Amira

- Amira Learning is like a smart, friendly reading coach that listens, helps, and encourages your child as they learn to read

Amira shares information with teachers so they know exactly where your child is doing well and where they need a little more help.




How to Access Amira

- ❖ i-Ready is an online program that helps students grow in reading and math.
 - It's not just another set of worksheets... it's more like a learning coach on the computer.
- The program gives your child short lessons that match exactly what they need to practice, based on their current skill level and the results from their diagnostic assessment.
- Teachers also use i -Ready to see where each student is excelling and where they might need extra support, so learning can be more personalized in the classroom
 - Small Group Instruction



Benefits of iready

- Personalized Lesson:
 - → i-Ready adjusts to your child's level, giving them
 practice that's not too easy and not too hard
- Builds Confidence:
 - ➤ Kids can learn at their own pace and celebrate progress along the way.

Iready expectations

- Students are expected to have 45 minutes in both reading and math every week
- Students are also expected to pass 2 lessons with an 80% or higher in both reading and math every week.

- Children can choose what interests them
 - Adventure stories, science books, comics, or even "read -to-me" books where the computer reads the story out loud.

 - ➤ Kids can explore fiction, nonfiction, audiobooks, and videos —helping them find books they want to read.
- Encourages a Love of Reading:
 - Because children pick topics they're excited about, they often read more.
- Supports Different Reading Levels:
 - With options like "read -to-me" and audiobooks, even struggling readers can enjoy books.
- Safe & Kid -Friendly:
 - Epic is designed just for children, so parents and teachers can feel comfortable letting kids explore freely.

MAP Growth

- MAP Growth is an assessment that helps teachers understand what your child knows and what they are ready to learn next in reading and math.
 - Unlike traditional tests that just give a score or grade, MAP Growth adjusts to each student
 - If your child answers a question correctly, the next one may be a little harder; if they get it wrong, the next one will be a bit easier.
- This way, it shows a clear picture of your child's individual learning level, no matter if they are working above or below grade level.



- Personalized Information:
 - Helps teachers see exactly where your child is in their learning journey, not just how they compare to classmates.
- Guides Instruction:
 - Teachers use MAP Growth results to adjust lessons and give your child the right kind of support and challenge.
- Measures Growth Over Time:
 - It tracks progress across the school year, so parents and teachers can celebrate growth and see where more practice is needed.
- Supports Every Learner:
 - Whether your child needs extra help or is ready for more advanced work, MAP Growth helps identify that.
 - Builds a Stronger School -to-Home Connection:
 - Parents can better understand their child's strengths and learning needs.

Understanding MAP Growth Scores



When your child takes the MAP Growth test, you'll usually see two main pieces of information:

- RIT Score (Rasch Unit Score):
 - ➤ This is like your child's "learning level."
 - ➤ The RIT score doesn't match a grade level —it's more like a scale that shows where your child is on their learning path.
 - > Higher scores mean more advanced skills.
 - Think of it like a yardstick: the number shows where your child is now, and future tests show how much they've grown.
- Percentile Ranking:
 - This tells you how your child is doing compared to other students their same age and grade nationwide.
 - For example:
 - 50th percentile = right in the middle (about average).
 - Above 50th = ahead of many peers.
 - Below 50th = behind many peers, which may mean they need extra support

How Parents Can Use the MAP Scores



- Look for Growth Over Time:
 - ➤ The most important part isn't the exact number... it's whether your child's RIT score goes up from fall to winter. Growth means progress!
- Focus on Strengths & Needs:
 - MAP reports often show what skills your child is ready to learn next. This helps parents know where to give extra support at home.
- Ask the Teacher:
 - ➤ Teachers use MAP scores to plan lessons. Parents can ask, "What skills is my child ready to work on now?" or "How can I help at home?"
 - Don't Compare Too Much:
 - ➤ Every child's learning journey is different. MAP is about growth, not competition.
