## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

Dear Parents/Guardians and Community Members, In the 2015-16 school year, Clatskanie Middle High School (CMHS) did not receive a rating for the Overall State Rating system. This is due to the US Department of Education allowing the State of Oregon to temporarily suspend the assignment of school ratings while schools transition from the OAKS to the Smarter Balanced Assessment. The results of the Smarter Balanced Assessment showed CMHS students are not achieving well in math. The district has recognized the low performance in math state test scores over the years and have adopted a K-12 math curriculum for the 2016-17 school year.

# **CURRICULUM & LEARNING ENVIRONMENT** WHAT IS THIS SCHOOL DOING TO IMPROVE STUDENT LEARNING AND TO PREPARE STUDENTS FOR THE FUTURE?

### SCHOOL READINESS

CMHS is improving student learning in mathematics by providing opportunities for students to excel in academics through advanced math courses as well as improving foundational skills for students who are not succeeding in Algebra 1 by taking a course that assists students mathematics skills and receive direct one on one instruction. Clatskanie School

District has adopted a new math curriculum for K-12 for the 2016-17 school year. CMHS has added a full time teaching position focusing on math and science. This is allowing math classes to be smaller. CMHS offers a wide variety of electives that prepare students for the work force as well as a variety of advanced course work to prepare for college.

### **ACADEMIC SUPPORT**

CMHS offers students online course work to recover credits. For the 2016-17 school year, CMHS has moved to a block schedule to allow extended office hours after school before the busses arrive for one on one support, re-take proficiency exams, and extra help. In addition, built in study-labs are offered throughout the day for students.

#### **ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT**

CMHS students are able to enrich their academics through advanced course work, dual-credit, college courses, advanced placement courses through online learning, and independent studies. Students are recognized for their hard work and effort through student recognition programs, honor roll, and scholarships.

### **CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION**

Through the grant received last year, CHS was able to create a woods processing course where students were able to learn to use a saw mill and mill their own lumber. The lumber was used in the middle school woods shop. The middle school woods shop built bird houses with the lumber for the high school environmental science class to enhance their learning about birds. For the 2016-17 school year, CMHS has expanded the CTE program by hiring an addition CTE teacher to support the middle school program.

CMHS offers a wide variety of CTE courses: Health Occupations (1 & 2), art, photography, metals, small engine repair, woods processing, wood shop, and forestry.

#### **EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES**

CMHS has enhanced their extracurricular activities. Currently students may participate in a wide range of athletics. Students also have several activities to choose from: Forestry, Speech and Debate, Drama, Band, Choir, National Honor Society, Key Club, Spanish Club, Student Council, Yearbook, and HOSA.

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
