1 **13. PUBLIC – AGENDA/NON-AGENDA ITEMS**
2

3 This is the time when anyone from the public who wishes to speak to the Board

7 In accordance with Board policy and procedures, speakers are not permitted to
8 publicly speak of personal issues involving school personnel, or against any
9 person connected to the school system. Any such concern should be presented
10 to the school or district-level administration so that a proper response may be
11 given.
12

13 ***Darnelle Davis**, 738 West Broad Street, Gibbstown, NJ said his ten-year-old
14 child has been called the N-word twice during this school year. He feels it is a bit
15 harsh and highly unacceptable. He also feels a one-day suspension for that
16 person making the racial slur is just a slap on the wrist and at the end of the day,
17 it makes the child on the receiving end of the racial slur look like a monster. He
18 said more needs to be done about this. **Susan Vernacchio** asked if he's met
19 with the teacher and principal about this? **Mr. Davis** said he has spoken with
20 **Mrs. Whitcraft** and **Mr. Tirico** who have both been doing a wonderful job
21 assisting him through all of this. They did all they could do but their hands are
22 tied at certain points. **Mr. Davis** is just asking for a little more. What is a slap on
23 the wrist going to do? Kids like being out of school so what is that teaching
24 them? **Mrs. Vernacchio** suggested that he speak directly with the
25 Superintendent. You've already gone to the teacher and the principal. The next
26 step is the Superintendent who will then come to us, the Board of Education. **Dr.**
27 **Jennifer Foley-Hindman** said they can absolutely have a discussion tomorrow
28 morning. We can talk about what you would like to see in the future or what
29 would be helpful and strategies that we can do differently. **Dr. Foley-Hindman**
30 said she is sorry that **Mr. Davis'** child had to experience that. **Meghann Myers**
31 said she also experienced this with her children since they were in Kindergarten
32 and I was in school multiple times because both of them were called names.
33 There needs to be stuff brought into the curriculum and it needs to be taught in
34 the classroom. You will get push back from other parents who do not want racial
35 issues or social injustice brought up but as a parent and board member, I can
36 totally relate to you. I have had the same conversation with my children. It's
37 unfortunate. **Erin Herzberg** thinks we all value **Mr. Davis** bringing this to our
38 attention. **Andrew Chapkowski** said highlighting what **Mr. Davis** said, what is
39 the difference between in-school suspension and out-of-school suspension? **Dr.**
40 **Foley-Hindman** said a lot of factors go into it, especially the age of the child
41 making the racial slurs. We don't impose out-of-school suspensions for the very
42 reasons **Mr. Davis** mentioned; that kids would rather be home. So we have in-
43 school suspension and do a restricted study as opposed to sending them home.
