

LINDSEY STUDENT SUPPORT CENTER

The Lindsey Student Support Center hosted summer fun activities throughout the months of June and July. The Student Services Department, along with six high school volunteers, supported seventy-seven students from across the district. Our school food nutrition staff served over 414 school lunches at LSSC. Each day, students could come inside to eat their lunch and enjoy a lunchtime movie for entertainment. Student Services staff developed activities for the students that incorporated both learning and summertime favorites! Some activities the students enjoyed were Arts and Crafts, Sundaes on Mondays, Wellness Wednesday, and Popcorn & Problem Solving. Special visitors from the Warner Robins Fire Department and the Houston County Sheriff's Office also came to teach the students about fire safety and first responder professions. The summer activities concluded with a Back-to-School Kick-Off Week, which incorporated multiple academic review opportunities along with a School Supply Scavenger Hunt. Overall, the summer fun activities at the Lindsey Student Support Center were enjoyed by all who participated!





Project AWARE received 289 referrals during the 2022-2023 school year. Students in 8th grade represented the highest number for referrals followed by 7th and 9th graders. Of those 289 student referrals, we helped 153 families establish ongoing therapeutic relationships with providers in our local community. There were 35 schools that accessed Project AWARE services during the 2022-2023 school year.

In collaboration with the District and School Effectiveness office, Project AWARE collected over 24,000 universal behavior screeners from our primary/elementary grade students during the 2022-2023 school year. The information was used to guide discussions and strategize interventions for both teacher and student-centered support. As a part of our ongoing efforts to proactively identify barriers to learning, Project AWARE will expand universal behavior screening to all middle schools during the 2023-2024 school year. The screeners will begin in September 2023. Parents will have the opportunity to opt their student out of both the primary/elementary screener and the middle school screener. As an additional resource, Dr. Emily Graybill, behavioral screener field expert from Georgia State University will host two trainings detailing both the research and the efficacy surrounding universal behavior screenings in the school environment.



TEACHER SPOTLIGHT

This month our spotlight shines on Mrs. Charmeka Overstreet from Lake Joy Primary School. Mrs. Overstreet worked as a Program Director for twenty years with a non-profit organization for at-risk children. Nine of those years were spent working with children who dropped out of school. When she was working with these young people, she realized she was on the wrong side of education and pursued a career in education. She has been teaching at LJPS for two years, and she also serves as department chair. She shared that she enjoys working under the great leadership of Dr. Kiefer. "The Administrative team and teachers at LJPS have welcomed me with open arms and allowed me to grow like wildflowers. I take my job seriously and have a strong passion for educating students." What makes Mrs. Overstreet exceptional is when she recognizes a need, she figures out a way to provide it for her students. For example, she put together a fundraiser and pulled together enough money to purchase basketballs for her students and followed this with raising donations to provide 110 basketballs for each student participating in this summer's ESY program. Mrs. Overstreet raised enough funds for 40 additional basketballs, which were donated to Westside and Miller Elementary Schools.

Mrs. Overstreet is married to Dr. Michael Overstreet, who is the Principal of Dublin High School. They have three beautiful children Ashley, Jay and Zion and one grandson Ashton. Credit Recovery

ESY PROGRAM

The Student Services Department offered a four-week Credit Recovery opportunity at Northside High School and Perry High School. The high school teachers, counselors, and Program Specialists from all five high schools worked together to identify students in grades 9-12 who were credit deficient. This opportunity was available to these students through their Individual Education Plans. The program was held June 5th through June 30th, Monday-Friday, from 7:30am-12:00pm. Students attended in person Monday through Thursday and participated virtually on Fridays. Students were allowed to attend in-person on Fridays to work with teachers as needed. A total of 121 students attended the program in-person and 4 students participated virtually due to specific needs. The goal is for these students to participate in the required courses to get back on track for graduation; therefore, increasing the Houston County graduation rate for students with disabilities. A total of 353 courses were completed during the four weeks and 6 students were able to graduate. These students participated in the county-wide summer graduation program, which was held on July 20, 2023 at Warner Robins High School.
