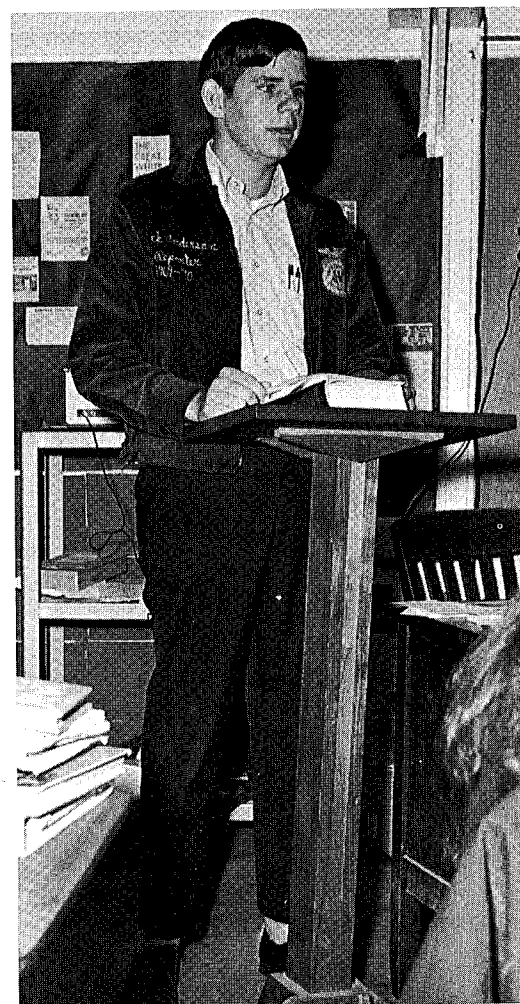

## Speech, reading, and drama broaden curriculum

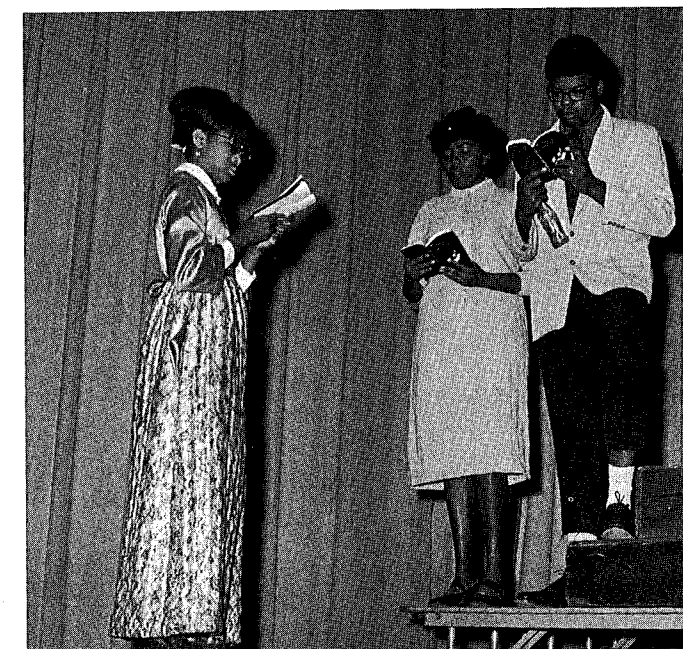


Reading students use electronic devices to improve their skill.

## Students relate English to life

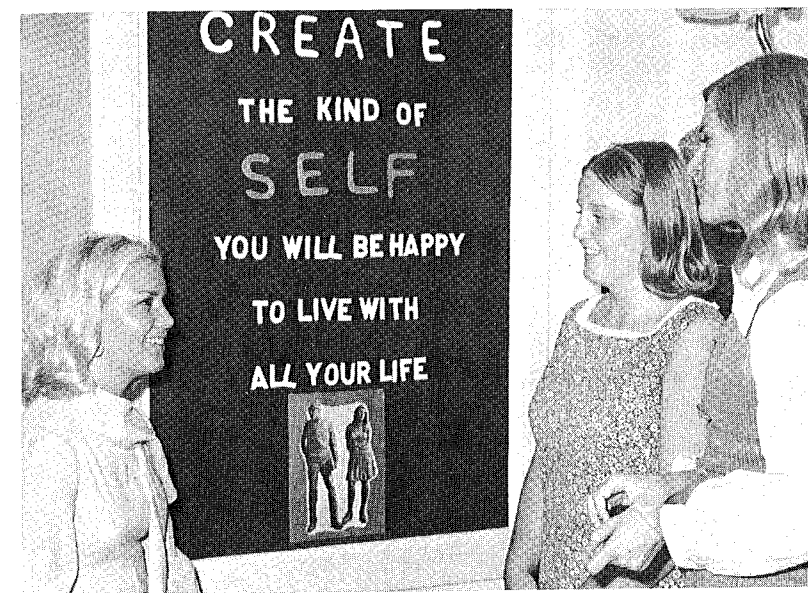

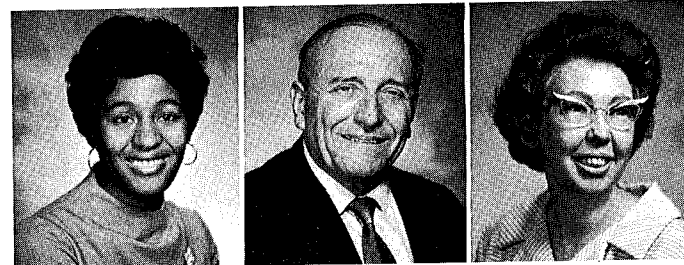
## Social studies students endeavor to understand

## Math meets the needs of all students

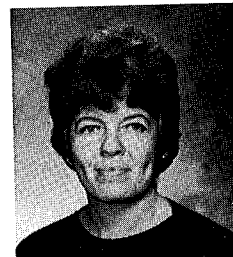

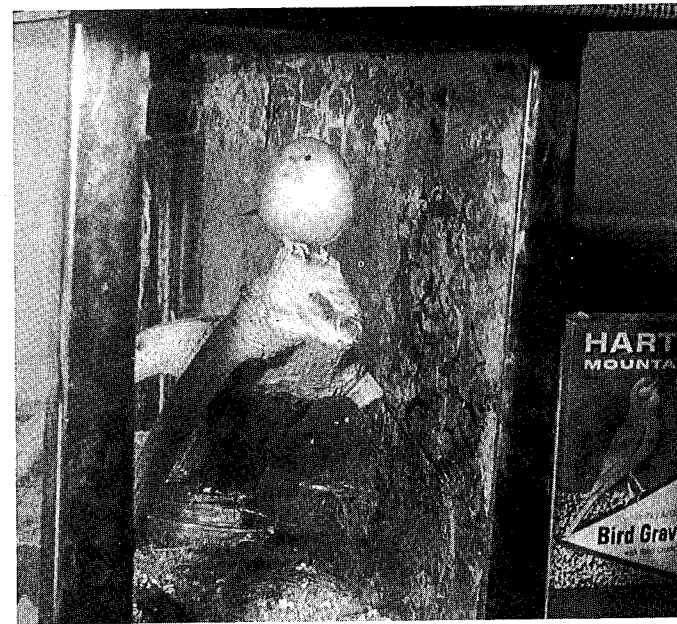


## Science study enlarges understanding of life

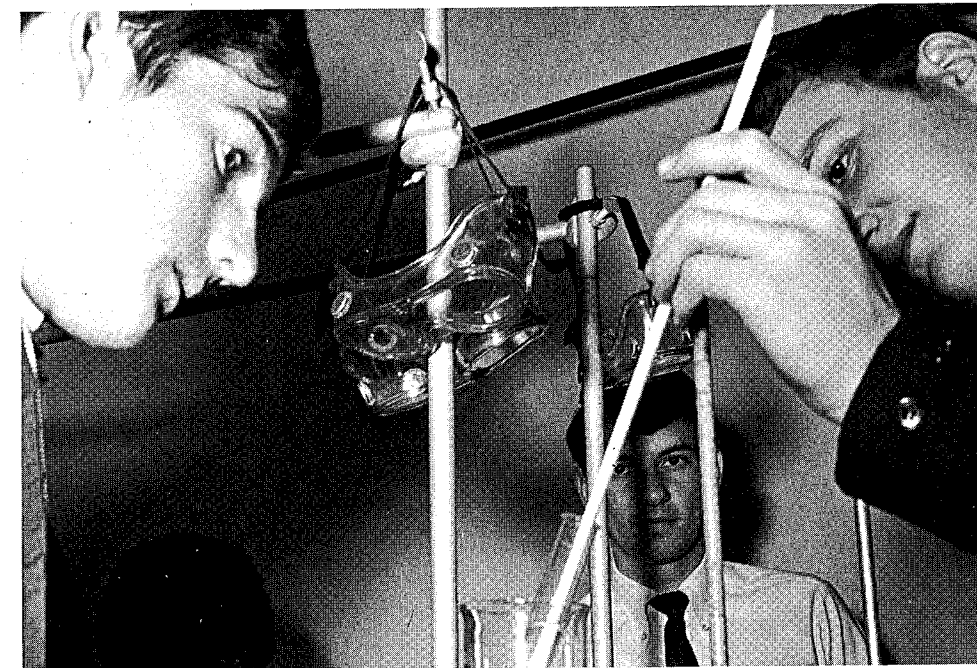
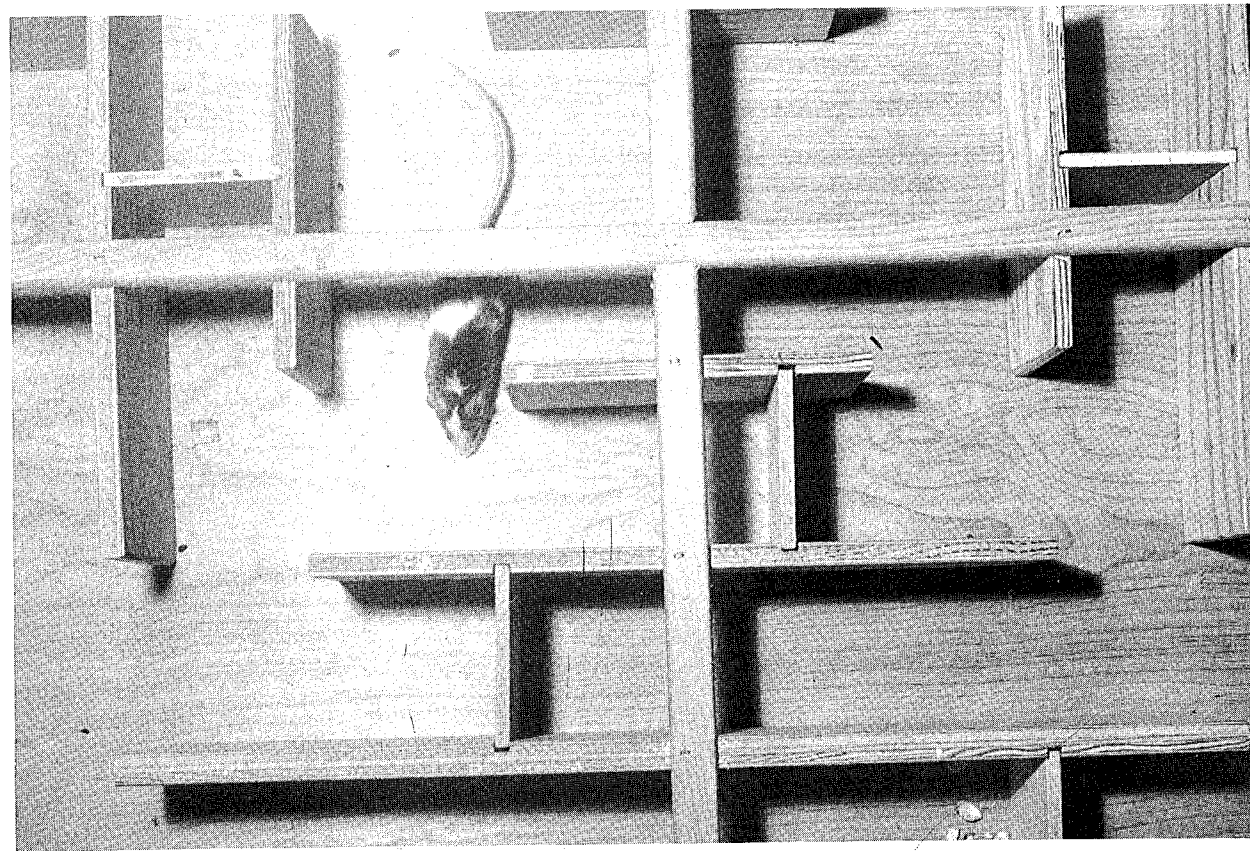

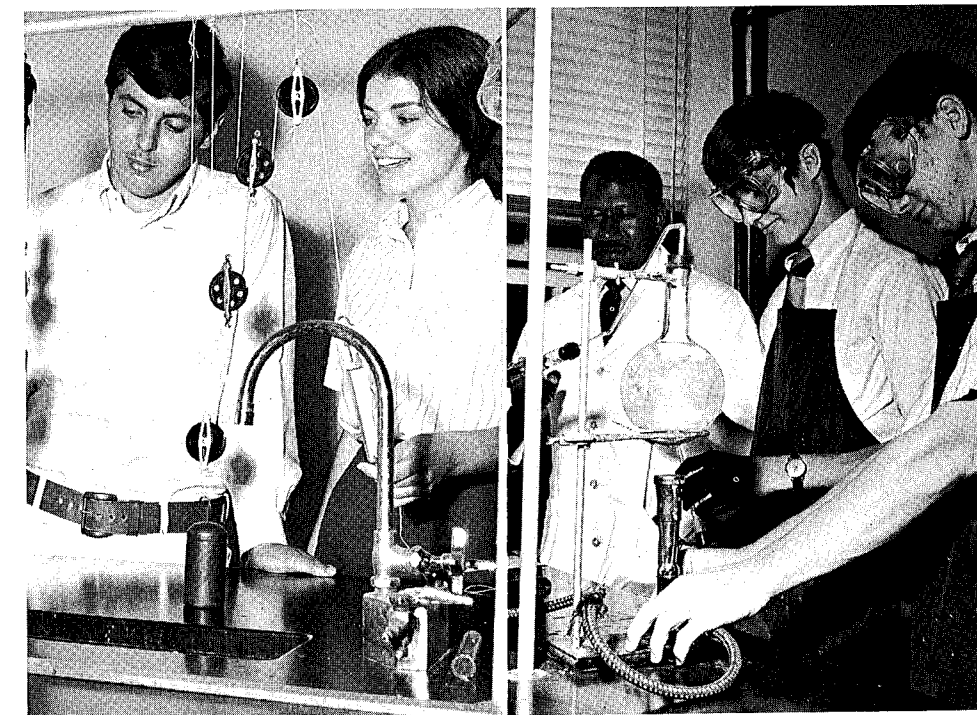
To add to the effectiveness of the science curriculum, the science faculty initiated team-teaching methods in chemistry and introduced the highly laboratory-orientated Biology Research course.



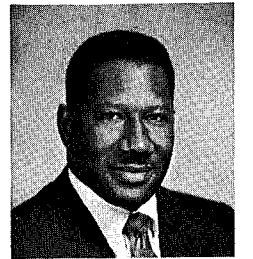
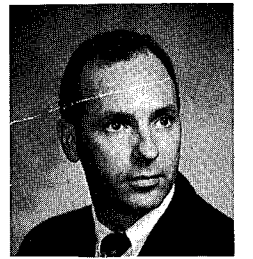
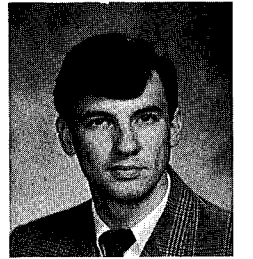
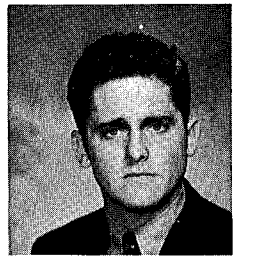

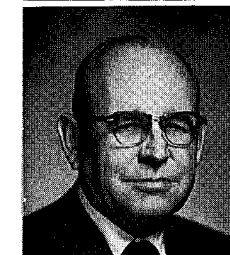
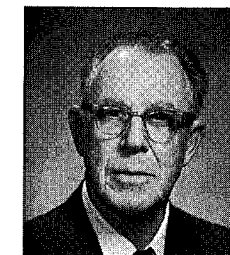
The students in DCT, agriculture, and industrial arts learn by doing. They practice skills that will enable them to find jobs when they leave high school.

These courses are designed so that students will be prepared to find work without further schooling.

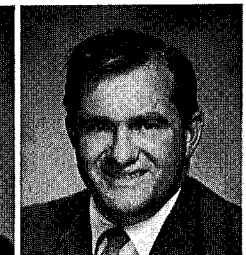
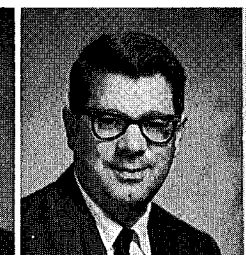

Comfortable classrooms and large work areas contain all the equipment which the student might need to learn his trade.



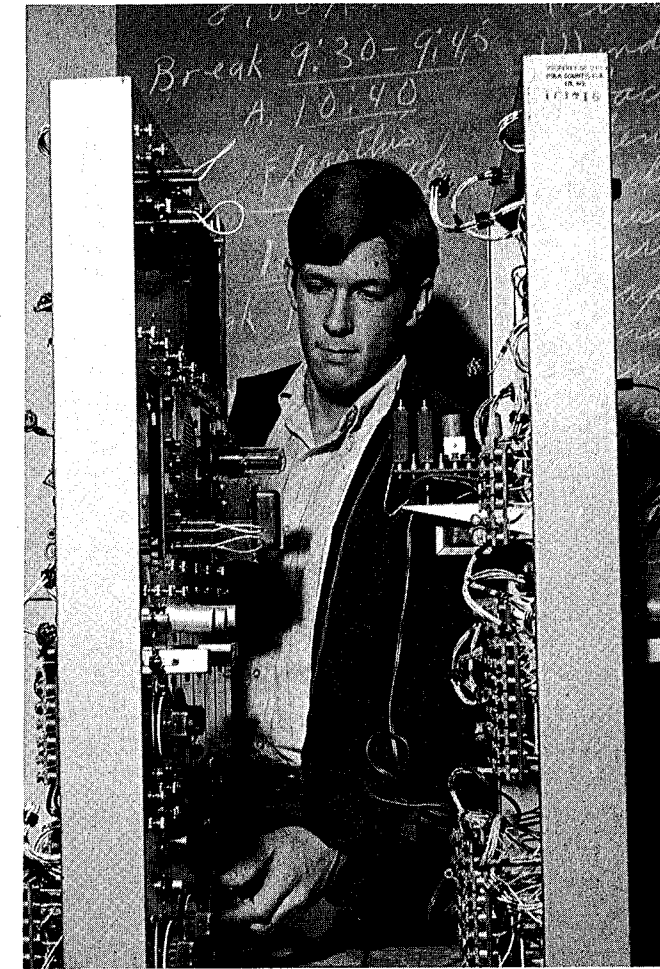

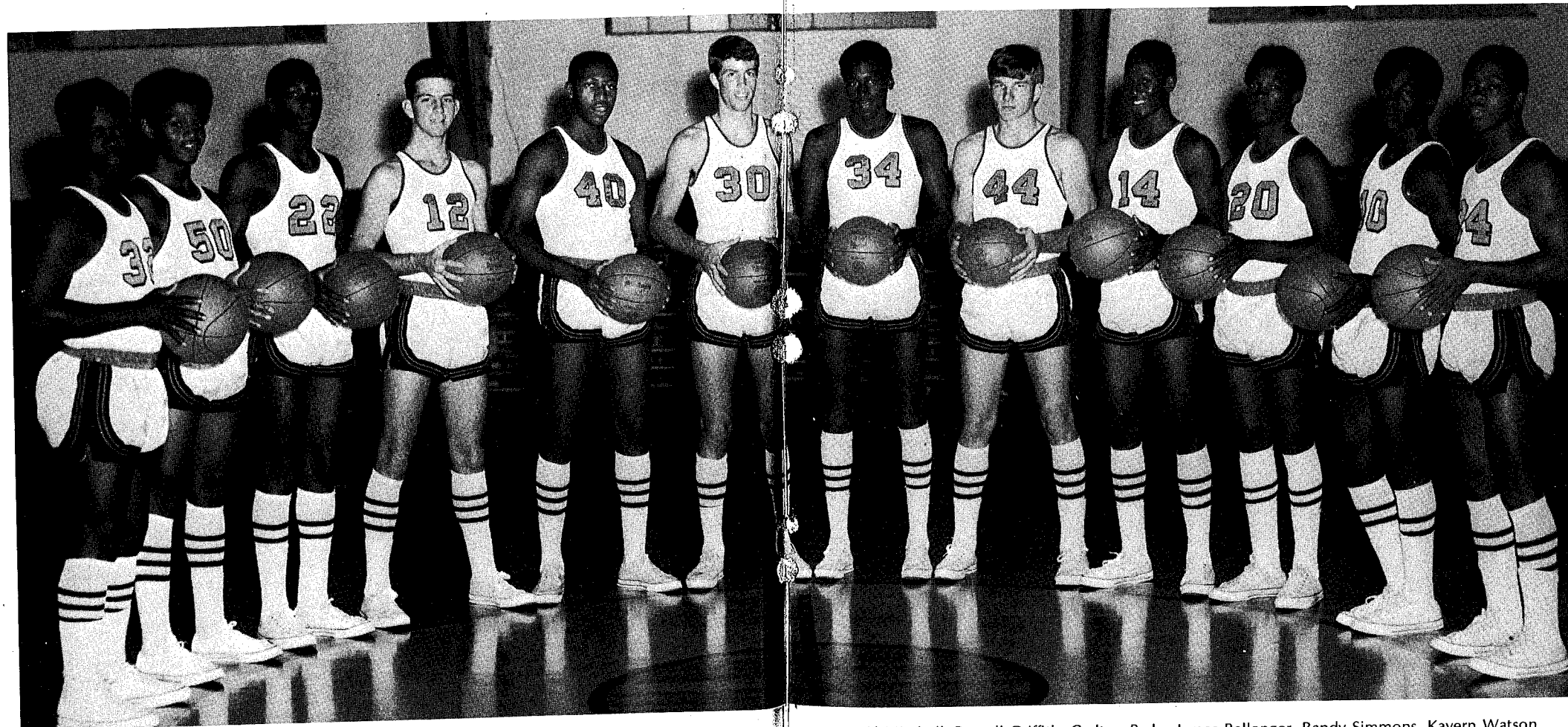
Great effort, skill, and teamwork helped the Highlanders capture the SWFC championship.

Led by coach Paul Todd, the Highlander basketball team fought their way to the Southwest Florida Conference basketball championship. After winning their first game against highly rated Middleton, they went on to post a 20-5 season.

Important and exciting games for the Highlanders were the conference contests with Bartow and Plant City. In the first game with Bartow, the Highlanders were victorious 86-57; but the second game proved to be a challenge with Bartow winning in overtime. The Highlanders first game against Plant City was far from a fast game. Plant City stalled the ball when in the lead, but in the fourth quarter Lake Wales played Plant City's game and pulled out a one point win to beat the Panthers 48-47.

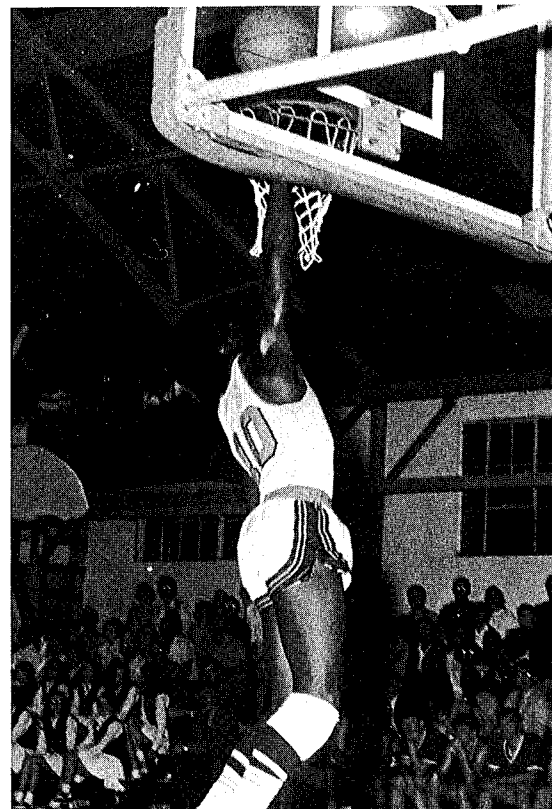

Practice and good teamwork enabled both the Lake Wales Highlander boys' and girls' tennis teams to capture the Southwest Florida Conference championship.

For the boys, it was their third consecutive championship, and they ended the season with a perfect 9-0 conference record. Finishing fourth in district play behind three very good Class AA schools, the team finished second at the Polk County tournament behind Lakeland, which was the only team to beat them in regular season play.

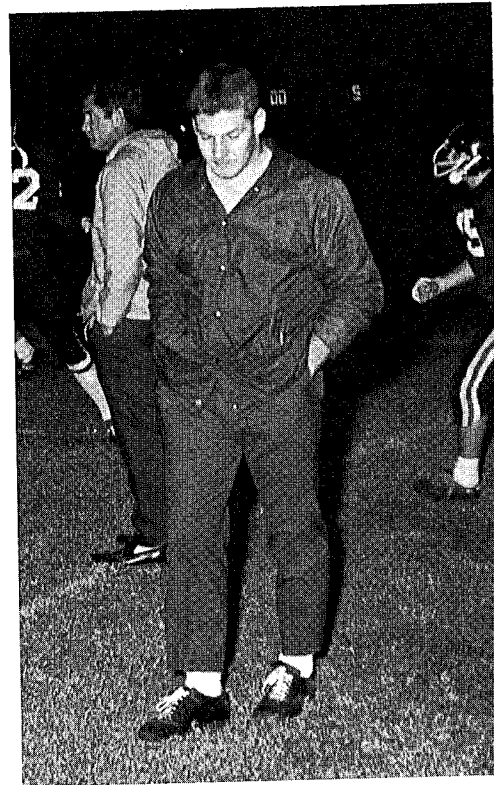
The girls' tennis team was second to no one on their way to winning the SWFC title this year. Losing only three sets to Bartow, the team completed a season record of 9-0 in conference play. The girls also took the number one position in the county tournaments where Julie Albritton and Mary Scherer won first place in their divisions. 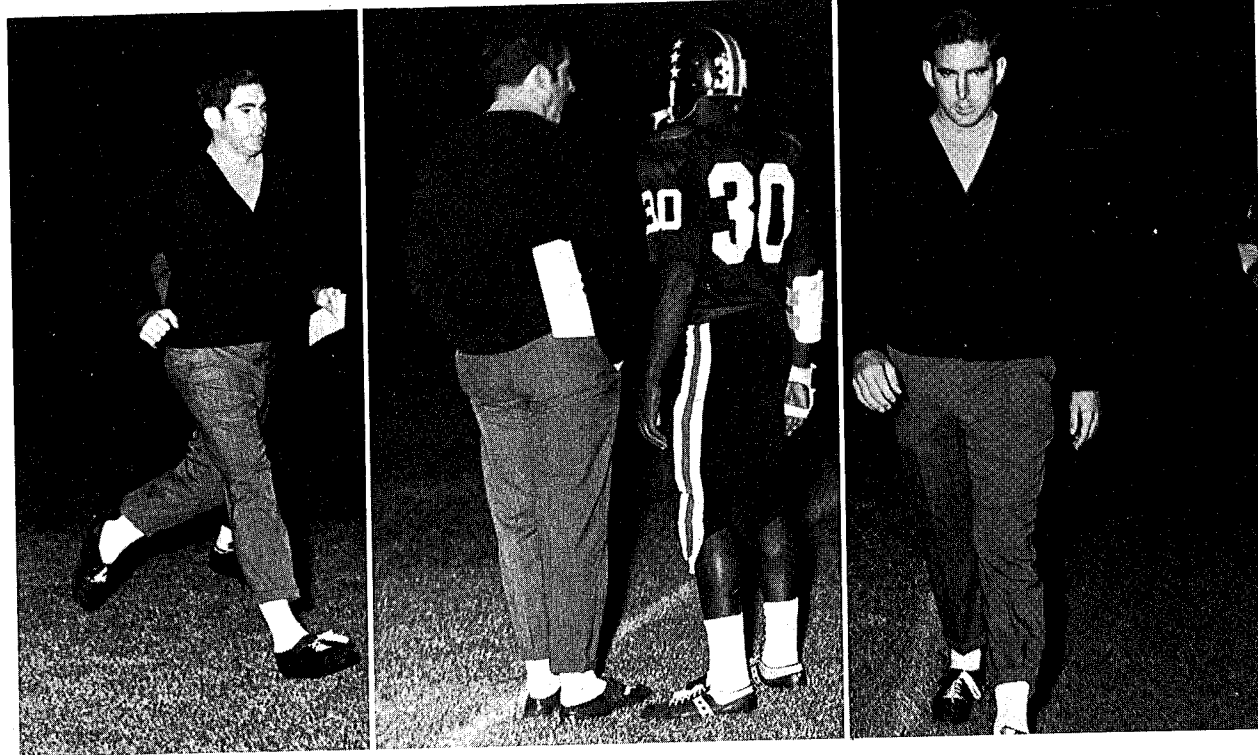
## Despite tough schedule Highlanders post 5-5 season

Mike Ferrell pitched a no-hitter against the Haines City Hornets and with teamwork the Highlanders were victorious 2-0.

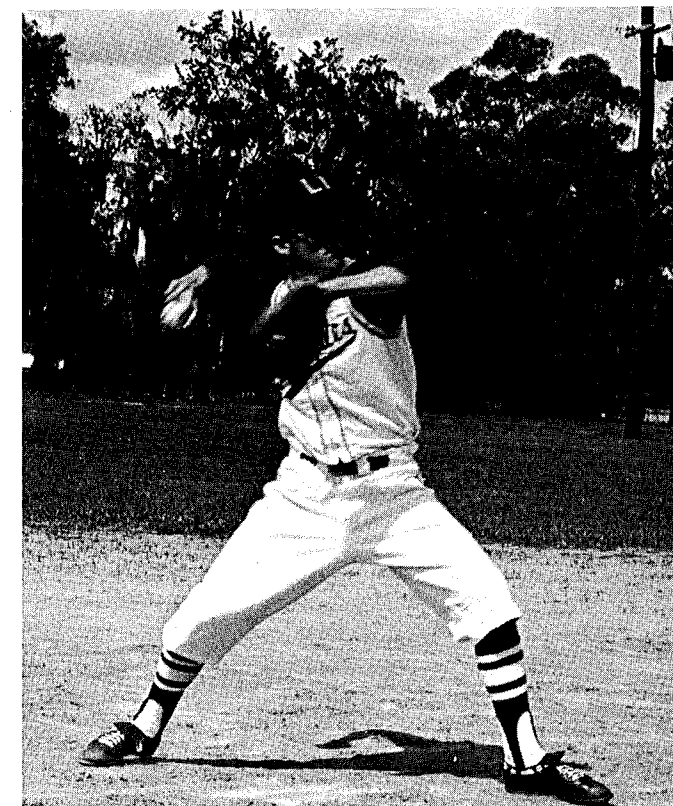

Clark Webb shoots out of a sand trap.

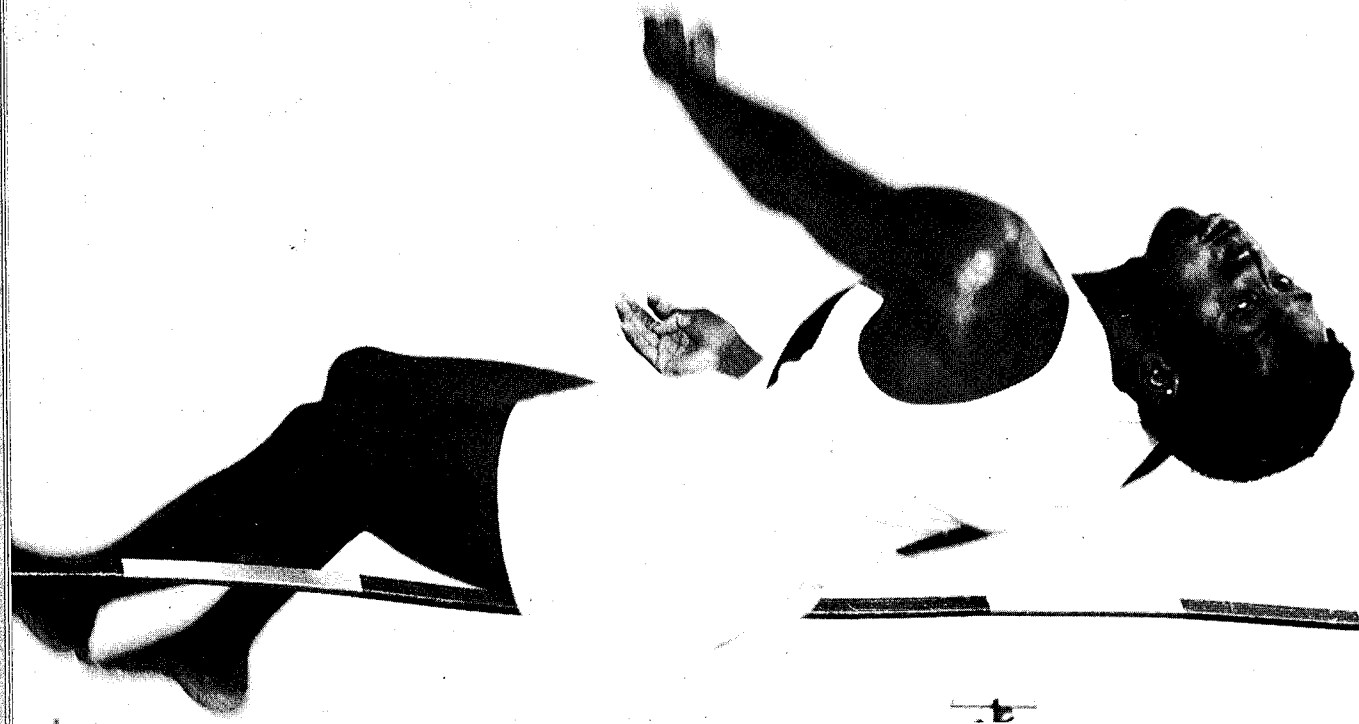

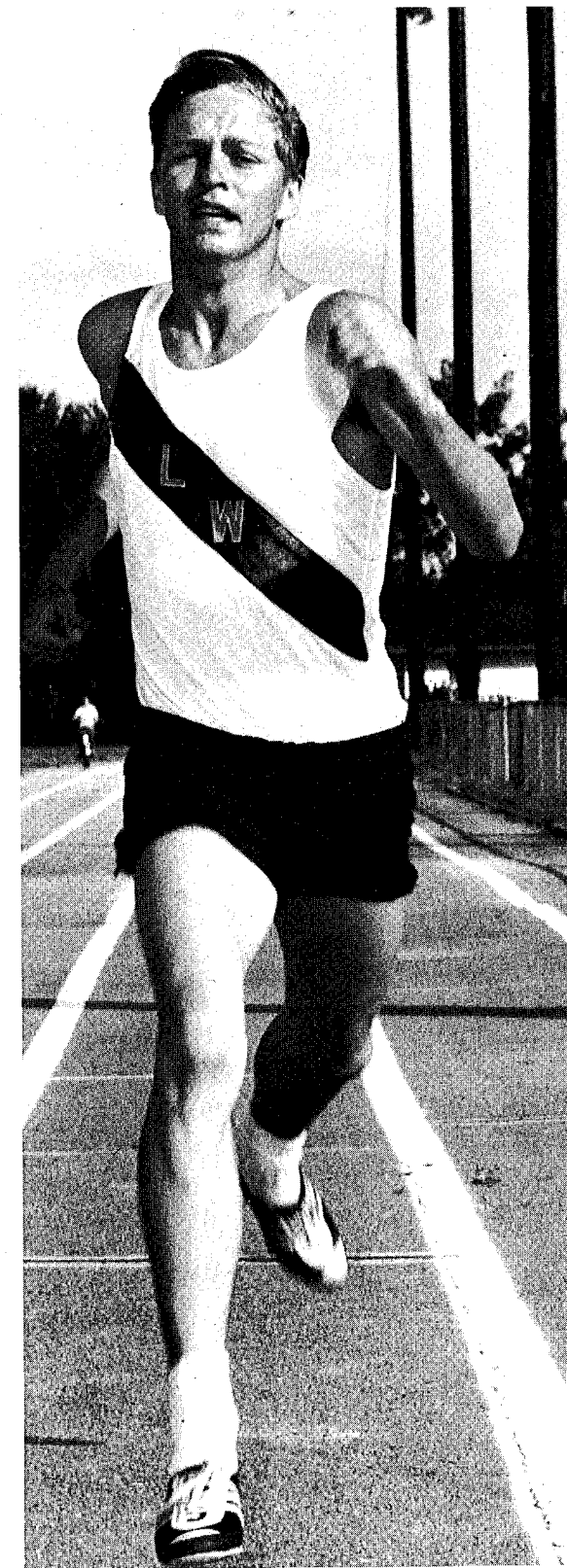

Al Mitchell breaks record with jump of six feet three.

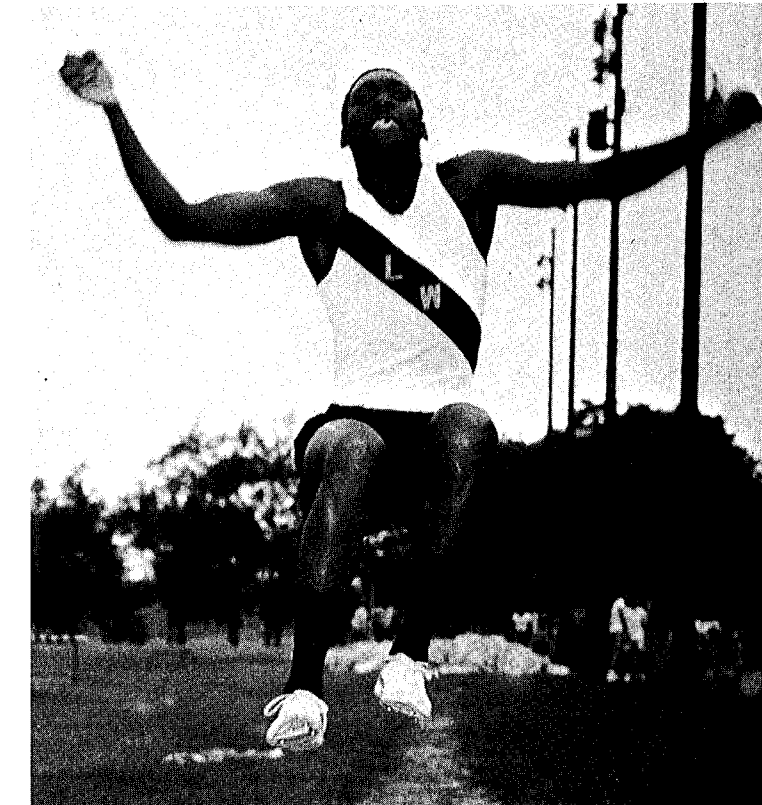

Ronnie Ward runs the 880-yard run.

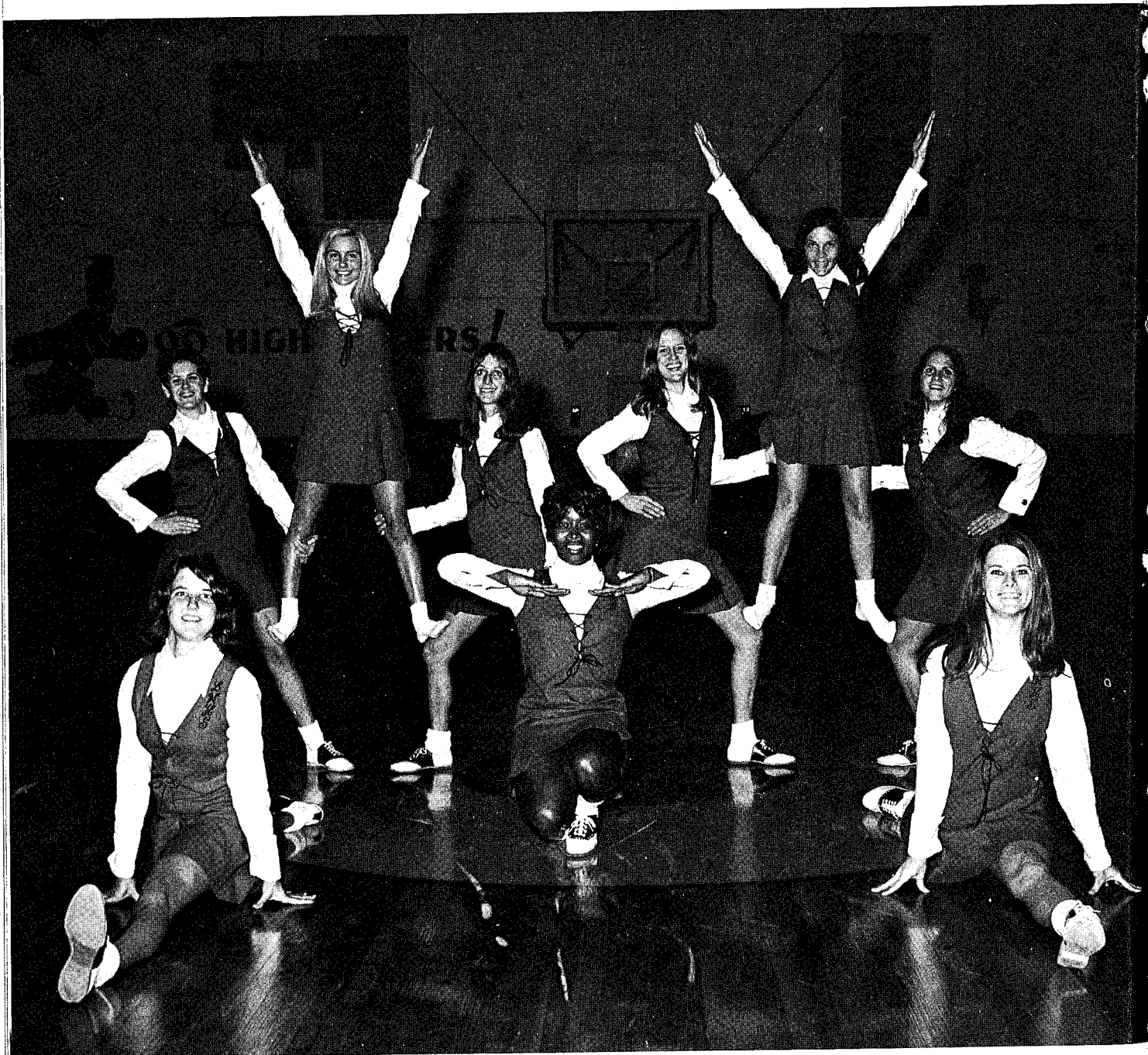
Under the coaching of Howard Barnhardt the Highlander track team broke five of the fourteen existing records. The broad jump record was broken by Robert Parks with a leap of 21 ft. 7 in., surpassing the old record of 21 ft. 5 in. Johnny James recorded a 50.0 sec. time for the 440-yd. run, breaking the old mark of 50.5 sec. The sprint medley relay team recorded a time of 1:57.4 to break the standing record of 2:04. Running for this year's time breaking score were Johnny James, Willie Cobb, Donald Grant, and Richard Ramsey. The same foursome with Mitchell Ware substituting for James broke the 880 relay mark with a 1:29.3 in a conference meet. Al Mitchell cleared the cross bar at 6 ft. 3 in. Mitchell's leap broke the existing record of 6 ft. ½ in.

Practice and hard work enabled the team to establish these new track records.



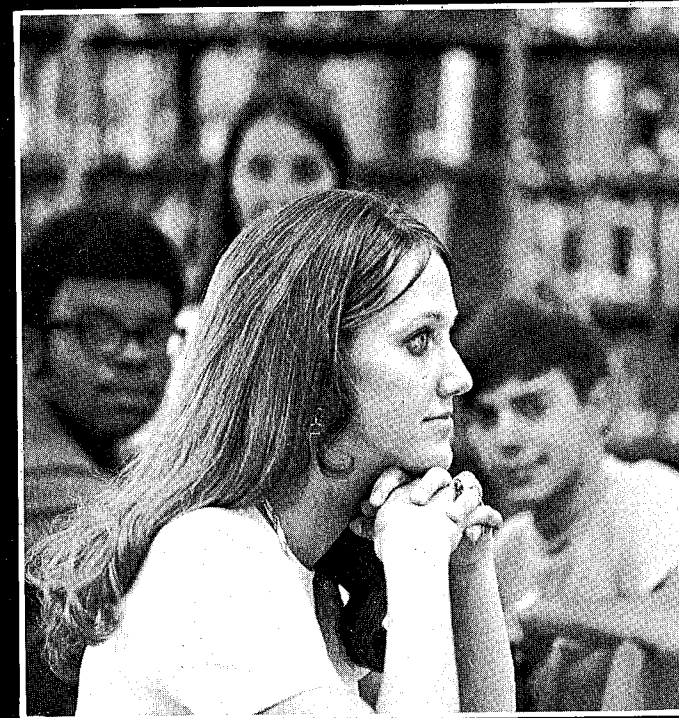
Robert Parks breaks Lake Wales broad jump record.

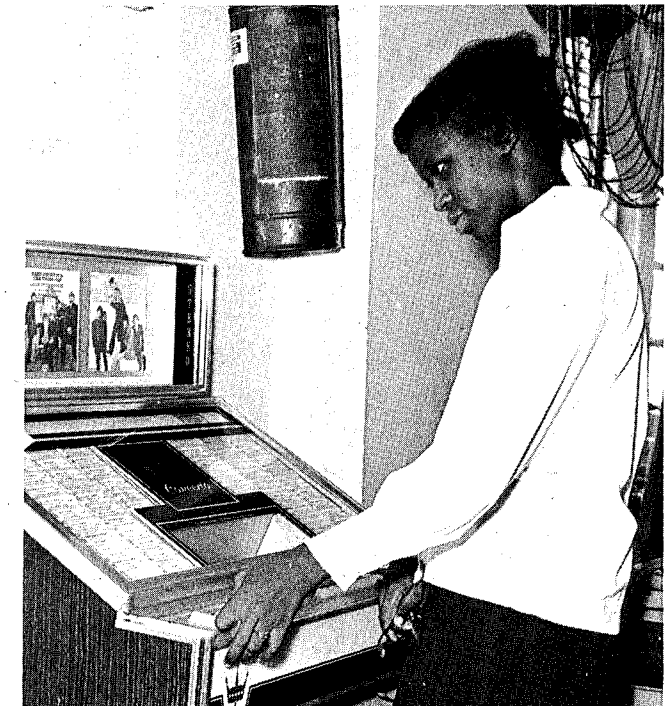

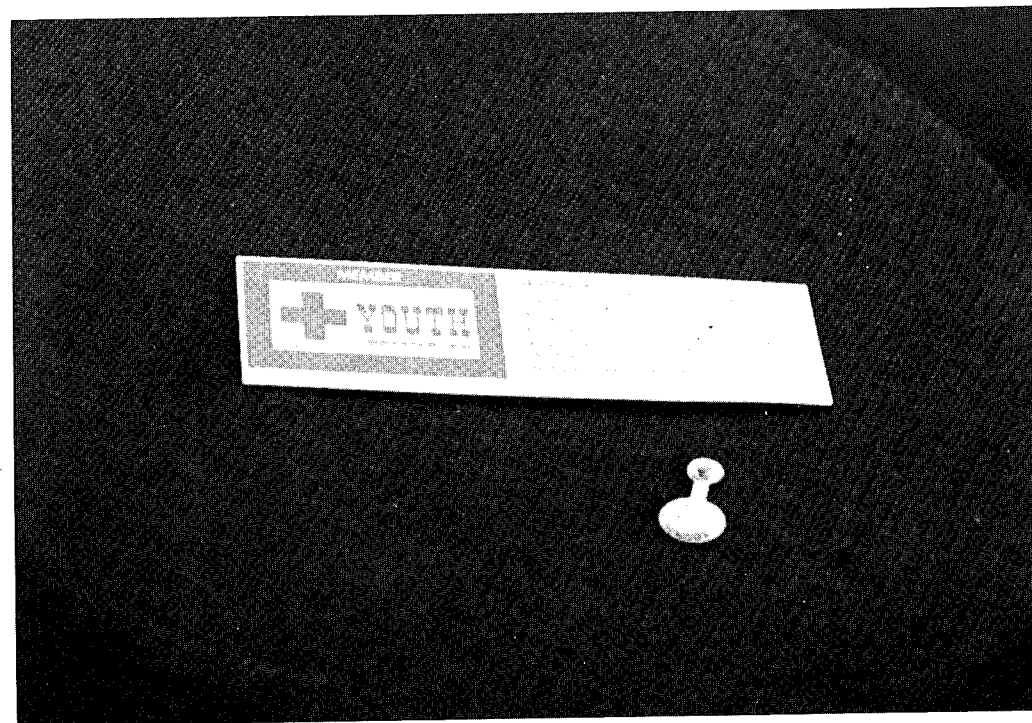


## Red cross drive tops last year's donations

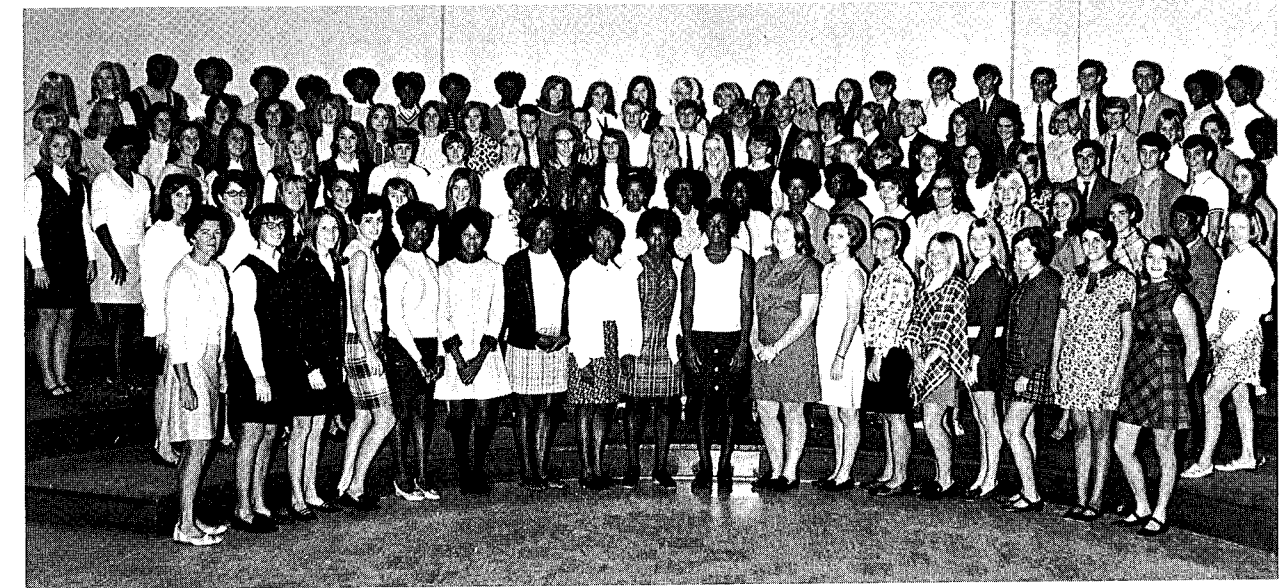

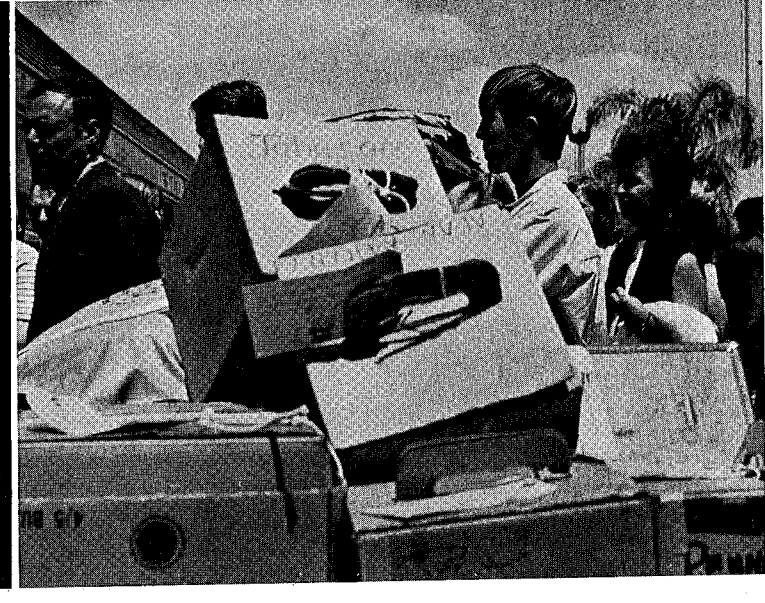
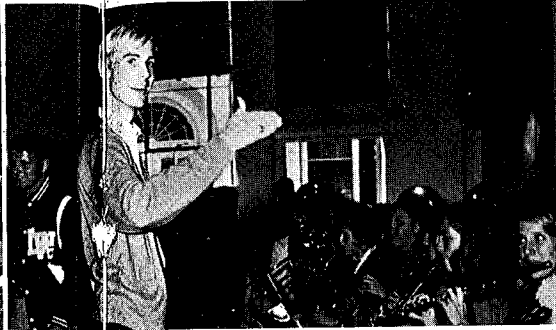
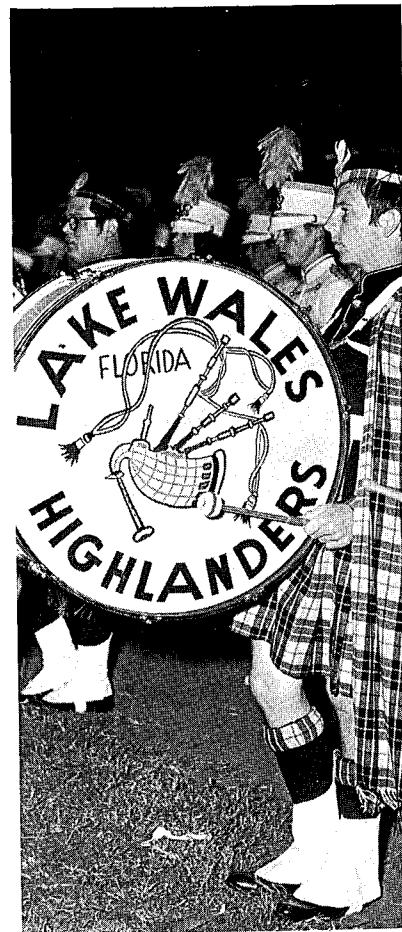


## Highlanders march in Cherry Blossom Festival

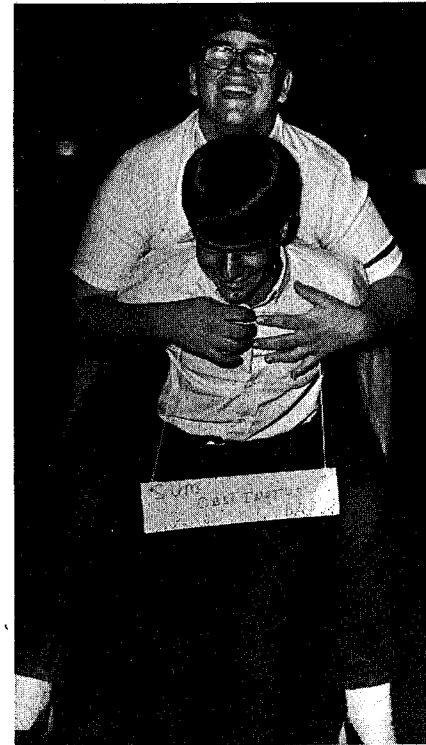

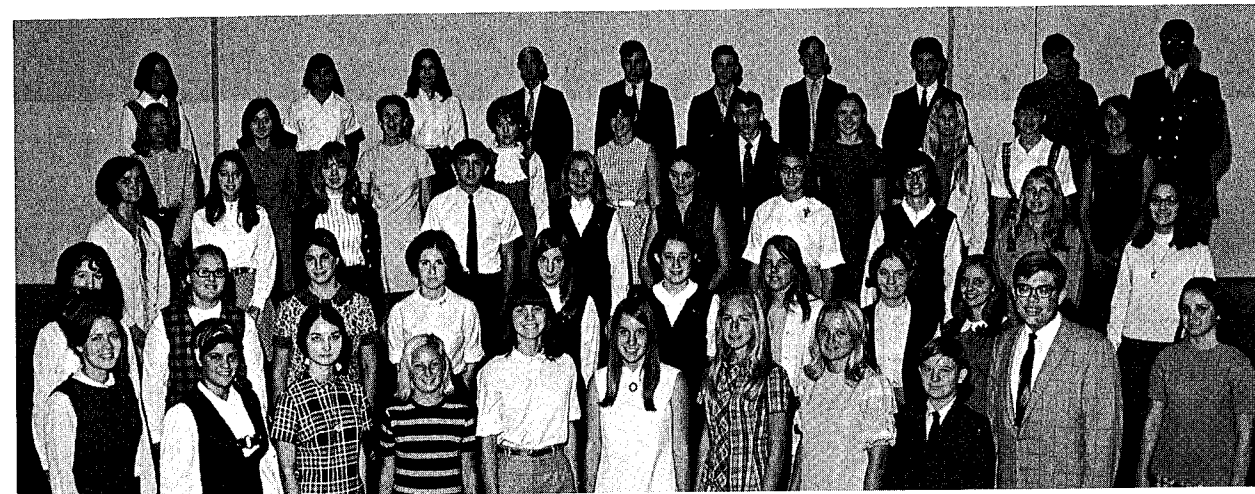

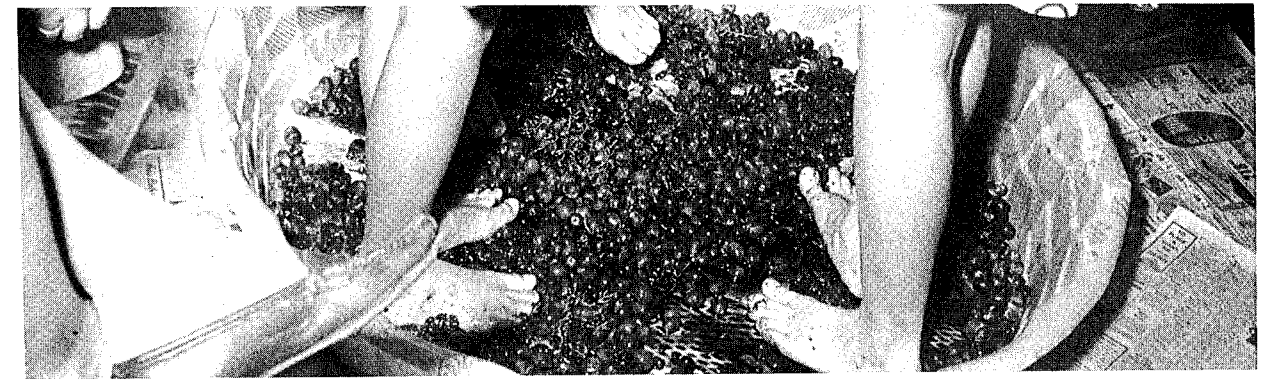

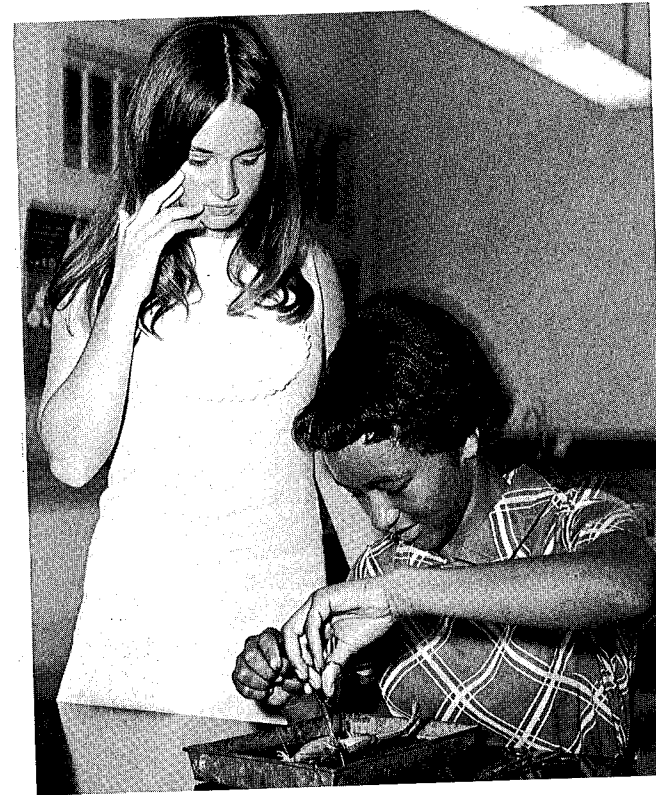




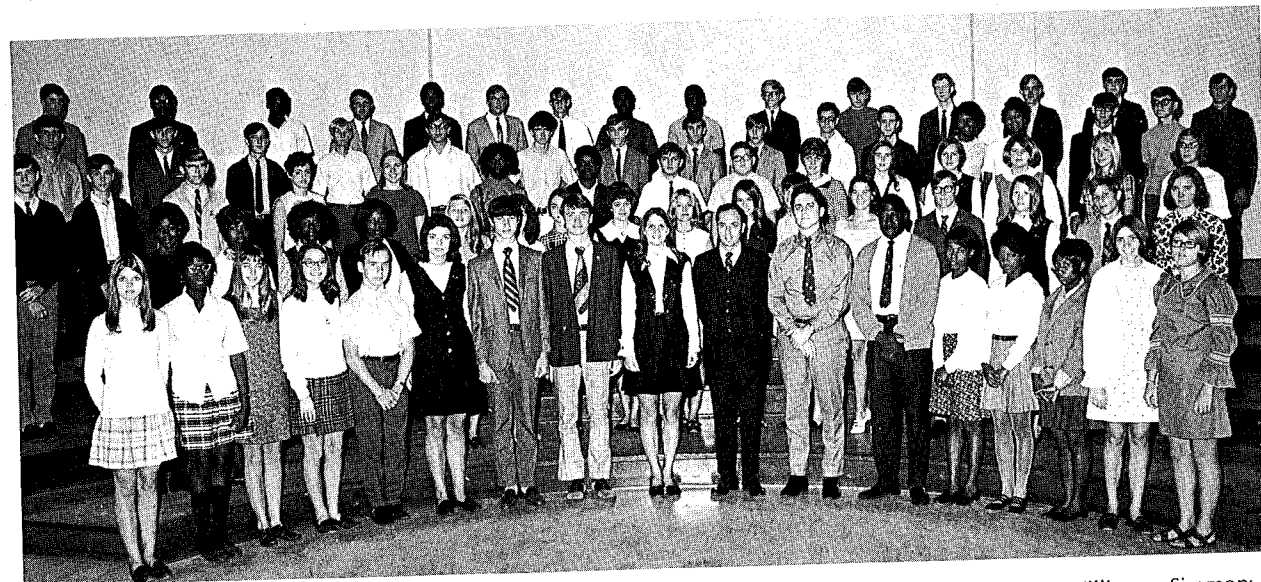
## Science Club co-ordinates Earth Day

Science Club stresses the learning of our environment through observation and experimentation. Their activities included coordinating Earth Day activities by making signs and posters and marching in protest to pollution.

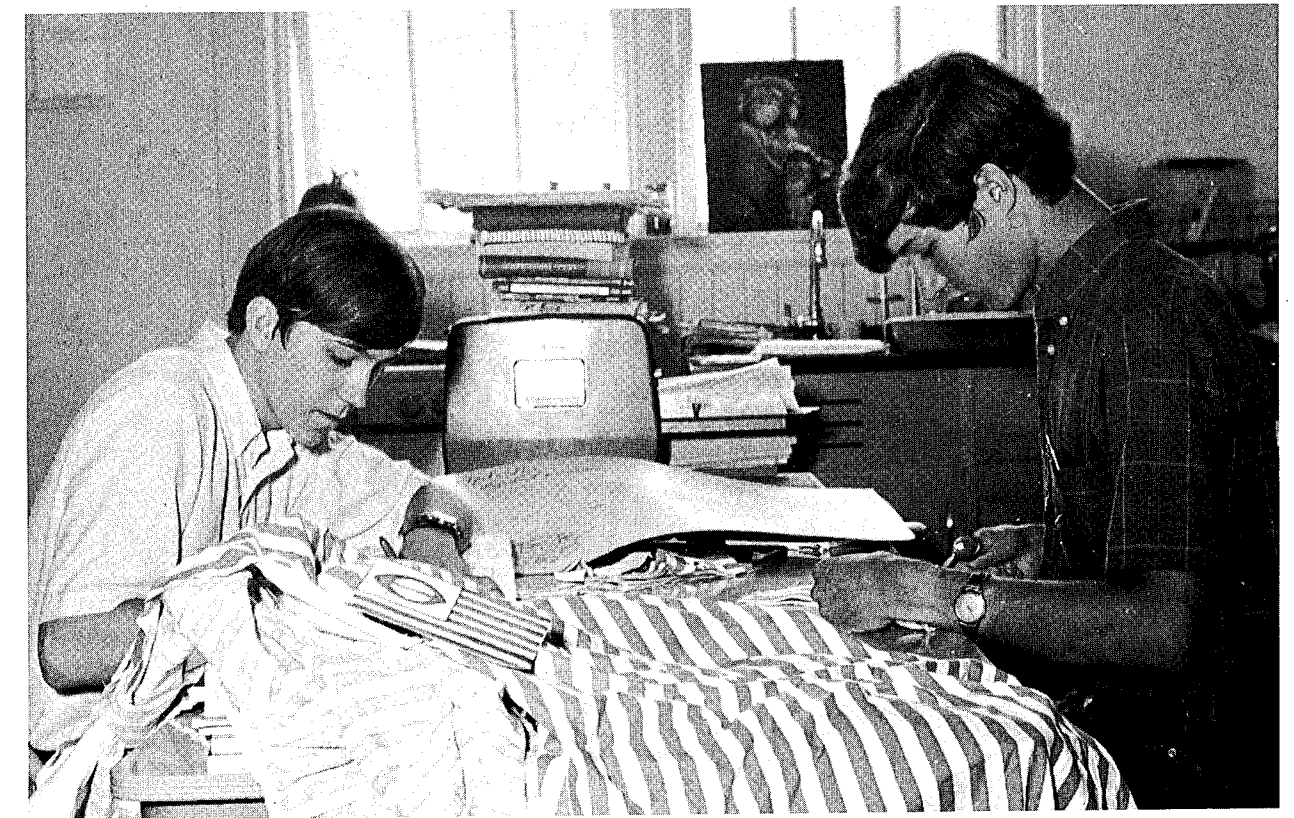

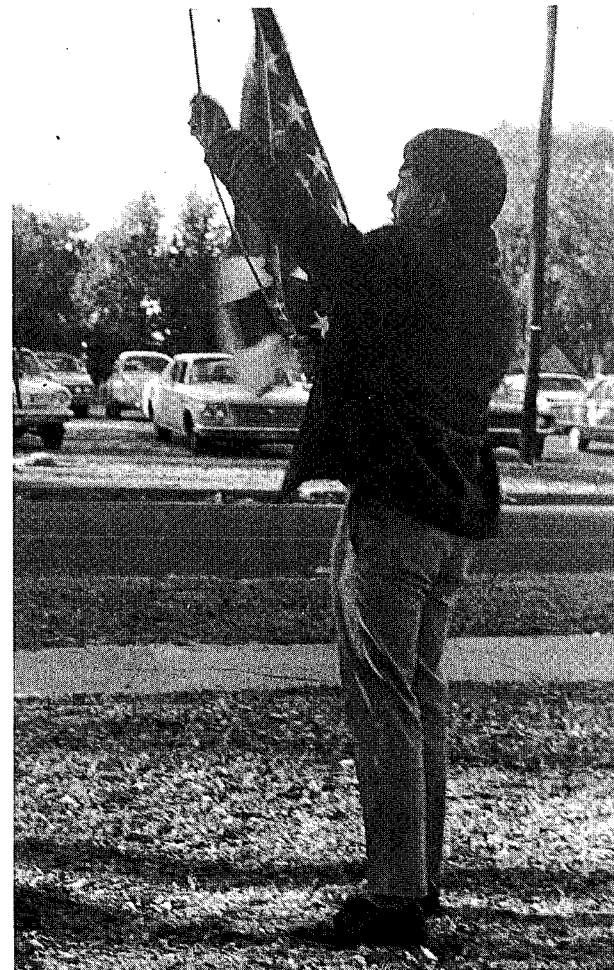

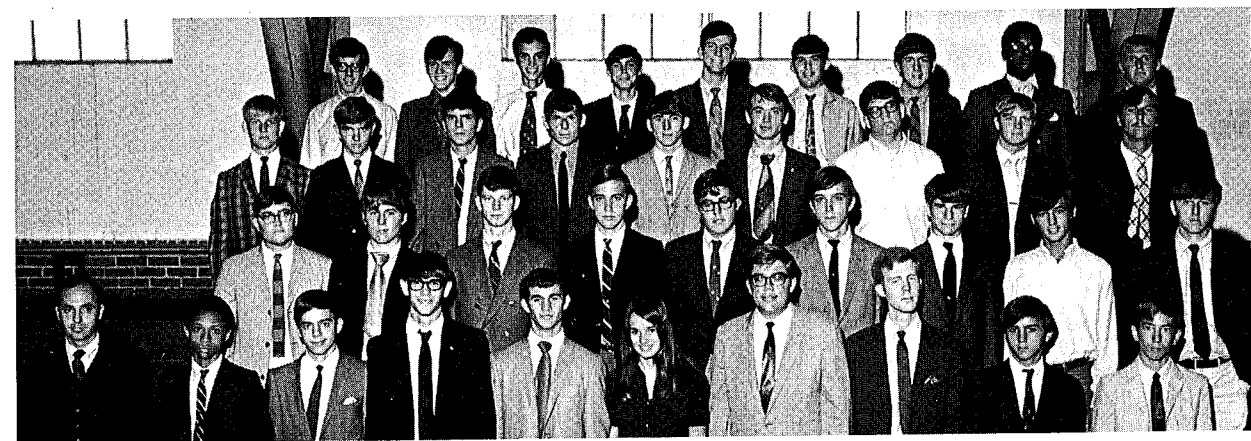


## Interact paints Alma Mater sign for auditorium

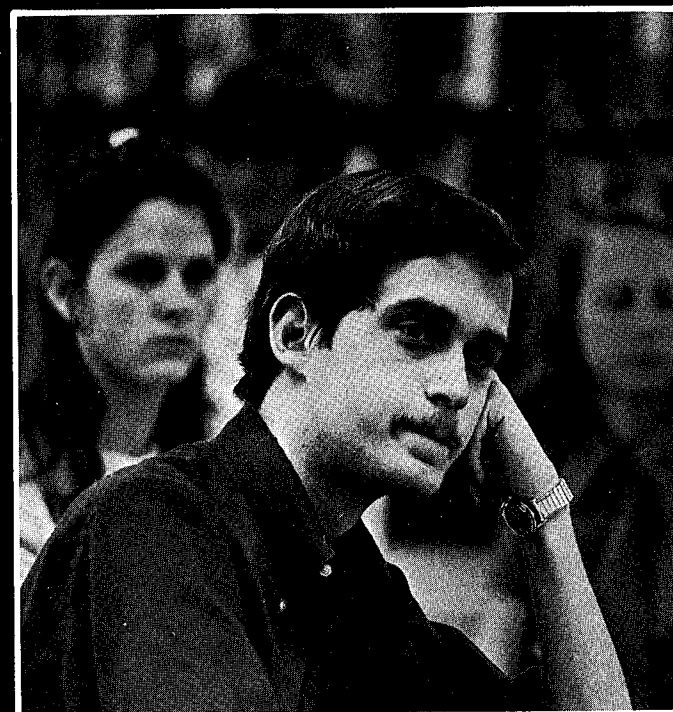
