Warren's Sky-Vu Drive-In: Our Local Gem



Written by Melanie M. Nelson, WHS, Class of 1981 If you grew up as a Warrenite, sharing a crazy story about wild adventures at the Warren Sky-Vu Drive-In just comes naturally. Spend some time talking with any local and the drive-in will surely enter the conversation. It's an historical icon right here in our own hometown and people from all over the world (even a kangaroo!) have journeyed to visit this unforgettable landmark. Throughout the decades, the Warren Sky-Vu has been a gathering spot for all ages. Today, it is a nostalgic experience for many people; conjuring up memories for all generations, while continuing traditions for others. Enjoy this historical tour of one of the last drive-in movie theaters in Minnesota! Let's journey through the annals of history and learn a bit about our gem - one of the last original outdoor movie theaters, the Sky-Vu Drive In.

It all began, according to Terry Paulson (Oslo High School, Class of 1964), with a vision from his dad. Allen Paulson, who was in the theater business. He was quite enamored with outdoor theaters and he became the driving force behind the design and development of the Sky-Vu Drive-In Theater. As a young man, Terry recalls the allure of outdoor theaters when he and his family would travel to view movies outdoors. In 1955 or 1956 (purchasing the land from the Howard Brothers) when Terry was just a young lad, his folks oversaw the construction of the Sky-Vu Theater. At that time, his father also owned the Roxy Theater in Oslo. The design for the Sky-Vu theater was replicated from the Roxy.

Terry shared that one of the most challenging steps of the build was the calculation of the distance of the screen to the lens/projector to ensure premium video quality. Allen carefully calculated the fine details. As a young lad, he remembers scaffolding along the bottom of the screen, but he didn't dare climb too far. It was high and scary!

One of the equipment pieces that appeared in the projection booth as 'one of a kind' was the sound amplifier which was built from scratch by Warren's hometown legend, Dr. Wally Lamb! Dr. Lamb and Allen were good friends and shared an extensive electronic background. This homemade amplifier provided excellent quality of the film's audio to each of the individual car speakers, which numbered at the time around 150. Dr. Lamb was a genius when it came to assembling the system, gathering used parts from many sources to provide a rich experience for all visitors to come. Terry recalls the amp built by Wally was so impressive that it could pick up a barking dog from the neighboring property. The two original projection machines were purchased used' with each having "Simplex" lamp houses utilizing arc carbons that provided the high intensity lighting that projected the picture from the booth to the screen. Terry recalls on one early mid-summer overcast, rainy evening, while opening the projection booth's viewing ports, there was a very loud 'BANG' and he caught a glimpse of a lightning bolt that had just struck the upper north corner of the screen, taking out around 10 feet or so. The bolt then traveled down the side of the screen until coming into contact with the guide wire, which then traveled directly to the ground. The guide wire momentarily glowed white hot! Terry recalls the unit becoming very hot and a piped exhaust system needed to be

installed to bleed off the heat. Once, when Terry was 14 or 15 years old, they were about to open for the evening when they heard a big bang! He saw the first guide wire was white hot! Lightning had struck the screen and took off the top ten feet of the screen. He noted the repairs were completed by a group of handy farmers.

In preparation for the cars filling the parking area, the entire viewing space was graveled and room was made for "a couple hundred cars or so" (Originally, Sky-Vu could host 145 vehicles). The original road built to enter the drive-in has now become Leonard Novak's driveway; he moved the road when his home was built. Once Sky-Vu was up and operational, Terry recalls his mother running the ticket booth. As a family-run operation, they would arrive around 6:30 p.m. to start making popcorn and getting everything prepared for the show. Ticket prices at that time were 50 cents for adults and children under the age of 12 were free. He charged 10 cents for popcorn or 25 cents for buttered popcorn. Milky Way, Snickers and Mars bars were also sold for a nickel each. There were also a few beverages available in the snack stand. He spoke fondly of Harold Steffan and Oscar Erickson both being great customers.

When the drive-in opened in 1956, Terry stated that it was one of very few outdoor theaters within a 300-mile radius, with one being in Grand Forks. As he grew up, he trained as a projectionist and he served in that capacity for approximately three years (1961-63), a trait that carried over during his time in the U.S. Air Force when he was assigned to run the projection machine at his squadron's monthly "Commander's Call" meeting and occasionally at the base theater at his duty station. Allen had expanded his ambitions for another drive-in theater and proceeded to own and build the 59-High Drive-In located in Thief River Falls, Minnesota. This was a tradeThis is where Bixby Knight enters the scene. Bixby and Allen met while working at the 59-High Theater. Bixby ran the projectors for Allen from 1955-56. He would later go on to purchase Sky-Vu from the Paulson family in 1963

Bixby indicated he purchased Sky-Vu from Allen Paulson and Ray Batko in 1963 and ran it for ten years.

Marge (Potucek) Simonson, (WHS 1957), received a great honor recently as she was inducted into the Power, Montana High School Hall of Fame. She was raised on a farm in the Radium area with three sisters and two brothers. Marge, her husband Jerome and family moved to Power in 1970. She worked at Power Public Schools for 42 years starting in 1973 and watched all four of her sons graduate from Power. She worked as an aide primarily with the elementary grades. She was the playground supervisor, ran the school concession stand for 20 years and also was one of two women who were 20-year members of the local fire department. She now spends her time gardening, raising flowers and watching activities of their grandchildren.

Father Craig Vasek, (WAO 2002), is a priest of the Diocese of Crookston, Minn. He has been appointed as a specialist in the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Secretariat of Evangelization and Catechesis. Father Craig was raised on a small farm in Tabor. After his high school graduation, he began his seminary formation in 2003 at Cardinal Muenah Seminary in Fargo, N.D, which included course work at North Dakota State University. He graduated in 2006 from Seminary and University with a Bachelor's degree in Philosophy and Humanities. He also studied at the Pontifical North American College in Rome, Italy. Returning to the Crookston Diocese, he served multiple parishes and obtained a Master's Degree in Psychology at Divine Mercy University in Arlington, VA. Prior to his appointment to the USCCB, he has spent the previous four years at the University of Mary at Bismarck, N.D. as the Chaplain of Athletics, a program director of the Institute for virtue in sports. Father Craig is currently working on a doctorate in Theology on the topic of the divine indwelling of God in the soul.

Jared Wohlers, (WAO 2015), became the new owner of Main Street Cafe, formerly known as the Uptown Cafe. Jared purchased his business on July 20, 2022 and opened for business on September 1, 2022. Jared has worked in the restaurant service industry for over 10 years. He stated, "I worked at The Dell in Argyle and when I moved to the Fargo-Moorhead area while attending Moorhead State University, I worked at Applebees, Longhorn Steakhouse and Lucky Pub 13. I've gained experience in fine-dining, quick and fast food as well as late-night bar environments. I fully expect to be working 100 hours a week. I know what I signed up for. I'll do whatever needs to be done to be successful."

Capt. **Pat Znajda**, **(WHS 1983)**, recently retired after 17 years with the Department of Natural Resources and totaled nearly 36 years in law enforcement. He followed in the footsteps of his father, Ted Znajda, who was a game warden and conservation officer in Warren from 1959 until his retirement in 1989. Pat had the honor of pinning the badge on the third generation of Znajda Conservation Officers when his daughter, Felicia, graduated from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Conservation Officer Academy in Little Falls. Pat also had an earlier honor in 2021 of pinning the badge on his son, Taylor, who graduated from the Minnesota State Patrol Academy and is now a state trooper in Hibbing.

Brad Swanson, (WAO 1999), is married to Katie (Kava) and they have two young sons. Brad is presently employed by a company called Simplicity Life, which is an insurance marketing organization supporting independent financial professionals along with financial institutions. After high school graduation, Brad attended the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks, N.D, earning a Bachelor's degree in Mass Communications in 2004. After college, he was employed by a couple of insurance marketing organizations in Fargo, N.D. He began a new job for Simplicity Life in 2008. The job brought him to an office in Monticello, MN for 11 years. Since Covid started in March 2020, Brad has worked three years from an office at his home in Otsego, MN.

Jeff Lahl, (1972 graduate of WHS), has been enjoying his first year of full retirement from being the Project Director for the Solar Electric Light Fund (SELF), a non-profit based in Washington D.C. that brings solar electrification (photovoltaics or PV) to developing countries. Jeff's work with SELF started 18 years ago as the organization's sole project manager and progressed to Project Director as the organization grew. During his time at SELF, Jeff led efforts to

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Harry and Art Howard were the landowners at the time of the acquisition.

Bixby echoes the praises of Dr. Wally Lamb, commending his skills in the audio system, stating that he was far ahead of his time in electronics.

Bixby reflected that the huge 48 foot by 60 foot screen had been damaged a total of three times in its history. In 1974 and again in 1979, the screen went down completely resulting from a storm hitting the area. In 1974, Steve Novak reported that Larry Korynta was working in the projector room and he heard a roaring noise. He noticed the screen was suddenly gone. Leonard grabbed Steve and pulled him under the fallen roof of the concession stand. The bathroom walls had caved in and were thrown into the field. During the storm of 1979, he recalls three workers having to take cover in the projection room. In 1986, a tornado came through the area and again damaged Sky-Vu, taking the roof of the concession stand.

Bixby ran the theater ten years prior to selling it to Leonard Novak and Darold Sundby in 1973. He commented that he would offer a "Buck Night Special" for \$1.00. His concession stand added Bar-B-Ques, corn dogs and hotdogs. Under his ownership, Elmer and Janet Sabol worked many nights in the ticket booth, serving food and keeping order among the movie-goers. Bixby shared that, at that time, the screen could be replaced in 4? x 8' panels, if needed. The upkeep of the screen included painting the panels with a special screen paint for a bright picture every couple of years. Bixby fondly recalls many of the old 30" x 40" movie posters. They came with the movies and were put up as advertising. They are now collector's items and many folks seek them out. He spoke of throwing stacks and stacks of them away. At the time, Bixby also operated the downtown Warren Theater, owned by Paul Snyder. The only change he made was to convert the sound system to radio broadcasting. Bixby recalls all local clientele with numerous migrant workers supporting the drive-in. He would be open from Memorial Day through Labor Day and always closed by September 1st. Sometimes he'd run a "Dusk 'til Dawn" event, showing four movies in one night a couple times per summer. This was always a hit and it was continued through the 70's and 80's. During those special evenings, people would get out of their vehicles and mingle around. He noted there were very few problems or issues. The local police would periodically drive through the parking area. This was the start of the memorable years at the Warren Sky-Vu! Upon moving on from Sky-Vu, Bixby moved to Grand Forks and operated the "Center Cinema" in East Grand Forks, Minnesota as well as the Golden Cue and later purchased Mr. Steak and Ugly's Restaurant near UND. Bixby holds many special memories of the Warren area and reminisces often while enjoying retirement in Colorado during the summer months and sunny Arizona in the winter.

After Leonard Novak (Shorty) and Darold Sundby purchased Sky-Vu from Bixby, Shorty and his family ran the successful theater until 2008 when it was taken over by his son, Steve in 2008. Most recently in 2021, Leonard's grandson, Chris joined the management team. At the time of the Sky-Vu purchase, the indoor Warren Theater was included as part of the sale. Sadly, the indoor Warren Theater was demolished in 1988, however some theater seats survived and can be found around Warren in the old Opera House. Many Warrenites recall cozy winter nights near Christmas time when parents would drop off their children at the theater and see Santa while their folks did their Christmas shopping around town. It was a magical Christmas-time for movie lovers, children and parents alike. A favorite treat was when workers would put the packages of licorice in with the popcorn, making the licorice all warm and melty. Interestingly enough, when the theater first opened, a pack of cigarettes could be purchased for just 25 cents.

Steve's son, Chris has taken over management and operations of Sky-Vu since 2021. Together they continually work to keep the system updated and have kept plans for expanding and improving the facility. In a large project

in 1993, the projector was replaced with a much larger reel system, allowing 4 disks to be loaded, with fewer reel changes. In 2011, Sky-Vu updated and switched to a digital platform, requiring a process of acquiring "keys" to unlock and playback movies. Steve shared that he used to prepare Red Baron pizza for \$2.00 and now they provide homemade pizzas for \$18.00. Popcorn originally was 30 cents, 50 cents or 75 cents; current prices are \$4, \$5, and \$7 for popcorn. Prices for Bar-B-Ques and hot dogs have gone from 50 cents/25 cents to \$3.00 and \$5.00. Soda previously sold for 15 cents and can now be purchased for \$4.00. Candy was originally 10 cents and is sold now for \$2.50. Movie-goers are guaranteed to enjoy concessions while enjoying a family movie together.

Throughout its history, Sky-Vu has undergone many changes and improvements:

The biggest change Steve noted was the removal of alcohol being allowed on the property. During the 70's and 80's, alcohol was allowed and teens would flock to the drive-in to gather with classmates and friends - but didn't often watch the movie. As an owner, the Novak's felt it was not in the best interest for his business and allowing alcohol was then discontinued. Another change was the switch from the speaker system to the updated 93.1 FM radio system. This allows each vehicle to hear the movie through their own speaker system. Thirdly, the pricing for tickets - when Sky-Vu opened originally, ticket prices were just a buck for adults and children under the age of 12 were free. The Novaks offered "carload night," charging just \$3.00 for as many people who would fit in the car. This limit was challenged many times, with movie-goers in the '70's and '80's creatively hiding in trunks and pick-up boxes to get into the movies! Movie prices in the '70's were \$2 per person and in the 80's, the price raised to \$6. Gate admission is now at \$9 per person and hasn't been raised in 5 years, despite expenses being quadrupled. A fun addition to Sky-Vu began when moviegoers started signing the concession stand, creating a "memory wall" of sorts. Today, as you walk up to the concession stand, it is very likely you'll see names on the wall you recognize.

The Sky-Vu of today is a much different experience than in the past, but Steve finds that more families attend the movie, putting up their hatchbacks or grabbing a lawn chair or even sitting in the back of their vehicles. It's a family/pet-friendly perfect outing. On a typical summer night, Sky-Vu will host anywhere from 35-90+ vehicles. Work starts with Steve's son, Chris, mowing and preparing the lawn, starting the machines and tending to the concession stand. Chris, as the current manager, serves hot dogs, homemade pizzas, pretzels, BBQ's, popcorn, slushies and several candy snacks. There are currently 14 employees, all high school students. Chris, Steve, and his daughter, Ashley, work together to make the experience enjoyable for all. Movies always start at "dusk" and Chris noted that after June 22nd, the time shifts by 7 minutes weekly. Movies are shown from Memorial Day through Labor Day and on weekends until the snow flies.

So, what does the future hold for our hidden gem in Minnesota, the Sky-Vu Theater? According to Steve and

Chris, plans include possibly adding campsites and a gazebo to the grounds. There is discussion of an addition on the north side of the concession stand to include larger bathrooms. With Sky-Vu being one of the original drive-in theaters in the country still surviving, Steve and Chris look forward to the future with continued hope. Perhaps a historical showroom, featuring the projection units of the past, old movie posters and other memorabilia will be something forthcoming. Steve and Chris will be adding on to the clothing line to include hats, shirts, sweatshirts, tank

tops and jackets. Next year will mark the 50th anniversary of the Warren Sky Vu! We're reminded that it is a BIG DEAL to be fortunate to have this beautiful facility right in our own backyards, so, when in Warren, take the time to go out to the drive-in with your family. Bring a carload. Enjoy the rare experience with your children as we all did. Class and family reunions are encouraged to come out and reminisce and take in a movie. Warren's Sky-Vu is currently followed by 21,000+ people through social media and the Novaks look to bring in those families to take in a movie on the "Big Silver Screen" of the Sky-Vu Drive In: Warren's most historical site.

But until then, the Novak tradition continues with the third generation now working in the family business.

Where Are They Now

Jacki (Knute) Omland, 1973 Alvarado High School, 1979-1983, AHS Teacher: "Retiring after 44 years of teaching. I just finished the last class of my teaching career. It all began in 1978 at Lincoln High School in Thief River Falls, MN. I remember my first day as if it were yesterday. I signed my contract on a Saturday and started the following Monday. I had not even seen my book or classroom before I walked in that Monday. From there, I came back to my hometown of Alvarado. I taught science and was a speech team coach there for 4 years. Additionally, I worked with the Drama Club and put on three plays each year. I then moved to Aberdeen, South Dakota, married my husband, Jay Omland and continued teaching." Jacki and Jay have one son, Brian and have taken in several foreign exchange students. They are proud to have seven grandchildren plus three additional from former exchange students." I taught physics and astronomy at Aberdeen Central High School until 2002, and at the NSU E-learning Center until 2022. I additionally taught physics as an adjunct instructor at Presentation College. I began my career working in animal and range research at Fort Keogh in Miles City, Montana for Montana State University. In 1990, I moved on to law school in Missoula, Montana. In 1993, I graduated from the University of Montana School of Law and began my law career in Glendive, Montana for three years, followed by relocating to Billings, Montana. In Billings, I worked for Yellowstone County as a public defender (nearly three years) then a prosecutor for several years. Moving on from Yellowstone County in 2004 brought me to a position as Corporate Counsel for an agricultural research and economics specially firm in Billings, Montana. I relocated to Helena and worked as a staff attorney for the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation, specializing in Western Water Law, among other areas. In 2016, after eight years with the DNRC, I became an elected County Attorney for Musselshell and Golden Valley Counties in Montana where I served until 2022. I decided not to run for re-election and plan to return to Minnesota by 2023 to retire or semi-retire as a lawyer somewhere in lake country where I can continue filling the blank chapters in my life's book. I look forward to that hometown feeling I knew growing up in Warren."


