## Dra. Silvia Morales Chainé - PhD in Experimental Behavior Analysis, UNAM



Silvia Morales Chainé is a renowned Mexican psychologist with extensive experience in research and teaching at the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM). With a background that includes a bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree in Psychology, she has focused her research on key areas such as brief intervention to reduce drug consumption and positive parenting to prevent problematic behaviors in children and adolescents.

Morales Chainé has held roles of academic responsibility, serving as the Academic Head of the Master's in Addiction Psychology and coordinating training centers in Psychology. Her work has extended to training healthcare professionals in early detection and brief intervention models, funded by major institutions. In addition to her contributions to human resources training in psychology, she has stood out for her participation in national and international conferences and for her extensive academic output, which includes numerous articles and chapters in specialized books on child psychology and addictions.

In recognition of her dedication and contributions, Silvia Morales Chainé was distinguished as a National Researcher Level I by Mexico's National System of Researchers (SNI), reflecting her significant impact in the field of psychology and addictions at a national and international level.

Parent leader, Santa Maria JUHSD



Originally from Etzatlan, Jalisco Mexico, Petra immigrated to the United States nearly 30 years ago in search of better life opportunities. Married for 28 years and mother of three children, Petra currently resides in the City of Santa Maria, CA.

For many years, Petra had jobs that were very physically demanding and time-consuming, however, she always found a way to stay involved in her children's education. Over the course of 22 years, Petra participated in different school activities such as workshops, field trips, conferences and had the opportunity to be part of different committees such as ELAC and DELAC representing parents from SMBSD and SMJUHSD districts.

Motivated by the experiences and impact her involvement had over the years, Petra decided to resume her studies and enrolled in Allan Hancock Community College; which allowed her to be certified as a health promoter and serve as coordinator of the program for parents with P.I.Q.E.; working as a health coordinator for Santa Barbara County, collaborating as a health educator for Dignity Health, in addition to obtaining her U.S. citizenship and GED.
