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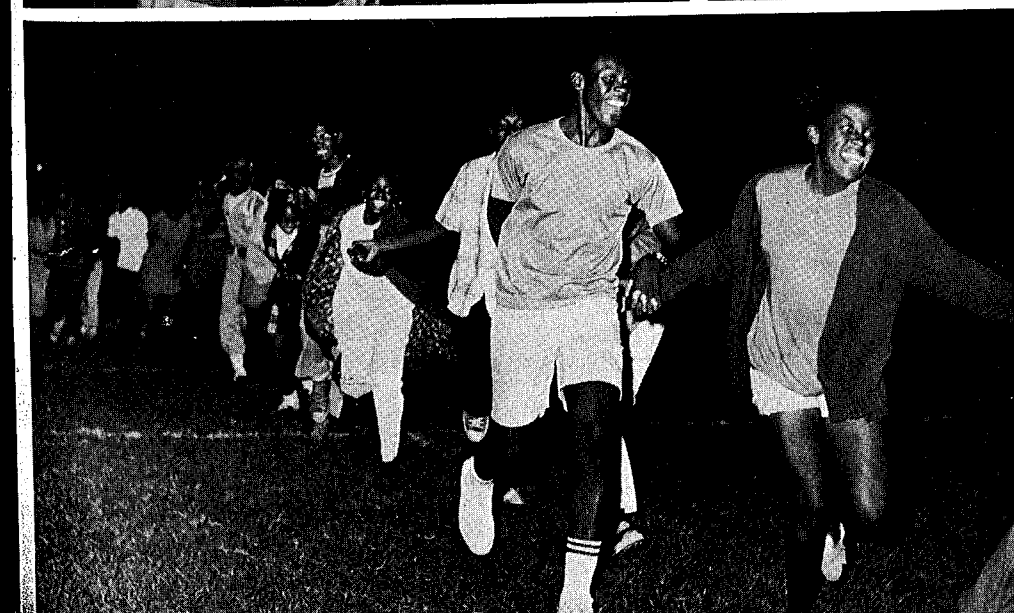
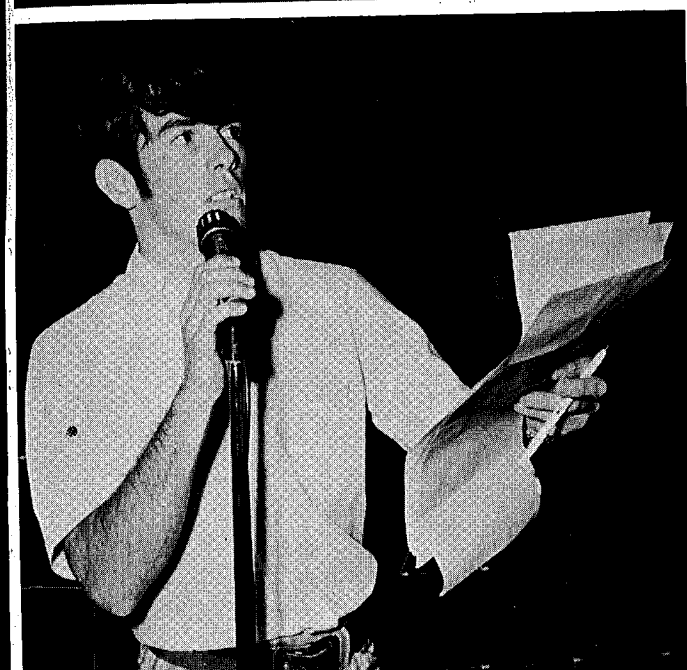
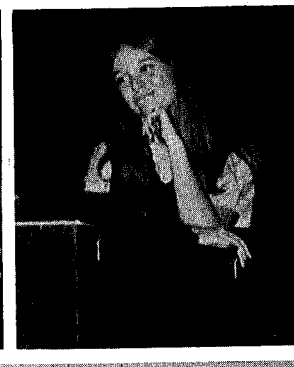
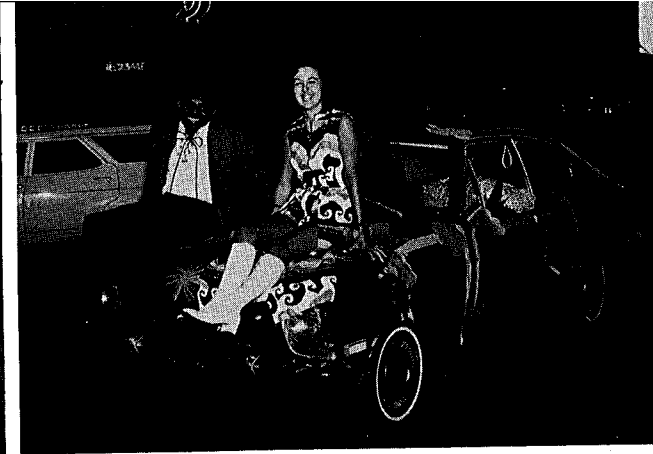
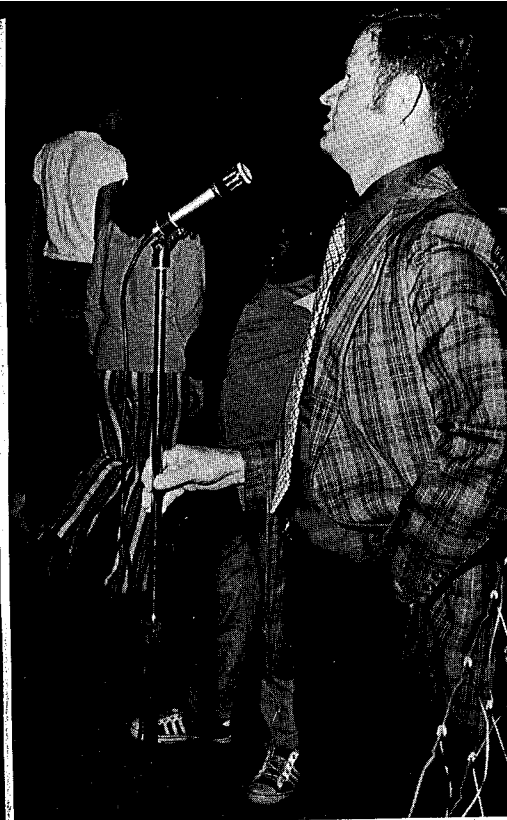


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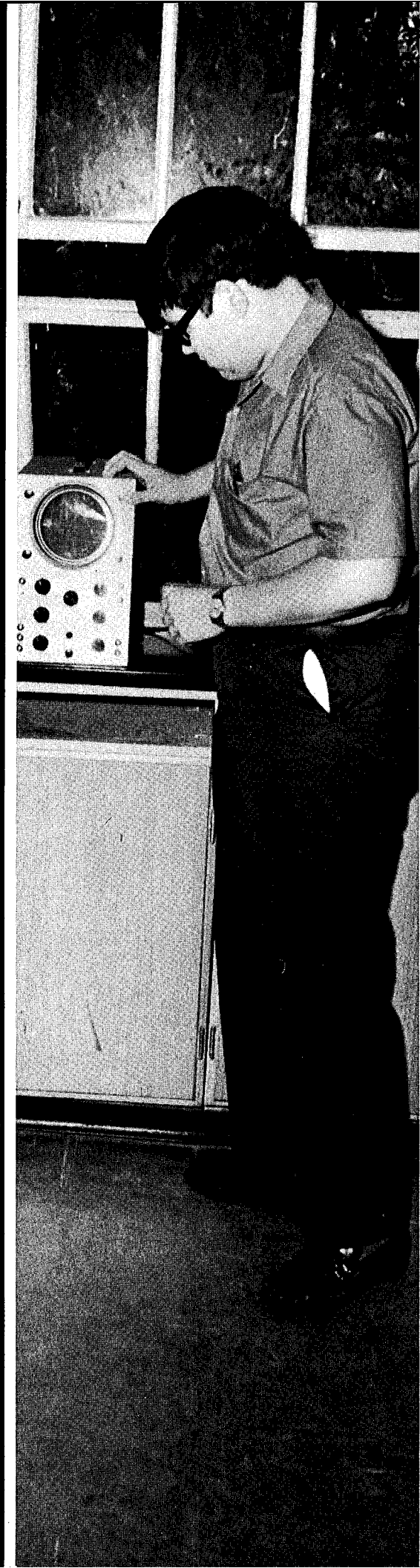
*S*o begins the story of the 1971-72 school year—a fast moving school session marked by change as well as tradition—a year of involvement and individuality—a time to be remembered.

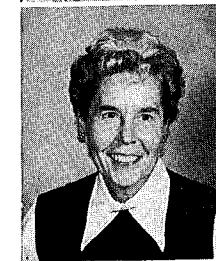


## Comprehension of knowledge . . .

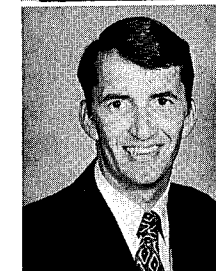
is broadened by the intensive study provided by the *English* department. Studies in basic skills of reading, and oral and written communication find and fulfill the needs of many students. The criterion reading program is a new program for a group in each grade emphasizing diagnostic testing and carefully aimed instruction. Encompassing the Humanities in the sophomore English not only enhances interest in the course, but also increases the student's appreciation of the arts, and stimulates thought. Students struggle with their first long theme paper in junior English, intensifying their study in composition. New in junior English is a study of newspapers, including interviews with visitors from the community, and a visit to the newspaper office. Senior English brings the involvement of plays and theatre, and a trip to see the Asolo production of *Twelfth Night* in Lakeland. English at L.W.H.S.—students strive for better communication of thoughts and ideas.

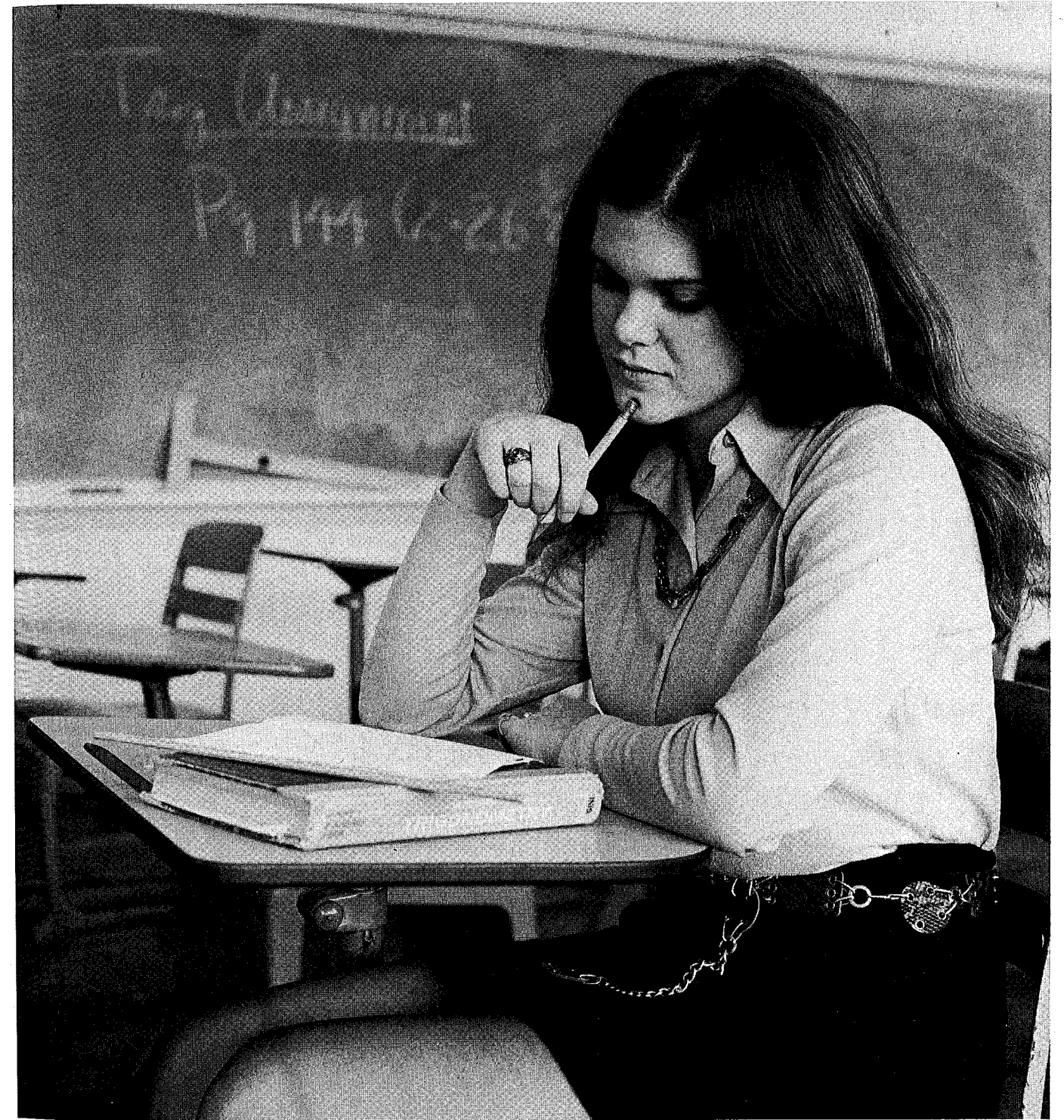
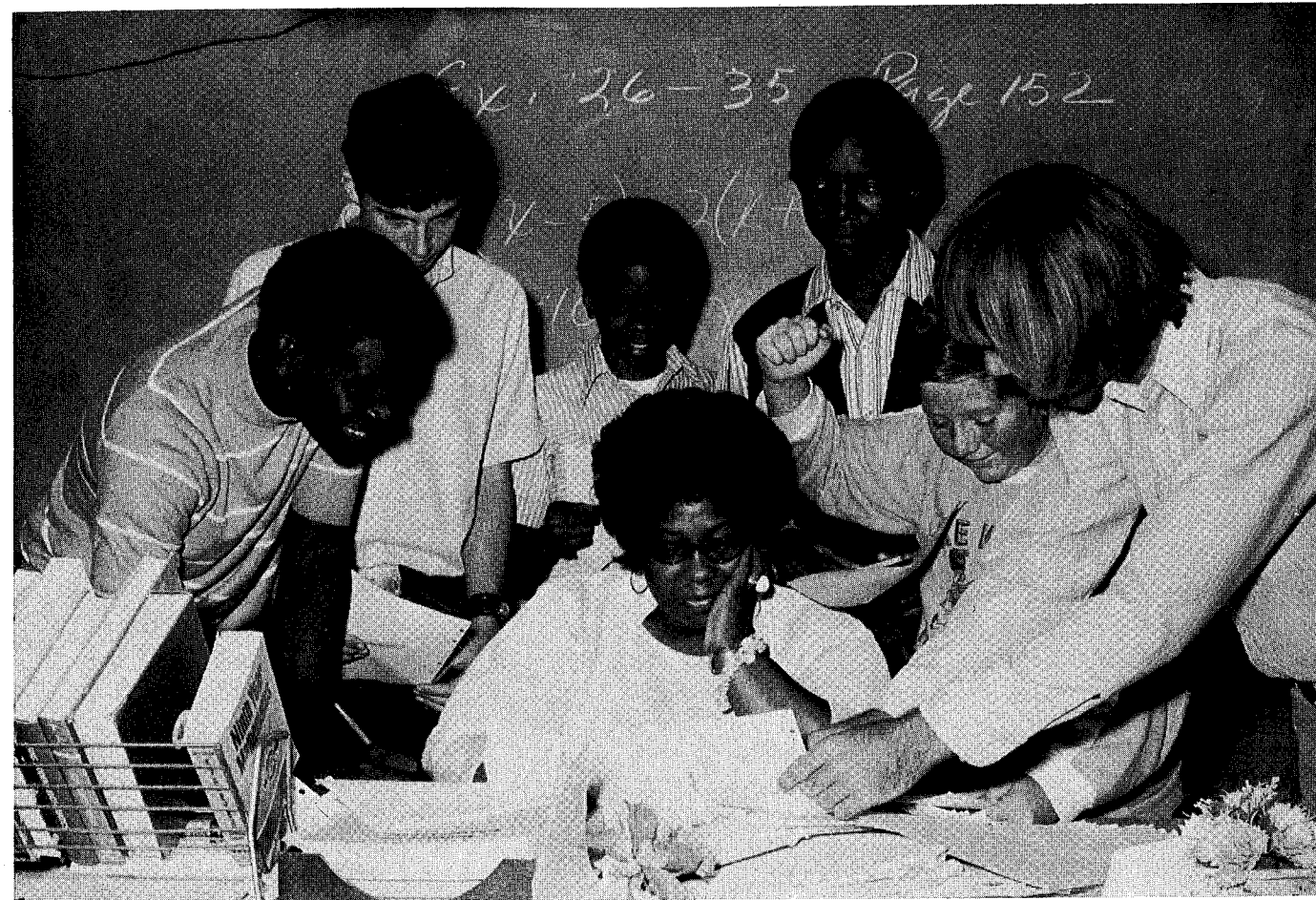


## Rationalization . . .

The student learns to work with real and unreal numbers, and with problems that involve tangible and intangible components in geometry and trig. In algebra I and II, the student acquires familiarity with equations and solution sets, and develops understanding in working word problems. Business mathematics provides knowledge in the practical application of math.

### dissection . . .

a first animal dissection for most students, highlights the year of the biology student. Other studies include a thorough investigation of animal and plant life, and an acquiring of some knowledge of the formation and development of the planet earth and its inhabitants. The student in physical science studies minerals, such as iron ore, and the technological uses of minerals and elements in today's world. Chemistry is instrumental in developing the student's understanding of laboratory fundamentals. The chemistry student studies atoms and molecules, covalent, ionic, and polar covalent bonds, and scientific equations. The student in physics studies the laws of gravity, velocity, and time, the properties of sound and light waves, and electronic theory. A diversified *science* program touches animal life, plant life, chemical properties, and physical laws.

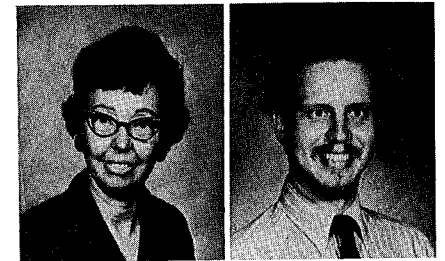
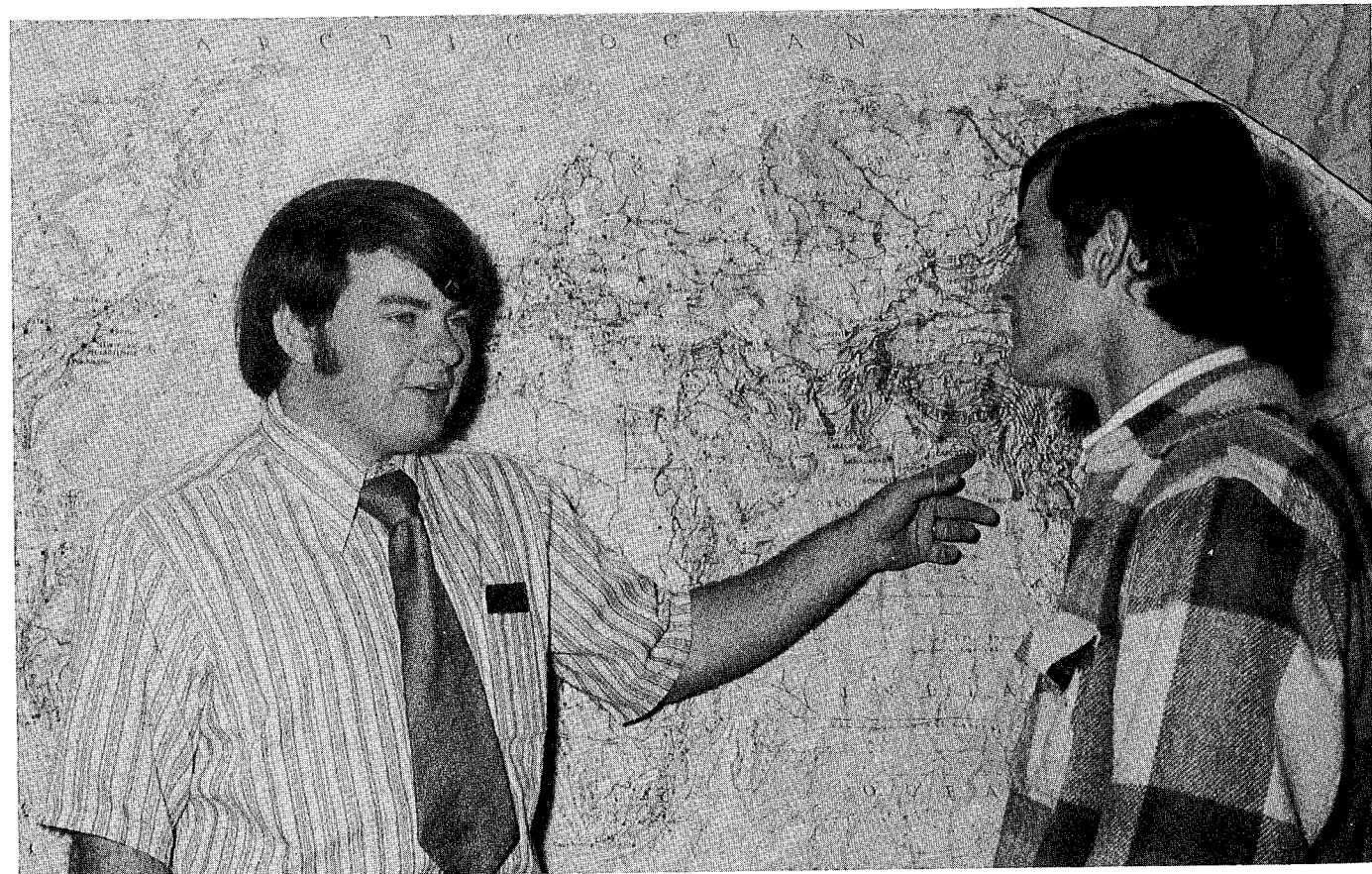
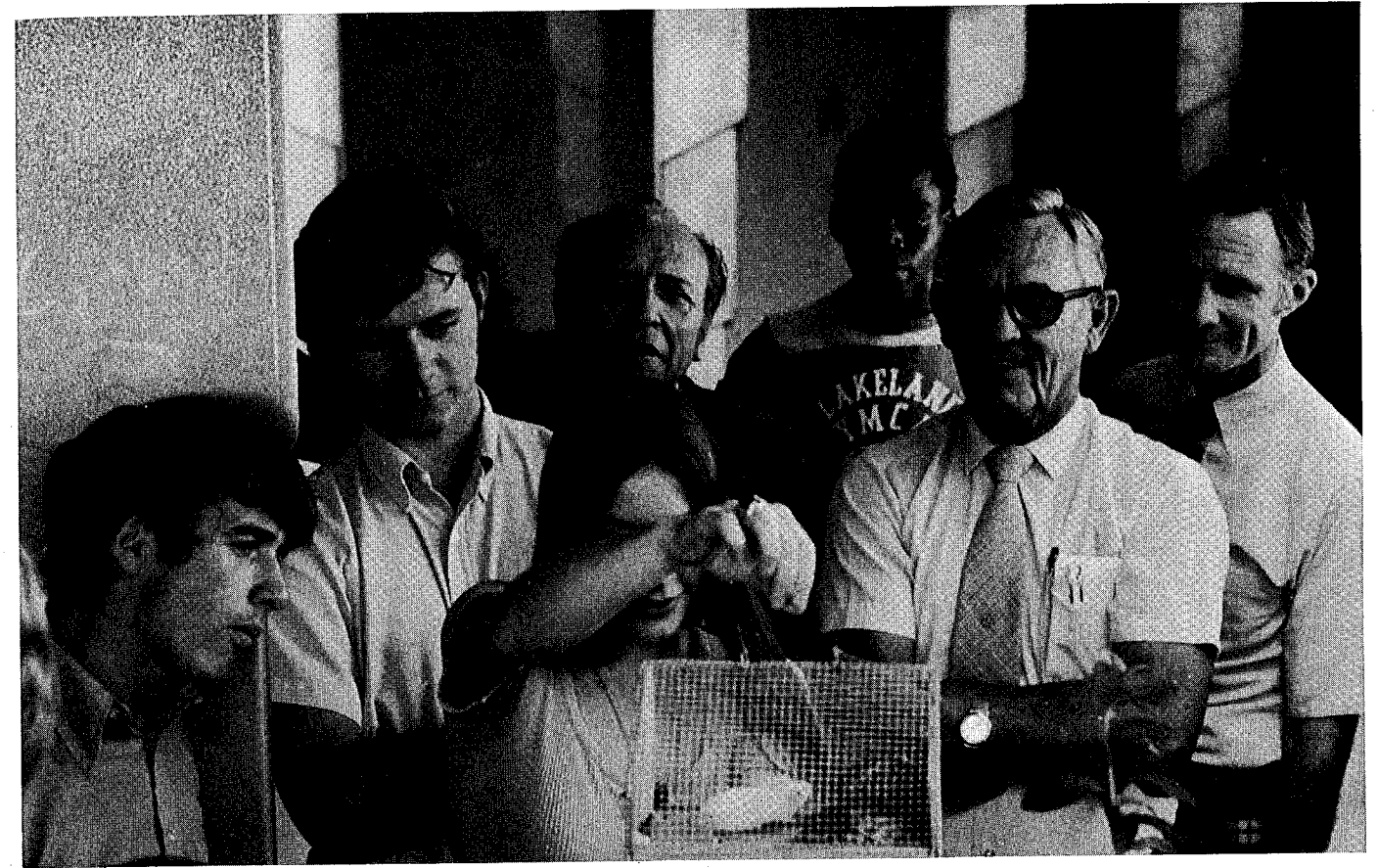
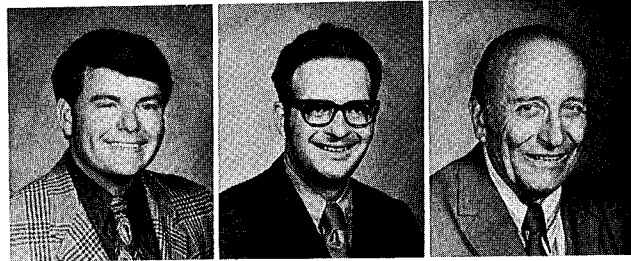
## Pondering man's existence . . .

the *social studies* student gains an indepth view of man's mind, the relationship of man to society, and perhaps even wonders of the relationship of man to the universe. In his study of people of historical and contemporary life, the social studies student begins to increase understanding of his own relationship with others. He relates his knowledge to issues of the day, both political and social: drugs, civil rights, government, and problems of technology in society. A trip to Florida Southern College and a lecture by Dr. Burnette, head of that department, contributes interest to the psychology course at Lake Wales High School. Intern teachers aiding in classroom instruction make current issues more relevant to the social studies student. Personal involvement in contemporary issues brings the student a greater knowledge and understanding of today's problems.

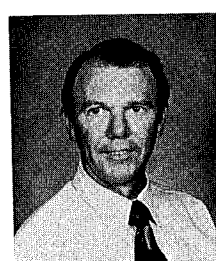
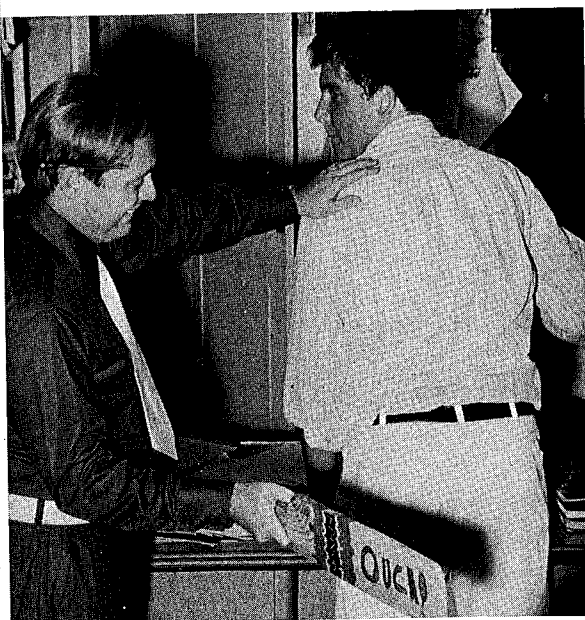
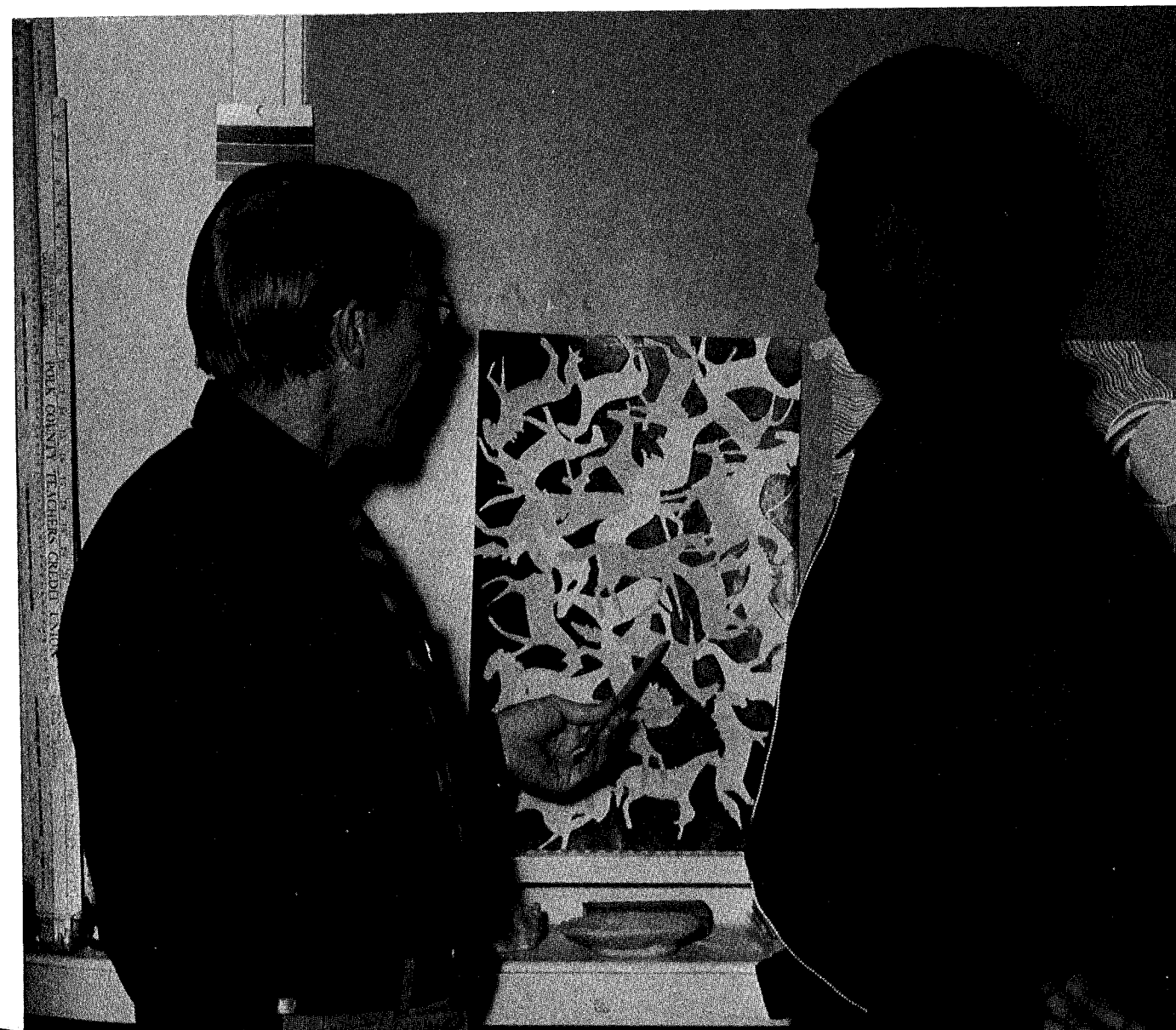


## Caesar dies . . .

and the Latin student relates the problems of his society to those of the Romans. Students in Latin acquire a knowledge of the history of Rome, study the Latin language, and learn of the many areas of our culture influenced by that of Roman days. Spanish students learn to converse fluently in the language. Speaking only in Spanish, and with constant translation from Spanish to English and vice versa, the students constantly use their knowledge of the subject. French students speak French, and then hear themselves via a tape recorder. Reading of the customs and habits of the French, the student foresees the day when he might travel to this far away land. *Foreign languages* introduce the student to other cultures. The *art* student expresses his own culture or those of which he has studied with oils, pastels, and sculpture.

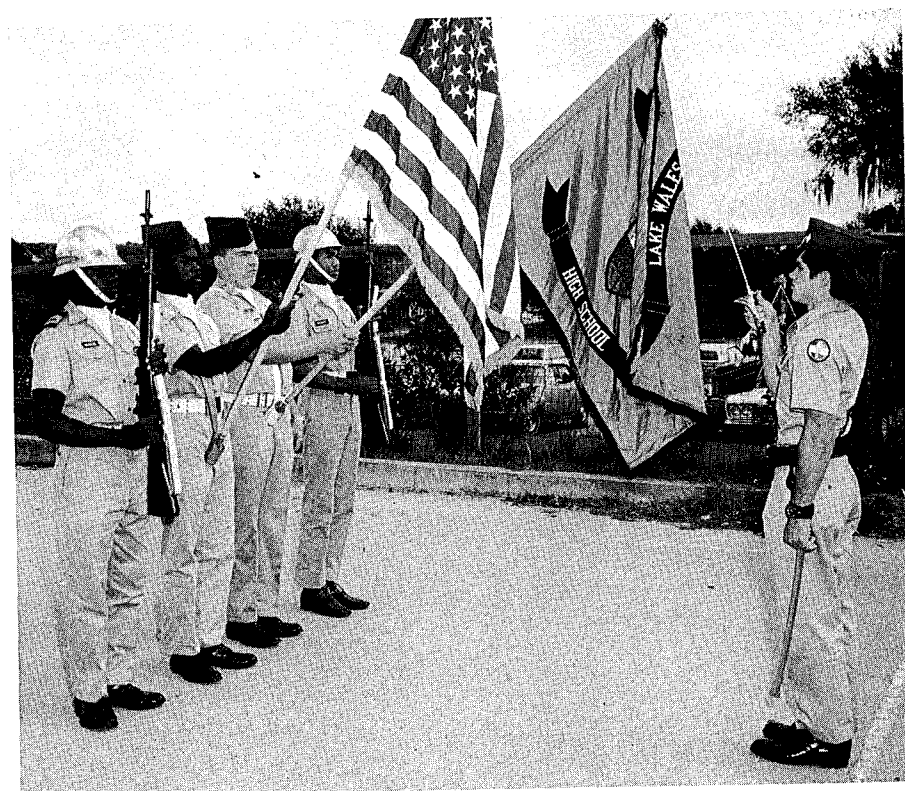
## Responsibility and leadership . . .

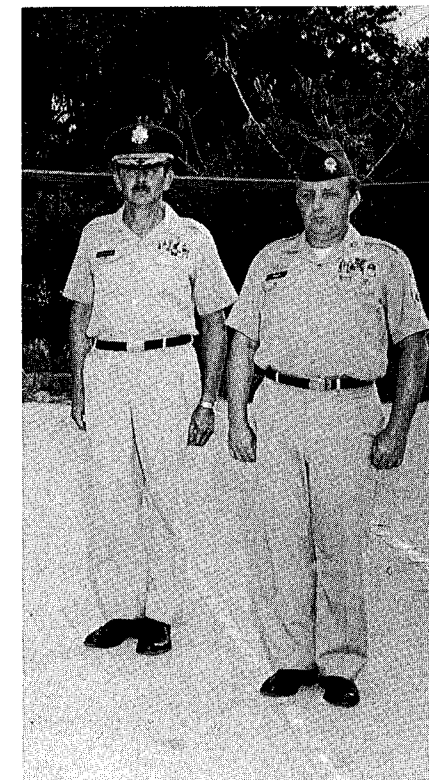
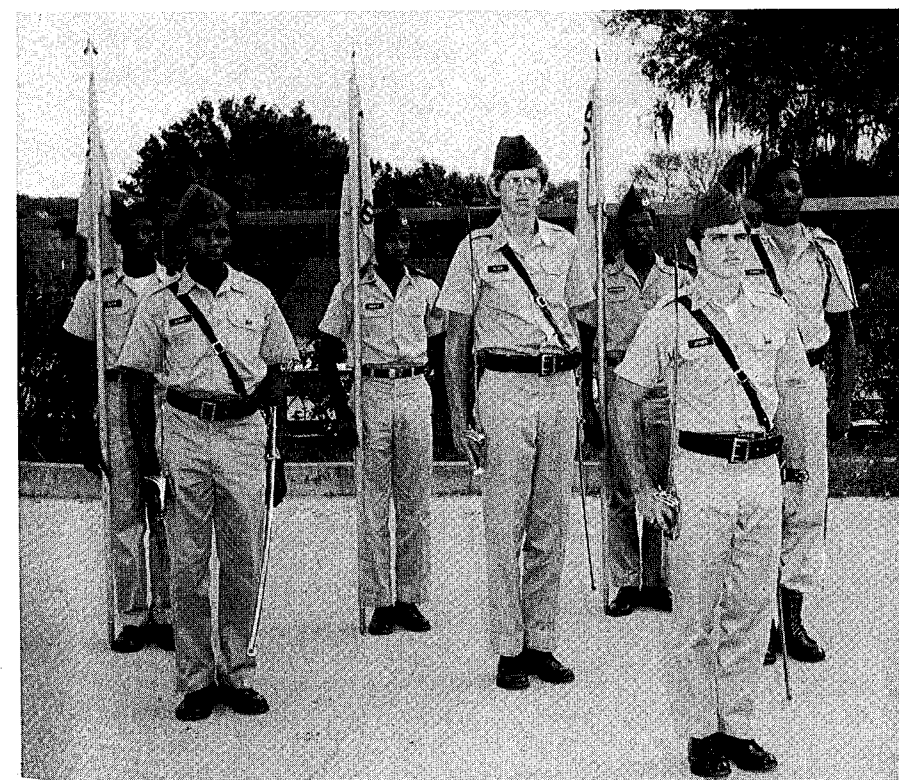

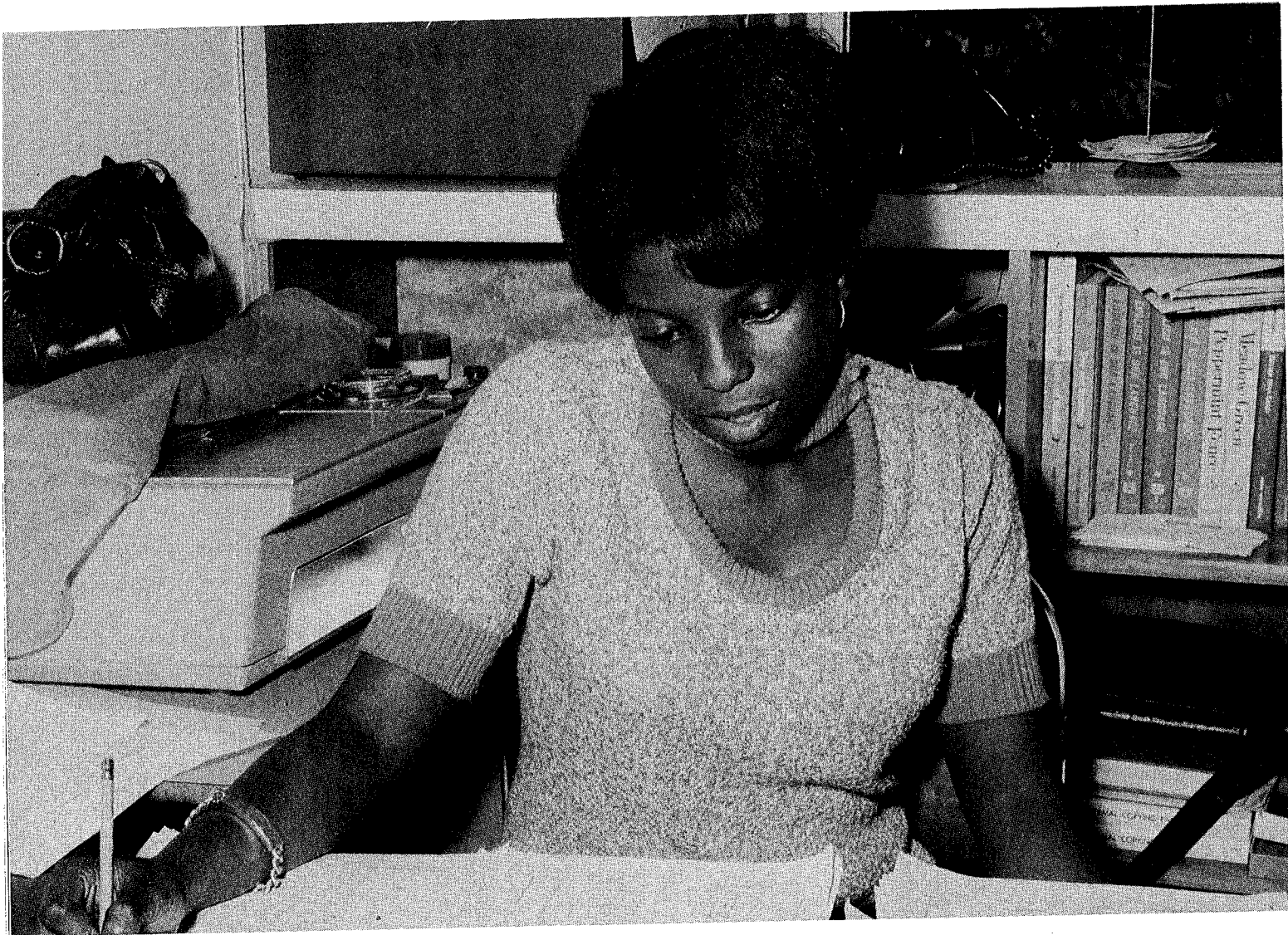


## Employment . . .

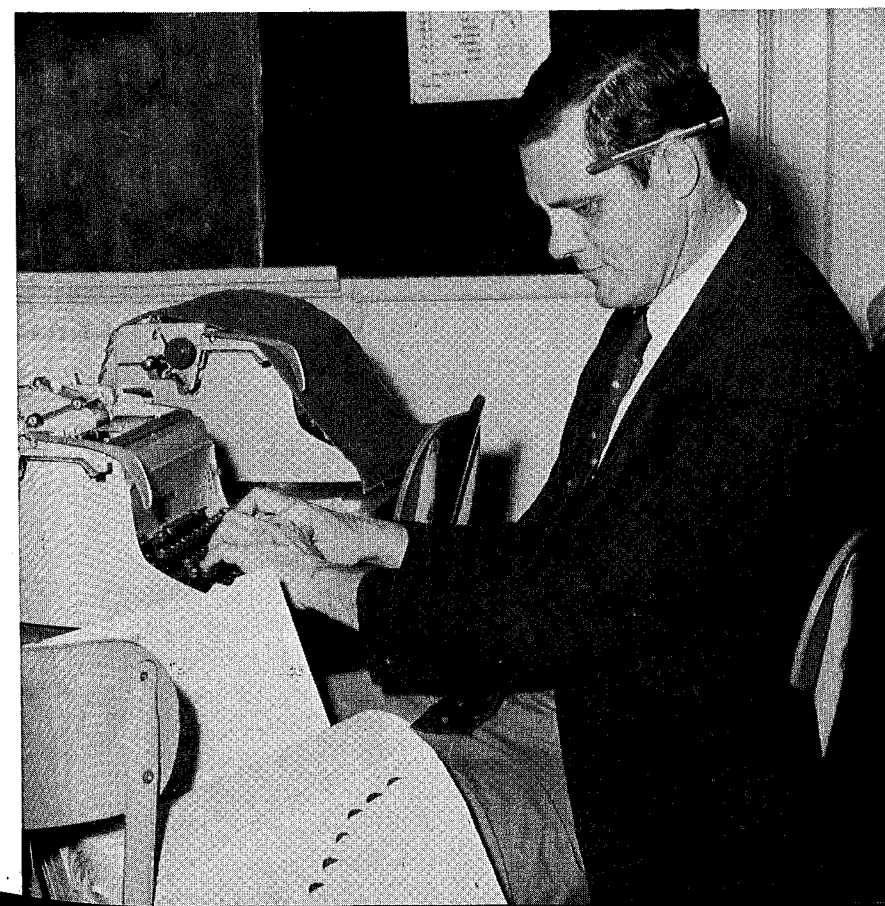
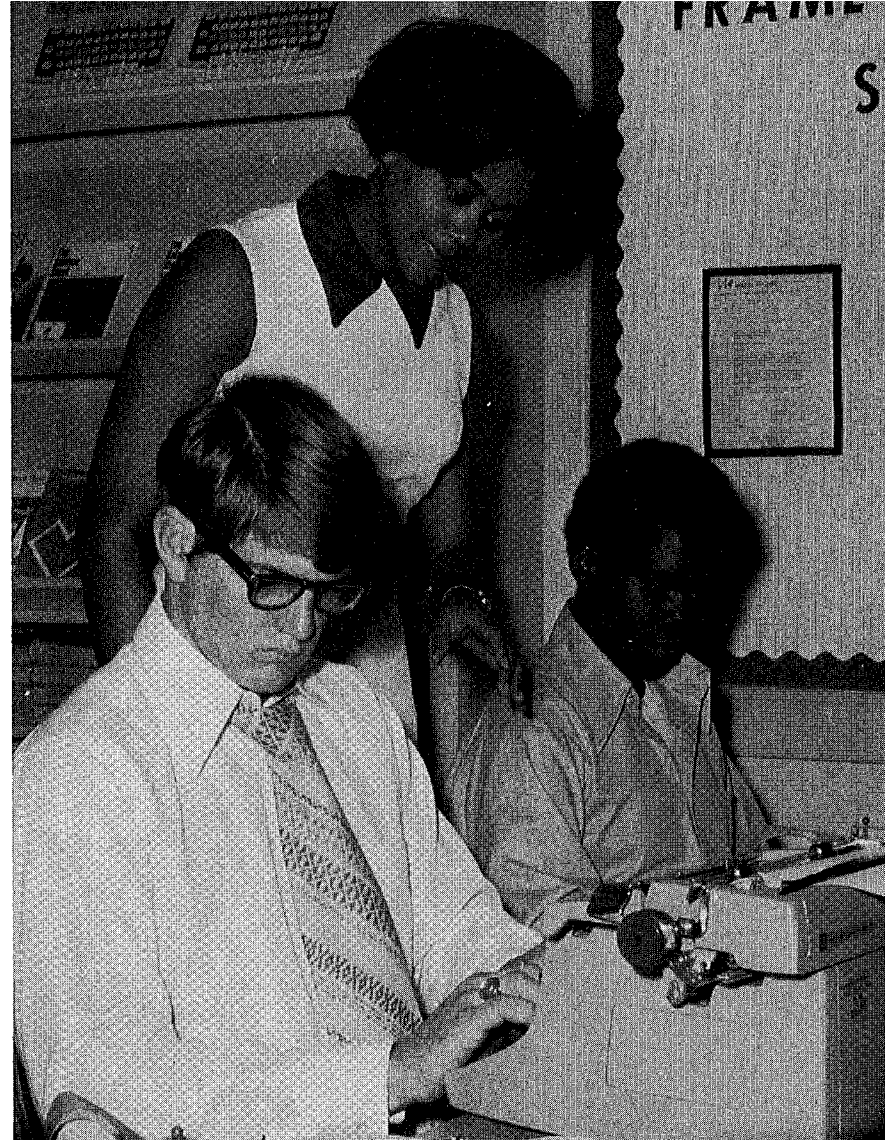

## Dexterity in office work . . .

skills learned by students in *business education*, enable youth to anticipate job placement. Balancing the books, writing journal entries, and learning the double entry system challenge the students in bookkeeping I and II, Typing I provides the student with a knowledge of the keyboard, correct business letter form, and dimensions in centering the material on the page. Typing II emphasizes the application of speed as the student strives to perfect form and technique. Students learn business communication in business English. In the business law course the student learns of the protection of business firms and private citizens provided by law. Students learn those strange symbols in Shorthand I, and then amaze everyone by taking 90 words a minute of dictation in Shorthand II. Personal typing is offered for the student who desires personal application of the skill.

## Running a redlight . . .

brings shock and strain to students and instructors in *driver education* . . . and doesn't do much for the student's grade either. Students in

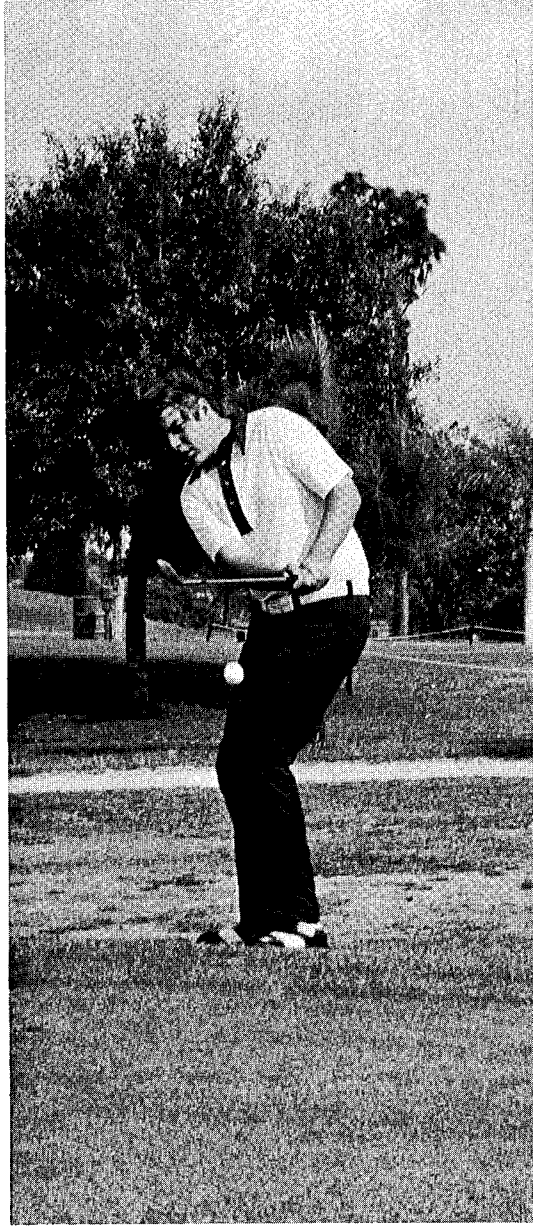
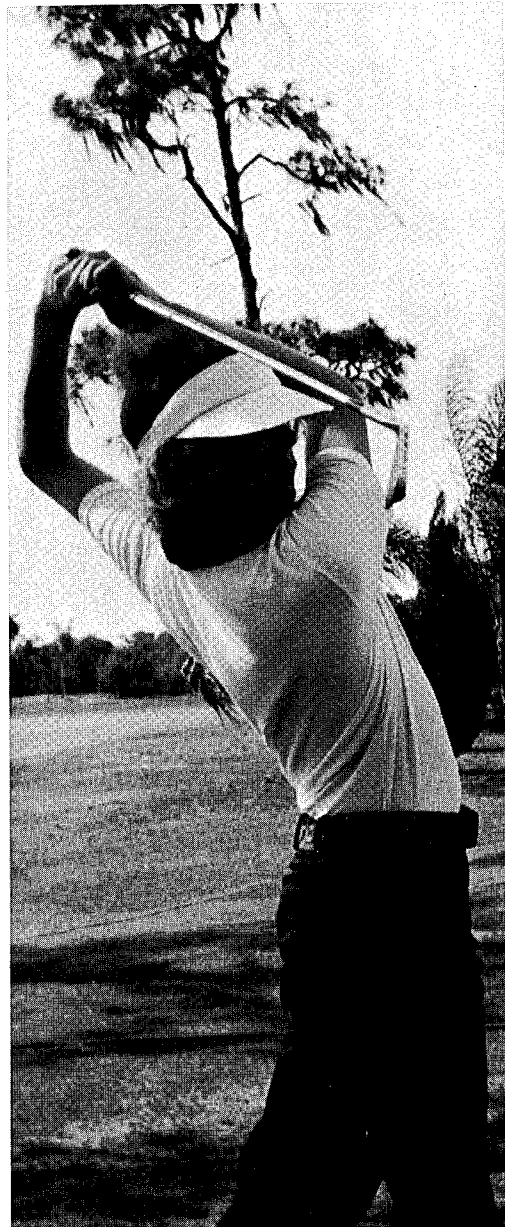
## Regional record . . .

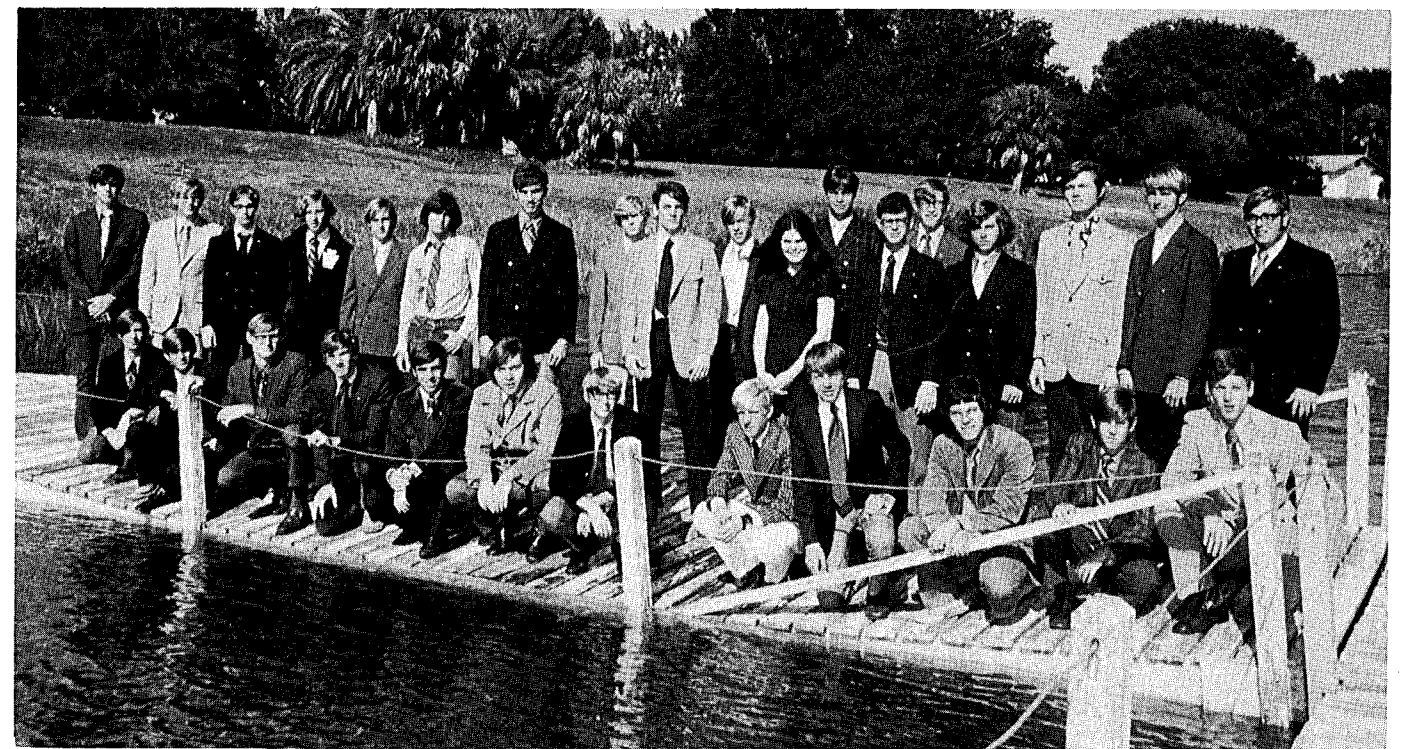




## A Theme Banquet . . .

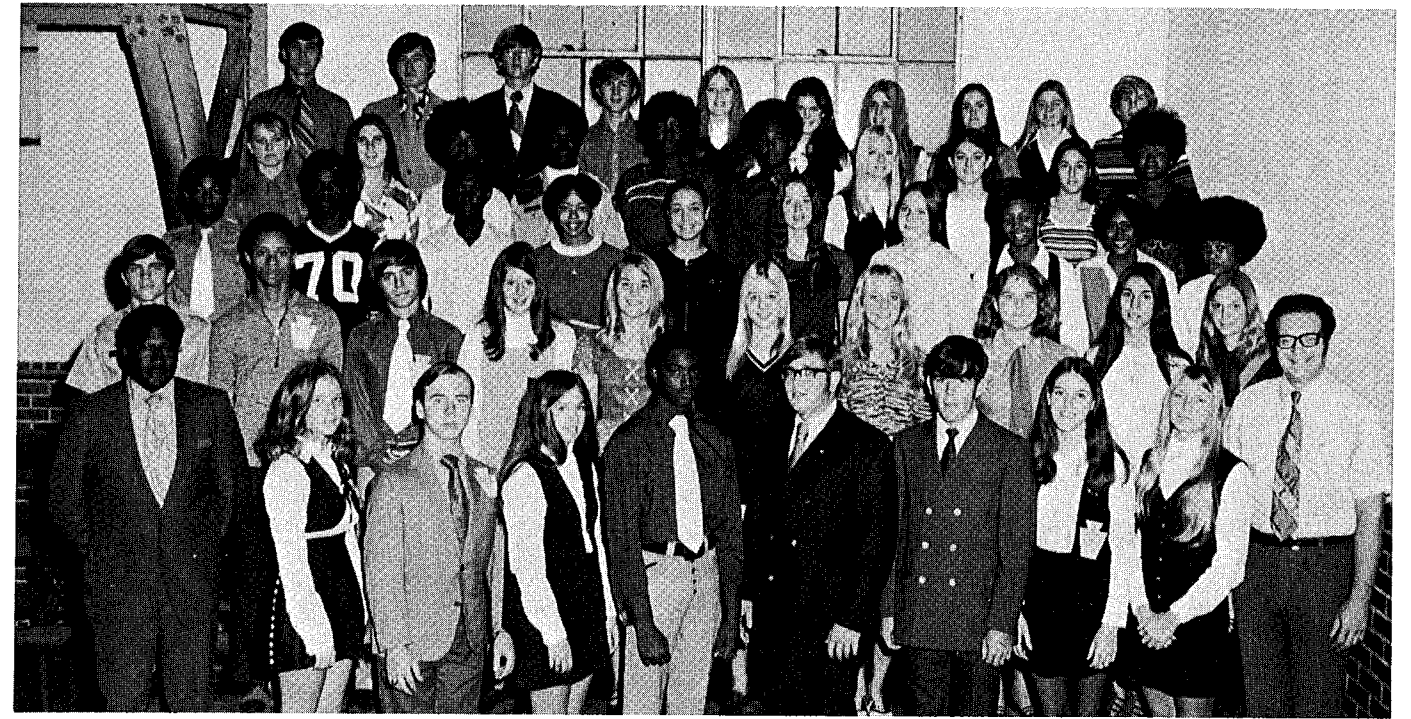
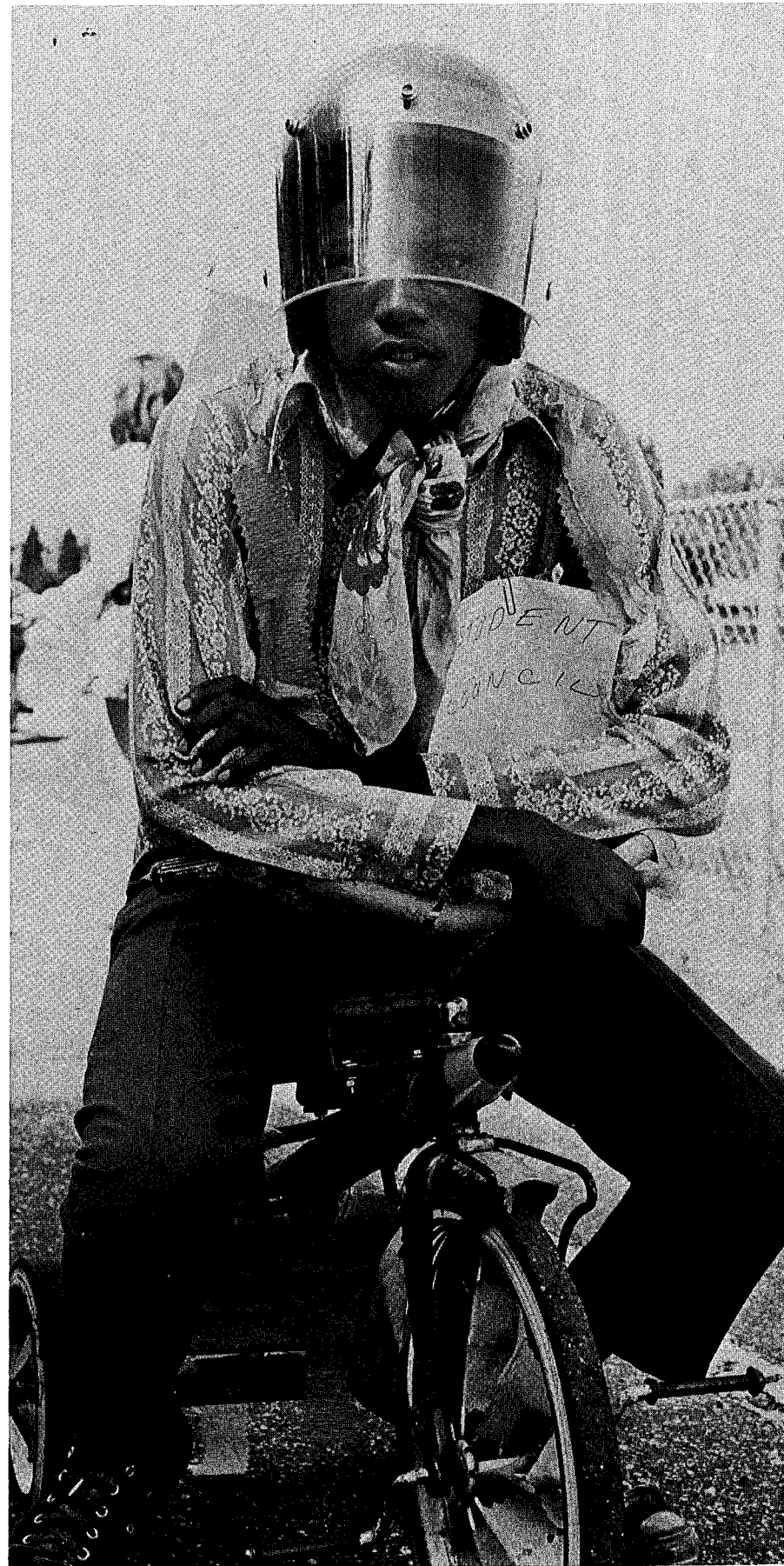




## Homecoming . . .

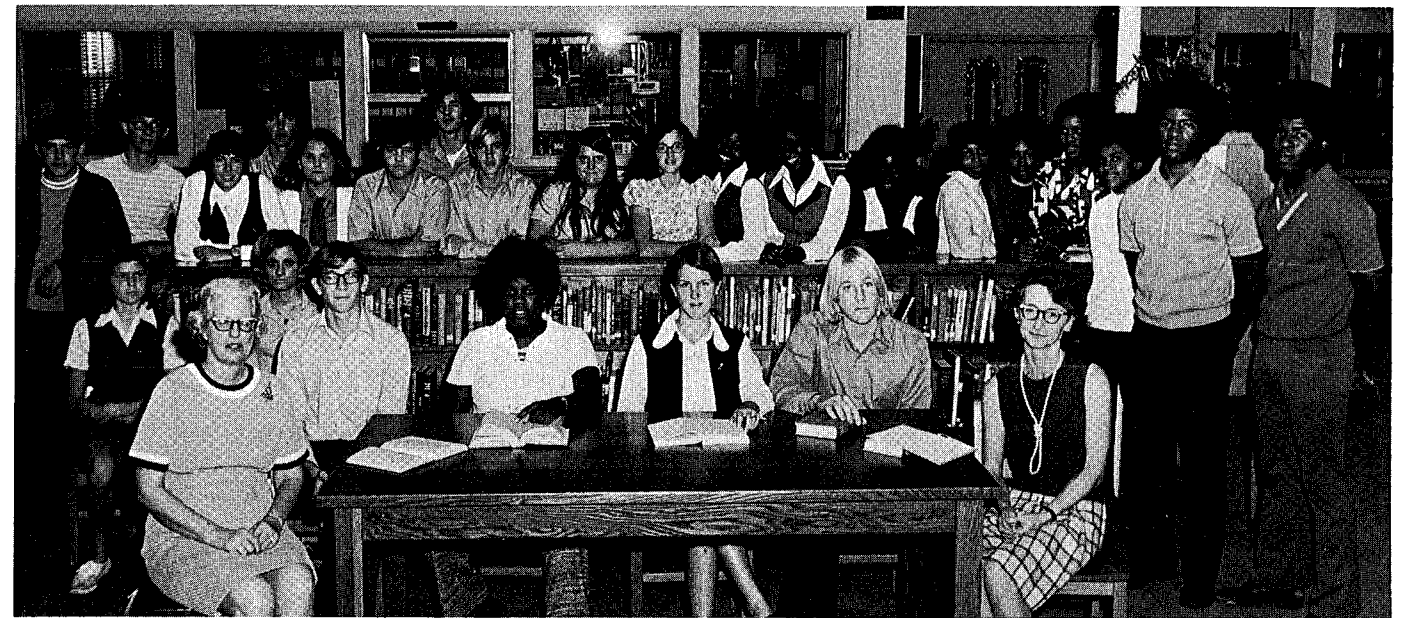
